Humphrey said that while Kennedy may be ahead in Wisconsin he doesn't think the polls reflect the closeness of the race.

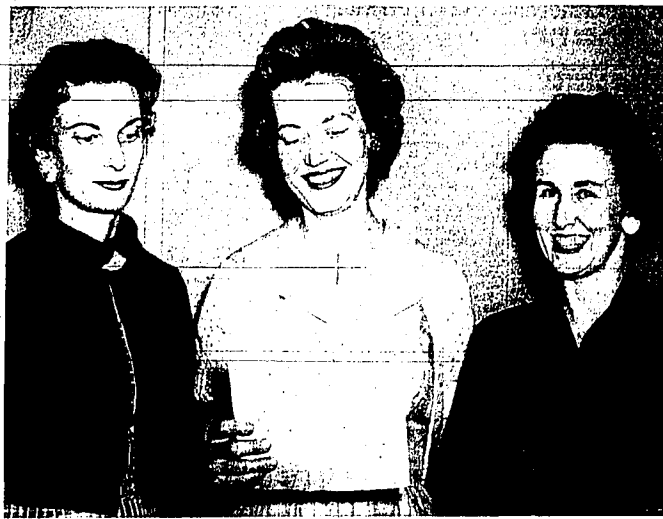
### Church Unit Notes Danger For Freedom

NEW YORK, March 25—The National Council of Churches today issued a report which it said would be published in a pattern which is probably "anti-American" and represents only to religious liberty but to freedom of expression and opinion in the United States.

The dangers lie in the leading of employment of governmental power, or more, at an official level, to induce or coerce registration of expression or to make some matter of the thought or religious opinion a test of loyalty.

For the same reason the council and its members oppose communism, Rosa wrote, but will continue to oppose any effort to use any government or communication of "in any case, to subject church loyalty to the poison of neutrality, to differentiate between religious groups in point of patriotism, and thus to undermine the unity of our nation in its life and freedom."
