### Hard-Hitting Campaign Is Nixon Pledge

LINCOLN, Neb., March 29 (AP)—Vice President Richard M. Nixon pledges a "hard-hitting campaign" should he win the Republican presidential nomination.

"With Republican party strength in the congress at its lowest level since 1956, anyone who does not recognize that we are in the front of our lives must be smoking opium," he told 8,000 persons at a party rally last night.

Blueprint Laid Out

Laying out a campaign blueprint in a 35-minute address interrupted 18 times by applause, Nixon pledged to carry the GOP "into every state, city and town that limitations of time, space and physical endurance will permit."

He offered these campaign suggestions:

Critique the Democratic record and defend the Republican record but do not resort to making, or answering, personal attacks.

"That has been my policy in the past. It will continue to be in the future."

"Don't Start too Early"

Don't make the mistake "of starting our campaign too early and have nothing left for the election."

Nixon made it clear he will not run on the Eisenhower record alone but on the basis of an expanded program of his own.

A record is coming a build-up, not to stand on, he said.

"Stand-pat, hold-the-line thinking isn't enough to meet the great challenge confronting the American people at home and abroad."

Farm Issue Noted

Nixon identified the farm problem as one of the party's "most difficult issues" and challenged the Democratic-controlled congress to do something about the problem.

"If they Democratic leaders fail to act or act irresponsibly during this session of congress, I will have made it clear that I prefer a farm scene to a farm solution."

LAKEHURST, N. J., March 29 (AP)—A navy blimp landed at the naval air station today after setting a record for sustained flight of almost four days.

The craft, a ZNP-9, landed at 8:20 a.m. (EST). It had spent 95 1/2 hours in the air, a navy spokesman said.

The previous endurance record for an ordinary airship was 73 1/2 hours, set less than two weeks ago by another navy blimp from the air station here.

The airship returned after flying an operational anti-submarine training mission more than 100 miles at sea.

### Mormons Create Stake in Britain

MANCHESTER, England, March 29 (AP)—The LDS church created its first stake abroad in Britain. Elders of the church met in this murky city in northwest England

and appointed local officers to begin their missionary work in Britain. The stake, in the Manchester-Liverpool-Birmingham industrial district, will make this region—the largest of British Muslims—independent of the missions in the rest of the country.

It was here that Mormons first began their missionary work in 1837, only seven years after the founding of the church itself. Previously, British had been one of the largest of the missions, but it was directly responsible to Salt Lake City.

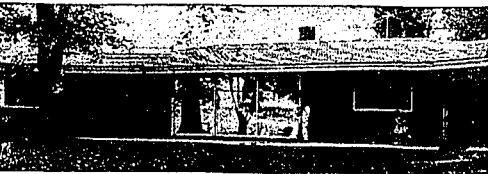

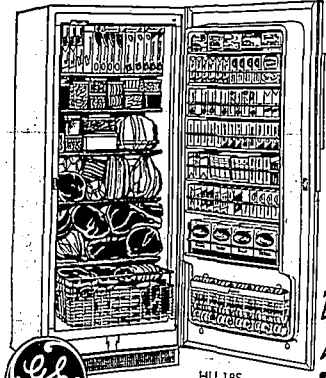

### Convict Has Started New Move to Live

**SAN RAFAEL, Calif., March 29** — Gary Chesman's attorney, using what he called a complex new weapon in the 12-year fight to save the convict-slasher from execution, filed a charge yesterday that Chesman's two death sentences were the produce of legal trickery.

The court move signalled a fight to avoid Chesman's third date with death in the San Quentin gas chamber May 7.

George T. Davis contended a new habeas corpus action that Chesman, now 38, was brought to trial in 1948 on charges of slaying kidnaping which carried a maximum sentence of life imprisonment.

But a Los Angeles jury convicted him of kidnaping with bodily harm and prescribed the death penalty. Davis said, because the judge instructed the jurors that perjured ex-avis constituted bodily harm.

The Los Angeles trial and conviction, therefore, violated a doctrine of constitutional law which contemplates to be given full notice of all charges against him, Davis contended.

### Effects of Flu Suspected As Cancer Agent

**LOUISVILLE, Ky., March 29** — Killed in action in a single day: A total of 500,000 sweepster cells in your lungs.

This can happen in a bout with an acute flu infection. Flu and chronic infections including bronchitis could lead to staggering losses of these sweepster, hair-like cells which cleanse the breathing tubes of the lungs.

Whole islands of missing cells could provide barren places where cigarette tars, chemicals from polluted air, or other agents could collect and open the gate to lung cancers, a medical researcher says.

Prevention or control of chronic lung infections thus could be a good defense against lung cancer.

Dr. George N. Papanicolaou, Cornell university medical college, told an American Cancer society seminar for science writers.

Great losses of cilia cells have been found in some victims of diphtheria in 1927, he said. The great flu epidemic and pneumonia of 1918-20 possibly could have influenced later lung cancers, Dr. Papanicolaou added.

The World War I hero's application for social security was approved last week. York, whose pension was based on the fact he is a self-employed farmer, also will get \$22 in retroactive pay.

York already receives \$10 monthly as a Medal of Honor winner and a 100 percent disability pension.

The 72-year-old York and his wife live on a small farm here. York's income tax troubles stem from money he received for a movie based on his life. The payment estimate he received about \$150,000 and should have paid \$85,000 in taxes.

"History has recorded with inexorable certainty," Smylic said, "that no great presidents ever emerged from the United States senate."

"The task of the presidency in the 1960s will require great executive skill and the most sophisticated administrative talents. It is just simple historic truth that these skills are never learned in a legislative tribunal where discussion and compromise are necessary parts of a successful legislator's equipment."

"Contrary," Smylic said, "the training and talent and experience of Richard Nixon with any one of the four senators. On every count our Republican candidate is a winner."

"In fact, no party in American history has ever been able to offer a candidate so skilled in the necessary arts of executive leadership, so trained in the field of diplomacy and so aware of the human and positive needs of America as we Republicans can put forward to carry our banner into the future decade ahead," he said.

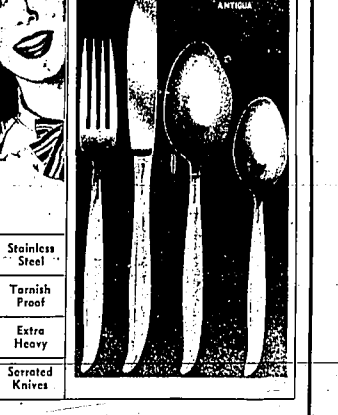

# Paul Ostyn Elevated to "Director of School Athletics" for Twin Falls

Paul Ostyn, head football and wrestling coach at Twin Falls high school, was elevated to the position of director of school athletics Monday night. Ostyn, who will continue as coach of football and wrestling, will replace Henry C. (Hank) Powers, who stepped down as athletic director after 19 years. Powers will remain in the school system and will become the second director of school athletics in Twin Falls history. The position was established when Powers stepped down as football coach in 1949.

"I am very pleased to have the opportunity to help Twin Falls maintain a strong athletic program," Ostyn said early Tuesday morning. "I intend to continue the program and assist set up by the board of education when the position was established 10 years ago. It is a great honor for me to follow in the footsteps of someone like Mr. Powers, who has spent 21 years of most of his life in athletics."

Ostyn said he planned to meet with all the head and assistant coaches in the system to lay out plans for next season.

In naming a new director, the board released an outline to govern the position. The first part outlined the phrase high school director and substituted director of school athletics in the outline which states the director is in charge of operating and conducting all athletic programs from the elementary through high school levels.

As director, Ostyn will be in charge of the athletic budget and is charged by the board to form a balanced distribution among the various sports.

Ostyn will have three assigned periods per day, starting at 7:30 a. m. to 10:30 a. m. for the remaining periods to be used for assisting in all sports and activities in the "directing, organizing and supervising" athletics.

Most officials, the outline says the director must cooperate in arranging schedules, recommending personnel for coaching positions, assume responsibility for equipping and care of all athletic equipment, and make arrangements for seating games, supervise advertising for athletic contests, and make arrangements for those eligible for athletic competition, and aid the administration in insurance procedures.

### Conviction of Negroes Lays Base for Suit

By The Associated Press  
A civil court conviction of 41 Negro students for trespassing in North Carolina has laid the groundwork for a possible U. S. Supreme court decision on lunch counter desegregation.

Attorneys for the students announced yesterday that the convictions and fines at Raleigh will be appealed first to superior court. One lawyer said the case will be taken to the supreme court if necessary.

**Terrace Law Involved**  
The appeal involves constitutional rights of North Carolina's trespass law which says in effect it is illegal to enter the entrance to the business to eat. Other southern states have similar statutes.

The students were arrested in London for the first time. The chief of police at Baton Rouge arrested seven Negro students from all-Negro Southern universities when they sought service at the white lunch counter of an S H Kmart store. They were charged with disturbing the peace.

**One Called Foolish**  
After the arrests, Louisiana Gov. Earl Long said the demonstration was very foolish. He suggested desegregated Negroes return to their native Africa and "they'll find out they're doing a lot better there."

At Memphis, Tenn., eight Negro lawyers met with the city commission and asked that all public facilities be desegregated immediately. The answer was an ultimatum in Mayor Henry Loeb said the commission is "pledged and committed to maintain segregation by all legal means."

### 75 Per Cent in Draft Rejected

WASHINGTON, March 29.—About 75 per cent of the men being called up in the draft have to be rejected for physical, mental or moral reasons.

A report by Selective Service Director Lewis B. Hershey shows the rate of rejections jumped from 66 per cent in 1953 to 73 per cent last year.

Hershey, who disclosed the figures in testimony before a house appropriations subcommittee, said higher standards adopted four years ago accounted in large part for the high rejection rate.

The United States is presently receiving about one million men 18 and over for the draft each year, and indicating about 100,000 "Three million of those rejected are classified as the lowest physical category."

### Polaris Port Is Dedicated

CHARLESTON, S. C., March 29.—The first port for atomic icebreakers was dedicated here today. Missiles will be assembled, packed, stored or loaded aboard the first ballistic submarines at the new facility. It is built on an 80-acre reservation seven miles up the Cooper river from Charleston harbor.

The defense department has declined to say whether the hydrogen warheads of the Polaris missiles will be stored here.

The Polaris missile, to be fired from submerged nuclear submarines, will have an initial operational range of about 1,300 statute miles. The missiles have been fired more than 300 miles in tests.

The missile-powered George Washington was commissioned last December and now is in operation.

The second of the Polaris subs, the Francis B. Rowan, is scheduled to join the fleet before the end of the year.

### First Missile Is Fired by A-Sub

PEARL HARBOR, Hawaii, March 29.—The navy has announced that the submarine Regulus has become the first nuclear-powered submarine to fire a guided missile from her deck.

The navy said the Regulus, christened by the Regulus II missile test work off Oahu and then guided the radio-controlled missile into plans took over.

The Regulus weapon fired 2 1/2 hours off Oahu at 6:00 a. m. and finally landed with out damage at Bonham Air force base on Kauai island.

The Regulus II was a part of the navy's development program for firing the Polaris missile from submerged submarines.

### Net Farmer Income Has Fallen in '60

WASHINGTON, March 29.—The agriculture department said today net farm income a percent below last year's—was more than seven per cent below the 1959 level in January and February.

Economists estimated in a department report that farm cash receipts in January and February amounted to \$4,800,000,000.

Net income would be down still more because farm costs in January and February of this year averaged nearly one per cent above a year earlier.

The drop in cash receipts was due mainly to lower farm prices. The department reported that farm prices rose about one per cent in January and February. But in February they still were about four per cent below a year earlier.

The department's demand and price situation report indicated some further improvement in prices in the month ending March 15. The report said average prices for major crops have improved on central markets since mid-February.
