South Demo Warns Butler About Attack

WASHINGTON, March 30 (AP)—The Democratic senatorial campaign chief today warned Democratic National Chairman Paul Butler's repeated challenges to the South and said they were damaging to the party.

"I sincerely hope that Butler's statements are not a calculated move to drive the South completely out of the Democratic party," said George Smathers, D., Fla., told United Press International.

As chairman of the senatorial campaign committee, Smathers' job is to try to get Democrats elected to the senate. He is expected to be Florida's favorite son candidate for the presidential nomination.

Butler, who long has been railing against southern Democratic leaders, recently warned them that their convention delegates may not be seated if they state Democratic presidential choices are not pledged to the national ticket.

Last week-end he invited opponents to the national party to send rival delegations to the national convention if that pledge is not made.

"I cannot understand how Butler's statements, which are criticized to astound and inflame the feelings of southern political leaders, can possibly do the Democratic party any good," Smathers commented. "Distractions and accentuation of divisions will not result in greater unity or strength within the party."

Major East-West Differences Still Exist on A-Ban Subject

WASHINGTON, March 30 (AP)—Despite the Eisenhower-Macmillan agreement on a reply to the Soviet Union's new nuclear test ban offer, major East-West differences on the subject still exist after nearly 1 1/2 years of negotiation.

How soon these differences will be settled remained a question after yesterday's meeting between President Eisenhower and Prime Minister Harold Macmillan in St. St. Berlin's communique noted that "important specific problems" still block agreement upon the atomic powers negotiating at Geneva.

They include:
1. Number of on-site inspections.
The United States and Britain want a scientifically adequate number of inspections allowed each year to make sure that suspicious events recorded by automatic instruments are just earthquakes, not atomic blasts. They say this would require about 20 inspection trips inside the Soviet Union each year.

The Soviets want a politically quiet on-site inspection system. They have proposed no specific limits but have indicated they need fewer than a half-dozen spot checks allowed a year.

2. Composition of the control commission.
The West says a control commission—the governing body for the test ban system—should have a three-two-two split among its seven members, to be composed of an American and a Britisher plus one western ally, one Soviet plus

an ally, and two neutrals.

The Soviets are asking for a three-three-one split, three members for the East and three for the West, plus one neutral. The western negotiators object that this setup would place too much pressure on the neutral and would give the Soviets a veto on all decisions requiring a two-thirds vote.

3. Staffing of control program.
The West says the 100 control stations which would be located around the world to police the test ban should be staffed one-third by persons from the country where the post is located, one-third by persons on the other side and one-third by neutrals.

The reads say they'll agree to this—provided the West agrees to their control commission proposal, reduces the number of neutrals on the control post staff and puts in charge of a national of the country where the post is located.

The West objects to having the control post staff headed by a man from the country under inspection.

4. Peaceful tests.
Moscow wants authority to set off a nuclear explosion for peaceful purposes for each year set off by both the United States and Britain.

The western powers contend there should be no arbitrary East-West matching of non-military tests.

Error in Cell Process Lets Cancer Start

LOUISVILLE, Ky., March 30 (AP)—Each day about 500 billion cells die in your body and 500 billion more are born.

In this vast factory of life a serious margin for error which can let cancer start, scientists said yesterday. They're trying to understand the process and try to devise better cancer control.

With Cells Replaced

With elegant precision, dying cells are almost always replaced by identical, healthy cells under genetic control.

But errors can creep in with something going awry to make a cell different, malignant, uncontrolled. Sometimes from outside—a virus or X-ray perhaps—can lead to a monkey wrench to produce oddities in the delicate life machinery of cells.

This estimate of 500 billion new cells daily—amounting to about one per cent of the total cells in the adult human body—was cited by Dr. M. Denere, director of the Carnegie Institute Department of Genetics at Cold Springs Harbor, N. Y.

Process Re-studied

He and other scientists, speaking to an American Cancer society seminar for scientists, outlined a program toward understanding the exactly simple yet fantastically complex process by which cells live, grow, reproduce and form new life under genetic or hereditary control.

New drugs often halt new cancers temporarily, then lose their punch as cancer cells become resistant.

Combined Drug Use Eyed

Dr. Denere said the drugs might work better if two or more were used together. This might greatly reduce the chances

that resistant cells would survive and keep growing.

Genetic studies, he explained, show that certain "hereditary" defects are often not all identical. By nature's "error" zone are able to resist, penetrate, or elude cancer's attack. This is a genetic trait. Giving both drugs simultaneously makes it most unlikely that any resistant bugs will survive.

WASHINGTON, March 30 (AP)—Census takers, many of whom are political active, are under orders to stay away from politics during the 1960 population survey.

The government has instructed a host on public talk by the census enumerators as they make house-to-house calls next month.

Democracy Helping This year, however, the political reform system seems to be breaking down in the big cities.

Republican party officials have called on Democrats in some cities to fill the quota.

The manual also advises census takers how to compute and enter heating costs for oil, gas and coal burners and how to tell a householder from a business.

Similar instructions are being given to the census-taking army in 1,000 classrooms across the nation this week before the big countdown starts Thursday night.

Listening for Life on Mars Is Suggested

WASHINGTON, March 30 (AP)—It should land a group of space living creatures, a report of space scientists suggests.

This was one of dozens of recommendations made by the space science board of the National Academy of Sciences in two reports on moon and planet exploration issued last night.

Dr. Edward R. Dyer of the space board said that the likelihood that neighboring planets harbor any kind of life capable of making a sound is "very, very remote."

Dr. Harold C. Urey, Nobel prize winner who prepared the report, said, "It can be considered a reasonable expectation that life exists on Mars... and it is possible that life may be present" on Venus.

Other reports can be questioned that if there are plants on Mars there also may be some sort of animal life and perhaps even intelligent vegetation.

Microphones rocketed to Mars might detect such creatures if they exist, Dyer said.

2 Units Have Most Delinquent Taxes

BOISE, March 30 (AP)—The delinquencies involving two tax units represent 40 per cent of the total paid, according to the Boise district office of the internal revenue service, Calvin E. Wright, director, said yesterday.

He said that Gen. John J. Williams, Delaware, is correct in saying that the total delinquent taxes last Dec. 31 was higher than it was six years earlier and only 48 per cent less than it was two years ago.

One delinquent account, Wright said, totals \$200,000 and represents 25.4 per cent of the total delinquencies. Another totals \$100,000 and represents 12.7 per cent.

"Actually," Wright said, "the number of delinquent accounts in Idaho has been cut 43.2 per cent in two years."

WASHINGTON, March 30 (AP)—Where does Ezra Taft Benson go from here? It is obvious that the secretary of agriculture does not see eye-to-eye with Vice President Richard M. Nixon on farm policy and Nixon is almost certain to be nominated for president at the Republican national convention in July.

As a result, how secure will be Benson's position in the cabinet? To longtime observers, it seems far too late for the congressional farm chief to change his concept of what is best for American agriculture to mesh with that of Nixon.

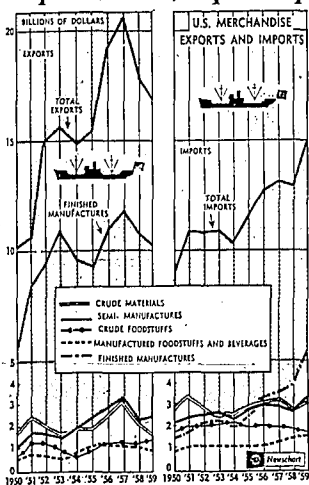

WASHINGTON, March 30 (AP)—Teen-agers should grow up better, they got married, a family sociologist said today.

By DAVID M. FULCOMER, a state policy analyst and professor at Indiana State University told United Press International that "very few people of high school age are ready for marriage."

"Marriage is for Adults" "Marriage," he said, "is for adults." But he added there is a trend in the United States toward forcing children "to grow up in a hurry."

He said parents are trying to make adults out of adolescents by forcing them "to go steady" without preparing them for the pitfalls of such relationships.

Fulcomer is the leader of a work group on current trends in marriage and family size at the White House conference on children and youth.

His group has explored the problems of marriage, divorce and remarriage as they affect children.

Marriage Age Drops
Fulcomer pointed out there has been a continuing downward trend in the marriage age. "In 1933," he noted, the average age was 23.2 for brides and 23.03 for grooms. In 1959, girls were getting married at the average age of 20 and men at 22.7.

Part of the reason, he explained, is that young girls now are more inclined to continue work after marriage than in the past "and delay 'til the 'widow' to put off the wedding date."

It also stressed that families are getting bigger. The trend in families is increasing, while the number of one-child couples is declining.

hopelessness of long continued poverty," he said.

Macrae said a nation as wealthy as America could abolish child poverty among its children if it wanted to do so. But he noted that federal relief payments under the much-altered aid to dependent children program average \$28.66 per child per month.

"Does this miserable sum reflect a genuine concern for the welfare of children?" he asked. "It is slow starvation rather than escape from the corrosive effects of poverty."

Dr. Ellen Winston, North Carolina state commissioner of public welfare, said "large numbers" of children who exist at levels of destitution are "indiscreet for any kind of relief payments because they don't fit into any of the piecemeal needs established by the social security law."

She cited, for example, the 500,000 children of migrant farm families who cannot meet residence requirements for public aid because they spend their lives on the move, following the crops from state to state.

Other speakers called attention to the special hardships of Negro children.

"Eleven per cent of all young Americans are seriously impeded by race discrimination in their search for education and jobs," said Justice George Evans of the Michigan supreme court. "The federal challenge of the 60s is for us to join in striking the shackles of discrimination and segregation from the hands of Negro children."

Other conference developments: Federal aid to education—Dr. William G. Carr, executive secretary of the National Education Association, challenged the delegates to "walk up the hill to the capitol" and urge their congressmen to support legislation for federal aid to education.

Television programs—Mrs. Eva J. Grant, Chicago editor of the National Parent-Teacher magazine, said children's programs on TV, "with few exceptions, are of several stupid and offensive; at best, inane and artless."

"We parents resent the censorship of television that results in requirements for public aid because they spend their lives on the move, following the crops from state to state."

This was reported yesterday by the national aeronautics and space administration in disclosing the first major findings by the 48-pound space messenger which already has soared more than 2 1/2 million miles on its long jaunt toward the sun.

NASA said Pioneer V has tentatively confirmed that there is a distinct region of magnetic field above the surface of the Earth.
