

6 Engine Plane Explodes, Falls Onto Little Rock

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., March 31 (AP)—A flaming six-engine jet bomber exploded over Little Rock today and rained debris and death in its plume near the capitol. At least five persons, including three crewmen, were killed. Two civilians were known dead. Flaming debris set seven or eight houses on fire, wreckage scattered buildings, and blocks around. One airman parachuted to safety. He was burned seriously. The B-47 bomber had taken off only 10 minutes earlier on a training flight from its station at Little Rock's air force base, an intelligence air command facility. A base spokesman said the plane was capable of carrying nuclear weapons, but had none aboard.

He was left with his home except for a few shrapnel wounds. He was taken to the eight-foot deep trench which the wreckage dug. JOHANNESBURG, South Africa, March 31 (UPI)—South African police clubbed Negro mobs into submission in four townships today and fired over the heads of others. Racial violence spread and whites feared a march on Durban. Helmeted troops and armored cars guarded the parliament building in Capetown. The national assembly is scheduled to convene today. A line of police held blacks in a nearby township of Lang and Nyasa while helicopters buzzed overhead as aerial snipers fired at the mob. There were widespread arrests—40 to 50 today and up to 200 yesterday. Negro opposition to the government's strict apartheid (total segregation) policies appeared to be growing. There were scattered reports of stone-throwing and rioting. Whites reported buying all the firearms available to protect themselves and their families. The threat was especially acute in the Durban area, which had a mass outpouring of thousands yesterday when 30,000 demonstrators gathered in front of the parliament building in Capetown.

Thousands Chased From Their Homes As Floods Continue

Swollen rivers which drove thousands from their homes threatened new floods today from the plains states to the East coast. Nebraska, the hardest-hit state, fought the raging rivers with sandbags and dynamite. Helicopters plucked stranded families from roof tops and dropped food and medicine to isolated towns. Crews toiled through the night placing thousands of sandbags on dikes holding back marauding streams. Demolition experts set off dynamite charges in an effort to smash mountainous ice jams. The danger in the great-belt mounted as officials said the runoff from the spring thaw was by no means over. The death toll climbed to 10-four in Missouri, three in Nebraska and one each in Illinois, Kansas and Michigan. Iowa and Nebraska appealed for immediate federal disaster aid. The American Red Cross estimated more than 4,000 persons had been affected by floods in Nebraska, Iowa, South Dakota, Kansas, Missouri and Illinois. 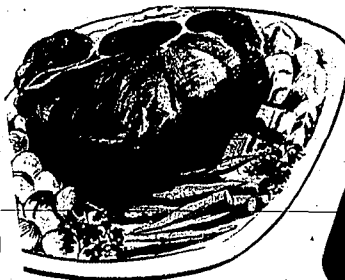

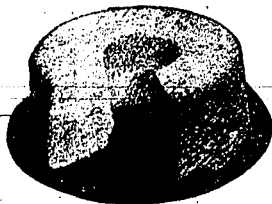

Six Million Spent By U. S. Smokers

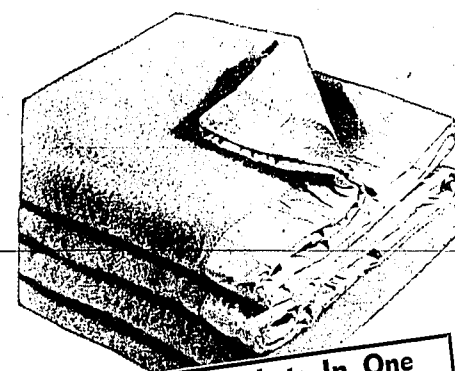

Salk Vaccine Called Threat To Humanity

BOULDER, Colo., March 31.—A prominent biologist said yesterday that he is not incriminating that we will lose an entire generation, perhaps even humanity, because of the widespread use of Salk vaccine.

Dr. Aaron Novick of the University of Oregon told the University of Colorado World Affairs Conference that the virus used in the vaccine which breaks marked physical resistance to that of human kidneys.

Antibodies Developed
The system of a person inoculated with the vaccine, therefore, develops antibodies against the virus. This is the purpose of the vaccine, Dr. Novick said.
But he claimed the human system also makes antibodies against the monkey kidney tissue. Human and monkey kidneys are so similar, he said, that it is possible that we will be producing antibodies against our own kidneys.

Salk Not Worried
In Denver, the Rocky Mountain News said it could not find Salk, developer of the vaccine, by telephone in Pittsburgh.
"The news quoted Salk as saying, 'It's not of any moment. This theory came up again and again many years ago. It has since been forgotten simply because it was thoroughly investigated, and there was no evidence that such a phenomenon was operative.'"

Joint Publication of Portlanders to End

PORTLAND, Ore. (March 31)—The afternoon Oregon Journal, which has been publishing combined editions with the rival morning Oregonian since a strike started last fall, will move back to its own plant April 16.
A joint announcement in yesterday's combined edition said separate publication of the two newspapers would resume on that date. Combined publication began 12 hours after a strike started last Nov. 10.
Managements of the papers announced the date after stiff negotiating, reached the point where independent publication was possible.

Dam Ready

SPOKANE, March 31.—The fourth and last generator at the Nason Rapids dam on the Clark Fork river in northwestern Montana will go "on the line" tomorrow, the Washington Water Power company reports Wednesday.
Completion of the \$1-million-dollar project, said the WWP, will about double the generating capacity of the firm and add 400,000 kilowatts to the Northwest Power pool.

Public-Land State Road Bill Started

WASHINGTON, March 31.—A bill to reduce the amount of money that public-land states must put up in relation to federal road funds was introduced yesterday in the Senate. The bill by Sen. E. L. Bartlett, D.-Mont., and eight Republicans would change the formula by which federal-aid highway funds are allocated to the states.

Generally, states are required to participate on a 50-50 basis. However, the amount required of public-land states is reduced according to the acreage of unreserved and unappropriated public land and non-taxable Indian land in each.

The bill would permit further reductions for three states by including all reserved federal public domain, except national forests and national parks and monuments, in calculating a state's share.

Based on present federal acreage in the states, the bill would provide the following yearly savings in the affected states' road fund requirements:
Utah \$22,214, Wyoming \$33,042, Colorado \$26,024, California \$3,122,339, Arizona \$23,612, South Dakota \$12,282, Nevada \$659,236, Montana \$301,684, Idaho \$489,229, Washington \$222,639, Oregon \$855,776, New Mexico \$683,635 and Alaska \$4,971,152.
