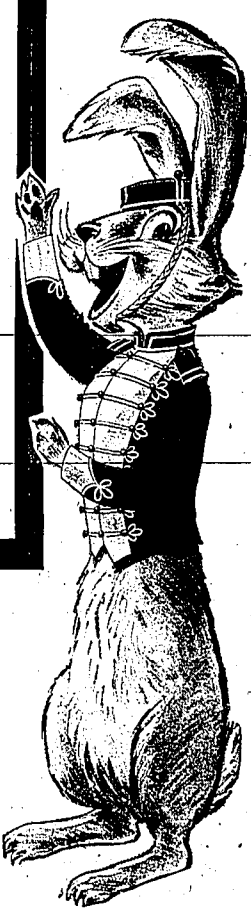

Post-War Act For Veterans Ends July 25

July 25 is the cut-off date set for World War II veteran participation in the post-war program, according to Arnold H. Helwege, veterans administration representative here.

Helwege points out more than five million World War II veterans have taken advantage of the GI bill loan provisions since 1944. Veterans who submit their applications by the deadline of July 25, for GI home, farm or business loans, will be allowed an additional year, or until July 25, 1961, to have the loan processed and closed.

World War II veterans who also served during the Korean conflict period are considered Korean-conflict veterans for GI loans.

Under the GI loan program, qualified veterans may obtain VA guaranteed or insured loans to purchase, build or improve a home, buy a farm or farm supplies, or buy or expand a business venture.

Helwege says veterans in rural areas and in small cities and towns where guaranteed loans are not generally available are eligible for VA direct home and farm-house loans.

"Dry Front" Is Given as Crash Cause

WASHINGTON, April 1—Sen. A. S. Mike Monroney, D. Okla., said yesterday a "rather rare dry front phenomenon" known as a weather front may have been part of the cause of the recent Electra plane crashes.

Monroney is chairman of the senate aviation subcommittee. He discussed the accident after a meeting of the Women's National Democratic club.

The senators said a dry weather front sometimes occurs on the borderline of a jet air stream—a channel of high winds up to 100 or 125 miles an hour, at all heights.

It may and might, although frequently breaks out and makes up of jet stream, to reduce its intensity, and they said jet streams that oppose their line of flight.

Monroney said a dry front is unlikely to show up on a pilot's radar because of the absence of moisture in the air.

He said a plane encountering such a weather front comes suddenly into violent turbulence, "almost like running into a concrete wall."

Unexpected turbulence in clear air has been suspected as a cause of the crash of two turbo-prop Electras, one near Toji City, Ind., March 11, in which 67 were killed, and one near Buffalo, Tex., Sept. 29, killing 34.

Cancer Vaccine's Progress Viewed

LOUISVILLE, Ky., April 1 (AP)—Vaccines made from their own cancer cells have helped and are helping a few cancer patients.

The vaccines tested in Dallas, Tex., and Buffalo, N. Y., mark a hopeful approach to a goal of making humans far more resistant to cancer.

Once in a rare while, people spontaneously recover from their cancer. There are numerous other people in which the body has defense systems which could be strengthened, if scientists can learn how.

Several new steps toward boosting immunity were described by an American Cancer society scientist for science writers.

Dr. Henry K. Beecher, M.D., and Dr. Eric M. Smith, Ph.D., said they found that the "increased boldness" after taking the pills was also accompanied by a greater "friendliness."

Beecher and Smith, writing their findings in the current issue of the Journal of the American Medical Association, said "The data shows that most non-defendant persons who take amphetamines in a moderate dose are likely to experience mood effects which contain both socially positive and socially negative elements."

"In the present investigation," they wrote, "increased feelings of mental and physical activation, elation, boldness and friendliness were the main effects of the drug on mood and physical states."

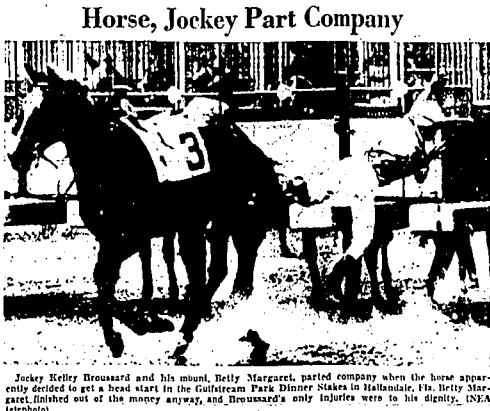

Montana State's Aid Cut Eyed by Skyline

MISSOULA, Mont., April 1 (AP)—Montana State university's attack on the policy of "obtaining athletes at the auction-block level" may have repercussions throughout the Skyline conference. Montana's action in cutting back its athletic scholarship program, effective in the fall of 1961, is sure to be given close scrutiny at the conference meeting in late May.

Dr. William E. Morgan, president of Colorado State university and head of the Skyline Council of Intercollegiate Presidents, said Thursday in commenting on Montana's action on Wednesday.

"Montana usually winds up at the bottom of the standings in conference football, but has a more respectable record in basketball."

If K. Newburn, Montana president, and Earl Lutz, chairman of the university's faculty athletic committee, emphasized that MSU's action is a late move, it is "in the event that others among our conference affiliates do adopt the university's policy in the immediate future," he said.

"Montana State university will be able to compete on a more favorable athletic basis than has been possible heretofore."

The statement added: "We do not believe that a program based on obtaining athletes at the auction-block level is a necessary part of the process of educating and receiving a university education."

The new program will offer full-time scholarships amounting to \$225 yearly, beginning in 1961. Under the current program, MSU athletes have been receiving as much as \$1,000 annually in support costs and fees.

"It is a simple fact that athletic income from all sources is not adequate to maintain a program of full athletic scholarships now or in the foreseeable future," the Newburn-Lutz statement said.
