# Herter States Threats May Wreck Meet

CHICAGO, April 4 (AP)—Secretary of State Christian A. Herter warned today that Soviet threats against Berlin could wreck chances for negotiating East-West arms control agreements. Herter's warning in a speech here appeared to be aimed at Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev. Herter declared U.S. willingness to negotiate sincerely on the problems of Berlin and free West Germany. He also said a military test ban agreement could be a historic turning point leading to a general arm control pact. "But he added, 'we can hardly move forward confidently in negotiating new arms control agreements until we have a military test ban agreement with them about Berlin as a condition precedent.' Herter accused Khrushchev of trying to 'show the seeds of suspicion and distrust among the world allies by a series of threatening speeches on West Germany.' Herter again declared the determination of the West 'to protect the freedom and security of the people of West Berlin' at the forthcoming summit meeting.

The Mississippi edged up past 64 feet in Quincy, six feet above levee level, and one of the highest levees ever recorded. The city's water is high ground and no major trouble is expected there. Skies were clearing in the mid-west. Moderate to heavy rain in southern Alabama and northern Florida continued over their area. Other rivers and streams in a half dozen other Midwest states were causing trouble for more than a week of flooding, but the worst appeared to end in hard-hit Missouri. The spring floods which also have hit Wisconsin, Kansas, Iowa, Nebraska and South Dakota have driven thousands from their homes. The American Red Cross is working to help those affected by the overflows. Damage was expected to run into the millions of dollars.

### Passage for Medical Plan Is Predicted

WASHINGTON, April 4 (AP)—United Auto Workers President Walter P. Reuther predicted today that public pressure would force congress to enact this year a medical care program for older citizens.

Reuther, who also is an AFL-CIO vice president, said last week's rejection of the labor-backed Federal medical plan by the House ways and means committee would prevent passage of some measure this session.

**Pressure Still Growing**  
He told the senate subcommittee on the problems of the aged and aging in a prepared statement that an increased volume of mail to congressmen and favorable editorials in a number of publications indicated the growing public pressure for such a program.

The House committee, he said, apparently "has not yet become fully aware of the public demand for action and of the overwhelming evidence that the best way to deal with the problem is by providing health benefits to the aged through social security."

**Plan Said Not Enough**  
Dr. James Z. Appel, Lancaster, Pa., a member of the American Medical Association (AMA) board, told the senate subcommittee the problem could not be solved simply by expanding the social security program.

Appel said in prepared testimony that the greatest problems facing old folks is not the cost of medical care but "their isolation from the rest of society."

He said the nation needed to abandon many "misconceptions about aging before real progress could be made."

The misperceptions, he said, "involve the older person's other requirements in life, whether these be housing, recreation, community understanding and acceptance, the right to be useful."

### Church Hits U.S. Defense

SOUTH BEND, Ind., April 4 (AP)—Sen. Frank Church, Idaho, said yesterday the Eisenhower administration has forced unilateral disarmament at a time when Russia has shown great strength.

"As it possible," the Idaho Democrat asked in his prepared remarks for a mock Democratic convention, "Notre Dame university, that the richest nation in history can no longer afford to be the strongest?"

Church said national defenses must be strengthened. "We cannot parley with weakness" at the coming summit conference, he said.

"Our army has shrank from 20 to 12 divisions; our navy has lost over 200 fighting ships... Khrushchev's threat to bury us cannot be dismissed as an idle boast. The communists have seized a third of the world in 15 years. Where is recorded a conquest so large in so short a time?"

Johnson said he told the Press club he was an "avowed candidate," but only in the senate race.

He said he was "kind my friends have expressed confidence in me by pledging their support. When I look at my own qualifications I get somewhat discouraged... till I look at some of the other candidates."

**Rights Bill Predicted**  
Turning to the civil rights issue, Johnson said he was certain the senate would pass a civil rights bill that reasonable men can live with.

He said there were "extremists on either side." Johnson added there were "extremists who would like to see the rights of the south and those who would like to see the rights of the north."

Johnson would not predict how soon the hotly-debated bill would be passed.

The new Mexico senator urged the state department and atomic energy commission (AEC) to make public detailed projects proposed under the U. S.-Soviet agreement signed last November.

The pact developed from talks held during Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev's U. S. visit.

"We want to know what benefits will come to the United States through the program," Anderson said. "We want to find out what our visitors will be able to see in Russia, what information we will get."

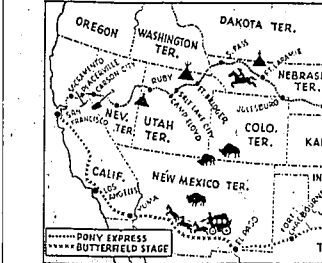

Groundwork for the Pony Express was laid in amazingly short order. Russell, Majors and Waddell formed a new company with the ambitious name of Central Overland California and Pike's Peak Express.

Russell gave his employees only 65 days to get ready. Existing telegraph stations were utilized and new ones hastily built, to make a total of about 119 "dancing stations."

Between two of these, changing horses every 10 to 15 miles at intermediate stations. Hay varied according to length and danger of the route.

Merely to establish the Pony Express required an outfit of \$100,000—for 500 of the best horses that could be bought, the hiring of 200 station tenders and 80 riders, and hay, grain and other materials for the stations.

A unique system for carrying the mail was devised. Over a small, light saddle a leather "moccasin" was fitted. In each corner of the moccasin was a padded "cushion," or box, for the mail.

To change horses, a rider merely whipped off the moccasin and threw it across a fresh mount. This one moccasin made the entire trip.

Selecting riders was of the utmost importance. Not only had they to be superb horsemen, but fearless and able to endure severe hardship.
