African Police Seize 150 Negro Groups Are Banned

CAPE TOWN, South Africa, April 8 (UPI)—Police raiders swooped down in five major cities today and seized at least 150 suspected communists and others of all races, including white men, in another move to break the Negro protest strikes against the government's racial segregation policies. Simultaneously, the two main Negro political organizations, the African National congress and the pan African congress, were banned by government proclamation. An African native stay-at-home campaign was abandoned by large numbers of Negroes who trooped back to their jobs in main cities throughout the nation. At Nyanga township outside Cape Town, scene of much of this week's violence, a militaryordonance which had sealed off the African settlement was lifted for the first time in 10 days.

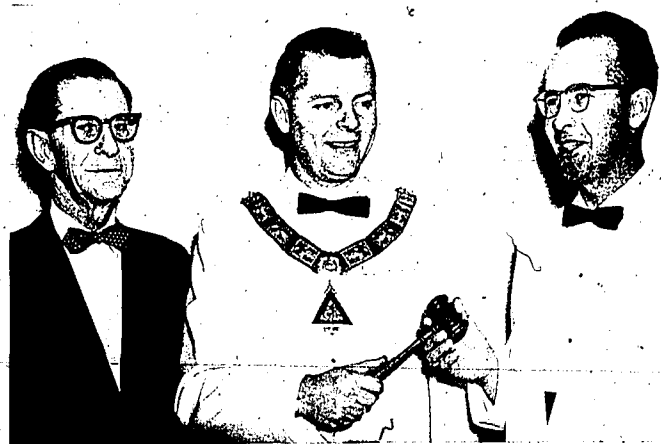

U. S. Warfare Expert Urges Potent Arms

CLEVELAND, O., April 8 (AP)—An army chemical warfare expert said today the United States should push to develop potential weapons even more potent than kill-in-a-minute "nerve gases" already possessed by America and the Soviet Union.

Hinting that some such effort may already be under way, but that an adequate program would require vigorous public support, Dr. William H. Sumneron, a deputy commander of the chemical corps' research and development command, asserted:

"It is to our national interest to uncover as yet unrevealed toxicological secrets at least as rapidly as a potential enemy nation can do so, and preferably before he does."

Sumneron made the statements at a symposium wherein he and other government scientists painted a picture of the "threat" to the United States and its allies arising from possible chemical and germ warfare—and the need for assuring strong defenses and countermeasures.

And their remarks were underscored by the statement of Maj. Gen. Marshall Stubbs, the army's chief chemical officer, who stressed some evidence that the communist bloc may surpass us in this field.

Federal School Aid Is Favored

Standing, Watching Girls Go By Favorite Argentine Sport

BURNING AIRS, Argentina, April 8 (AP)—It's a good day in Buenos Aires—or better yet if a girl here is Argentine sport—because you'll find a good percentage of the male population standing on the corner watching the girls go by.

"It's the favorite outdoor sport. Being somewhat of a sport ourselves, we decided to do an on-the-spot street interview.

"Pardon me, sir, I saw you watching the girls and I wonder if you would answer a few questions."

"Si, senior. I'm delighted. But more over a little please. You're breaking the view, that's fine."

"Your name please."

"Juan Casanova."

"Mr. Casanova would you give us an idea of your duties at this corner. I mean a few simple rules for girl-watching."

"Certainly, senior. First you have to find a spot with an unobstructed view. Then you keep your eyes open, swing your head quickly from side to side until you spot a subject. The subject is then kept in observation until its quality is judged."

"If acceptable the subject is viewed thoroughly up and down, approaching if especially worth viewing may continue after the subject has passed. Often back viewing, as it is known in the trade, is very rewarding."

"However, it is dangerous, especially for an inexperienced watcher, for another subject may be missed. Veterans glance quickly down the street to be sure nothing good is coming then and only then they begin their hunt."

"I've been noticing that you come to this corner regularly. Do all of you have favorite spots?"

"Well, some spots are better than others. I like this one because there's always a nice breeze at this corner."

"What are your hours?"

"Well, technically I'm always on duty whenever I'm in the street. The sport can be played walking along, although not as effectively as standing."

"Is it permissible to speak to the girls, or subjects?"

"Of course, senior. It is not possible you have not heard of the pickup artist's figure."

"No, I don't believe so."

"Ah, the pickup is the true art. It is the compliment to her beauty or a flirtatious remark."

"What do you usually say?"

"The simplest phrases are 'How beautiful,' or 'Senorita, what eyes' or for the more daring, 'What a figure!'"

Bureau Chief Is Appointed

BURLEY, April 8—Howell R. Gnuw has been appointed to fill the position of chief of the power division of the bureau of reclamation office at Burley, reports M. L. Tillery, project superintendent.

Gnuw will be in charge of the Minidoka project power operations in the Upper Snake river valley area, which includes the hydroelectric plants at Fallsdam, Gann and Minidoka dam and transmission systems.

Gnuw is a graduate of Pennsylvania State college, having received a BS degree in electrical engineering in 1932. He also did post graduate work at the University of Colorado. He first joined the bureau in 1940 as an electrical engineer in the chief engineer's office in Denver and was transferred to Gann, Wyo., in 1947, where he served as chief of the systems engineering branch until his transfer to Burley office.

Prior to his service with the bureau, Gnuw was employed by the Metropolitan Edison company at York, Pa., for seven years. He left his position as district superintendent of that company to enter the armed services in 1942 where he attained the rank of lieutenant in the navy as an electrical design officer. He is currently a lieutenant commander in the naval reserve.

Multiple Use of Forests Is Topic of Illustrated Folder

An illustrated folder concerning forest service multiple use management and an extensive development program for Idaho's Sawtooth mountain region is presently being distributed to conservationists, educators and other Idaho groups.

One side of the folder contains a map indicating major features and picnic grounds. The folder is number five in the Intermountain region's new education series of folders. It states "The Sawtooth mountain region covers about 1,200,000 acres within Idaho's Boise, Challis and Sawtooth national forests, and it includes the 200,000-acre Sawtooth primitive area."

Three rivers, originating mainly within the area, yield enough water to irrigate 400,000 acres of crop land. The potential timber yield is about 35 million board feet, according to the pamphlet. Elk, deer, bear, mountain goat and bighorn sheep plus several species of salmon and trout are listed as the area's most important wildlife. This entire region is open for hunting and fishing. The region is reported to furnish summer forage for 4,000 cattle and 70,000 sheep, to possess great mineral potential, and has magnificent scenery. There are 18 peaks, jutting over 10,000 feet, 355 lakes and 830 miles of fishing stream.

The folder describes the forest service area program as designed to provide harmonious development of the uses and resources. The plan calls for increasing watershed protection and improvement, reforestation of denuded timber lands with improved conifers obtained from forest service offices in Boise, Sawtooth and Challis national forests or from the regional office at Oxnard.

Control of fire, insects and disease, rehabilitation of thousands of acres of game range and intensive management and development of grazing areas involving fence construction, water development, revegetation of depleted rangeland, control of undesirable plants and a deferred rotation management system to insure pool use of forage crops. Extensive road and trail construction also will be undertaken.

Complex of the new folder can be obtained from forest service offices in Boise, Sawtooth and Challis national forests or from the regional office at Oxnard.
