### Demo Blasts Reclamation, Benefit Plan

FLAGSTAFF, Ariz., April 9 (AP)—John P. Kennedy, D. Mass., today called for modernization of the nation's social security program and attacked the Eisenhower administration's reclamation policies.

The Democratic presidential hopeful spoke before some 500 persons crowded into the Flagstaff armory for his opening show-one-day campaign trip across Arizona.

Overhaul urged "Our social security program," he said, "must be brought into line with costs and vital needs of the 1960's."

He recommended this four-point program to assure older citizens of their retirement: 1. Increased benefits scaled to keep pace with living costs.

2. Sound and effective health insurance program for those over 65.

3. Increased lump sum payment by social security to surviving spouses.

4. Increased amounts which older people may carry and still remain eligible for social security.

Roosevelt praised. "The Eisenhower administration," he said, "has left monuments of failure and shame to stand as its reclamation program. I am not here to talk about water needs or problems or tell you how the next president must answer western demands."

"I have faith in the wisdom of two great easterners—Freddy and Franklin D. Roosevelt—to whom the great resources of the West were the key to American greatness and growth."

The nation, said Kennedy, is in the midst of a depression in handling of natural resources.

### Khrushchev Said Target in France

MOSCOW, April 9 (AP)—The Soviet public was told today that Premier Nikita Khrushchev was saved from a terrorist attempt on his life during his recent visit in Paris.

An article in Pravda by Yuri Zhukov, the chairman of the state committee for cultural relations with foreign countries, said the French press had reported on a suspect, destined as Khrushchev was on the way to lay a wreath at the tomb of the Unknown Soldier.

On this suspect, Zhukov reported, was found a hand grenade, a machine pistol and 53 cartridges.

Later, the article continued, "another terrorist was arrested as he was about to make an attempt on N. S. Khrushchev's life while the chief of state returned to the Kremlin and museum."

### Stock Market Scores Gains During Week

NEW YORK, April 9.—Stocks rebounded this week from last week's five-day decline, ending with four out of five trading days.

Active picked up from the previous week's lull, but not enough to indicate the long-awaited spring rally was under way. Buyers said the new business outlook will have to improve substantially before any such rally could be launched.

The early advances were said to be only technical following the successive sessions of declines. Prices, but the spurt on Wednesday was attributed to the report on the economic situation of the country.

The first improved trading session was said to be a result of a rebound from the previous week's decline. This type of rebound has been on the average for the past few weeks.

The enthusiasm carried over from Thursday's market, but it was not the case in late in the session, as the early gains.

Traders continued their operations early Friday, but some late after effects picked up from their loss of the day—many into higher prices.

In all, the last moved higher on average in the first four trading days since the start of the week.

Some of the gains were attributed to the Dow Jones Industrial average, which rallied the week at 42.10 to 12,122.30 from last Friday's close of 12,080.30.

Many investors are the first feeling the upward movement.

Traders reported that the market picks up with the improved weather and the favorable March quarterly reports continue to flow in.

As has been the case thus far this year, market price movements reflected individual corporate developments rather than any improvement in the general news.

The exception this time was the rise in the March auto sales report.

"The 'major business barometer' was solid. Steel production continued to decline and some of the experts see a further dip. Despite the rise in late March auto sales, the auto industry this week hit 100,000 in output, and was scheduled further cuts.

Railroad loadings improved slightly; construction dipped a bit, but still ran ahead of a year ago, electricity output jumped 7.2 per cent above a year ago, and retail sales ran 8 to 12 per cent ahead of a year ago as delayed Easter shopping began.

The outlook for the economy for the rest of the year—continues to be optimistic, but some say business is good, but they add that it is not yet clear that business firms in April and May will make a break for profit for a spring start.

A steel magazine survey had 65 economists predicting a restoration of business confidence later in the year.

Sales this week totaled 14,638,970 shares, or an average of 2,927,814 shares per day, as against 12,207,850 shares or 2,441,510 daily the week before.

IBM paced the advance, rising 2 1/2 points. Texas Instruments rose 1 1/2 in this group and Magnavox 4 1/2, while Motorola dropped 3 1/2 and Zenith lost 3. Philco fell 2 1/2 on lower anticipated first quarter earnings.

Motors showed Ford up 3 1/2, Chrysler 2 1/2, American Motors 1 1/2, and General Motors up 1 1/2, and showed some individual strength.

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### Garcia Asking For Weapons In Philippines

MANILA, April 9 (AP)—President Carlos P. Garcia said today he wants atomic weapons stored in the Philippines where they can be put to instant use in event of an attack. He emphasized this includes U. S. missiles.

Garcia's top air force general, Brig. Gen. Pedro Q. Molina, quickly backed up the president. Both men were obviously thinking about the giant armies of red China, only a few hundred miles across the South China sea.

**Anniversary Noted**  
Garcia noted the invitation to the United States to bring atomic weapons here in an interview with the Associated Press on the 10th anniversary of the fall of Batista to the Japanese.

The president appears to have been thinking a great deal about the question, and chose his words carefully.

He was obviously aware of the violent opposition of some of the free Asian nations, especially Japan, to storing atomic weapons in their soil.

**Hases Site Proposed**  
The president said that if the United States felt that atomic weapons "could be kept at the American bases here rather than under control of the Philippine government."

Garcia added that the approval of the Philippine congress would be necessary. "But I am sure it would approve." There has been some congressional opposition, however, to any such arrangement.

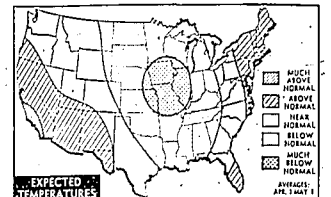

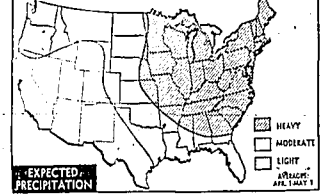

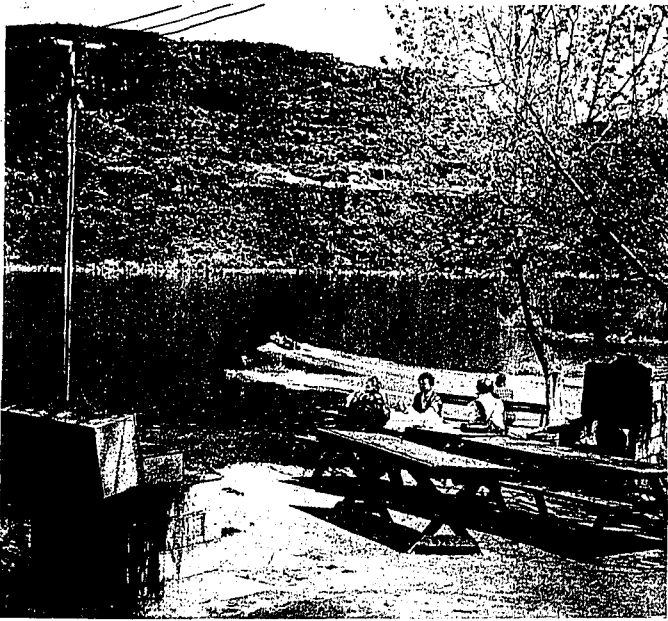

Facilities to Be Expanded at Twin Falls Park



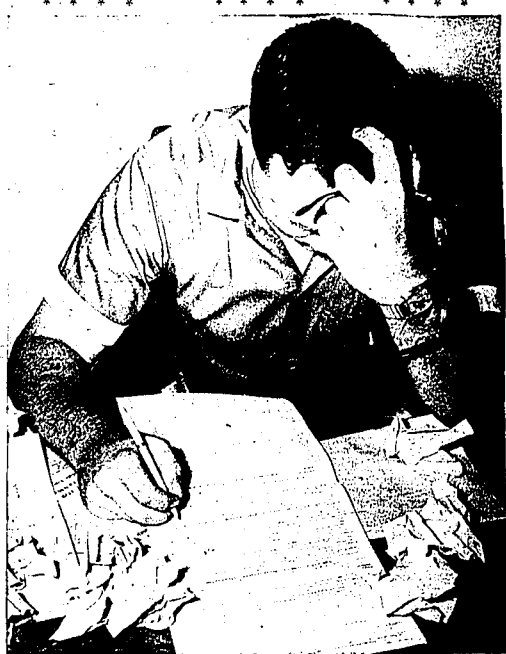

Idaho Power Plans New Facilities At Twin Falls Park This Summer

Idaho Power company announces additional facilities will be installed soon in the public park at the Twin Falls generating plant, which an estimated 15,000 persons turn into a fun-in-the-sun playground every summer. R. Moore, the utility's vice president for power plant operations, said Idaho Power will spend several thousand dollars to add more lighting for expanded night use of the popular recreation area and more electrical outlets to accommodate cooking appliances brought from home by picnickers. A serving table equipped with electrical outlets also will be installed for the convenience of the large club and family groups that use the park for outings during warm-weather months. The park, a scenic five-acre area first opened to the public by the utility in 1927, already provides electric cooking facilities, fireplaces and tables in a setting of trees and shrubs on a bluff overlooking the power plant and its reservoir. A gravel road leads from the park itself to boat-launching ramps, docks and swimming beaches. Moore reported plant personnel have started their annual "spring housecleaning" to ready the park for the flood of visitors that usually begins about Easter and continues to September or October. Superintendent of the Twin Falls plant is Calvin O. Kysar, Jr. Large numbers of tourists use the park, many of them remaining in the Twin Falls area longer than planned to enjoy its facilities. It also brings groupings for another season of public use are the recreational facilities at two other Idaho Power plants in the Magic Valley area—Clear Lake and Thousand Springs. The company's park at Clear Lake, north of Buhl, will be the site again this year for Easter sunrise services sponsored by the Buhl Municipal association. On land owned by Idaho Power at Niagara and Crystal springs, north of Buhl, the Idaho fish and game department is developing public-use areas under a license agreement with the utility providing for creation of recreation facilities. "The additional facilities in our park at the Twin Falls power plant are part of Idaho Power's continuing program to develop and maintain recreation areas throughout its system," Moore said. "It has been estimated that some 112,000 persons annually use these areas for such purposes as picnicking, camping, hunting and fishing, boating, water-skiing and just plain sightseeing. Elsewhere on the man-made Brownlee lake, two other major recreation areas have been developed by the State of Oregon and Richmond, Ore. boating enthusiasts on land donated by Idaho Power. Another area, also donated by the utility, is being developed by residents of Weiser. Moore pointed out that road from Baker and Cambridge to the Brownlee-Oregon area, once all most inaccessible, have been paved and are "in excellent condition."

Taxpayers, Accountants Puzzled At Some Inequalities in Tax Law

If some taxpayers are confused and a few are up in arms over the new state tax, it probably isn't the fault of the 1959 Idaho Income Tax. Taxpayers and accountants alike are sometimes confused, or at least puzzled, by some of the more outstanding inequalities to be found in the new law. For the most part, accountants contacted in Twin Falls believe the law is basically a good one and, so long as the state's basic faults that should be corrected as soon as possible—possibly at a special session of the legislature on those faults won't be carried through the next tax-paying session. They note this is the first time Idaho has had a revised income tax law under a new administration. The fact that it is being passed in a late session, on the federal law has made some things as arriving at the pie a income much easier than in the past. Although it is clear, they note there are still muddy places that need clarification, and certain inequalities should be eliminated. "Basically the most outstanding inequality, and the one the accountants point out first, is the fact that Idaho has given itself to tax income earned in other states in cases where an individual has moved to Idaho during the taxable year. Most of them don't consider the right of Idaho to tax the income made by residents from businesses in other states while they reside in this state, but they feel the Idaho has no right to tax income earned in another state while residing here. Such action can result in some pretty arbitrary tax procedure, they point out." According to the law, a resident means "any individual who at any time during the taxable year resides in this state, or who is in this state for more than a temporary or transitory purpose." Thus, a person can be a resident of Idaho for one year in the month, or even a few days of the taxable year and will be taxed on the income made here and in the other state as well. Many accountants feel this is an abuse of the tax law and has fostered such quips as, "Why don't we state simply tax California. There are more of them and they make a lot of money down there." This suggestion may lack merit, but to some it follows the same line of reasoning the current law employs. For example, take the man and wife, without children, who file a joint return. Assume they make a total of \$7,000—\$2,000 of which was earned in Idaho and \$5,000 earned in another state. Subtract the standard 10 per cent deduction of \$100 and the \$1,200 exemption and they arrive at a taxable income of \$5,700. Under the present law their taxes would be \$231.50. This way they have been taxed on the income they made in the other state, it may be subtracted, but most states have a much lower state income tax and so such allowances don't arrive to counterbalance the inequality. It also is possible they lived in a state where revenue was gathered from a tax such as the sales tax. So in effect they were paying taxes all the time they resided in the other state and then are taxed again here. "If this same taxpayer income was computed on the Idaho Income tax as Page 21, Column 1)

46 Enumerators Work on Twin Falls Census Count

The 1960 census of population, and housing, the nation's 18th decennial census, started in Twin Falls county Friday, April 1, when 46 census enumerators started on their jobs which will last until late in the month. According to Mrs. F. L. Rudolph, Twin Falls, one of the three crew leaders in the county, most of the work is supposed to be finished by April 22. Two other crew leaders in the county are Joseph Edgett, Buhl, and Edgar Vincent, Piler. Each has about 15 enumerators on his crew. The three crew leaders and their enumerators have about one-third of the county to check. The county is divided according to population and the division follows Pocatello from March 14 through 18. There, they learned how to handle enumerators, how to teach them to take the census, and how to care for all the book work that goes along with the census. In addition to the crew leaders and the enumerators, there is also a field reviewer to aid each crew leader. They check books of the enumerators. The enumerators, recommended by the Republican central committee, were tested and selected by the crew leaders. They were chosen by March 24. According to Mrs. Rudolph, they are mostly housewives, who are working part time. They attended school for four, one-half day sessions and then started working. Life Is "Normal" At Base in Cuba

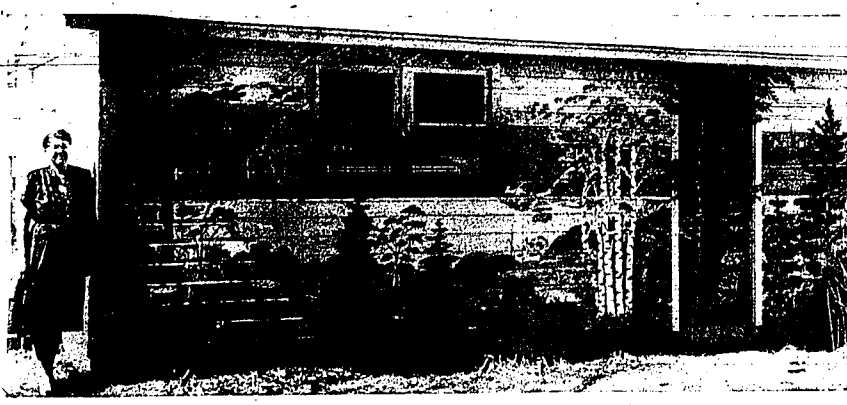
QUANTANAMO NAVAL BASE, Cuba, April 9 (AP) — Far removed from clamor raised by Fidel Castro's Cuban government in Havana, work and life go on as usual at this 100,000-man military base. If there is any concern over threats voiced by some Castro supporters to force the Yankees out, it is not apparent among the Americans living here. Cuban employees of the base—more than 3,000 of them—are increasingly concerned. But their fear of being expelled jobs, which many of them have held within the naval base for a quarter of a century. Castro's government recently asked the United States to rehire the Cuban labor leader Ernest Cuatrecasas, and complained that the naval base was hiring anti-Castro workers. So far, however, this has been the strongest formal demand made by the revolutionary government in connection with the 45-mile-square area of land and water occupied under perpetual treaty by the United States since 1902. This demand and any other, says base commander Attilio Freni, will have to be taken up with Washington. "Our job is to supply and train units of the Atlantic surface and air fleets," says heavy Admiral Freni. "Cuba is not a political concern." Meanwhile Freni and the naval and civilian personnel under him are getting on with their jobs—retraining new or renovated fleet units which sail into Quantanamo regularly for a period of instruction by Freni's corps of more than 300 expert naval instructors and keeping fleet units supplied with fuel, ammunition and other necessities. Since November, 1958, when Maj. Paul Castro kidnaped two busloads of American sailors, Cuba has been off limits to military personnel on Quantanamo. The base is cut off from Cuban national territory by a six-foot steel fence. A stepped-up recreational program and frequent jobs for civilian and military personnel to other Caribbean islands replaced the former visits to Cuban cities. Many Cubans object to this policy but it has been continued and will be, says Freni, until things settle down in the republic. What is the Quantanamo naval base? It's a huge American city dropped down on an area of 19,000 acres of semi-arid land and 2,200 acres of sparkling deep-anchorage water near the southeastern tip of Cuba. It's a major naval base capable of handling the largest American warships and the fastest naval vessels. Its subordinate commands include a naval supply depot, a naval air station with two fleets, a naval training center, an air-dependent 100-bed naval hospital, a dental clinic and a naval aviation utility squadron. As presently there are about 3,000 sailors and marines, including officers, plus 3,000 dependents and about 500 civilian service employees and dependents. When major fleet units are in Quantanamo for training the population takes a big jump—up to 10,000 men over normal as between 70 and 90 ships make the big base training headquarters. "It's no trouble to keep people busy here in their working time," says Admiral Freni. "But with Cuba cut off, recreation is a big problem. Yet most of our people like it on the base and many of them request reassignment here." He is backed up by his secretary, Meriam Silvino, formally of Mexico. (Continued on Page 21, Column 1)

She got her idea from a garage she had seen in TWIN FALLS. "If they can do it in Twin Falls, I can do it in Burley," she said with a smile.

come only, and his exemption provided for the period he lived in Idaho he would be taxed only on the \$2,000. Subtract the standard deduction of \$200 and the prorated exemption of \$300 and his taxable income is \$1,500. The tax on this would total \$32.50 as compared to the \$23.50.

Under the present law this taxpayer has paid \$102.50 worth of taxes on an income received which he received in another state.

Many persons feel the state has no right to tax such out-of-state income. And they believe the law should be changed so only earnings made in Idaho may be taxed.

Most accountants believe earnings from outside the state should be taxed only if the taxpayer lives in Idaho and has out-of-state earnings or if he works in an adjacent state—which is common in some of the border areas.

These border areas also give rise to another common inequality. That is a double excise tax when a married wife file separate returns, which is mandatory if one of them works outside the state and another inside the state. The non-resident tax return, there is no joint non-resident tax return. There is a \$10 excise tax, a total of \$20.

Some accountants said they are in disagreement on the effect of this feature; feel that line seven

on page two of form 40 can result in certain inequalities, depending on the nature of the taxpayer's return. Most of them feel that the person who is dealt with in an unusual manner is the person who used the standard deduction, and the degree to which he is affected will vary with each circumstance. The inequality can vary from a few dollars to \$86, according to one accountant. And the person who makes \$5,000 or less, is the one who often bears the brunt of the inequality.

A general criticism is that the overall tax rate in Idaho is much too high, discharging both individuals and industry. One man pointed out that the standard tax reports for customers who introduced him to the tax systems of a score of states and Idaho was higher than that.

This results in few benefits to the resident and the industries. One accountant remarked that not only did it discourage industry from coming here, but it knew of a few who are considering leaving the state because of the high tax rate.

## Let's talk dry cleaning

SHRINKAGE is one of the most frequent problems that occur in washing clothes, regardless of the cleaning method. Although dry cleaning reduces the least degree of shrinkage of any method, there are still cases when shrinkage will occur.

Sometimes such shrinkage is a gradual thing, occurring a little bit at a time with each cleaning, but without your noticing it. All of a sudden the garment is too tight, and it's only natural to blame the dry cleaning. But in some fabrics even the most careful treatment can't completely avoid shrinkage.

There are various reasons for this. One is the effect of the wetting fabrics by either the fabric or the clothing manufacturer. Shrinkage is caused by the wetting and drying can add to this stretching. When such a garment is cleaned by the behavior method, it will relax to its normal state. This is called relaxation shrinkage.

The best way to avoid shrinkage is to check labels carefully before you buy to make sure the garment is pre-shrunk. You can make every effort to minimize any possible shrinkage in dry cleaning. You can bring in your fine clothes with the confidence that if it can be cleaned safely, we can clean it and will prompt pickup and delivery.

## Hay Fields Irrigated in Area Where Water Supply Short in Normal Year

For more than a week now, hay fields on two ranches have been irrigated in an area where water is usually short even of Hub butte on the Salmon tract.

The ranches belong to William T. Williams and John Pustor. Both men own shares in the Salmon River Canal company.

Williams built a reservoir south of his homestead in 1947. A 25-acre lake that can contain the 350 acre-feet of water decreed to him from McMillan creek. The reservoir is nearly full now.

In the fall the reservoir is dry, and Williams prefers to use the water now flowing out of the

mountain into it rather than letting it spill over and go nowhere.

Some of the water flowing into the ditches he built are going to Pustor's farms, and the remainder is flowing through Williams' private canal to his hay ground.

When the hay fields are wet, Williams will use the water for his bean ground, saving a power bill on his pumps.

Williams is aware his ground watered too early may slow growth in cool weather, but he has to use the water now or not at all. He also says once the hay does start growing in the warmer month of May, having been irrigated, it will con-

## Report Given on Winter Wheat in Areas of Nation

WASHINGTON, April 9 (AP)—The government's weather and crop bulletin for the week ended April 4 said winter wheat raised from planting in the corn belt and northern Great Plains to making excellent growth in the southern Great Plains. The crop also made fair progress in the Northwest.

The weather bureau said that most factors that affect production prospects remain on the plus side. Moisture supplies are mostly plentiful, no serious insect infestations are present, and winter damage has been generally light.

The situation for barley and oats production remains unfavorable as winter kill was heavy on the fall-sown acreage, and adverse weather and wet fields continue to delay seeding of spring acreage.

## No Alarm Advised Over Minidoka's Spider Mites

RUPERT, April 9—There is no need to be alarmed over the appearance of Pacific spider mites that are invading some houses, says Minidoka County Agent W. O. Priest.

These mites began showing up with the warm weather, and are confusing housewives, he said. They are tiny reddish-orange plants that wintered in lawns and shrubs and are now crawling up the sun-heated walls of the houses. They climb up the walls in an effort to get warm and also to reach for food.

They will enter the house around the door and window casings and seem to accumulate at the fire-trapped area they come to, said Priest. They are noticed first in sinks below a window and in the corners of solid walled rooms.

These insects cause no damage, said Priest, and as a rule do not bother anything after the lawns and shrubs begin growing and the

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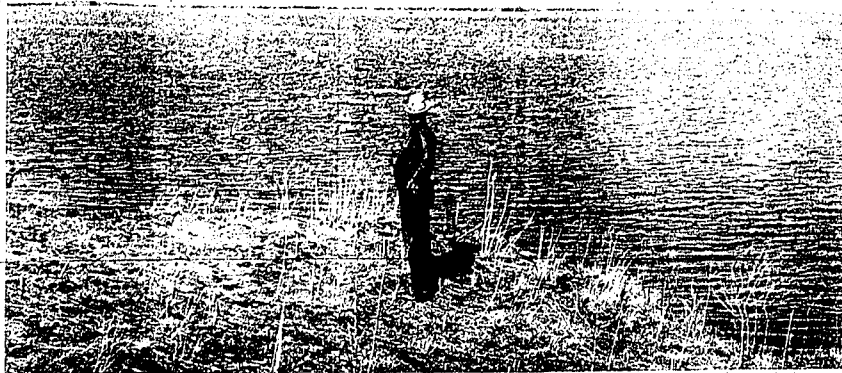

## World Wheat Surplus Dips Slightly in 1959; Still High

WASHINGTON, April 8 (AP)—The agriculture department reported the world wheat surplus declined slightly last year, but still was the second highest in history.

The department said world wheat production in the 1958-59 crop year up about 10 per cent from the previous fiscal year.

But it warns the rate of increase, which nearly doubled since fiscal 1955-57, appears to be slowing because of increased production in Europe and more competition from the southern hemisphere and the Middle East. In the 1960-61 season, however, drought in those regions would total 12 million metric tons for the year ending June 30 may reduce their competition.

The production total was about three per cent below the record harvest of the 1958-59 crop year, but still the second highest on record and 28 per cent above the 1950-51 average.

The department also said cotton, breaking crops of corn, cotton, coffee and cocoa have been or will be harvested for the 1959-60 season. And despite the prospect of record consumption of feed grains, the world surpluses of these crops are large.

### More Sheepmen Move Shorn Flocks Out To Desert Ranges as Weather Warmer

More sheep operators around Magic Valley send their bands of shorn ewes and lambs out on desert ranges last week. Until warm weather arrived some operators had misgivings about the stress to which their recently shorn animals might be subjected in case of storm flurries or cold wind. This worry has faded. Most of the ewes have been shorn, and prices received for the fleeces are reported at 43 to 50 cents a pound. The variation is caused by the amount of dirt on the fleeces and whether they were contracted earlier in the season. For some operators, the price is about 10 cents a pound more this year than last. Not all bands are shorn before they go out on the range. Robert Brock, Rupert, trails his quality yielding ewes across the desert on the north side, and shears them when they reach Arco in the late spring. Brock purchases his yearlings in Wyoming with the agreement to sell some back to the original breeder. He sold many of the others to sheepmen here with an eye for quality replacements. Not all lambs from this winter crop will go out on the desert. At the Glen Boggs ranch east of Murfreesboro, one of the lambs born in December weigh from 60 to 80 pounds. These will be held back in the feedlot for fattening, according to Kent (Bud) Davis, sheep foreman at the ranch. As the sheep are moved out on pastures and the lambing sheds stand bare, many operators dis-

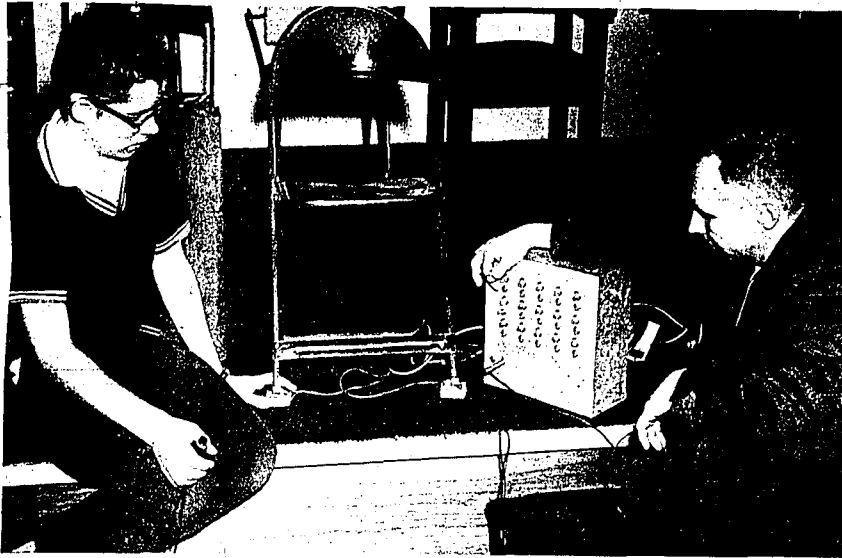
