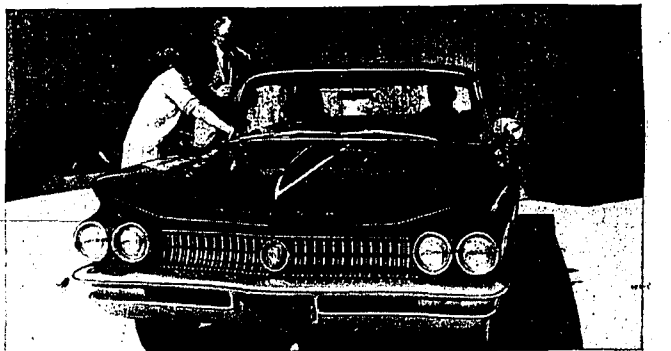

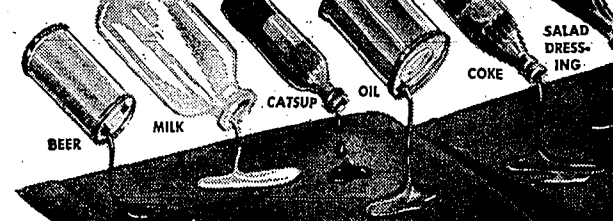

Chou En-lai Starts South Asian Visits

TOKYO, April 13—Premier Chou En-lai set out today on a three-nation South Asian tour designed to mend fences damaged by red China's actions in Tibet and border disputes with her neighbors.

The 61-year-old communist premier will visit all of his suzerain on his visits to Burma, India and Nepal.

Adams Shocked

Communist suppression of the uprising in Tibet shocked many Asians who formerly were apologists for the Peking regime. Movement of Chinese troops into territory India considered her own infuriated the Indians. News that the Chinese now are claiming Mt. Everest up the Nepal, who take great pride that their little kingdom is the home of the world's highest mountain.

High hopes of the tour will be laid rest in New Delhi between Chou and Indian Prime Minister Nehru on their dispute over 51,000 square miles of Himalayan territory between India and Tibet.

Solution Not Expected

Nehru already has put a damper on the meeting by expressing doubt that it would lead to any immediate solution of the dispute. At stake are 25,000 square miles in the Ladakh area of Kashmir. Chinese forces have penetrated into both tracts despite India's contention they have long been Indian territory. In border clashes last year 12 Indian policemen were killed.

Nepal recently concluded agreements with Burma and Nepal ending their border disputes.

Democracy in Korea Is Said Under Threat

SEOUL, April 13—While U.S. President Dwight D. Eisenhower prepares to pay a brief visit to this distinctly pro-American nation, the Democracy that the United States is trying to help take root in South Korea is in danger.

The nation has been upset by political strife ever since the 1954 presidential election. Almost daily demonstrations have been staged somewhere in the nation protesting the elections as "fraudulent."

In the southern port city of Masan, about 200 miles south of here, the demonstrations repeatedly turned to rioting. There was death, injury and destruction.

President Eisenhower, who was re-elected without opposition to his fourth consecutive term as the young republic's only president, came under strong public fire.

It was the first time someone political discovers here could recall that there have been widespread public demands for the resignation of the 68-year-old president.

The opposition Democratic party, which has declared the elections "illegal and null and void" and which has filed suit with the supreme court to have them nullified, claims the demonstrations are "grassroots uprisings" against the election tactics of the ruling liberal party.

The liberals claim the Democrats are trying to create unrest in the country. The government claims the communists have a hand in the matter.

1960 Diphtheria Toll Rises to 90

POTATELLA, April 13—Southern Idaho's 1960 diphtheria outbreak grew by 10 cases over the week-end, a health officer said yesterday.

Dr. Victor Overholt, director of the southern Idaho district health office here, said all 10 cases are in Blackfoot—two new ones and eight previously suspected ones that were confirmed.

The 10 raise to 90 the number of cases noted in southern Idaho so far this year. The disease is highly rare nowadays, because of vaccination practices. Most of the cases have been noted in Blackfoot county, in which Blackfoot is located.

Dr. Overholt said the previous record for a given year, according to his files, was 1923, when 87 cases of diphtheria were recorded.

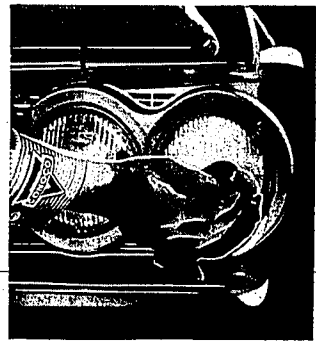

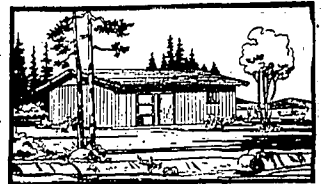

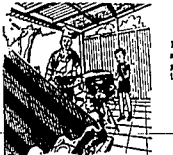

Tax Officials Wait to Pay U. S. Citizens

WASHINGTON, April 13 (AP)—Here's news bigger than man-bites-dog: The government wants to pay 20 million dollars to the taxpayers.

The money is in the treasury, waiting to be disbursed by about 400,000 taxpayers who failed to receive their income tax refund checks over the years.

The government will keep the money available "forever," the treasury told United Press International.

This information was disclosed as time was running out for the nation's 60 million taxpayers to file their 1959 income tax returns.

In 37 states, the deadline is the usual midnight, April 15—Friday. In the other 13 states the deadline has been pushed back to midnight next Monday because April 15,

Farm Wages Rates Reach Record High

WASHINGTON, April 13 — 672 farm wages are at their highest rate in history.

The agriculture department said the U. S. average composite rate per hour for farm hired hands on April 1 was 74 cents. This is nearly five per cent above the comparable rate a year ago. The index of this average, seasonally adjusted, is 60 per cent of the 1914-15 base.

Rise in U.S.-Wide

The department said the increases in farm wage rates were broadly and consistently reported throughout the states and appeared in each type of hiring arrangement on such rates were obtained, whether per month, per day or per hour.

The composite rate per hour was calculated from these rates by type as of April 1. Per month with board and room, \$165.00 per month with board and room, \$34.75; per week without board and room, \$45.75; per day with board, \$5.20; per day without board and room, \$5.00; per hour with board, 77 cents; per hour without board, 69 cents.
