Senate Rights Plan Termed South Victory

WASHINGTON, April 18 (AP)—Sen. Allen J. Ellender, D. La., called the senate-union debate on the bill a "victory for the South."

His claim yesterday highlighted a continuing North-South debate over impact of the legislation awaiting expected house approval later this week.

"Worth Vote" Senate liberals, who voted for the revised bill on final senate passage, contended that the bill was "worth voting for" but did not go far enough in securing Negro rights in the South.

Ellender said southern senators had managed to hold "so-called liberals at bay" in securing the bill's effect on southern states.

He cited a dozen changes in the original house bill as evidence of "elimination of most of the provisions which would have severely penalized the people of the South."

"Bills Called Advance" "Frankly," he said, "I regard the outcome of the senate debate as a victory for the South, although I would have preferred that no bill at all be passed."

But Sen. Prescott Bush, R. Conn., said he regards the final bill as a "substantial advance" in the field of civil rights.

Sen. Jacob K. Javits, R. N. Y., said Republicans had agreed that "we didn't go further with the bill" but he said "it was an advance" in securing voting rights and "worth voting for."

Confidence in Negro Action Is Expressed

A Negro integration leader says a new demonstration is dramatizing the position of the Negro in the South and predicts they will be upheld legally.

The expression of confidence came from the Rev. Martin Luther King, Jr., at the start of the 11th week of the Negro campaign against segregated lunch counters.

Negro Meets Press
The 31-year-old Atlanta Baptist pastor appeared on the NBC television program Meet the Press in Washington last night shortly after a Negro college student conference at Raleigh, N. C., laid the groundwork for formation of a Southwide organization.

King contended that sit-ins might violate local laws. But, he said, "in breaking local laws we are really trying to draw attention to laws as set forth in the 1954 U. S. supreme court's decision on public school desegregation."

The man who led the successful bus boycott in Montgomery, Ala., in 1956, said that if the local laws against sit-ins reach the supreme court, they will be held to be in violation of the basic guarantees of the constitution.

More Action Wanted
King said he felt both the congress and the President could and should do more to hasten integration.

This statement was echoed in the findings and recommendations of the Easter Weekend National conference attended by 142 students from 11 southern states and the District of Columbia.

The student steering committee said in a statement there was a possibility President Eisenhower might go to Africa this fall.

The committee said, "If we feel that before going to Africa, the President should lend the prestige of his office to the desegregation of public buildings in this country and that he shall be even better prepared for his visit to Africa."

India Protest Rally to Meet China Leader

NEW DELHI, India, April 18 (AP)—The All-India party announced today it would mass for a black flag demonstration tomorrow when communist Chinese Premier Chou En-lai arrives for a conference on Sino-Indian border troubles.

Mahabub Khan Singh, the party president, said he and his followers would march to the Presidential palace carrying black flags of protest.

It Will Be Peaceful
"The demonstration will be peaceful and disciplined," he said. "I myself will lead the march."

He said his aim would be to demonstrate India's firm determination not to tolerate aggression from communist China.

Thousands of Indians paraded to Premier Jawaharlal Nehru's residence yesterday demanding that he not allow ground in his talk with Chou.

Procession Grows
Less than 200 started a five-mile march to Nehru's home but by the time it reached there the procession was five miles long.

Banners "No co-existence," "stand firm... beware of China's satellite," "no bartering of Indian interests," "not an inch of territory will be yielded."

Despite the 100-degree heat, men, boys, women with babies chained, as well as "death to double-faced Chou."
