Loan Agency Draws Blast From House

WASHINGTON, April 20 — House investigators accused the Development Loan fund (DLF) of carrying millions of dollars of foreign loans without knowing exactly how the money would be spent.

The house government operations committee unanimously approved a bill recommending that Congress consider abolishing the DLF if the lending agency doesn't adopt more businesslike tactics.

The report was issued only a few hours before the house was scheduled to launch debate on President Kennedy's four billion dollar foreign aid program.

Tighter Control Asked
The house bill did not contain any spending authority for the DLF, but carried language designed to tighten up the fund's lending activities.

Congress set up the DLF in 1957 to make "soft" loans, repayable in foreign currencies, to finance industrial projects in underdeveloped nations. In four years it has received appropriations totaling 14 billion dollars.

The house committee report said it was Congress' intent when it created the DLF that it should make loans only for specific projects and programs, screened in advance.

Yet, it said, the DLF actually has been setting aside or earmarking money for particular governments and approving projects within this dollar amount at a later date.

Comparison made
"Once the recipient governments have been promised aid in a certain amount, they have been known to take the view that DLF is here to be bureaucratic if it scrutinizes too closely the projects to which aid is to be put," the report said.

A staff investigator said that in some instances the procedure has been comparable to an individual getting a \$2,000 auto loan from a bank and then spending the money for a week-end with a home.

In a statement commenting on the report, the agency had made some advance commitments in the past but no such commitment had been made since 1958. In the 1959 fiscal year, it added, 51 of 62 loan agreements signed were for projects.

Furthermore, the DLF argued, advance commitments could save money for U.S. taxpayers, it said they could be used to encourage contributions of foreign capital from other nations, and to bring about economic reforms to more efficient use of U.S. funds.

Kefauver Unit Drug Charges Get Challenge

WASHINGTON, April 20 — The drug industry today angrily challenged charges by Sen. Estes Kefauver, D. Tenn., that the industry lacks competition and thus can "coerce" the public with high prices.

Dr. Austin Smith, president of the Pharmaceutical Manufacturers association, in a return bout with Kefauver, said just the opposite was true. He said keen competition exists within the industry.

Charge Denied
So much, he said, in prepared testimony, that drug companies have been criticized by the same Senate investigators for alleged "competitive excesses" in selling their products.

Medical witnesses charged last week that doctors are subjected to much misleading and unnecessary drug advertising and promotion "ballyhoo" which only booted prices to the public.

But Smith said, "It is impossible to show that the drug industry is monopolistic or highly concentrated for all the evidence is to the contrary."

1,200 Firms Claimed
He said 1,200 drug firms were vying in the U. S. for business and the number has been growing. However, not one of the companies, he said, can claim a corner on as much as 10 per cent of the total market.

"The industry official charged that exhibits worked up by the subcommittee's staff to show a monopoly on certain drugs were 'incomplete and distorted.'"

Water Charge Increased by Burley Group

BURLEY, April 20—The Burley city council instructed Herman Becke, city attorney, during its meeting Monday evening to draw up an amendment for the present city ordinance making \$100 the minimum charge for new installation of water to city property.

New subdivisions coming into the city will be required to pay this amount for all of the lots shown on the plat in advance. The former minimum charge was \$70.

By revising this money in advance the city will have enough money to install new water systems and meters, it was pointed out.

A 40-acre plot on Park avenue was submitted by Northwest Construction, Idaho Falls, and was approved subject to some revisions. This would accommodate 70 homes.

A plat south of the city on Albu avenue and 16th street was approved by Truman Havelock, city engineer, and Bill Barnhill for approval.

Warrior Rhee Facing Worst Crisis as Chief

TOKYO, April 20—Old warrior Byungnan Rhee is under the heaviest fire of his long turbulent career since he came to an angry section of the nation he dedicated his life to creating—the Republic of South Korea.

Can he survive? Students and opposition politicians have called for his resignation. They say this will quiet the violent demonstrations that have led to martial law and rocked the nation in the wake of charges Rhee's March 15 election to a fourth term was rigged.

The tide of opinion seemed running strong against the 83-year-old, staunchly anti-communist leader. But few felt he would step down.

Rhee is a man of many images: The revolutionary leader who stood against Korea's last monarchy and Japan's occupation from 1905 to 1945.

The patriot who suffered torture, imprisonment and humiliation but clung to his dream of a free, independent Korea.

A man of stubborn courage who at times has been almost a lone voice calling for a way out to crush communism, and drive the communists from the northern half of the nation.

A scholar and Christian, a conservationist, a tireless worker. A dictator tolerating no opinions but his own, ruling with an iron control like a Chinese warlord.

A doctored old man, crippled by a growing senility, surrounded by "yes" men who have used him to screen their erosion of a power structure to maintain themselves in office.

Some say Korea's capacity and yearning for democracy has outstripped the government's ability to grant more freedom, and that the Korean people have outgrown Rhee's own understanding of them. They say they are no longer children willing to be ruled by a stern father.

Whether this be true, Rhee is faced with a personal crisis of great magnitude never before. This time police efforts to crush anti-government outbursts have touched off deeper and more widespread uprisings. Efforts to use softer tactics have failed miserably.

This is the dilemma of Rhee and his government as they face the world's most colorful figures in the twilight of a spectacular career.

Nothing Hurts Politicians as Much as Public Indifference

WASHINGTON, April 20—To a politician, the thing that hurts least is the indignity heaped upon him by his opponent as the indifference he's metted out by the public.

This is a politically minded land, and to a foreigner politics sometimes seems to be our major recreation.

Yet this interest, as every politician knows, can be overestimated. The West Virginia primaries coming up May 10, for instance, could mean the death of presidential hopes for either Ben. John F. Kennedy, D. Mass., or Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey, D. Minn.

Yet a survey there last week showed that many voters had trouble remembering who was running. One man remembered Kennedy's name, but he thought his opponent was a fellow named Murphy.

Not in West Virginia unique. Anyone who has ever wandered around the grass roots has found that a disturbing number of voters couldn't care less.

It's curious that the better our communications, the more poorly we may be informed. With newspapers, radio, television, and news magazines to tempt eye and ear, how can anyone fail to keep moderately informed?

Possibly it's partly because we have become a nation of city dwellers with so much to entertain us. How many would go miles today to hear Lincoln debate Douglas? It's easier to go to a nearby drive-in, or to turn on TV and watch a western.

Maybe there have always been islands of indifference, but the early writers didn't find them. Alexis de Tocqueville, the great French observer, visited here over a century ago, and gave a report on pre-election activities.

For a long while before the appointed time has come, the election becomes the important, and, as to speak, the all-encompassing topic of discussion. Factional anger is redoubled, and all the artificial passions which the imagination can create in a happy and peaceful land are excited and brought to light," he wrote.

As the election draws near, the activity of intrigue and the agitation of the populace increase; the citizens are divided into hostile camps, each of which assumes the name of its favorite candidate; the whole nation glows feverishly; excitement; the election is the daily theme of the press, the subject of private conversation, the end of every thought and action, the sole interest of the present.

"Who the voters are well-informed," Thomas Jefferson once wrote, "they can be trusted with their private opinions and their votes." Well-informed is the key here. Let's hear no more about Murphy.

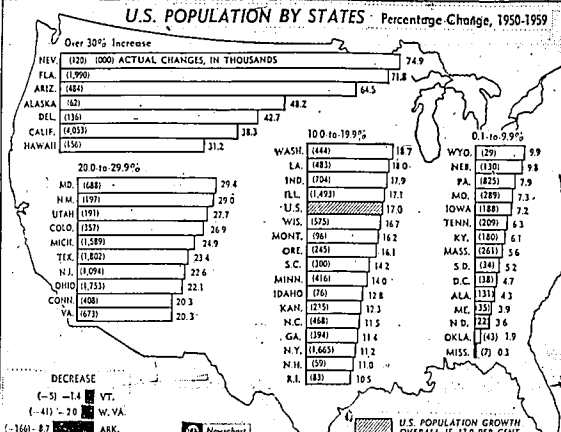

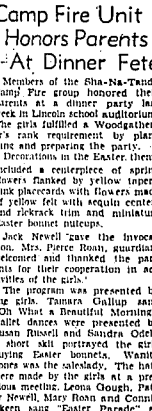

The victory was the fourth for the representative of Finland in the past seven years of the 26-mile, 385-yard test from suburban Boston to Boston's Back Bay. It was a personal conquest for Kotilla who finished fourth on a bad leg in his only previous appearance in 1955.

Kotilla broke from the pack 11 miles from the start and steadily increased his margin from that point.

Blistered feet forced Kelley, America's premier marathoner, to drop out at the 21-mile mark after a strong showing in his past effort in this patriot's day classic.

Mckenzie, 30, who represented the United States in the 1956 Olympics at 10,000 meters, put on a stirring finish coming off the hills at Boston college five miles from the end.

The former New York university two-miler attributed much of his success to his English-born wife, Chris, who ran alongside him at the various check points, stocking him and suturing his pain.

West told a group of about 200 persons who marched on city hall he thought it was wrong to discriminate against anyone.

The mayor agreed with the Negro students that lunch counters and other eating facilities should be desegregated but added it would be a matter for the jurisdiction to decide.

He Can't Give Orders

"I cannot tell a businessman how to run his business," he said. A later debate between West and a state legislator, the Rev. C. L. Mason, preceded his remarks.

West read a prepared statement which charged West with lack of decision and put the moral weight of his office in the local conflict.

The demonstration began about 10:30 a. m. at the home of Negro city Councilman Z. Alton Lewis, who was shattered by an explosion.

Lewis and his wife, who was in a back bedroom, escaped.

Negrees Represented

Lewis, 42, a life member of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, has represented Negroes in connection with all-in demonstrations here.

The city council, at the request of West, has offered a \$20,000 reward for information leading to the arrest of the persons who bombed the home.

The couple was expected to move into a self-contained unit in effect, a three-story house—attached to a wing of the palace. It was formerly occupied by the Marquess of Carborough, a cousin of the queen who died shortly after Margaret's engagement was announced.

Kensington palace is semi-public, with its main rooms open to visitors. The building houses London city museum.

Queen Victoria was born in Kensington palace, and it was there that she was told of her accession to the throne at the age of 17.

No relative monarch has lived there since Victoria moved to Buckingham palace, but it has been the home of many royal relatives—like the Duchess of Kent, an aunt of the queen, who uses it as her London residence.

Screening of Home Buyers Is Explained

DETROIT, Mich., April 20 (AP)—A property owners group today announced a plan for screening home buyers on racial and other grounds "because no one can meet with prejudices affecting real estate values."

The group is the most careful and conservative method possible for making the best of a difficult fact, said the Greater Pointe Property Owners Association.

The association and an allied brokers group issued a joint statement in comment on charges by State Atty. Gen. Paul L. Adams that the point system was "morally repulsive."

Adams, charging discrimination was practiced on grounds of nationality, race and religion, hinted at action against the property owners. He did not elaborate.

The attorney general said the "degree of a man's accent" and "awareness of his complexion" among the factors that figured in point-scoring of prospective home owners' qualifications.

The point system was explained in a joint statement by the Greater Pointe Property Owners association and the Greater Pointe Brokers association.

It is applied in Detroit's 14th and 15th wards—a generally upper middle class group of cities. In the Lake St. Clair and St. Clair River area east of the Motor City. The communities are Grosve Pointe, Grosve Pointe Park, Grosve Pointe Farms, Grosve Pointe Woods and Grosve Pointe Shores.

A private investigator makes inquiry about a prospective home buyer when a salesman or broker has done.

According to the association's statement, anyone who is investigated must score at least 50 points to qualify as a buyer.

If he is Polish, he must score 55 points; if southern European 65, and Jewish 65.

There are no point ratings for Negroes or Orientals. The point system has been hard since 1945.

R. Noble Weatherbe, secretary of the property owners, said the point ratings are advisory to the home seller and not binding.

A form filled out by the investigator has a note:

"A station in life of sufficient eminence could be capable of other considerations in this report."

"For example," Weatherbe said, "if Einstein (Albert Einstein, the last genius) had wanted to move here, he would have passed even if he didn't make the points."
