## U.S. to Launch Communication Satellite May 5

HOUSTON, Tex., April 21 (UPI)—Senate Democratic leader Lyndon B. Johnson, Texas, revealed today that the United States on May 5 will try to orbit a communications satellite which he said could "completely revolutionize" global communication. Johnson, in a speech here, said that television can be expected to "benefit greatly" from the satellite—called "Echo"—"The eyes and ears of radio and television upon the Earth will foster, God willing, understanding not frightened isolation, free exchange of knowledge not mutation."

The satellite will be a 100-foot balloon. "The national aeronautics and space administration (NASA) will launch the balloon, loaded into a 26-inch rocket with a three-stage Thor-Delta rocket from Cape Canaveral. At 100 miles high it will be put into a 1,000-mile high orbit.

Johnson challenged Russia to join America in peaceful attacks on the problems ranging from space to disease and disarmament. In a prepared speech before a stateside Junior Chamber of Commerce convention, he said the outer space peaceful interest in outer space already has been demonstrated. He said he made a "declaration of peace" in the 1958 Space Act congress declared it in U. S. policy that activities in outer space should be devoted to peaceful purposes for the benefit of all mankind.

The other incumbent, Harry Turner, said he did not intend to file his petition but to date has not done so. No Democrats have filed with the state registrar to solicit to date, but it is expected they will file the entire ballot before the filing deadline.

T. W. Silvers, county auditor, said Wednesday he will avail himself of the opportunity to file his office normally is not open on that day, April 21 to the deadline.

It Turner does file, four candidates will be vying for the three legislative posts from Twin Falls county. This appears to be the only intra-party contest by the primary election to be held June 7.

Webb was born and raised in Twin Falls and was graduated from Twin Falls high school in 1949. He completed his undergraduate work at the University of Idaho and was graduated from the University of Utah law school in 1955. He was admitted to the Idaho bar in 1956. During a period from the summer of 1956 to 1957, he was employed as a newspaper reporter.

### DAR Resolution Warns President

WASHINGTON, April 21 (AP)—The Daughters of the American Revolution approved today a resolution warning President Eisenhower against what it called surrender to communism at the coming summit conference. Also approved with just a small margin, was a resolution demanding a return to the gold standard.

The only discussion as delegates to the 60th convocation conference, reportedly finished action on the last batch of resolutions came from Mrs. John O'Sullivan, Wilson, Conn.

Mrs. O'Sullivan objected to a resolution which urged the necessity of requiring for students getting loans under the National Defense Education Act.

The delegates passed with acclaim a resolution contending that loyalty oaths do not restrict academic freedom because "loyalty can have no injurious effect."

Other resolutions were approved.

## U.S. Said Pressuring Rhee to Set New Vote; Cabinet Quits

SEOUL, April 21 (UPI)—The United States was reported applying strong pressure today to fire controversial Vice President Lee Ki Poong and give his disgraced political opposition another crack at the job. Rhee's entire cabinet resigned today as result of Tuesday's bloody near-revolution in which official statistics said 115 persons were killed and 748 injured. Rhee still had not formally accepted the resignation, but a cabinet reshuffle appeared certain.

Tuesday's violent anti-parliament rioting was touched off mainly by nation-wide rural election at the recent presidential elections in which Rhee's hand-picked candidate defeated incumbent Vice President John S. Ohms.

## House Gives Final Vote To Rights Bill; Take Likely To Sign

WASHINGTON, April 21 (UPI)—The house gave final and overwhelming congressional approval today to a civil rights bill containing new Negro voting guarantees. The measure—second major civil rights bill produced by congress since the reconstruction era following the Civil War—now goes to President Eisenhower who is expected to sign it into law. As the house passed the bill, Attorney General William F. Rogers issued a statement promising prompt and vigorous enforcement when the measure becomes law. But he expressed hope that "responsible" business and industry would undertake to eliminate discriminatory practices.

## Venezuelan Revolt Fails; Leader Flees

CARACAS, Venezuela, April 21 (AP)—The rebel stronghold in San Cristobal crumbled today under the threat of a battle with soldiers and tanks of President Romulo Betancourt's army. The rebel leader was in flight with his top aides. Jesus Maria Castro Leon, the ambitious general in the Venezuelan air force who led the rebels here, fled to Colombia yesterday, apparently heading back where he came from. Soldiers attempted to seal off the border by blocking the Venezuela-Colombia road. Castro Leon was seen by the rebels trying to return to Colombia along the Andean plains south of the mountains around San Cristobal.

### Demo Digest Hits GOP on Moral Issues

WASHINGTON, April 21 (AP)—The Democratic Digest has accused the Eisenhower administration of what it called 10 major cases of "conflict of interest, moral indiscretion, or downright dishonesty."

The Digest is the Democratic National committee's official publication. It made the charge in an article entitled, "The Failure to Lead on Moral Issues."

In a separate article the Digest dwelled in detail on what it called "the grand old party's" its phrase for official corruption, and said the White House has not only appeared indifferent, but in many cases it raised the exposed official.

The Digest said that after seven years of the "great crusade" to clean up the government, the state of the nation's ethical standards has become a matter of national concern.

"Everywhere," it said, "people who are worried about public officials are pointing with alarm."

To substantiate its charges, the Digest reviewed a list of 13 cases of what it called "Republican scandals," beginning with the California extortion fund for then Sen. Richard M. Nixon in 1952 and ending with the resignation last Jan-

### Russ, too

WASHINGTON, April 21 (AP)—Russian scientists and military men, like their American counterparts, apparently disagree among themselves over whether nuclear tests should be resumed.

Reports of discussion in the communist ranks were dropped in off-hand remarks by Russian negotiators at the U. S.-British-Soviet nuclear test ban talks in Geneva, American officials said today.

But the officials said most delegates felt Russian Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev might be in the mood to sign a test ban treaty.

### West, Russians Don't Seem To Have New Plan for Meet

WASHINGTON, April 21 (AP)—The western allies, with months to prepare, apparently are going to the summit meeting with the Soviet Union next month with no new ideas. And the Soviet Union, despite some big talks, hasn't produced any new ones, either.

The foreign ministers of the western big four—United States, Britain, France, West Germany—met here recently to work out their plans and reconcile their differences before the conference which opens in Paris May 16.

But if all they said and agreed couldn't stand off a communist onslaught—there are only 11,000 of them—this would be it: Stand firm—they are a symbol of the allied forces.

At home the Soviet Union is building up expectations for some dramatic developments when Premier Nikita Khrushchev joins British and French leaders at the summit.

There are the fields most mentioned in Soviet newspapers: Germany in peace treaty not getting allied troops out of Berlin, both of which Khrushchev has been demanding more than a year, plus disarmament.

There's nothing new in that. If what French President Charles de Gaulle was saying this week in Canada and what the American state department said yesterday look like vital differences on what's important at the summit, a close examination shows no real difference at all.

Khrushchev began calling on the allies in November, 1958, to get their troops out of West Berlin, which, although linked with West Germany, lies 100 miles inside communist East Germany.

### Chou's Talks In India Are Called Frank

NEW DELHI, India, April 21 (AP)—Communist Chinese Premier Chou En-lai conferred with Home Minister Govind Ballabh Pant on the Sino-Indian border dispute today and said afterwards his talks were being conducted "very frankly."

Pant is Nehru's right hand man in the government and Chou issued a "courtesy call" at his office into an explanation of Premier's position on the border dispute.

Waiting newsmen tried to question him afterward but he brushed them off with "the talks are going on very frankly," and then drew the visitor from Peking also called on Vice President Radhakrishnan. The West refused to discuss the matter.

Yesterday Chou talked alone with Defense Minister V. K. Krishna Menon for two hours after the summit.

### Case Victory Boosts Nixon Campaigning

WASHINGTON, April 21 (AP)—Vice President Richard M. Nixon has taken reassurance from the New Jersey Republican primary that he is choosing the right kind of political course.

The smashing win in which Sen. Clifford P. Case, R., N. J., was renominated in Tuesday's balloting seemed likely to make the winner from some Republicans for a more conservative route than Nixon has chosen to take as the party's prospective presidential nominee.

Intensive Campaigner Healen Case's ability to surmount by week-end campaigning a well-financed, intensive drive by his avowedly conservative opponent, Robert Morris, showed up Nixon's decision to stick to his vice-presidential choice and to avoid political stamping until he gets the nomination.

Nixon himself maintained discreet silence. But it was obvious his camp felt relief and satisfaction that Case had denounced the political vengeance that a liberal-minded Republican could win handily in a key state like New Jersey.

Case campaigned on his record of support for President Eisenhower's program. But it was clear to all who knew him that Case was willing to go farther than Eisenhower in federal participation in such fields as housing, urban renewal and health care for the elderly.

Morris, on the other hand, wanted to draw back from Eisenhower's position. His nomination would have been interpreted as support for the views of Sen. Barry Goldwater, Arizona, who thinks the bid for the support of independents and Democrats he thinks will be needed to elect him, Nixon made it clear he will push out the horizons of the Eisenhower program when the time comes.

# Korean Riot Has U.S. Saying "Save Us From Our Friends"

The Korean upheaval can leave the U. S. state department once more breathing the melancholy refrain: "Save us from our friends."

Once again communism gets an available gift of propaganda in the global political war crying about the future of Asia.

U. S. policy again finds itself entrapped in a snarl.

Cold war expediency has produced among many people in the uncommitted world the impression that anything goes, so long as it goes under the label of anti-communism.

This impression has been fortified by U. S. support of unsuccessful regimes—Batista of Cuba, to name one—for what must appear to the puzzled public of some countries to be the only reason that such leaders proclaim themselves anti-communists.

Many, including friends of the United States, consider Syngman Rhee as the least of dictators supported by U. S. billions.

The United States, after coming to rescue the country from communist invasion and envelopment, let it be known South Korea would become a showcase of democracy in Asia.

Many Koreans, however, mistakenly look upon Rhee's ruling Liberal party as a creation of the United States. Recent events can easily lead to a wave of anti-Americanism, not only in South Korea, but well beyond its borders.

The communists already are busy with a linking of the propaganda chain.

## Most of Asia Shows Shock About Korea

TOKYO, April 21 (AP)—Most of free Asia, disillusioned about and concerned over South Korea's bloody anti-government riots, the general feeling seemed that President Syngman Rhee got what was coming to him.

European newspapers expressed similar reaction coupled with anxious words over possible damage to the West's position in Asia.

Several criticized the United States for supporting Rhee.

Many non-communist Asia nations, including nationalist China, took the official position it would be presumptuous to comment on an internal Korean affair.

But Japanese Prime Minister Nobusuke Kishi voiced strong criticism of Rhee, asserting the upsurge represented "the accumulation of dissatisfaction among the people will the policies of their government."

His regime has been at odds with Rhee's over repatriation of Korean refugees.

Public opinion in Japan and nationalist China was inclined to reflect Kishi's view and to exonerate the Korean demonstrators.

In Hong Kong, the anti-communist newspaper Sing Pao agreed that the riots were an internal matter.

"We take a humanitarian stand that the Rhee regime deal with events promptly. Rhee's stubborn attitude was bound to provoke the students' anger," it added.

### Struggle Against Secrecy in Government Gains and Loses

WASHINGTON, April 21 (AP)—The struggle against governmental secrecy has made progress in Congress, but met some setbacks in the administration, the freedom of information committee of the American Society of Newspaper Editors reports.

In a summary presented today at the opening of ASNE's annual meeting, Eugene S. Pulliam, Jr., vice chairman of the committee, said that "several claims of executive privilege" exempting agencies from opening their records to the public "were rejected, like mushrooms this year."

Some momentary success was achieved in the society's perennial battle with the Pentagon, said Pulliam, managing editor of the Indianapolis News, but the gains were offset by the first time, he reported, "figures on U. S. military aid to foreign nations were withheld for the first time, and the new secretary of defense, Thomas S. Gates, Jr. announced that he and his top subordinates 'must operate in an open glass-paned house.'"

That was 11 months ago. He's held two press conferences since and has been open to subordinates "like mushrooms this year."

On the other hand, Pulliam said, the senate has followed the lead of the house and opened up its payroll records, and bills are pending to limit the power of the executive agencies to suppress information and to prevent federal courts from restricting the reporting of criminal cases.

"We haven't won either the battle or the war," Pulliam said. "We haven't lost it either."

### Crowded City Areas Called Polio Targets

NEWARK, N. J., April 21 (AP)—Polio paralytic is striking hard again—aiming now mostly at 1 and 2-year-old children in crowded city housing, researchers report.

There are danger spots in the U. S. population where large groups of persons—especially babies and preschool children—are vulnerable to coming polio, they said.

These "hot spots" must be found and protected by Balk vaccines, said Mrs. Alexander D. Langguth and E. Russell Alexander of the epidemiology branch of the U. S. public health service's communicable disease center.

More than 4,000 persons were paralyzed by polio last year in the United States despite Balk vaccines, they told the annual symposium on polio vaccines here.

Once called "no respecter of social class or pocketbook," polio has changed its pattern.

Now it hits hardest in local cities and outlying areas, striking on young children in crowded city areas, generally lower economic groups—tenements and slums.

Evidence still shows that Balk vaccine inoculation is a potent protection against polio, Dr. Alexander said.

Three or more doses is between 80 to 90 per cent effective. Four or more doses boosts effectiveness to 90 per cent or better.

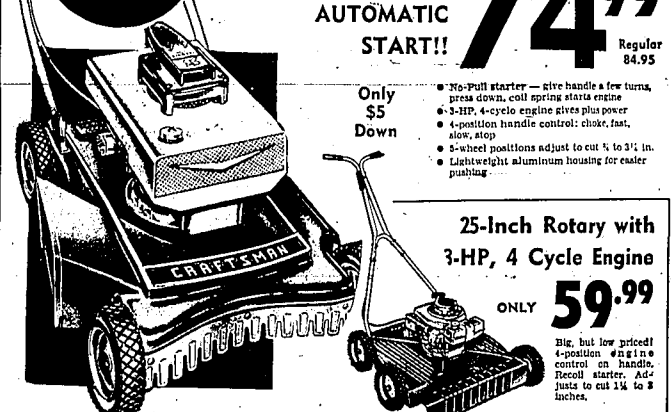
"When I heard the news of my coming back, I know my prayers were answered, and I know how happy I am," Minoso said.
