## Cupils Sack Home Of Korean Leader In More Violence

SPOLI, April 25 (UPI)—Frenzied student rioters seeking to kill Vice President Lee Ki-poong sacked his home and dramed troops to shoot them tonight during violent demonstrations against the Syngman Rhee government. There were renewed demands for the resignation of U. S. Ambassador W. M. McConaughey, who reported at Lee's troop-guarded presidential palace for urgent talks as 10,000 students milled through streets screaming "kill Lee Ki-poong," "depart him, Lee Ki-poong," "depart him, Lee Ki-poong," and shouting "down with Rhee."

Officials said two rioters were killed. Press reports listed as many as three dead and 100 injured. Lee's leader in Seoul, Lee Ki-poong, said Lee had fled the country. Troops guarded Lee's residence but after a threatened riot in that direction, the rioters swung around.

Three people were injured and one of them was hospitalized early Sunday morning in a head-on collision of two cars and one-half mile east of Twin Falls at the turn-off of a high line canal bridge.

### Broadcasters Worry About Pay TV Tests

NEW YORK, April 25 (AP)—If pay television should go over big in 1960, broadcast television might be threatened. That is the view of many in the offices of the broadcasting companies.

Sources today said the networks are worried that advertisers might ultimately switch to pay TV.

Should the public go along with advertising not tied to editorial content on pay TV, the networks' income from advertising will be hurt.

Early Tests Laid Egg Pay TV tests several years ago laid an egg. However, the promoters claim they have better systems worked out for advertising payment.

At the time of the early tests, Gen. David Sarnoff, the power behind the National Broadcasting Company, conducted a rigorous campaign against pay TV.

At that time, NBC's stake in the venture was small compared to what it is today. It now controls 100 percent of pay TV.

About 45 million Americans now have one or more televisions. Should pay TV catch, there would be a \$3-billion-dollar market to nibble at.

### Sure Method For Detecting A-Blast Asked

WASHINGTON, April 25 (AP)—A Democratic party scientist panel has called for an urgent program to develop effective methods for detecting underground nuclear explosions.

The scientist members of the Democratic Advisory Council's committee on space and technology said yesterday the program should be accompanied by a limited moratorium on low-yield underground tests, the type now most difficult to detect.

"The committee also renewed its plea for a ban on all medium and high-power tests and urged speedy congressional action on proposals to establish a national peace agency to work for disarmament."

"It is of paramount importance that a treaty on the cessation of nuclear tests be concluded with speed," the committee said. It said a test ban by the present autumn would limit the spread of atomic weapons to other nations.

Dr. Eric A. C. Pollard, committee chairman and head of the Yale university physics department, said research into explosion detection—this science of detecting underground explosions—should be conducted independently of such government agencies as the atomic energy commission and the defense department.

Pollard said the research should be conducted under the proposed national peace agency. He said the research and detection programs would cost about 100 million dollars but said the drive should produce results within a year if there was "real drive behind it."

### Senator Claims Defense Wastes

WASHINGTON, April 25 (AP)—Sen. Paul H. Douglas, D-Ill., has accused the defense department of "wasting waste and mismanagement" involving up to three billion dollars worth of government property.

Douglas, chairman of the senate house economic committee, made the charge last night in releasing a transcript of hearings which his group held on procurement of disposal of military supplies.

"Prime target of Douglas' criticism was the 'stock fund' system used by the military services to build up a hoard of supplies. Any time a branch of the armed forces or any other government agency wants to draw on these supplies it must pay for them."

"This results in a second appropriation which the using service must have in order to draw down the supplies," Douglas said. "In many cases, this results in the property's being bought and paid for twice."

NEW YORK, April 25 (AP)—Directors of The Associated Press marked the 60th year of the news cooperative today by holding its 40th annual convention in New York.

"The lasting existence of The Associated Press guarantees that the public will have access to honest news, free of bias, free of domination by political or economic groups and free of taint from selfish interests," they said in their annual report.

The report, read at the AP annual meeting, said the AP developed significantly in the past six decades without changing its basic principles.

"Now, as in 1900, The Associated Press is controlled by those it serves," the report said.

### Idaho Adopts New Plan for Scholarships

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, April 25—What is considered to be one of the most challenging scholarship programs for the nation's top students has been adopted by the University of Idaho.

Dr. Theophilus said the board of trustees approved a program at its Pocatello meeting in which out-of-state students automatically will be refunded their non-resident tuition for any semester in which they attain a 2.33 grade average out of a possible 4.00 while carrying 14 credits or more. Residents of Idaho pay no tuition, but out-of-state students currently are charged \$250 a year. Thus, a non-resident student who maintains a 2.33 average for four years should receive a scholarship totaling \$1,000. The new policy is effective with the start of the fall semester.

"Our first responsibility is to the residents of the state, and for that reason we have had to limit our out-of-state enrollment," said Theophilus. "Non-resident students generally must be in the upper half of their high school graduating class to be admitted to the university. Under this rule, hundreds of students are turned away annually."

"As a broadening influence, it is important to a university to have students from different parts of the nation and world. But we want to give particular encouragement to the top scholars. A 2.33 grade average is difficult to maintain. It is, for instance, the average that must be attained throughout college to be considered for Phi Beta Kappa national scholastic honors."

"It was felt that non-resident students should be awarded a scholarship returning their tuition for maintaining a high average. By this plan, in 1959, the university granted a free-tuition scholarship to every resident of Idaho."

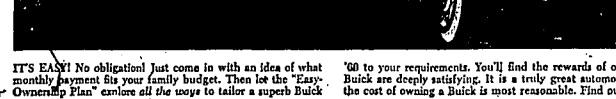

### Group Asks Huge Payment for FHA Loans May Be Cut

WASHINGTON, April 25 (AP)—A private citizens' group urged congress today to cut by more than one-half President Dwight D. Eisenhower's proposed \$1,175,000,000 FHA loan program.

The plea was made in a house appropriations subcommittee by members of the Citizens' Political Action Committee, headed by Paul McClellan, chairman of the group.

The group included former State Department Undersecretary for International Affairs and Brig. Gen. Bunker Fellers (D-Mo.).

The drastic slash was recommended as the first step in the group's proposal for ending all federal aid by July 1, 1962.

The house already has approved a \$4,025,000,000 authorization for foreign aid spending in the fiscal year starting July 1. This was 125 million dollars under the President's request. The senate foreign relations committee has approved a \$1,145,000,000 bill.

### Abolishment for Committee Asked

WASHINGTON, April 25 (AP)—Rep. James Roosevelt, D. Calif., called on the house today to abolish its committee on un-American activities.

He said, if a speech prepared for house delivery, the committee's "attack" on the National Council of Churches in the past few days and congress' "California's educational system were proof" that the committee is "a waste of time and usefulness, it has now completely outlived it."

Roosevelt said it was "imprudent for the house to abolish the group. 'We cannot go on blinking at the nature of the committee and its operations—by ignoring it, we simply default to its viciousness.'"
