Rhee Expected to Resign in Minute as His Regime Weakens Before Rebellion

SEOUL, Wednesday, April 27 (UPI)—President Syngman Rhee's forces crumbled before a historic unarmed rebellion today. Expectations mounted he would step down from power at any minute and submit his and Korea's future to a new election. Rhee capitulated Tuesday to his outraged populace and promised to quit "if the people desire" but this was not enough and new riots erupted throughout Korea. A mob of 100,000 laid siege to the barricaded presidential palace and shot at Rhee's resignation. His whole regime appeared crumbling. His once trusted lieutenant deserted him in the national assembly and joined in demands he quit. His police, who killed at least 158 persons in a week of rioting, fled their posts. His cabinet fled to Washington not under fire.

And there were fears of some communist move to take advantage of the uprising.

In Washington the state department issued a statement calling for "adequate measures to redress grievances of the people." It took Rhee's declaration that he is prepared to resign.

Students who led the demonstrations threatened to continue unless Rhee leaves office. They called for his resignation and killed 23 persons, bringing to 1,000 the number in a week of violence.

WASHINGTON, April 27 (UPI)—Representatives of the 16 allied nations which fought in the Korean war will convene today to confer on the situation in Korea.

The extraordinary session was set for 2:30 p. m. (EST) as fast-moving developments in the Korean crisis brought the attention of President Eisenhower to the United States. J. Graham Parsons, assistant secretary of state for Asian affairs, was expected to lead the allied ambassadors on Korean developments.

It is known that there are questions in the minds of the allied representatives about public statements in the United States in the past few days which have been interpreted to indicate the Korean government to take corrective action to solve the problem of the Korean election.

The 16 countries which contributed forces to the Korean war are Australia, Belgium, Canada, Colombia, Ethiopia, France, Greece, Guatemala, Luxembourg, The Netherlands, New Zealand, the Philippines, Thailand, Turkey, United Kingdom, and the United States.

Ike; De Gaulle to Ask Russ Action to Prove Red Intent

WASHINGTON, April 26 (AP)—President Eisenhower and French President Charles de Gaulle plan to challenge Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev to demonstrate by action that he wants a relaxation of tension.

That action, at the start of next month's summit conference in Paris, was agreed on by the two presidents in four days of talks which ended today with De Gaulle's departure for New York.

The two western leaders entered the summit conference in Paris to make clear to Khrushchev that if he presses his Berlin demands too far he will kill all chance of getting an improvement in East-West relations in other fields.

Their hope is that the Soviet premier will agree to add speed to the Berlin debate in spite of his persistent tough talk about it—and concentrate instead on the summit search for common ground in disarmament.

Diplomats reported that Eisenhower and De Gaulle had reached a high degree of agreement in their pre-summit talks. They were represented as confident of full support and cooperation from British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan, who will join them in meeting with Khrushchev at the Paris conference beginning May 16.

U.S., Russ Mental Gap Pointed Out

CHICAGO, April 26 (AP)—Lt. Gen. Arthur G. Trudeau, army research chief, said yesterday the "mental gap" between the United States and Russia is more important than any other aspect.

Trudeau criticized the attitude of Americans toward the need for civil defense.

"We have become so inured to luxuries that we are unwilling to face the realities of life today," he said. "In passive and civil defense, Russia is way out in front of us—I don't see anything happening here."

South Africa Guns Loaded Century Ago

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa, April 26 (AP)—The guns that killed 60 Africans and wounded 166 more at Sharpeville were loaded more than a century ago.

The awakening of the numerically superior Negroes in South Africa and their massive reaction to the doctrine of white supremacy have been inevitable since white first met black in the bush country in the 17th century.

Not since the hardy, courageous Dutch settlers of the Cape of Good Hope set out on their great trek to found their own nation in the early 17th century have whites in South Africa regarded Africans as anything but a threat to survival.

As a result, the Dutch settlers of the Cape, headed into the wild and perilous country to the north and east.

They were descendants of small group dropped at the Cape by the Dutch East India company to provide fresh food and water for ships in East India trade.

These pioneers had a fierce burning passion to overcome the dangers before them and set up their own republic.

The black man had no place in these dreams, except as a worker. The master-servant relationship that still persists began in those days.

In 1828 Piet Retief, one of the Boer leaders, walked into a trap set by Zulu chief Dingaan in Natal. Dingaan entered Retief and 70 men into his kraal in the rolling hills to discuss cession of land rights. He murdered them all.

Dingaan then sent his Zulu warriors to the camps and killed 350 more Boers and some 200 colored servants they had brought with them from the Cape.

Andries Pretorius, another Boer leader, gathered new forces and in the three-hour battle of Blood river killed 3,000 Zulus. Only three Boers were wounded.

Dingaan's war and the battle of Blood river have become the centerpiece of Afrikaner nationalism.

While the Zulus and other tribes have been at peace with the white man for nearly a century the battle of Blood river still is celebrated annually as Heredag (Heroes day).

Expert Wanted to Check Hen That Thinks She's Pheasant

CHARLOTTEVILLE, Va., April 26 (AP)—Charlotteville breeder Joel Cochran is looking for a poultry expert specializing in poultry. His problem... he's got a cornish hen which thinks she's a pheasant.

Cochran, a poultry grower and somewhat of a specialist himself, doesn't know what to make of his split-personality hen, but he does recognize some of the symptoms.

He says it started in the spring of 1958 when one of his silver pheasants laid a dozen eggs. Cochran took the eggs from her and gave them to another pheasant to hatch.

But the mother insisted on nesting so he stuck a white Cornish bantam hen egg under her and she hatched it.

Later, she laid the pheasant, but kept the chicken.

Now the chicken is performing like her long-since departed foster mother.

Every spring she lays eggs, but only in the spring and not in the summer and fall like others of her breed. Her laying habits are just like those of a pheasant.

The eggs, too, are like those of a pheasant... brown and about half the size of the ones her roommate lays.

Last spring, she laid about 10 eggs during two months of the nesting period... all brown, of course. Then she stopped and laid no more until this spring. So far, she's come through with an even dozen, brown, naturally!

The bird also runs away when he comes with feed and doesn't cluster around like the other Cornish variety.

She clucks like a normal hen, but has all the shyest instincts of a pheasant. She struts like a pheasant, too, but pretts on the same strains as the other hens.

Funds Urged For Work on Conservation

WASHINGTON, April 26 (AP)—Ten western senators have asked a senate subcommittee on agricultural appropriations to provide a million dollars a year for three years for pre-construction and design work on soil and water conservation research facilities.

The 10 senators signed a letter asking the subcommittee to vote federal funds for the facilities. Sen. Frank E. Moss, D., Idaho, announced the request in a statement.

Waste Agreed "There is general agreement that our watersheds are wasting and that a comprehensive program of research is needed to improve techniques of watershed management and utilization."

"Numerous bills are before congress calling for the establishment of research laboratories in several states. Utah offers many advantages for establishment of such a laboratory—location, trained personnel with a broad background in the subject, a long history of interest in conservation, and many others. I shall continue to work to have a laboratory established in Utah."

The confining climate, however, are stalling the program. It will take several years to complete the design and pre-construction work. It is essential that appropriations for this purpose be made without further delay.

Better Teaching Standards Eyed As More Needed

BOISE, April 25 (AP)—Public Instruction Superintendent D. P. Enckings said today it is important to "upgrade" teaching standards but the state first must provide enough instructors to handle public school class loads.

"We can't do this immediately," he said when asked to comment on action of the delegate assembly of the Idaho Education Association in voting down a motion calling for the state to cease reimbursing school districts for teachers who do not meet certificate requirements in the subjects they are teaching.

He said Idaho needs to provide salaries to make it competitive in getting teachers. The superintendent said many small schools and some large ones would have trouble finding teachers if such a requirement were added immediately.

"I think the judgment of the superintendent of school districts is good," he said. He added he thinks teachers are being assigned in most cases to the subject areas in which they were trained.

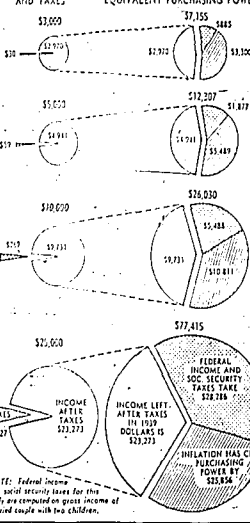

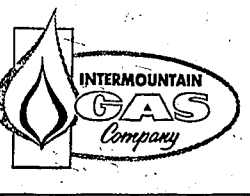

Large Radio Telescope Is Asked in U.S.

WASHINGTON, April 26 (AP)—A government astronomer wants the nation to build a radio telescope in the desert.

It would be the world's largest, designed to meet the growing challenge of the space age and perhaps to revolutionize astronomy.

The suggestion came yesterday from Dr. Otto Struve, director of the National Radio Astronomy Observatory, Green Bank, W. Va., where he works with an 85-foot telescope, the largest in the United States.

160-Million-Dollar Cost

Estimating the cost at 160 million dollars and declaring it would take many years to build, Struve held a meeting of the executive committee of the National Association of Science Writers.

One of the mysteries of many astronomical and space problems I believe that the construction of a very large antenna, with an aperture of the order of 2,000 feet, should be embarked upon as soon as necessary financial resources become available.

Results Promised

The astronomer whose appearance was cosponsored by the American Physical Society, said a lunar parabolic dish of the type he envisioned conceivably could:

1. Provide a new and powerful method for determining the distance of remote galaxies, far beyond the Milky Way, thus giving us information on the structure and nature of the universe.
2. Enable measurements of surface heat radiation from all the planets in the solar system.
3. Allow study of the titanic forces near the center of the Milky Way galaxy.
4. Uncover hitherto-producing activities of many stars and show the sun whose periodic flares shoot violently for thousands of miles in space.

Nehru Turns Down Offer to Give up Land

NEW DELHI, April 26 (AP)—Prime Minister Nehru today rejected a proposal by Red China's Premier Enlai that India abandon her claim to 15,000 square miles in the Ladakh sector of Kashmir in exchange for clear title to 20,000 disputed square miles on the northeast frontier.

"There can be no question of bartering away this area," the Indian leader said in a statement. "India is a settled fact. Nehru told reporters at the airport after seeing Chou off to Nepal."

Offer Made

Before winding up his week-long Chou talks, Nehru had offered to abandon Popping's claims to the northeast frontier territory in exchange for the Ladakh sector.

The Red Chinese premier said India was "not entirely agreed to the swap he proposed, but the border dispute 'became smaller' as a result of his 21 hours of talks with Nehru.

Commenting on Chou's remarks, Nehru told newsmen that the Chinese leader's facts "are so basically different from ours that naturally conclusions differ, too."

Tensions Lessened

Nehru said the week-long negotiations has brought "a new atmosphere in the basic tensions" but added that feeling was "no bit lighter" during the border skirmishes last year in which 13 Indians were killed.

Chou's proposal ended speculation that the Chinese had sent troops into the mountainous, economically unimportant, northeast frontier area primarily as a bargaining lever, and that Ladakh, on the northeast frontier, was their real target. The Chinese want Ladakh because they have built across it a key road between communist-occupied Tibet and the western Chinese province of Sinkiang.

Nehru said he still felt the foot of the trouble was Chinese expansionism.

Also discussed were plans to develop competitive skiers to enter in state and Pacific northwest competition. Thirty persons attended the meeting.

Idaho Diseases Drop Last Week

BOISE, April 26 (AP)—A general decrease in the number of communicable diseases reported by physicians in Idaho was noted last week by the state health department.

Dr. John A. Mather, chief of the preventive medicine section of the department, said the decrease is consistent with this season of the year.

In the department's weekly report on communicable diseases, Dr. Mather said diseases showing a decrease include influenza, scarlet fever, measles and mumps.

There were 56 cases of influenza, 23 cases of scarlet fever, 103 of measles and 37 of mumps.

"These are our problems and we must find the solution. We must solve them ourselves. We do not look to government to keep us in business."

Association Secretary H. H. Cahill said ANPA membership now is at its highest with 841 newspapers representing almost 57 per cent week-day circulation and 95 per cent Sunday circulation of the nation's newspapers.
