# Buhl Driver, 43, U.S. Space Craft Pilot, Most Korea Rioters Quiet After Rhee's Resignation; Acting Chief Takes Over

Garold V. Stanley, 43, Buhl, was sentenced to not more than five years in the state penitentiary Tuesday afternoon when he appeared before District Judge Charles Scoggin for violation of parole for drunk driving, repeat offenses. Stanley appeared in eleventh district court before Judge Scoggin of the fourth judicial district, with counsel, Hugh Baker. Scoggin was the judge who placed Stanley on parole in January, 1959, after Judges Sherman Bellwood and Theron Ward dismissed themselves.

Stanley was a probation for drunk driving, repeat offenses. He was arrested April 11 on drunk driving and was fifth time in Utah, Oregon and Idaho that Stanley had been arrested on such a charge.

Stanley's probation period was to run until September 1960. Judge Scoggin, state parole officer, reported the parole violation in an affidavit to the prosecuting attorney who requested Judge Scoggin to issue a bench warrant. Judge Scoggin signed the bench warrant and ordered Stanley to appear on a motion to revoke the parole.

In court Tuesday Stanley admitted the probation violation and waived his right to a trial. His arrest could be pronounced, his driver's license was ordered to be suspended for six months.

Stanley was remanded to the custody of the sheriff who will take him to the penitentiary in Boise later this week.

William James Johnson, 40, Boise, was arrested Tuesday at the west edge of Twin Falls on highway 30 and charged with driving without a license. Deputy Sheriff Charles Yngstad.

**Seoul, April 27 (UPI)—**Fresh demonstrations demanding a quick cleanup of the old regime broke out in scattered towns across Korea tonight despite President Syngman Rhee's resignation. Foreign Minister Iuh Chung took over the shattered government as acting president and admitted prompt elections. It was enough to send home most of the huge mobs which forced Rhee out of office. But demonstrations took place in Pohang, Chungmu, Kimchong and a few other small towns as a final gasp of hatred.

Reflected against hated local officials, the mobs never attacked Rhee's one-time powerful Liberal party. The mobs burned their homes but there were no clashes with police.

## Conviction in Rupert Man's Case Is OK'd

BOISE, April 27 (UPI)—The negligent homicide conviction of Loren D. Anderson, Rupert, was upheld today by the Idaho supreme court.

Anderson had been found guilty by a Minidoka county jury in the death of Albert K. V. passenger being carried in an Anderson car when it swerved into the path of another vehicle the night of Jan. 26, 1958.

In appealing to the supreme court, Anderson asserted that he had been accused of more than one offense and that Judge Sherman J. Bellwood did not recognize the commission of the crime.

In a unanimous opinion by Justice E. B. Smith, the supreme court ruled that the conviction was proper. The court included other offenses as the manner or means of the commission of the crime.

The court also held that Anderson's plea of clemency was considered by the judge who reduced the sentence to four months in jail and a fine of \$500. The court said Anderson could have received a suspended sentence for one year and a fine of \$1,000 for the offense.

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### New African Nation Fetes Its Freedom

LOME, Togo, April 27 (AP) — Thousands of natives danced in the brightly lit, main-lined streets of Lome last night as the flagging of Togo became the newest member of Africa's fast-growing family of independent nations.

Independence for Togo's 12 million people came at midnight, ending 28 years of foreign rule, under Germany, Britain, France and Italy, after France, as the United Nations trust territory of Togoland.

### U. S. Court's Ruling in Case May Be Union Shop Death

By LYLE C. WILSON

WASHINGTON, April 27 (AP)—The U. S. supreme court has accepted for decision a legal dispute which indirectly could invalidate all union shop labor contracts in the United States.

The court heard arguments last week in what is known, for short, as the *Looper* case. The issue raised involves minority and individual rights of union members. The non-union case arose in Georgia.

A few employees of the Southern railway sued to forbid their union to spend dues money for political objectives which the complaining union members opposed.

This is a union shop situation. The complaining union members, therefore, may not withdraw their financial support of the union without resigning their union membership. If they resign their union membership, they also resign their jobs.

That is what makes the *Looper* case a hot one. The narrow area of individual rights in which the issue is raised contrasts also to the political importance of the case.

The court now has heard arguments and has agreed to decide the case. It would be difficult for the court to render an opinion without establishing as the law of the land either:

—That a union member cannot be compelled to contribute toward political expenditures for objectives which he opposes, or;

prohibition of union spending or of contributions for political purposes, federal courts have held specifically that the unions may make political medicine in their publications or use the medium of TV. The rights of freedom of speech, press and assembly protected the union in those fields.

In the *TV* case, which arose in Michigan, three U. S. supreme court justices held that if minority rights were involved at all, this simply was the concern of internal union management.

"To date," these three justices suggested, "unions have operated under a rule of the majority."

That suited the labor leaders fine. The notable trend of the modern court, however, has been

to determine such issues in favor of the minority "or of the individual. The three justices were, nevertheless, of the modern court; Chief Justice Earl Warren and Associate Justices Hugo Black and William O. Douglas.

—Invalidate the union shop with its requirement of union membership, or;

—Compel union leaders to finance their political activities wholly from voluntary funds. Despite *Corrupt Practices Act*
