In approving a \$39,337,867,000 defense appropriation bill for fiscal 1961, the committee added about \$1,500,000,000 to President Eisenhower's fields. But it ordered strict accounting elsewhere.

POCATELLO, April 29 (AP)—The specialized, personalized journal is fast replacing the rural, general-type publication in the weekly newspaper field, a publisher told some 200 high school journalists yesterday.

Ferry Swisher of Pocatello, publisher of *The Intermountain*, took part in a panel on future news media which opened the 15th annual spring convention of the Idaho State High School Press Association.

He told the gathering at Idaho State College that day has passed when weekly papers must meet on strictly local news stories with names.

T. F. Civic Symphony Presents Final Concert of This Season

The final concert of the current season by the Twin Falls Civic Symphony under the direction of Richard Smith was presented Thursday evening in the Junior high school auditorium. It was a superior performance of a well balanced program and was heard by a capacity audience.

The opening selection, "Oberon Overture" by C. M. von Weber was presented with the technical skill and sensitivity demanded by this difficult work. The phrasing of soft passages by the string section and the brilliant and tumultuous conclusion were played with an excellence which is unusual for a non-professional orchestra.

"Adagio Patheque" by Godard showed most graphically how much progress has been made in developing the string section since the first concert by this orchestra last fall. Humperdinck's "Hansel and Gretel Prelude" with its familiar themes was very well received by the audience. "Der Rosenkavalier Waltz" by Richard Strauss was played with the exuberance and fine tempo characteristics of this great waltz. Complete change of mood was created by the King and Sibelius by Richard Rogers. The orchestra played each theme with verve and flair.

Following the intermission was the "Piano Concerto in A Minor" by Grieg with Train Bellini, concert pianist, as guest artist. From its initial chorus to its conclusion it was a performance well worthy of the tremendous applause which came at the end of the first movement and again at its finale. Mrs. Bellini, a master of her instrument, played with a crystal clarity of tone and with all the feeling and sensitivity which this taxing work demands.

The orchestral accompaniment was beautifully balanced, and at no time over-rode the solo instrument. This was due in great part to Smith's fine direction.

At the conclusion of the concert, because of the great ovation, Mrs. Bellini played three encores. First was the brilliant and spirited "Jota" by Laretti, second, "The Juke Box" by Litchick. This selection was played because of the many requests for it and Mrs. Bellini created the authentic tinkling sounds of a music box on her concert grand piano. Her final encore was the beautiful and moving Chopin "Nocturne in G Sharp Minor."

The small size of the stage is a handicap to a full symphony orchestra. The drum and tympani must be placed in the wings and because of this are not heard as well as they should be in certain passages. It is hoped that a new auditorium with an adequate stage can secure a full orchestra. An excellent orchestra can have a proper setting.

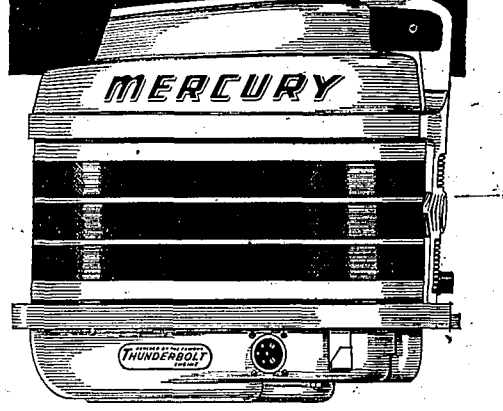

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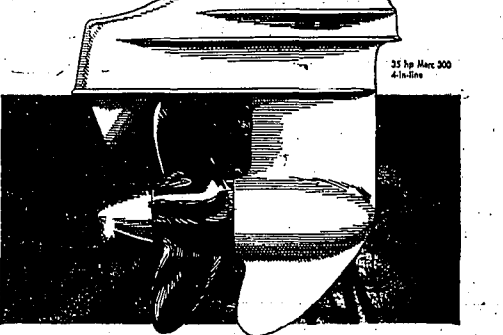

CASTRO'S TRUE COLOR

Soon it will be a year and a half since Fidel Castro took power in Cuba. In that time he has become a pliable figure, one of the great disappointments of the age of emerging peoples.

While he fought dictator Batista in the hills, his infectious romantic idealism captivated the romantic idealists in America and other places.

It seemed fitting he should be called Dr. Fidel Castro, for he was thought of almost as a philosopher of revolution.

Whatever there was of the true man in that image, it is gone. The aura of romanticism has evaporated away. Castro stands before the world as a weak, floundering, ineffectual man, totally incapable of governing.

Yearning still for the *small revolution*, unhappy at his desk, he has made the television studio his desk. There, in three and four-hour sittings before the camera, he shouts against America in effort to hide his total incapacity for sober, rational leadership.

Castro is supposed to have been something of a genuine student of government and revolution. He seems to have remembered all the right things.

When he should have fastened in mind the true character of American freedom and the sympathy of Americans for freedom everywhere, he remembered instead the old totalitarian lessons: When you're having trouble at home, blame the neighbors; that foreign plotters seek to undermine you.

As a matter of fact, Castro must look to Red China as his model today. The Soviet Union long since has moved on to subtler and more mature devices of propaganda.

We cannot hope there will be any end to this, that Castro by some miracle will become again the liberal idealist he seemed, that he will "settle down" and govern.

Since he cannot govern, he will be governing, he has no choice but to practice the arts of deceit to cloak his inadequacy from the Cuban people.

The world—and 80 m. e. Cubans—see through him now. In time most Cubans will see how empty a man he is.

Then Castro will go down.

In an era when crusades for independence are being mounted in many places, he will be sadly remembered as the man who wore the outer garments of the free, independent leader—but lacked his heart and substance.

RARE IN OUR TIME

President Charles de Gaulle's visit to the United States gives Americans their first opportunity to pay fitting honor to one of the free world's authentic heroes.

He is, in the eyes of all, the embodiment of the spirit of France as he has his courage and his steadfast adherence to the image of a Free France held together the remnants of a great country in World War II. Unhappily, at that time these very qualities earned him the enmity of even some idle from other allied leaders.

But when De Gaulle re-emerged as the genuine savior of his country in 1958, in the depths of its crisis of indecision and virtual government, he was seen more clearly for what he really is.

Today we can understand him as a man who first preserved the shape if not the substance of a once-great free nation and now is desperately engaged in the effort to restore its substance.

As the United States recognizes that its own safety and well-being are inseparably linked with those of all other free peoples, so must herald both the man and the postwar labors of this dedicated servant of freedom.

We, as well as France, are deeply fortunate that there is a Charles de Gaulle. Without the Frenchman, the world would be clinging to those shreds of spirit from which they finally were astonishing revival.

Without him the painfully disruptive effects of government indecision might have driven France the inevitable prey of a waiting Russian communism.

As he moves among us in this all-too-short visit we therefore can look upon him with gratitude and appreciation.

We can also look upon him as one of the truly great figures of the age, and with no little wonderment, at a man who by some curious alchemy manages to exalt principle and still get things done.

That de Gaulle alone makes him a rarity in this troubled time—a man worth staring at while he is in our midst.

HUMANEF CHEF

A friend of Sen. Hiram L. Fong, R., Hawaii, was invited to a big Chinese dinner on her recent trip to Hong Kong. What fascinated her most about the dishes was that she could not identify the ingredients.

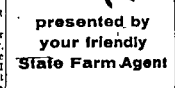

WASHINGTON, April 23 (AP)—Under the Eisenhower administration, the agriculture department has released more than 100 million pounds of surplus food to help feed the needy of the nation, the White House said Thursday. The statement said "Very material assistance" was worth \$12,000,000. Eisenhower replied he thought the government should be providing aid for Americans in want, but he promised to check and report back. Thursday's White House statement said: "It should be made perfectly clear that by law and as a matter of policy all surplus foods made available to needy persons in this country before they are made available for donation to needy persons abroad."

But a cat selects her own society, and doesn't worry about public opinion. Our cat has at least two distinct personalities. By day she is a sleek, plush-footed creature who greets visitors with all the dignity and calm of an ancient Chinese mandarin.

But at night she roams the house like a dozen clumsy bighorns.
