Tornadoes From Desert, Calls Taxi

WASHINGTON, May 6 (AP)—President Eisenhower limited today his most candid plans to visit Russia next fall. He said he would not go to the Soviet Union, but he would like to see the American campaign to go to the Soviet Union, he said. Eisenhower suddenly decided his Moscow trip with a big "if." He did so by saying that he would take a new kind of a bust as the gift to the Soviet premier. "If" he makes the trip. The interjection of the "if" was obviously far from accidental at a time when officials from the President have been heard to say they figure out what Khrushchev is up to in his critical present conference period.

As part of the search for an explanation, the United States formally and politely asked the Soviet foreign office today for "the full facts" behind Khrushchev's boast that Soviet forces had given an American aircraft, early Sunday, an allegedly friendly reception at the front. The early delivery in Moscow, particularly asked about the fate of the plane, was not a state department spokesman said in this instance or any other. The spokesman said the plane was not deliberately violated by an American aircraft. He reiterated the U. S. government's firm belief that the Soviet-French border aircraft landing in Moscow was having trouble with its oxygen equipment and had been blacked out.

Authorities seeking to analyze the purpose behind Khrushchev's moves apparently feel that the Soviet premier is trying to force Eisenhower into a summit conference trap where the Soviet leader would make important concessions to the United States.

Although the statement of Khrushchev's current bluster outbursts against the United States and Eisenhower personally continues, it is an additional view. There is some danger Khrushchev may overplay his hand and wreck summit conference plans completely.

Eisenhower has reportedly said he would not go to the summit under threat or duress.

WILBURTON, Okla., May 6 (UPI)—The death toll from a blast of tornadoes that raged 12 cities, leaving a trail of destruction in Oklahoma and Arkansas grew slowly today as rescue workers burrowed under the wreckage of homes and stores. The known dead totaled 30; at least 250 were injured, newly killed in a western Oklahoma town.

Wilburton, a town of 2,000 population, was almost wiped off the map. Thirteen Wilburton residents were killed and an estimated 100 injured. "It looks as if a bomb had dropped on Wilburton," said Dwight Garner, Wilburton superintendent of schools. "The school building and homes counted, the dead included. Apulso, three; Ketchum, three; Checotah, one; the Green Street, Midway, one, six; Bristol, two; Hoffman, one. A 70-year-old man was killed in the Merceer-Portland bottoms area of Oklahoma. A tornado also hit Prescott, Ark.

"The death toll was almost sure to grow, since some of the injured were in critical condition." About 30 square blocks of this southern Oklahoma village town was crushed, about 10 blocks leveled and another 50 percent destroyed.

Rescue workers digged through stacks of rubble for survivors. Homes and business buildings reported 12 persons dead, and up to 25 others injured. They expected the death toll to go higher. Garner, former coordinator for the green observer corps in Wilburton, was a chain of hundreds of volunteer workers.

He said the strain used to warn the town couldn't be used last night when the storm hit because hard rain had been weather knocked out, about 20 minutes before the twister formed.

"I think a lot more people could have been saved if they had happened," Garner said.

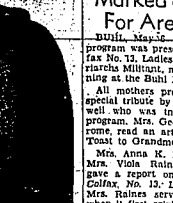

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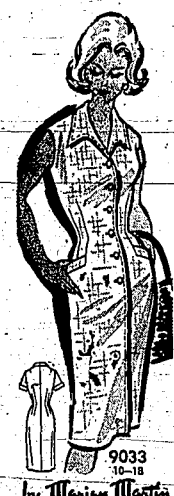

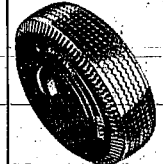
