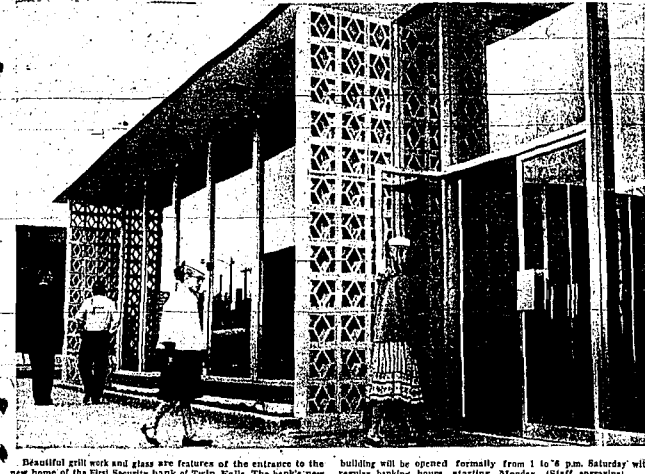


Saturday Opening Planned for New Bank Here

Saturday Ceremonies Will Open New Bank

Vernon Riddle, chairman of Twin Falls city commission, will head a group of civic and business leaders who will participate in opening ceremonies Saturday for the new home of First Security Bank of Twin Falls. The ceremonies will begin at 1 p.m. and open house will continue until 6 p.m. The new bank building is situated on Main avenue, south between Second and Third streets. Other speakers at the opening will include Carl W. Berg, president of the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce; Ralph J. Comstock, president, First Security Bank of Twin Falls; and Lane L. Wilken, vice president in charge.

Regular banking hours will be observed at the new office beginning Monday, May 23, from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. Mondays through Fridays, and from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Fridays.

The new building measures 54 1/2 feet wide by 45 1/2 feet deep with main and lower floors. Total floor area is 5,000 feet. There is a drive along the west side of the building to a parking area in the rear. There also is a drive-in drive on the east side of the building.

Bank directors who toured the building in connection with their board meeting in Twin Falls last week had these comments:

J. B. Simpson: "The building is not only modern and functional for complete banking service, but also is a handsome structure. Customers will appreciate it."

Atlas Is Shot To Point Off South Africa

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla., May 19—An Atlas missile with a dummy warhead on a 3,000-mile flight to a point on the tip of South Africa's longest, longest ground-to-ground missile shot on record.

The 10-minute flight and demonstration of America's new intercontinental ballistic missile at the very first time that President Eisenhower was flying the other way, heading home from a summit conference wrecked by a dramatic attack by Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev.

The rocket crashed into the Indian ocean at a point of Prince Edward Island, a circular island about one-third of the way from the Cape of Good Hope to the Antarctic coast.

Russia was sure to take note that the 9,000-mile distance would reach any point in the Soviet Union. In fact, multistage point-of-cut, a shot fired in a carefully directed direction would go farther, said by British reports.

The Atlas America's best space weapon, soared 100 miles to the edge of space with the dummy warhead and 1,000 points of momentary research and development tests. The Atlas missile rocket traveled at better than 10,000 miles an hour.

The shot exceeded the previous range distance missile mark set by Russia—7,000 miles over the Pacific ocean last January with a so-called "napper" rocket.

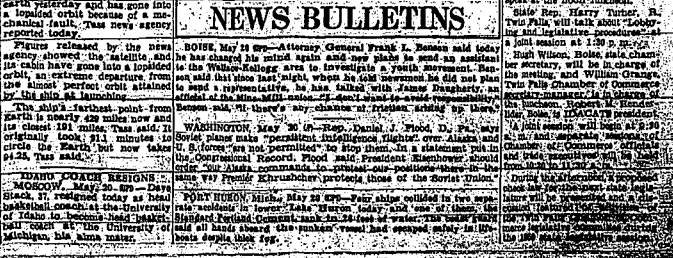
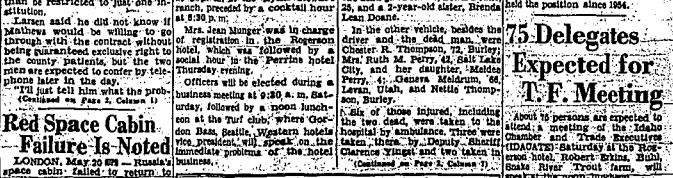
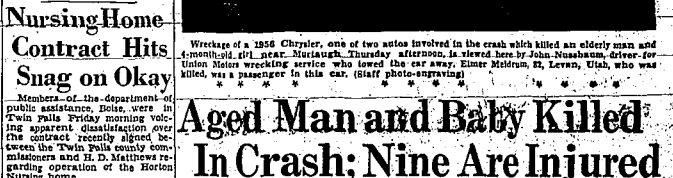

Dr. Bennion has served as institute director at the University of Utah from 1924 except for three years. In 1928, he was director of the institute of religion of the University of California.

He is a member of the general board of the Mutual Improvement Association, an LDS youth organization; a member and past president of the Utah Association for Mental Health; board of directors; chairman of the Salt Lake County hospital citizens' advisory board; and a member of the state study committee on religion.

Death Claims Famed Musician At Age of 88

AMTIVILLE, N. Y., May 20—Dr. Edgar B. Burchell, 88, who gained wide recognition as an authority on the anatomy and pathology of the eye and ear although he never completed high school, died yesterday.

Dr. Burchell lived in Larchmont and had been visiting his daughter, Mrs. Wendell W. Battersfield, when he became ill at her home in Amtivil, N. Y.

He was the only layman ever named a fellow of the American Academy of Ophthalmology and Otolaryngology. He received the honorary degree of doctor of science from the University of the City of New York in 1926.

He began his career as a first-assistant porter at the New York Eye and Ear hospital and later persuaded doctors to instruct him in laboratory tests. He took dissection textbooks to study at home.

Dr. Burchell remained at the hospital until he retired in 1925. A museum of his work was established in his honor at that time. It contains 250,000 slides, covering every known eye affliction and prepared over the years by Dr. Burchell.

WASHINGTON — Vice President Nixon's political staff has already begun to create a strategy that may help him emerge as the Democratic candidate for the White House, according to a source familiar with the Democrats' maneuvers for at least a year.

POLITICS AND PEACE

For months many top Democrats have been both publicly and privately bemoaning the fact that President Eisenhower and the Republican party seem to have what they called the "peace issue" locked up for 1960.

The blowup engineered at the summit by Soviet Premier Khrushchev over the U-2 spy plane affair has suddenly injected an important new element into this year's political equation.

At this stage it would be entirely too glib and facile to assert, as some may wish to do, that this explosion rocks the Republicans of peace as a persuasive election factor.

True enough, Khrushchev's harsh snub and insults against the President suggest he is no longer willing to deal with him on the same terms as heretofore, but prefers to await his successor next January.

If he clings to this position, the Soviet leader thus may deny Eisenhower any chance of translating his peace hopes into solid credentials in the remaining eight months of his regime. Unquestionably, this would be a blow to the President's fondest designs.

It will not necessarily weaken or destroy the trust most Americans still seem to vest in the President on the issue of peace, Khrushchev's verbal violence at Paris being only too readily forgotten, and it probably would not have achieved anything in the best of circumstances.

Consequently, the Democrats have a bright new message to deliver with which to counteract the party's criticisms could sound "pro-Khrushchev" to some voters.

Already some key Democrats have recognized this. Their statements on the crisis are tempered to avoid the sharply partisan line.

Their problem would have been different had Khrushchev not announced that Eisenhower and the United States grovel in apology. But no American politician can say anything which "seems" by the remotest shade to endorse the party's position.

This does not mean that, during the fall campaign the spy-plane and summit crisis will be totally buried from political debate. Even so, the Democrats will probably find that on these matters, they probably could not hold to that resolve.

But they are bound to concede that the bright new message to deliver with which to counteract the party's criticisms could sound "pro-Khrushchev" to some voters.

Already some key Democrats have recognized this. Their statements on the crisis are tempered to avoid the sharply partisan line.

Nevertheless, they will always be under some restraint. Partisanship has sharp limits in time of peril, and they can see already that the debate at Paris has not altered Eisenhower's identity with peace.

Their course must be a delicate one.

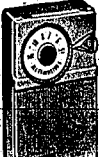

American Industrialist Tells Washington Story to Premier

PARIS, May 20 (AP)—American multimillionaire Cyrus Khrushchev told the story of George Washington and the cherry tree yesterday in a hurriedly arranged post-summer talk at Orly airport.

Soviet Americans were shocked by Eaton's approach to the Soviet premier in the light of Khrushchev's summit-reeking bashing at President Eisenhower.

"No, I don't think he did," Eaton replied, "but I pulled some serious fish. I think we need to return to the principles of George Washington."

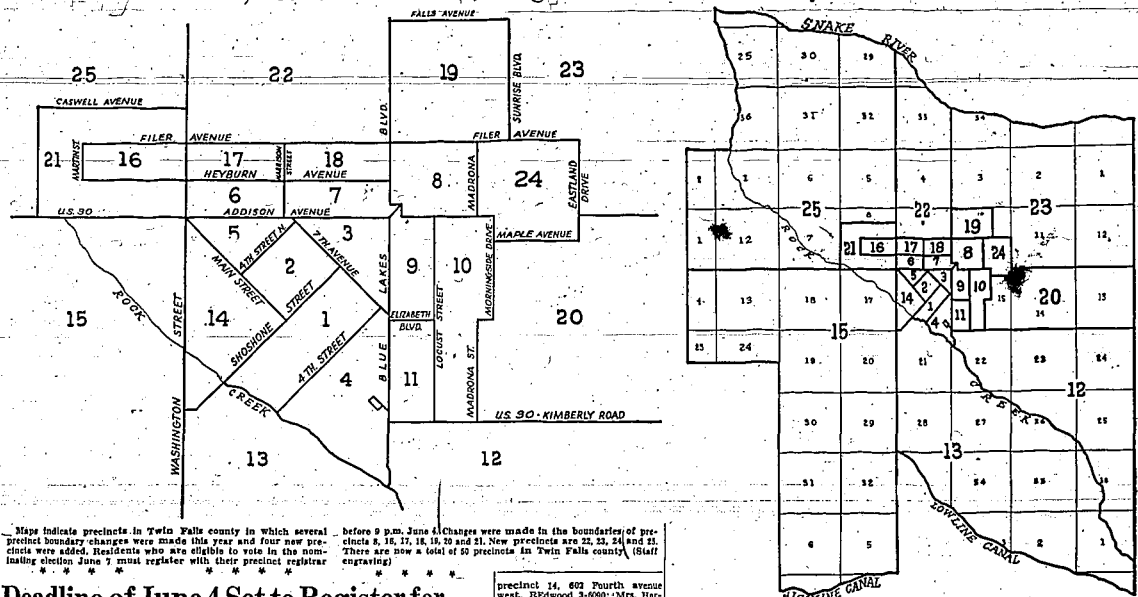

In order to vote in the forthcoming election June 7, Twin Falls residents must register by 9 p.m. June 4.

All persons 21 or over, who are citizens of the United States, residents of Idaho for six months and residents of Twin Falls county for 30 days are eligible to register. But in order to vote, residents must be registered with their precinct registrars before 9 p.m. June 4.

Map indicates precincts in Twin Falls county in which several precinct boundary changes were made this year and four new precincts were added. Residents who are eligible to vote in the forthcoming election June 7 must register with their precinct registrars before 9 p.m. June 4.

Changes have resulted in four new precincts in the Twin Falls area. The new precincts are numbered 22, 23, 24 and 25. None of the other 50 county precincts have been changed.

Registration books will be closed from 9 p.m. June 4 until June 5.

The registrar of the precinct in which the resident lives, voters are notified. No registrations will be taken at the courthouse, he pointed out.

Registrars maintain books, posted on their homes, for registering and they may be called for information, voters said.

Several precinct boundaries have been changed. Precincts 1, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20 and 21. New precincts are numbered 22, 23, 24 and 25. None of the other 50 county precincts have been changed.

Registration books will be closed from 9 p.m. June 4 until June 5.

Story of Violent Red Spying May Be Told at U. N. Parley

WASHINGTON, May 20 (UPI)—The United States will announce today that it has filed charges against spy flights with the Soviet Union.

It is a story of sudden death, espionage, double agents, wiretaps, live, atom spies and trawlers which breaks with electronic ears.

Many chapters have been told. Officials have hinted their ears to the surface yesterday when Vice President Richard M. Nixon dropped the matter from the table.

One of these cases pointed to the Soviet Embassy in Washington, D. C., which was the subject of a report by an American spy.

In 1954 Nikolai S. Khokhlov, Soviet secret agent, fled to the West after refusing to talk about his work in an order to President Dwight D. Eisenhower, a leading anti-communist refugee in France.

It was the most significant of which involved Julius and Ethel Rosenberg, executed on June 19, 1953 for delivering atomic secrets to the Soviet Union.

Another major case involved government girl Julia Coplan who was never retried after her conviction was set aside.

The United States has uncovered the quarters of an unscrupulous Brooklyn, N. Y., "artist" and found they were the most significant of which involved Julius and Ethel Rosenberg, executed on June 19, 1953 for delivering atomic secrets to the Soviet Union.

Last year the U. S. navy boarded a Russian trawler after a similar cable-cutting incident, but could find no proof and no clear motive.

On April 26 the gray hull of the U. S. machine gunner's cutter Washington sailed quietly under the waters of the Gulf stream off Long Island to test underwater mine.

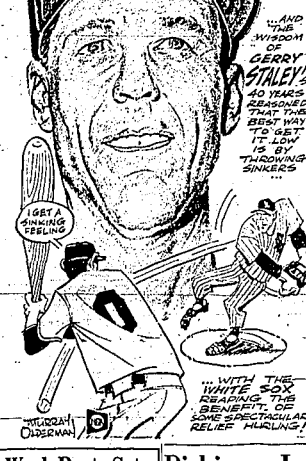

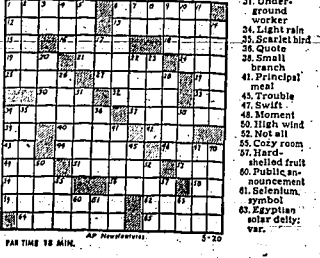

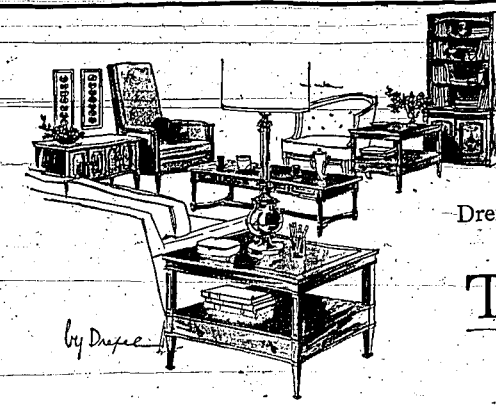
The picnic will be held on the last day of school May 27 with a potluck dinner to be served. The picnic is for all pupils, their families, and all residents of the community that wish to contribute.

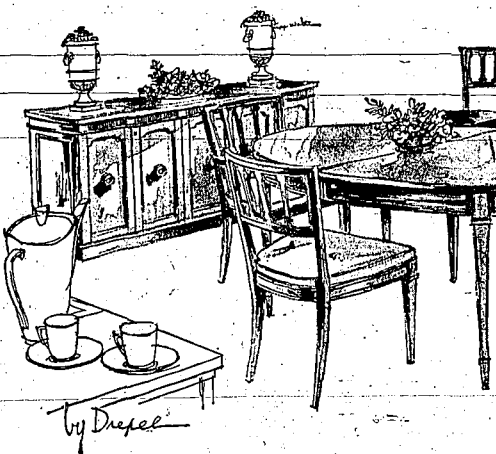

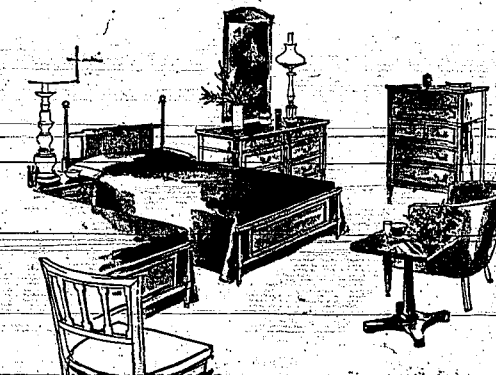
