Heard New Earthquake Smashes Chile; Tidal Waves and Volcano Eruptions Raising Death Tolls

SANTIAGO, Chile, May 25 (UP)—A new earthquake which authorities described as "cataclysmic proportions" hit southern Chile today, bringing new tidal waves and volcano eruptions. Government officials expressed fear the death toll would surpass 5,000. Nine volcanoes which had been silent for half a century belched forth smoke, ash and lava over a wide area of southern Chile, already devastated in the worst series of earthquakes in the history of the nation. Today's quake was one of four major quakes since Sunday which smashed the entire topography of the country, was being changed. There have been a steady series of shocks during that period with some areas trembling without letup. Seismologists said the major quake today was grade 12 on the international Mercalli scale—this is catastrophic proportions. It registered 2.2 on local Richter scale—though none higher than 5 has ever been reported before.

"The people of Montana will make their choice based on their own judgment and in accordance with the interests of our state and nation at heart."

The one exception, Mansfield said, was when he announced Rep. 23 he would support Murray, who had declared he would run again, Murray later withdrew from the race and threw his support to Don Bonner, former Montana governor.

Demo Accuses GOP of Being Soft to Soviet

NEW YORK, May 23 (AP)—National Democratic Chairman Paul Butler, apparently stung by suggestions that he is a party of appeasement, yesterday accused the Eisenhower administration of being "too soft on the Soviet Union."

Spoken in Washington for comments on Butler's assertions, White House Press Secretary James C. Hagerty said: "Tell him I listened to his remarks and I am sure he is a very patriotic man."

Butler, in a speech before the Democratic National Convention in Washington, said the administration has been "too soft" on the Soviet Union.

He said that he was not accusing the Republican administration of appeasement, which he defined as a deliberate policy, but rather of an unwitting reliance on the Soviet Communists.

Republicans have used the word "appeasement" in criticizing Democratic demands for a thorough airing of circumstances surrounding the U.S. spy plane crisis and the collapse of the Paris summit meeting.

Butler, in a news conference urged a tougher policy toward the Soviet Union and added:

"We had too soft a policy toward Russia in the last two years."

Reporters asked if Butler favored a return to the policy of containing the Soviets. Butler replied that he was not a foreign affairs expert and was not advocating any particular policy.

Rural Decay Broadens as American Family Farm Life Slowly Disappears

ARROW, ROCK, Mo.—(INCA)—Broadening rural decay is accompanied by the gradual disappearance of American family farm life as statistics tend to show it.

Statistics and village, once surrounded by prosperous farms, are desperately trying for survival in the wake of an exodus of farm families to the cities.

A slow decay down many a gravel road will reveal a lonesome, abandoned school, churches, stores and barns. Some of the deserted buildings are used for storage of grain and machinery.

In Arrow Rock, one of the oldest towns in central Missouri and for years an important stop on the Missouri River, three Protestant churches have consolidated with the combined congregation still numbering only about 20 persons each Sunday. Residents, faced with a steadily declining farm economy, have moved away.

At New Hampton, a strictly rural state, more than half the houses are occupied by single individuals—mostly older persons.

The U. S. department of agriculture in rural areas reaches far beyond our rural communities," says Fred V. Heintzel, president of the Missouri Farmers Association, "the farmer's total net income. To some extent, the farm loses merely as a by-product."

Often called "downside" or "rural-aid" farmers, these two men are employed by the government on construction projects and in business establishments. They farm, work, and, and holidays.

One farmer after over the financial plight of his rural neighbors, remarked:

"For years farm children have been gathering walnuts and marketing them in town for spending money; this year the adults were gathering up walnuts."

In order to supplement aging incomes, many farm wives hold one or more part-time jobs. In Missouri, several garment factories supply jobs which help farm women to earn from work.

Part-time jobs and the supply may differ on the factors contributing to the steady national decline of farm income and the number of farms, but all agree on one thing: Slow, serious problems national and local are being created.

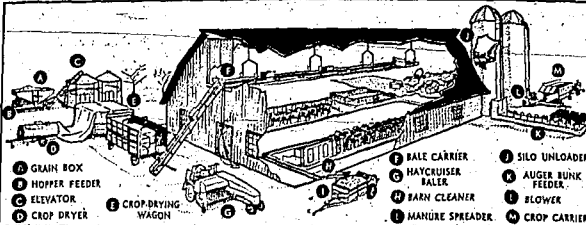

Dodge Looks Like Volume Car for 1961

BERHOFF, May 25 (U-P)—Current indications are that Dodge, rather than Plymouth, will be the big volume division, Chrysler corporation with the start of the 1961 model year.

Only four months ago, M. C. Patterson, general manager of Dodge division, felt it necessary to assure dealers that rumors the Dodge name was being abandoned were unfounded.

Chrysler, circulated freely last year even as Patterson was maintaining stoutly that his new "price Dart" would breathe new life into the division.

Chrysler, that the Dart would turn the traditional low price price of Chevrolet, Ford and Plymouth into the best price was being severely ignored. But Patterson was dead right.

According to unofficial figures here it what happened in the first three months of 1960.

Combined Chevrolet-Ford-Plymouth sales of 170,000 cars were a shade under last year's three-month total of 169,715 for Chevrolet-Ford-Plymouth.

Chevrolet took 49.6 per cent of the total; Ford took 31.8 per cent; Plymouth took 18.6 per cent.

Year Chevrolet took 45.8 per cent; Ford 44.1 per cent and Plymouth 10.1 per cent.

Thus while Plymouth sales were a fraction of a per cent, Chrysler corporation's share rose .85 per cent because of the Dart.

In the over-all sales picture Plymouth dropped from fifth behind Chevrolet, Ford, Pontiac and Oldsmobile in last year's first quarter to eighth this year.

Nazi Guarded By Israelis in Secret Prison

JERUSALEM, May 25 (AP)—Adolf Eichmann, whose Gestapo role is reputed to have killed six million Jews in Hitler's mass murder, was held under close guard Tuesday at a secret prison. The Israeli government plans to put him on trial for his life.

Reports from Bonn said the West German government would like to see Eichmann and a spokesman, many will help Israel in preparation for the trial.

But by the story of the systematic mass killer's long years of resistance, the Israeli government apparently has decided to let the story emerge now.

The Israeli secret service caught up with the ex-Nazi in Jerusalem after a search of 13 years. Premier David Ben-Gurion's revolution led to capture to parliament but gave no details.

He is believed to have been seized and brought to Israel. He was held in a secret prison, reported to have been seen in Kuwait, a Persian Gulf sheikdom, but officials would not say where.

Eichmann was arrested in a clandestine in Jaffa Monday by a team of Israeli intelligence.

He would not be charged with the death of six million Jews and advised he would have a lawyer to defend himself.

The Israeli parliament abolished the death penalty last year except for treason cases and war crimes against the Jewish people.

From 1933 until the end of World War I, Eichmann was chief of the Gestapo's Jewish section.

Midastep Called Step Toward Tension Ease

WASHINGTON, May 25 (AP)—The state department pictured the new Mexican Midsatellite as a step toward easing international tension and of potential use in super-vising disarmament.

Press Officer Lincoln White gave this view when asked about the Midsat satellite launched from Cape Canaveral, Fla., Tuesday was an insistent provocation by the United States.

The German Communists made this assertion even though the satellite was not aimed at a country which would take it over their territory or over the Soviet Union. Its path covers territory of the great north and south of the equator.

White told newsmen, "This satellite is the most recent of the series of service satellites for a variety of practical purposes under development by the United States."

Pollster Says Nixon Would Lose to Demo

SAN FRANCISCO, May 25 (AP)—An opinion poll finished by the public who favor New York's Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller reports that in a vote for president this week Vice President Richard M. Nixon would lose California to Democratic Adlai E. Stevenson of John F. Kennedy.

The poll was by Paetz Control-Idair, professional opinion surveyor. The result was made public by William M. Britton, San Francisco attorney and spokesman for the group financing the poll.

The sampling of 3,022 California voters was started May 11 and completed three days later. This was immediately after Kennedy's strong showing in the West Virginia primary but before the start of the Paris summit conference.

"Nixon would probably lose California to either Kennedy or Stevenson in November," the poll summary continued. "This appears to be the case because of the remarkably consistent way in which California Democrats vote behind their own party's candidate in opposition to Nixon."

The poll score in Nixon's home state for Nixon vs. Stevenson reported in percentages: Stevenson 43, Nixon 41.5, no opinion 13.7.

Nixon vs. Kennedy: Kennedy 44, Nixon 38.9, no opinion 16.7.

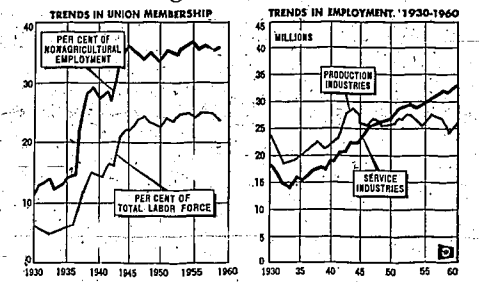

Union Drive for White Collar Worker During Past 2 Years Claimed Failure

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The almost 60 per cent of the total big union drives for white collar workers during the past two years have failed.

That's now shown by department of labor research.

Around a third of the nation's non-farm labor force is now composed of salaried white collar workers. But less than an eighth of union members are white collar men. In the year 1958 from 1950 to 1958, white collar workers in the union apparently declined markedly.

"This holds no good for long-time future influence of labor unions. White collar workers are becoming a larger and larger share of the labor market. In manufacturing, the percentage of white collar workers has almost doubled in the last 15 years.

In some fields this will gradually mean a lessening of union power. Take one example: The last strike by long-distance telephone workers haven't worked well. The lines are now so mechanized that supervisors and other non-union men have been able to carry on essential services during the strikes.

In aircraft manufacture, the number of blue collar workers—many of whom have declined

only one-seventh of the 4.3 million clerical employees outside the government are in union members. And not more than 20 per cent of federal white collar workers belong to employ organizations.

Fewer than a tenth of the five million employees of state and local governments are organized. Unions have been negligible in banking, insurance, real estate and other service industries.

"They've scored marked success with municipal actors, newspaper and writers. They've organized workers in railway and communication unions.

But the overall showing is not great.

Research men in the department of labor have sought to find out why. They're not certain yet, but they report these theories:

"The white collar worker is closer to management. He tends to think of his own aims and the company's as being the same."

Others are dominated by blue collar workers. The white collar man often wants to identify himself with the blue collar level.

Many white collar workers think they have a better chance of getting ahead on individual merit than by collective bargaining. A good many engineers, chemists and other scientific men are in conflict between union membership and the confidential relationship between a professional man and his employer.

So far the unions haven't given up. They're in the process right now of organizing new drives for the white collar worker. They're worried about the future of winners and the chapter with the best decoration.

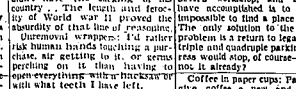

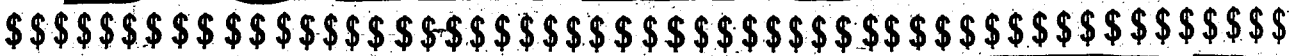
