Protection on Ike's Eastern Trip Planned

TAIPEI, Formosa, June 1.—The United States and nationalistic China will mobilize maximum air and sea patrols to insure Formosa during President Eisenhower's 21-hour visit June 10 to 15, military sources said today.

Nationalist China's officials fear the communists might attack in the Formosa straits during Eisenhower's Asian tour as they did when the late John Foster Dulles visited Taipei two years ago.

High Alert Set
Formosa-based missiles, the atom-bombed U. S. seventh fleet and the national jet air force will be in a state of high alert when Eisenhower spends and a night some 100 miles from communist China.

Washington dispatches said the U. S. aircraft carrier Taskforce 70 will escort Eisenhower's seventh fleet cruiser from Manila to northern Formosa if the President decides on the 30-hour tour voyage rather than flying.

Open Sea Trips, Likely
The cruiser probably would not enter the 100-mile-wide Formosa straits which separates the national island from the Chinese mainland.

Tested it would sail along Formosa's east coast in the open Pacific to the northern port of Keelung where, weather permitting, Eisenhower probably would fly by helicopter the 30 miles to Taipei.

Formosa is guarded by four batteries of Nike-Hercules anti-aircraft missiles mounted by Chinese and a Matador missile battery manned by Americans.

U. S., NEPAL SIGN PACT
KATMANDU, Nepal, June 1.—The United States and Nepal signed a one-million dollar agreement yesterday for joint projects involving village development, telecommunications, water improvement, militia control, education and industrial development during the 1950-51 fiscal year. Study Says Children, Money, Main Source for Happiness

NEW YORK, June 1 (AP).—A nationwide survey tells where and how Americans find their happiness and their own reasons for it.

Major sources for happiness—deeds, insufficient housing, in street, not enough money.

Only 10 per cent said marriage alone made them happy. 14 per cent cited their jobs.

Only four per cent said they were unhappy in 1957 because of world tensions and the possibility of war.

There are some of the best findings of a mental health survey of the average U.S. citizen, taken by the University of Michigan's survey research center.

Entitled "American View of Mental Health," it is the fourth in a series supported by the joint commission on mental illness and health.

Jacq. H. Kerk, director of the commission, said one professional politician who read the book said it would become a bible for politicians—an accounting of what American voters really worry and care about.

Based on 246 interviews—some of them four hours long—the survey turned up these findings:

Older people find fewer shortcomings in themselves than do younger people, with age, people seem to come to terms with self.

Younger people are more involved in achievement and older people are more involved in considerations of the moral and the good.

How do Americans handle their personal crisis? "Many do nothing, or forgo it, or permit the situation to run its course. Those who try to cope with their troubles on their own often turn to their spouses, other members of their families or friends.

"Another sizable group prays sixteen per cent pray as a means of handling their daily worries and even more—a third—pray when faced with a critical emergency, such as illness.

"Nearly did they put their faith in bartenders, taxi drivers, fortune tellers or other supposedly popular but unorthodox contacts."

Nearly one-quarter said they had at some point in their adult lives come to the brink of nervous breakdown. Prime reason—the death of a loved one or job termination.

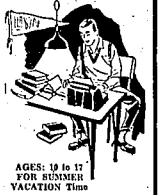

He set all the right ground rules, including closed door sessions with censored reports released to the public. In launching the inquiry, Mr. Fulbright set the example of the unanimous support of all committee members of both parties.

Nevertheless, the partisan clamor already being suggested by the committee is extremely difficult to keep committee members from being used by both sides as political ammunition in this presidential year.

It is not hard to see how people could sit on material they think may cut the ground from under their opponents at the polls. This does not mean they will continue to deliberately exploit the situation at the risk of our security and our position abroad. Many will act with some restraint. Others will be able to persuade themselves that such underhanded interest coincides with the national interest.

Already there have been a good many careless and intemperate remarks about the U-2 affair. They are blunders, and as such they do nothing to clarify but indeed only confuse Americans' understanding of the incident.

The committee is looking into whatever mistakes our government may have made in that connection and from it we should expect a rational report.

No committee will measure the blunders of the politicians who unwisely distort the story. We will have to trust that the American people themselves will make that necessary judgment. They will hold a rather large committee meeting of their own next November.

2 Demos Hit She Packs for European Trip

U2 Incident; Texan Quiet

LOS ANGELES, June 1 (AP)—Sen. P. Kenneth and Representative Symington, Democratic and Republican hopefuls, borrowed Harry Truman's "five um ber" technique last night and lashed out at Vice President Richard M. Nixon and the Eisenhower administration's U2 policy.

But a third Democratic front-runner for the nomination, Sen. Lyndon Johnson, declining to mention names or discuss "um ber" takes, said Russian Premier Nikita Khrushchev is "a study in mistakes" if he thinks communist provocateurs can divide the United States.

Not Anxious to Meet

All three presidential hopefuls agreed, however, they would be in no hurry to hold a summit meeting with Khrushchev if they were elected. Khrushchev made clear after the summit failure that he felt he could achieve better results with a new U. S. president.

Johnson, Kennedy and Symington spoke at a \$100,000 political dinner for California's Edmund G. Brown attended by 1,000 persons in California's primary next Tuesday.

Kennedy, victor in recent election, was assisted by Sen. Lyndon Johnson's U2 policy, and had sharp words with Nixon, who is considered the vice president accused him and Adlai Stevenson of being soft on communism when they criticized the government's handling of the incident.

The Massachusetts senator said he "couldn't imagine Truman being paid and sent to Europe," the way he said Eisenhower was. He said he hardly thought Nixon was qualified to be president, merely on the basis of his trip to Latin America and his conduct in the kitchen with Khrushchev.

Symington Blasts Nixon

Sen. Missouri said he is "funny to hear Nixon defend the Eisenhower policies," and he said he and explain why he is against them on the other.

He added, "If we don't change our policies soon, we are going to be a second class nation."

Johnson criticized what he termed the Republican "stiff upper lip" and turned up his nose to the public, but he added away from a newspaper's U2 incident on anyone.

Charge Denied

In news conference earlier Symington and Johnson denied they had headed way to spur a "Khrushchev" movement.

At the dinner, Kennedy joked about his Catholicism, and a couple of months back there was talk about a Brown-Kennedy fight and, of course, the U2 question was whether two candidates from opposite sides could carry the nation.

Brown also is a Catholic.

WASHINGTON, June 1 (AP)—Plans were announced yesterday to develop a new second-stage engine for the Saturn space rocket about twice as powerful as the one it is scheduled to use initially.

The national aeronautics and space administration announced it will negotiate a contract with the Rocketdyne division of North American Aviation, Inc. to develop a 220,000-pound thrust, liquid-hydrogen fueled engine.

The Saturn is America's brightest hope for a rocket to put a multiton payload into outer space or to effect a soft landing—rather than a crash—on the moon.

The first Saturn launching, with two dummy upper stages, is scheduled for mid-1961, but scientists agree that any full-scale launching before 1964 is unlikely.

The first time I saw Joe Louis was in the winter of 1936. It was in the ring in Detroit, Michigan, against a guy I old class named Natie Mann. I was a boxer at several points. I was a heavyweight prospect in action. It was a dull fight as I remember it. I was down six times, staying the 15-round distance by the use of my left and right defense. Joe kept his head low, shielded by his arms, and only talked it after he was safely back on his stool between rounds. "After that, I saw Louis, in nearly all of his fights, and those I missed were at the close of his career when he was home-far, and I was glad to miss them. Louis was too good when he was good to see him knocked about by men he could have handled, and after evening when his left hook had the bite of a trip hammer and his right had "church in out" written across its leather face. This was 24 years ago. The world was just about to become Joe's oyster, and Joe was coming up with all the tools to open it. He operated with all right, and he kept it open a long time. And then it shut on him. It's too bad it did, for no heavyweight champion ever fought cleaner, harder and with less excuses or complaints than Louis. During his day I must have seen him hit with every illegal punch there is, yet I do not remember his ever so much as looking at the referee. He just let his fists settle the score.

Handling of Juveniles Held Important; Changes Talked

BOISE, June 1—The chairman of an Idaho Bar association committee on lower court reform said today he looks on juvenile delinquency cases as "matters of life and death which should be handled by the best judges available."

But Area county Probate Judge W. E. Smith, chairman of the committee on the reform of inferior courts of the Idaho Bar association, said he thinks probate judges still have a useful place in the handling of juvenile cases.

He suggests that juvenile jurisdiction be transferred from the probate courts to district courts in circumstances where the retention of qualified probate judges as hearing officers and juvenile court judges is justified.

"We should not lose the talents of these probate judges who have become exceptionally well qualified to handle juvenile cases," he said. "Probate judges in the state have common sense and that is the most important qualification in the handling of juvenile cases."

"If punitive action was the right approach," said Dr. Carver, "we would have gotten rid of juvenile delinquency 100 years ago. We've had jails a lot longer than we've had mental health programs."

Judge Smith said he considers juvenile delinquency problems to be "essentially ones of correction and he declared that psychiatric treatment is needed in "only 10 per cent of the cases."

Dr. Carver and Judge Smith, both of whom have responsibility under the Youth Rehabilitation act, agree that the problem is growing and that a revision of the court system would be a step in the right direction.

Judge Smith said he considers the trend in juvenile crime continues that in 10 years between 80 and 90 per cent of all 17-year-old boys in Idaho will "land in juvenile court."

"This increase goes to the guts of the country. It is caused primarily by the departure of people from values which used to be considered, justice—values such as honor, integrity, patriotism, faith in God, faith in the integrity of the individual and respect for law."

Society has added a diremish command to the ten: "Thou shalt not get caught." Following the example established by adults, young people are adopting delinquent behavior as an acceptable way of life.

Dr. Carver and Judge Smith believe that the "family court" on a district basis would aid in handling the juvenile offender because all family problems, including divorce and adoption, would be handled by the family court.

Judge Smith's committee has recommended that the district courts become family courts in addition to their other duties.

The committee has suggested that Idaho lawyers study the standard Family Court act which was drafted by the National Probation and Parole association, the U. S. Children's Bureau and the National Council of Juvenile Court Judges.

"It is my personal hope," said Judge Smith, "that this proposed act will be approved by the lawyers so that it can be offered to the legislature in 1963."

"Family law, including juvenile law, should be in district courts because their family matters are the most important cases handled in our system of jurisprudence. Very literally family law cases are matters of life or death," he declared.

"This proposed law, for the sake of children, extends the philosophy of the Youth Rehabilitation act into the field of divorce and adoption. It would allow the judge in any matter involving children to have the benefit of a social study by a social worker before he makes his decision."

"In cases where the custody of a child is at stake, the judge could order psychiatric evaluation of both the child and the parent before a placement is made."

"Such legislation would afford an opportunity for the counseling of couples before divorce and rehabilitate many families and make them viable again."

"By organizing the family court on a district basis district court facilities for juveniles might become a reality instead of theory to be dodged by county counselors working with limited county funds."

"This act provides the best machinery yet devised in law for the prevention and cure of juvenile delinquency and all other family problems."

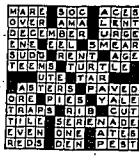

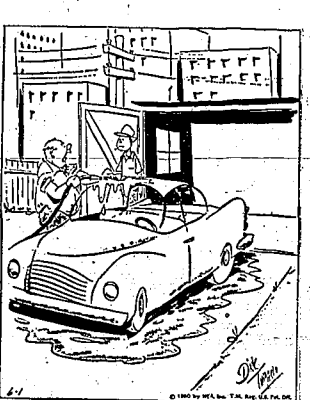

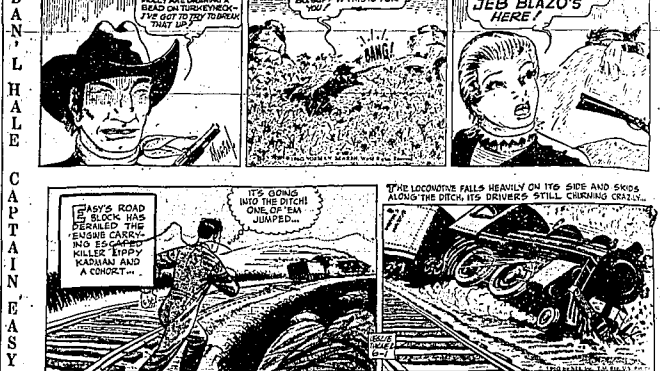
