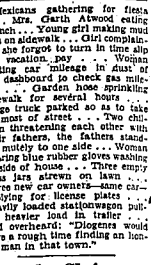

Nixon Called Name by Red Newswriters

MOSCOW, June 4 (AP)—Frank Hammer, a Vice President Richard M. Nixon today with the clear-cut aim of becoming his nemesis along with the rest of the American leadership.

The Soviet communist newspaper called Nixon a hypocrite, a demagogue and a hysterical demagogue in an article paralleling in violence the news conference attack by Premier Nikita Khrushchev yesterday on President Eisenhower and West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer.

Observer Writes

The Pravda article on Nixon was written by "Olovrov," the title given to a writer who is reflecting official policy.

It centered on the vice president's speech Tuesday before members of the eight-nation Southeast Asia Treaty organization in Washington. Nixon had called on western nations and their allies to adopt a no-retreat, no-concession policy. He suggested they should be guided by the principle of firmness without belligerence.

Speech Torn Apart

Pravda ripped into the speech almost phrase by phrase.

"How low have bourgeois policies fallen," it asked, "if men of Nixon's type, grabbing their satellites by the throat, can in tender voices shout honesty and peace?"

"The speech is complete hypocrisy," the writer accused Nixon of shouting false tears about the freedom of the Paris summit conference, then quoted him as saying "the method of summit meetings should be dropped."

Study Says Water Use to Be Up 70 Per Cent in 20 Years

WASHINGTON, June 4 (AP)—Commerce department experts predicted today the nation's daily water requirements will increase by nearly 70 per cent during the next 20 years.

Proportions in the report run from .155, when estimated daily water use was around 250 billion gallons, to an anticipated requirement of 404 billion gallons a day in 1980.

The calculations are based on an estimated population of 230.8 million in 1980, not including Alaska and Hawaii. The present population is around 170 million.

Using data assembled from various government sources, that report says the overall water supply will be ample to meet the nation's needs 20 years hence, but that there will continue to be shortages in some parts.

Idaho Solon Is Critical of Aid for Laos

WASHINGTON, June 4 (AP)—Sen. Henry Dworshak, R., Idaho, today criticized the administration's heavy increase in military aid funds for Laos but acknowledged native forces would be ineffective in stemming a red Chinese attack.

He said the amount requested for the foreign aid money increased for the 1961 fiscal year starts on July 1 is 3 1/2 times as much as was provided two years ago.

He called this "unrealistic in the light of the relative unimportance of Laos militarily."

Dworshak, a member of the sen-

ate appropriations committee said he has not at liberty to disclose the exact figures but that the military bill proposed for the South-east Asia country runs into the millions of dollars.

He added in a statement that at a recent closed-door hearing of the appropriations committee he asked Gen. William B. Palmer, the defense department's director of foreign military assistance, how long the Laos forces could last should an attack by red China.

He quoted Palmer as replying, "They would not last long enough for the American boys to get there."

Dworshak said Palmer also does not have any military force of foreign military forces that is not trained in their own professional military forces."

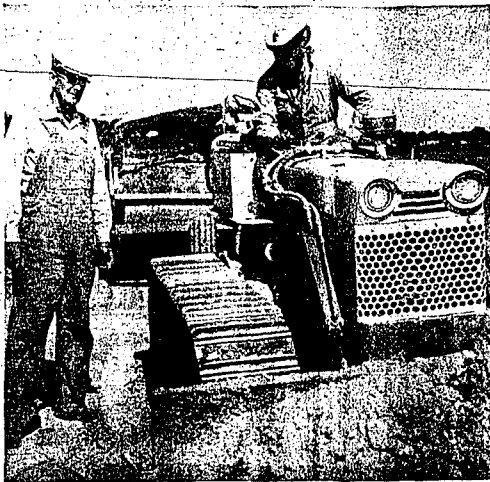
Don Sabertia McKenrath, Bellevue, seeks the office of justice of the peace for the No. 2 justice precinct.

Boyle Visits Mother, Finds She's Comfort for Children

CITY, June 4 (UP)—Children are supposed to be a comfort to their mother in her old age. It works the other way in our frontier town—mother gets a lot more of a comfort she is, to her daughter and four sons. We doubt if we could ever see along without her.

Her mother will be 73 in September. Returning here for my first visit with her in more than a year. I was afraid of what time might have done to her in the interval. The worry was needless. Time had gnawed white hairs on her head and slowed her steps with rheumatism, but she has no power to curb her spiritably spirit.

"All that I've got wrong with me is old age—and that, I will keep," she said. Her only concession to the years is, "I can't really see the cane now."

Mother has had what might be called a hard life, but she never thinks of it that way. At 15 she left her mother, and at 17 she emigrated here by herself from her farm home in County Mayo, Ireland.

"I think dad was making about \$12 a week when he injured. Five children came along and she had to cook and mend and clean to do the laundry for us all."

Mother is proud of the fact that she never had a child, and all she now more than 40 years old. "That's a pretty good health record," she often says. "If you dad and I did nothing else for you, we brought you into this world with strong healthy bodies. That means a lot."

"A large family is an agitation. That's what it is—a constant agitation. But it doesn't leave you any time for self-pity, and that's a good thing."

"I'm sorry about you children now more than that ever. At least when you were small I knew where you all were."

When she was younger, mother had a fine Irish temper. When angered at something one of her blood had done, she would turn her eyes to the ceiling and loose a life of eloquence that curled the back of the arm tree outside the window.

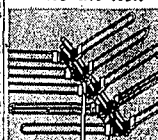
Dad died in 1937, but we still don't really think of him as dead. We talk of him now as if he had merely gone into another room and might be back at any moment.

"That attitude—plus mother's inherent courage—may explain why nearly 23 years of widowhood haven't soured her disposition. "I was too busy to grieve," she said. "And I still am. Anyway, death is part of life, and you must accept what you can't avoid. Life is love and happiness and sorrow, and it does no good to complain against it."

On Memorial day, surrounded by her family, mother went to the local grave and brought him a bunch of flowers—the didn't cry at all. She put the flowers in a vase, we all said a prayer, and after a while turned to leave. I took mother's hand and wrapped it around my arm to steady her path across the rolling turf. Independent as ever, she pulled her hand away and leaned more heavily on the cane. "I don't need any help," she said. "I don't like to feel too much weight on anyone."

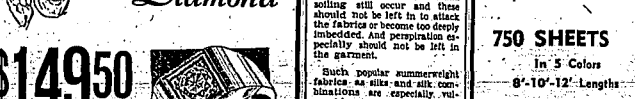

"If I wanted to, I could sit out on the sidewalk and sell pencils to a tin cup," said George Mett, 24, Newark, N. J., who lost the use of his legs and left arm in an automobile accident in 1953 and stayed in the Twin Falls Salvation Army shelter Thursday night after hitchhiking from Pocatello. Mett has traveled throughout the United States since a neck-and-shoulder accident, working as a salesman. "After the accident I was determined to work for a living," he stated by selling Christmas cards from door to door, with the help of someone pushing his wheelchair. Now he travels around the country and sells wholesale merchandise, pens or jewelry from a booth in shopping centers and grocery stores. Mett left New Jersey, where his parents and younger sister live, about a month ago. Last week he arrived at Pocatello, Idaho, where he hitchhiked until Thursday and then hitchhiked rides into Twin Falls. One driver took him to a far American Falls, where he walked three hours until an ex-marine picked him up and drove him into the Salvation Army Thrift store. While he was in a Pocatello cafe, someone stole his suitcase in which he had his artificial arm and some money. In the Thrift store, he met Mrs. Leo Pittman and Mrs. Reed Pittman, who gave him some clothing and money.

Railworkers Dispute Has Been Settled

CHICAGO, June 4 (AP)—A 15-month wage dispute between the 17,000 member Order of Railroad Conductors and Brakemen and the nation's railroads was settled today on the four per cent hourly formula of the engineers' arbitration award. The conductors' agreement calls for a two per cent, or \$1.68 cents an hour, increase in average basic wage rates effective July 1, this year. Another boost of the same amount will be applied March 1, 1961. The pact incorporates a cost-of-living adjustment of 17 cents an hour into the basic pay but discontinues the cost-of-living escalator clause. The contract will expire Nov. 1, 1961. Rate pay for conductors, including the 17-cent cost-of-living allowance under the contract which expired Nov. 1, 1959, ranged from \$24.50 to \$28.50 an hour. Average annual earnings of passenger and freight conductors have been reported as about \$9,770. Theodore Short, spokesman for the Carriers' conference committee, said the settlement today and yesterday's arbitration award to the engineers do not affect the railroad proposals for changes in work rules. Voting for Judges Without Naming Party Believed OK

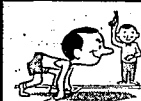
BOISE, June 4 (AP)—An informed legal source expressed belief today that a voter in next Tuesday's primary election could obtain a nonpartisan judicial ballot without identifying himself either as a Republican or a Democrat. "The intent of the law," said the informant, who asked not to be quoted by name, "is to permit a voter to exercise his franchise without restriction." "I think he could vote the nonpartisan ballot even if he didn't want to vote either one of the party ballots." The judicial voting will be a final election for two of the four candidates seeking the two supreme court seats at stake. That is because there are two candidates for each seat and Idaho law says that if a candidate gets a majority of the vote cast in the primary he is elected without further balloting. U. S. Official Is Disgusted With Russian

WASHINGTON, June 4 (AP)—Secretary of State Christian A. Hunter said today he was disgusted with Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev's "blatant propaganda attacks" on President Eisenhower. He accused the Soviet leader of trying to "create a false picture of the Paris summit conference collapse."

Hunter's statement, which was made at the state department as the U. S. began its 100th anniversary celebration yesterday during a Moscow news conference.

He attacked Khrushchev's "blatant propaganda" which he said was "completely lacking in wit" and "not what he called 'sophisticated forces in the United States.'"

"The best job we could give him in our country would be as director of a children's home," he said as a childlike figure, "but as head of a mighty state he is more dangerous and might do a lot of harm."

U. S. Almost Silent

With one exception, there was no official U. S. comment yesterday on Khrushchev's remarks. The White House branded as "absolutely untrue" a claim by the Soviet press that Eisenhower had told him last fall at Camp David that the United States did not want a united Germany.

State department officials said today they pronounced the White House was aware of Hunter's statement which said: "All American and other charges designed to feel at the ill-remembered attacks coming from Moscow."

Attack "Unjustifiable"

"It is understandable that Mr. Khrushchev is seeking to divert attention from the responsibility known to all the world — for the disruption of the Paris summit conference, should seek to cast the blame in any way that he can," Hunter said.

"His personal attempts at vilification can only add that I deplore the degradation of the standards of international relations which he is attempting to bring about."

"His remarks reflect credit neither on himself nor on his government."

Red China Says Everest Higher

TSIKYO, June 4 (AP)—The red Chinese who reported they topped Mt. Everest last month have calculated a higher elevation than ever before for the highest mountain.

"Previous radio said they figured it at 29,123 feet."

For almost a century most maps have shown Everest's height at 29,000 feet, and some have had it at 29,028 feet in 1954.

The Indian government report said it was 29,167 feet, but was accepted by the U. S. National Geographic society.

Midwest Invaded By N. Y. Leader

BISMARCK, N. D., June 4 (AP)—Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller moved across this Midwestern farm state today in a grain truck tour that left voters with a strong reminder he was available for the Republican nomination of president.

The New York governor spoke on farm policy in a wheatfield, on foreign affairs in a village marked with children and cows and about thousands of hands.

The governor did not receive and he said he had not expected any encouragement that North Dakota would launch any move to draft him for the Republican nomination.

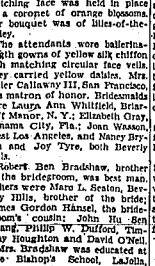

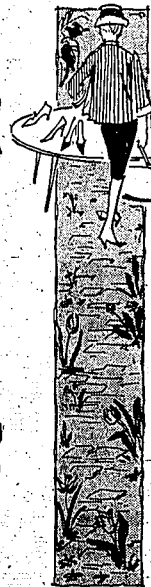

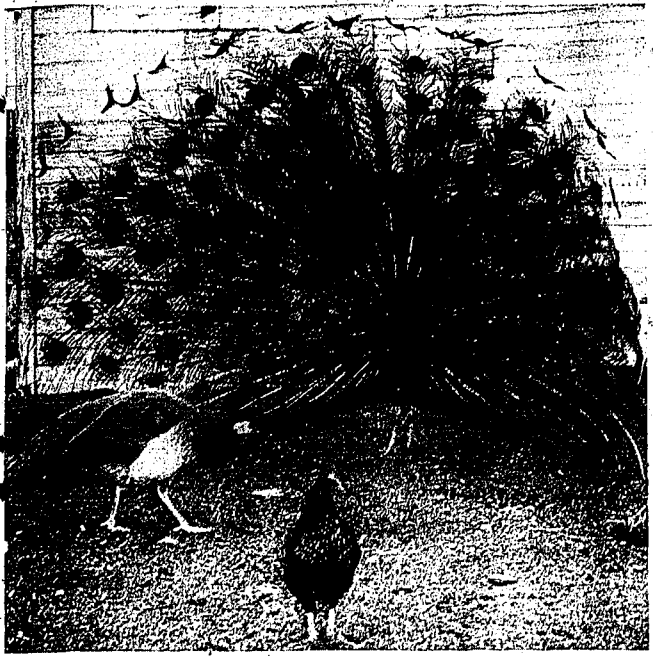

Old Bayonet Is Found in Desert and Sold as Junk

Almost anything can turn up in the desert, and almost anything can turn up in a scrapyard—even a bayonet.

Bill Anderson, who works for Mrs. L. L. Langdon, is used to all kinds of junk in the line of scrap metal, but was surprised a few days ago when a man brought in a bayonet.

The surprising thing was that the man found it in the desert west of Balanced Rock, where the man, whom Anderson didn't know, had been rummaging around in the desert "looking for scrap metal in those dump yards that characterize some of the desert regions bordering more settled areas."

It had gathered a load of metal and was about ready to bring it into Twin Falls to sell when he noticed a piece of metal protruding from the ground.

It was dug at the metal and he pulled free of the soil, earth. He was surprised to discover he had grasped the end of a bayonet—deadly, complete with blade.

Anderson says it is one of the most unusual items that has turned up in the scrapyard in some time and adds that he intends to keep it. According to a catalog he has, the bayonet resembles a bayonet of the type used in the Franco-Prussian war.

Motorists who pass the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Paul V. Jones south-west of Twin Falls are sometimes startled by the sight of the multitude of peacocks and peahens in the barnyard. For more than three years they have raised the birds, which look like an over-dressed pheasant.

Mrs. Jones, who operates the Apparel Shop, formerly Haly's, has been raising them for three years. She started with three birds and now has 32, establishing a sort of peacock ranch.

She has done this for no other reason than she simply likes them. She was given the original three birds by Mr. and Mrs. Percy Lawrence, Phoenix, who formerly operated the Vogue, Inc. They acquired the birds after they moved from Twin Falls to Emmet. They were unsuccessful in raising the birds because too many of the birds were mistaken for pheasants by hunters. So they gave the remainder of their stock to Mrs. Jones. In the fall Mrs. Jones acquires a "Watch out for Peacock" sign.

Difficult to Raise

Although Mrs. Jones says "Peacocks are difficult to raise, somewhat like turkeys, they do for no reason at all," she had had considerable success in her venture. Now there is hardly a spot on the acreage where you can't find a strutting peacock, preening his feathers, showing off for the hens and, in general, being a feathered extrovert.

Their nest roost in a conventional chicken coop, but drive on ranging about 40 feet high in the trees of the barnyard. They hop around the trees on the ground, like nervous bunnies. Mrs. Jones says they fly like wild birds and can fly for a mile or so without tiring.

Broken Windows, Smashed Bottles Used to Make Laminated Glassware

FILER, June 4 — Mrs. Ralph Dean is probably one of the few people in Magic Valley who can enjoy broken windows and smashed bottles in her hobby. Mrs. Dean has a broken glass vase with pottery and neatly strung studs in the art of broken glassware, especially laminated glassware.

Her display at the recent hobby show held at the Episcopal Church of the Ascension in Twin Falls was one of the most unusual displays and caught the eye of many persons interested in glassware and pottery work.

Just starting with this particular kind of thing only a few months ago, she is the first to admit she has a lot to learn about it. But she has enjoyed the time spent experimenting with glass and reconstructing it to create interesting and attractive glassware.

She first became interested in this type of glassware after visiting some shops in California that made laminated glassware. She is one of the first persons around here to start making it, but quite a few hobbyists are experimenting with it in the Boise area.

Made From Mold

Unlike pottery, this type of object is made from a mold. The glass is placed over the mold, placed in a kiln, and when the heat softens the glass it settles into the mold. When it has cooled, it is removed.

So far Mrs. Dean says that the main disadvantage she can find over pottery making is the worker is limited to constructing only hollow containers, like planters or ashtrays, or jewelry pieces. This is because it is difficult to extract the glass from a deep mold. Another disadvantage is that the molds, which are made from acetone, are rather expensive, starting at about \$2.50 and going on up. But color variations of glassware from a single mold are endless.

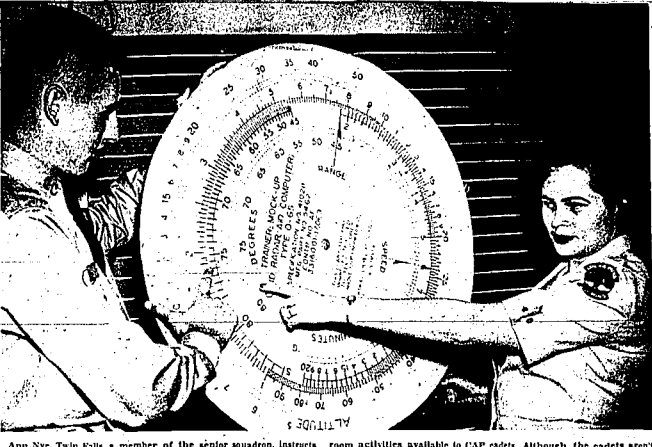

Agency Denies Curbs on Import of Lamb, Mutton

SALT LAKE CITY, June 8—The United States Department of Agriculture has rejected the requests of the domestic sheep industry for relief from foreign lamb and mutton imports, according to the National Wool Growers Association. Salt Lake City.

The commission rejected the requests for a 100 percent tariff on June 1. The rejection was made on the grounds that domestic lamb and mutton and live lambs are not being imported into the United States in sufficient quantities to cause or threaten serious injury to the domestic sheep industry.

The legality of the rejection was based on section seven of the trade agreements extension act, which was interpreted that since sheep and goats do not produce dressed lamb or mutton they have no legal right to seek relief from injury at least as far as dressed lamb and mutton imports are concerned.

Harold Jaseval, president of the National Wool Growers Association, said it was extremely hard to visualize how anyone could ray the producers of lamb and mutton.

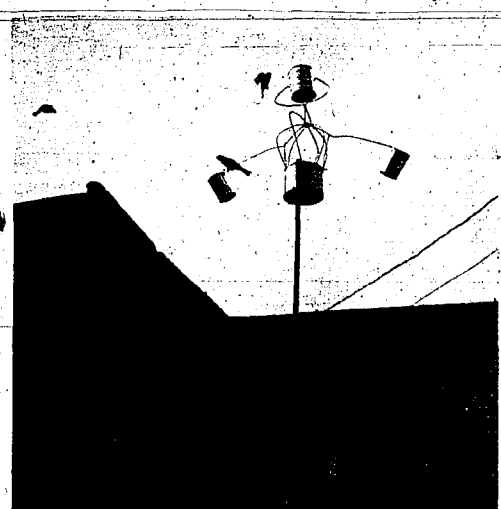

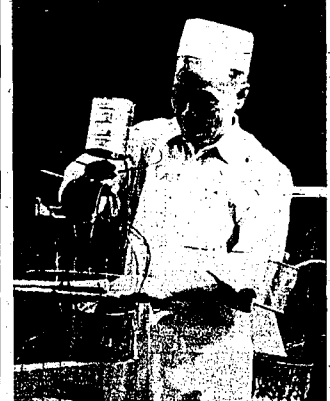
For the past four years, Lee has occupied himself in the hours where cafe business is slow by playing host to a noisy, hungry flock of sparrows. Each morning about 9:30 he mixes a savory mouth-watering brew of bread crumbs and Twin Falls city water.

This may not attract many persons, but sparrows being what they are, Lee's bird and bird feeder is as popular with the city sparrows as the local coffee bars are with the city's midtown semi-awakes.

Each morning the sparrows fly in from all over the city and make gluttonous of themselves at the feed. In the meantime, Lee stands in the back door of the cafe and watches the scene. Except when someone tries to photograph them, the feeder is usually covered with about 15 to 20 breaking sparrows. They flutter around the wire and cans and fight over the choice morsel.

By late morning the delicious meal had been consumed and they fly away to fill their cans with Twin Falls street smog.

Now Lee goes to the alley to dress up his bird feeding station. He bought a few red wood and glass bird feeders. They were replaced with his creation, and they have been eating happily again.

Trading Stamp Once Was Oddity, Now Is One of Mightiest Marketing Tools

NEW YORK, June 4.—Who do some shoppers neglect to count their change at checkout counters and get a stamp? Probably because they're too busy adding up their trading stamps.

Such is their single-mindedness that they ignore almost a retelling oddity just a decade ago has become one of the mightiest marketing tools in U. S. business.

Three out of four American families save the colorful little coupons they collect. Six free purchases ranging from gum to grand prizes. They paste the stamps in books and swap them for almost everything from even-ting Evening. They have been offered to little avail, in more than a dozen state legislatures.

MAGIC VALLEY PORTRAIT Forest Supervisor Has Spent Most of Life Working With Natural Resources

Charged with supervising 185,000 acres of land and coordinating the work of nearly 200 persons during the past summer, J. L. Sevy, supervisor of the Sawtooth national forest, has spent most of his life working with natural resources. His work has ranged from a young rafter hand in Utah to a person who has spent almost 23 years with the forest service.

Sevy has been supervisor of the Sawtooth national forest since 1957. He was transferred from Wyoming where he had been supervisor of the Bridger national forest since 1954.

As supervisor of the forest his primary duties are to coordinate the many programs, supervise the projects in progress, and make other important decisions of the forest. He estimates about one-third of his time is spent traveling about the eight major districts. He still manages, even as an executive position, to spend about 50 days a year on horseback, inspecting back areas of the forest. He notes that modern days are not like when he first arrived as a forest ranger in Nevada. One year he spent as much as 200 days in the saddle, making inspection tours of the back areas.

Sevy was born and reared in Utah. His father and uncles were ranchers. Later his father went into law and became a district judge in Utah. Sevy spent all his early years on a ranch working with livestock. He was born in Panhandle and reared in Richfield, Utah. While attending public schools in Richfield he worked as a shepherd for his uncles. Even in college he worked summers — and sometimes stopped out of school to work — on cattle ranches.

He first developed his appreciation of range husbandry and its effect on the country and the livestock while working the high ranchlands.

"I believe that period in my life had a great deal to do with my choice of career."

"Much of our summer range work on the headwaters of the Snake river, where at times the country was overgrazed, and any sudden storm created a flood. Through some of my experiences there I realized the value of a good range policy."

After he finished high school, out of school to work on ranches.

"Then I realized that maybe I want to see and that I'd better go to college."

He enrolled in 1923 for one quarter at the University of Idaho. After that he enrolled at the branch agricultural college of the

Immediately after graduation Sevy joined the forest service. He was assigned to the Boise ranger district in central Nevada. For the first year he was an acting forest ranger. As a forest ranger for that district, he was in charge of grazing, timber cutting, and fire control.

"That fall he was transferred to the Reese river ranger station. He was there until the spring of 1940. Until 1944 he was in charge of the Austin ranger district, and

He was assigned back in 1944 to Utah to work with the (include assistant forest supervisor and development for the (mountain region of the forest. He was transferred to the part of California, western Wyoming, Utah, and the Idaho area south of the Snake river when he was.

It was his duty to provide standards and guidance for the (ranger district. He supervised many (to visit and established and approved range development programs. Sevy spent much time on the road on this job, much of the traveling time done on horseback. In the course of his work he probably has traveled through more of the back country than most people would attempt in a lifetime.

In 1954 Sevy was put in charge of the district's fire control program. This involved development of From 1954 until the time he came here in 1957 he was in charge of the Bridger national forest in Wyoming.

"One of his jobs Sevy says is probably the greatest thing about it is that you meet so many different kinds of people — rich and poor — in this line of work. It's impossible to do business and deal with such a widespread sample of the public."

"There is no tedium in this kind of work. You can shift gears if you want to and work both indoors and outdoors. I still enjoy the outdoor aspects of the work and, of course, that was one of the reasons why I was attracted to the work."

Noting that forest service work is an occupation that high school graduates should consider, Sevy says that the work is interesting and satisfying.

"It is tremendously important work. We find out how to use land properly and how to leave it as good as better — condition than we found it. The work builds an appreciation of the outdoors. Speaking of the future, he says, "We must always allow for proper land use so that the production is maintained. And we must guard against any plan that does not allow for optimum use of the land, for as populations increase the demand for land increases."

"Now we ought to document the results of using the land so our children can profit from our learning of the Austin ranger district, and

lived in Austin, Nev. That year Sevy had his first post in Boise where he was put in charge of the Adams creek ranger district. He was transferred to Boise, where he was the staff officer in charge of range and watershed work in the Boise office.

He is also on the troop committee of the 4th, sponsored by the Methodist church. Sevy is a member of the Rotary club and is a member of the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals.

Youth Act Is

Defended by Local Judge

Judge J. Dean Mosher, in answering criticism of the youth rehabilitation act recently given by Dr. Ferrell O. Carter, head of the state board of health, said in a recent Friday that Dr. Carter's proposition presented yet another attempt by administrative agencies to assume the functions of a local court.

Judge Mosher was referring to a recent statement by Dr. Carter in which he criticized the provisions of the youth rehabilitation act. Dr. Carter said, according to Mosher, that the act is "a law which is filed under the act of the legislature, now the work of the judge or a member of his staff, is undertaken by an official of the state board of health. Then a report can be made by the official to the judge before a disposition is made of the case."

Dr. Carter's proposition, Mosher says, is part of a trend all too apparent for years in both state and federal courts—that of assuming functions of the local courts. Judge Mosher says Carter acts as the reason for having these functions taken over by the state, that judges and jury members are not qualified to handle such functions.

Judge Mosher concurs with part of Carter's statement in regard to some of the prohibitive judgments in the state. But he claims the solution to the problem lies not in the state assuming new functions but rather in improvements in the courts to obtain competent judges who will be provided with sufficient funds on the local level to maintain local control.

Mosher says he feels a judge resident in an area is better able to cope with local problems than the functioning of the local courts, state capital.

He feels the youth rehabilitation program presently operating is basically sound. The fault, he says, seems to be insufficient funds to carry out the functions of the state board in health as contemplated under the act.

He concludes the program opening in Twin Falls with the juvenile department and a full time probation officer, is most satisfactory. There have been very few reports of previous violators, he notes.

Opening Day Anglers Will Pay Scant Heed to Problems of Supply, Demand

Tens of thousands of anglers and trout are expected to descend on Idaho this week and are beginning the annual harvest of about 11 million Idaho trout. Which means that more than 100 million trout are being raised to solve economic problems such as supply and demand.

Experience over the past few years promises that these billions of dollars and trout will average over 50 trout per angler per week and season's end. Of that, which means that more than 90 per cent of some 250,000 trout are being raised to solve economic problems such as supply and demand.

Just fish game, there are other things anglers in Idaho's opening day are looking for. The yearly catches of 11 million trout and other species and sizes, or a total of 63,720 pounds. With increasing trout production, a new type of balanced diet, fortified with vitamins, has been developed in pellet and meal form to replace traditional red meat and other animal products formerly used in hatcheries. This not only increases the quality of fish, but also reduces labor cost. Moreover, it cuts down disease resulting from dietary deficiencies.

In southwestern Idaho, a new blow-type machine has been built at Hagerman to feed the pellets to trout. It not only saves time and labor but also distributes fish food more evenly by means of a conveyor belt.

The required amount necessary for each acre or rearing pond. This food is mixed with the water's surface. This feeder is mounted on a pick-up truck and has a 1,000-pound capacity. This permits feeding all trout without returning to the storage bin for reloading.

Idaho. To do this, it is necessary that the intake of fish be studied, that the proper equipment be provided in order to maintain a stock as high as possible. In many instances it may be simple to provide good fishing in some of the back country streams and lakes because the fishing procedure here is rather limited and nature provides adequate food and suitable conditions.

"It is necessary to diversify the means used to perpetuate good fishing," he concludes. "This is a rather expensive process. It can not be maintained with the present license revenues unless many of the people who participate in this activity go into areas where the pressure is much less. The cost of the production of fish, for those who fish in artificially stocked waters, is much greater than the amount paid for their license."

\$43,000 Damages Sought in Court

Suit was filed in district court Friday by Mrs. Elizabeth Randall, 47, acting for her son, Gary Randall, 17, against the Idaho Power company charging the firm with negligence which resulted in the death of her son.

The suit asks \$43,000 from the company and for such other and further relief as to the court seems just and proper.

The action charges the company with not anticipating that children would be attracted to the reservoir which stood near high tension power lines where Juan Randall took place Sept. 15, 1958, about one-fourth mile north of Mullan.

Young Randall pulled a rope attached to the high tension line and grabbed hold of a metal section of the line and swung himself in an arc. The boom pole of the rig curved over and connected with the power line. Juan Randall received severe burns which resulted in the amputation of four toes on his right foot and all the toes on his left foot.

Mrs. Randall says her son was injured while playing near the reservoir. She says she had warned her son not to play near the reservoir.

Attorneys for Randall are Murray, Schwartz and Channing.

Eighth Grade Students Introduced to Stock Market in Mathematics Classes

Stock market experts learn young in Twin Falls. Students have tackled the stock market with textbook and even money in Mrs. William Anderson's eighth grade mathematics class during the school year. Mrs. Curtis Dixon, eighth grade mathematics teacher, introduced her students to the subject.

Junior high school should be an exploratory nature, giving students an insight into many aspects of contemporary life. This particular assignment shows how mathematics is used to reveal the course of the stock market, a useful instrument of our economy. Junior high school classes should also provide for some research to broaden and enrich their educational experience and make them more aware of the world in which they live. The idea first met with approval was made and the textbook portion read many students had a hard time of this. During the course of the year students have related mathematics to such things as installment buying, investments, savings accounts, taxes, and even checking accounts. Most of this has fallen under the subject.

In contrast to the days when mathematics was taught as a rote subject, involving digits and their various effects on each other, Mrs. Dixon says this is an assignment in her class to show students how mathematics plays a role in everyday life.

For two months her students studied and plotted the course of their favorite stocks as a part of an outside assignment. On the first of April she made the assignment. At that time each student in her classes—there are 10—began noting the course of about five stocks they chose to study.

During the first week they watched quotations in the Times-News and took daily readings on stocks. They were carefully noted in a notebook. At the week's end they made a chart of the stock's progress. Some students made graphs depicting the rise, fall or constancy of their stocks.

In the following weeks—until the end of school—they took several readings each week and made a weekly chart to show the stock's progress.

At the end of the outside assignment they turned in their reports and discussed the assignment. Mrs. Dixon says the assignment was sparked by a portion of the text book that dealt, briefly, with the subject.

Mrs. Dixon found most of the students were interested in the assignment. She believes classes in

section of the course devoted to business mathematics. Mrs. Eaton points out that applying mathematics to such real things tends to attract the interest of more students.

Mrs. Eaton notes there is a distinct advantage to starting the students out early on such subjects. "You never know, I might want to ask them for advice when they become experts in a few years."
