## 2 Atlas Missile Firings Postponed in South Due To Strike of Machinists

SAN DIEGO, Calif., June 7 (AP)—Two Atlas missile test launchings at Cape Canaveral, Fla., were postponed as the machinist strike against Convair continues the ocean-spunking rocket. The union meatwife expanded its walkout by calling new "quickie" strikes against Convair in San Diego. Some facilities here already had been struck. The International Association of Machinists pulled workers out of two testment plants here on a continuing policy of calling quickie strikes, a spokesman said, "where it hurts the most." Fifty men who service air force F106 jet interceptors before they are flown from the plant and an undetermined number of maintenance workers inside the plant were called out for the job today.

This brings the total of IAM members out at missile launchings to about 2,450, a spokesman said. The number of AIM workers at missile facilities prior to the strike was given as 27,235.

Word of the postponement of the Cape Canaveral firings came from the air force in Washington. The launchings had been scheduled for this week.

The strike, which called off yesterday by the IAM in a wage dispute, has curtailed activity at five missile bases including Vandenberg air force base, Calif., site of the nation's only combat-ready Atlas launching pads.

The air force said Atlas tests will be held in an emergency from Vandenberg because the operational pads there are closed by air force, not contractor crews. Convair officials at Vandenberg also have been stymied as they have become many workers as refusing to cross the IAM picket lines.

However, the machinists today agreed to continue their strike at the Cape Canaveral facility. Some 2,600 military technicians and some 1,500 machinists' lines yesterday, said (Continued on Page 2, Column 2)

## Town's Power Cut By Crossing Crash

SHOSHONE, June 7—Residents of this community were not electricity for nearly an hour this morning when three high-voltage power lines, one for a mile and a half, crossed each other for the same length of time as the result of a collision between a truck and a switch engine at 8:06 a.m. Approximately 20 men, including Idaho Power company, railroad and city employees, helped to remove a 65-foot power pole. Work was covered when the truck operated by Harold Ivie, Hailey, Sheriff Thomas Conner said the break in the pole drew the tower over and so light officials had the power turned off until the pole could be removed and the truck and engine removed from the scene. The pole did not fall to the ground, the sheriff said. The driver escaped injury.

The driver, a 50-year-old truck owned by A. E. Boger, a resident of the recently burned ranch, was going south on the highway. He was riding the wheel bolts and wheels, but failed to see the C-P or diesel engine which was going north.

"When he did realize the two vehicles would collide, I've stepped on the gas" he said. "The truck was in the air. The bed of the truck was struck by the engine."

Two Shoshone men were killed in March, 1956, in the same site as the result of a truck-train collision. The sheriff said a utility engineer of the switch engine Wendell Allison, Glenn Pease and two other men were killed. Damage was estimated at \$1,500 to the truck with minor damage to the engine and hand railing of the engine.

## 2,000 Trapped in East Perter Says Subway Blaze but One Mckeck Go to Japan

### Found Dead in Smoke

NEW YORK, June 7 (AP)—Fires spread thick, choking smoke through the complex of subways in the Grand Central station area today, trapping more than 2,000 persons in the tunnels. More than 100 were overcome by smoke. A massive rescue force of more than 1,000 police and firemen led coughing, frightened passengers to the surface from the pitch dark tunnels. There were no fatalities. Hundreds were trapped and some were killed by the fire that was discovered at 9:30 a.m. At least 136 persons were taken to hospitals. Some remained for smoke or shock treatment. Witnesses told of weeping, choking passengers smashing windows and trying to get out of the tunnels. One of the passengers, Leo Calhoun, 19, helped others on his train get out by forming a human train.

Many persons collapsed when they reached the street. Hospital disaster workers took the sidewalk of 42nd street across from Grand Central. Doctors and nurses from out to out, administering oxygen to smoke victims.

The fire, which started about 11:00 a.m. in a tunnel at 42nd street and burning south for 15 minutes to the Grand Central area. It apparently started by a spark from the nearby subway fire. The fire burned for 90 minutes and spread to adjacent streets. It was extinguished by firefighters.

"You couldn't see an inch ahead," said John J. Croty, 63, a fireman, who was treated at a hospital.

Croty, who was covered with soot and soot, said he saw no one aboard his train and the passengers from out to out, administering oxygen to smoke victims.

### Skies Clear For Idaho's '60 Contest

The engineering firm of Hoffman, Fiske and Millar submitted its report on plans for a \$1,600,000 sewerage system and sewerage treatment plant to Twin Falls commissioners Monday night. City Manager Joseph Lattimore was asked to contact fiscal agents to request they meet with the commissioners next Monday to discuss financing for the revenue bond project. Voters will be given an opportunity soon in a bond election to approve or disapprove the project.

The engineers suggest that the bonds be repaid over a 25-year period, at four and one-fourth per cent. They estimated that cost to each individual in Twin Falls for the expanded sewer system and treatment plant will average about \$14 per month over the normal rate of borrowing, and about one-third that amount on an anticipated population of 48,000 for Twin Falls in the year 2000, the report says. For the sewerage treatment plant to be located along the Snake River below the canyon rim, the Snake river is chosen rather than Rock creek because of its greater capacity. Rock creek has a capacity 100 times greater than Rock creek. By removing the wetlands, the Snake river is chosen for the treatment plant. The liquid, the effect of treated sewage on the Snake river is negligible.

### Inflated Count Shows City Dwellers Are on Move

WASHINGTON, June 7 (AP)—Inflation has caught up with the cost of doing business.

### Count Shows City Dwellers Are on Move

WASHINGTON, June 7 (AP)—Millions of Americans already had figured out for themselves—city dwellers are moving more and more to the suburbs.

Reports from many metropolitan areas show big population jumps for the suburbs, but only small gains or even declines for the cities themselves.

Population Drops

Many city totals are not yet in, but those available show that the population has dropped since 1950 in New York, Cleveland, Newark, N. J., Philadelphia, Richmond, Va., Rochester, N. Y., Baltimore, and Minneapolis-St. Paul.

Chasing up gains over the decade were Seattle and Spokane, Wash.; Akron, O.; Flint, Mich.; San Antonio, Tex., and Atlanta, Ga. Some increases, such as Kansas City, a partly reflected annexation of surrounding territory.

In virtually every case population has expanded in the suburbs, regardless of the trend in the main city itself.

Theory Supported

Population experts say the figures appear to bear out their theory that after a city reaches a certain size, its population levels off and may even decline.

New York City, the nation's largest city, has lost more than 200,000 residents since 1950, is cited as a good example of this theory.

The census bureau has estimated that between 1950 and 1959, the population of suburban areas jumped 44.3 per cent, compared to an increase for the entire nation of 16.3 per cent.

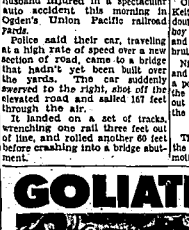

# News Story Claims Reports Of Spending Are Artificial

WASHINGTON, June 7 (AP)—The House public works and judiciary committees have submitted artificial reports of their 1959 spending of public funds overseas, Knight newspaper said yesterday.

The article said that "in each of the 23 committees from Argentina to Sudan, where members of the judiciary committee traveled, their reports allege that they spent an average of 30 percent of their counterpart spending only to his committee chairman," the article said.

"These reports have been published through the house committee spending system into the public domain, without a ripple even though the limitations are obvious and conspicuous."

The committee expense reports in question cover congressional spending of counterpart funds overseas. These are currencies of foreign governments which are used to finance projects of aid and sales transactions both within the overseas country and in the United States.

The article said that the reports are "artificially inflated" to show that the United States spends more than the rest of the world.

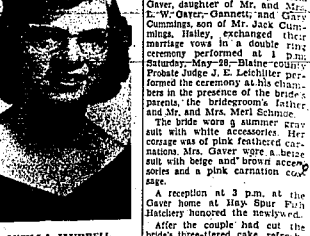

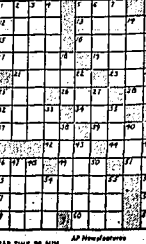

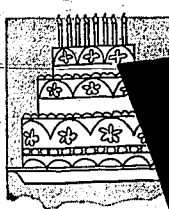
