### Turbulent Snake Boils This Time Over Issue of Salmon

LEWISTON, June 8 (AP)—The Snake is a turbulent river, both physically and politically. Physically, it tumbles down out of the Wyoming mountains, plunges through the deepest gorge in North America and empties into the Columbia river 1,000 miles from its starting point.

Politically, the waters of the snake expected to be calmer in 1957 after the 11-year battle over Hells canyon came to an end. That bitter public-versus-private power fight ended with Idaho Power company winning the right to build three dams in the Hells canyon reach of the river.

But already another fight over dam sites is underway as this time the key bend in the battle may be fish.

The principal antagonists are Pacific Northwest Power company and Washington Public Power Supply system.

Pacific Northwest, which has applied for a license to build high Mountain Sheep dam, is a combination of four private utility firms.

Washington public power, which has applied for a license to build Nez Perce dam, is a combination of 12 public utility firms in the state of Washington. Construction of either dam would make the Snake a navigable waterway.

In 1953, Pacific Northwest applied for a preliminary permit for a two-dam project known as Mountain Sheep-Pennant Valley on the Middle Snake.

The federal power commission turned down the application for a preliminary permit for the Mountain Sheep dam in March 1958. A hearing on that application had been set by the FPC for March 21 this year.

On March 15, the Washington public power group applied for a license to build Nez Perce. Hearings were put off to May 1, then July 16, and finally to Oct. 17.

The two applicants recently agreed to use data issued by the army corps of engineers at the basis of their arguments in the joint hearing next fall. But three agreements were made.

Why bill the fans over two dams less than three miles apart and with less than 10 feet difference in height?

The issue lies in the fact that those three miles mean the difference between below the mouth of the Salmon river and above the mouth of the Salmon. And the Salmon river is the last great spawning ground for the chinook salmon, which provide the major part of commercial and sport fisheries on the Columbia river.

High Mountain Sheep would be about 50 miles south of Lewiston, not quite one mile above the confluence of the Snake and Salmon. At 600 feet in height, it would back water to the tail water of Hells canyon dam, creating 75,000 kilowatts of power with an eventual capacity of 1.75 million kilowatts.

Nez Perce dam would be about three miles downstream below the mouth of the Salmon river. At 700 feet in height, it would create 1.2 million kilowatts of power with an eventual capacity of 2.4 million kilowatts.

The public power group bases its argument mainly on the greater power production of Nez Perce and a crash program probably could solve the problem of fish passage while the dam is under construction.

Pacific Northwest bases its claim on the thesis that the area needs more power as soon as possible and Mountain Sheep can be built more quickly and without disturbing the fish runs in the Salmon. It claims that after the fish problem is solved, a second dam, Lower Canyon—can be built on the Salmon river. Together with Mountain Sheep, it would provide nearly half again as much power as Nez Perce.

The private firm also contends that because of geologic formations, Nez Perce is not as sound an engineering project as Mountain Sheep. Public power bodies generally side with the public power system, though not all the conservationists in general side with Pacific Northwest.

Meanwhile, a research assault is being made on the problem of est-

ing spawning salmon upstream over dams and fingerlings downstream without getting caught in turbines. When they solve that one, disputes of dam building can return to its old basis: Which dam produces the most power and shall be built by a public or private trust?

These issues alone could keep the deep, swift Snake in turbulent political waters for many years.

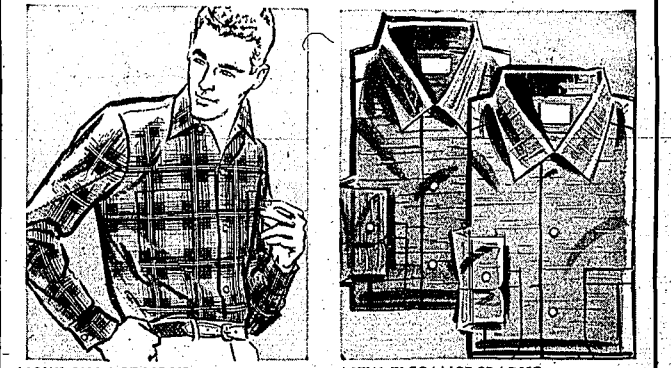

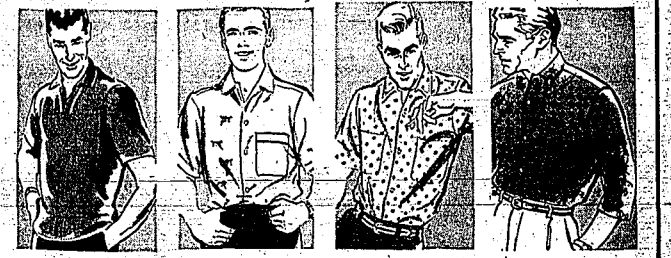

WASHINGTON, June 8 (AP)—Key lawmakers in both parties called today for a stepped-up program of emergency aid for earthquake-stricken Chile with special emphasis on housing.

They urged President Eisenhower to take all possible steps to back up the recent arrival of medical personnel and supplies with additional aid programs.

Sen. John J. Sparkman, D., Ala., chairman of the senate foreign relations committee, said he could not "think of a better use" for President Eisenhower's foreign aid contingency fund than aiding Chile to reduce its homeless quake victims.

"Rebuilding after the earthquake would afford a wonderful opportunity to demonstrate what can be done," Sparkman said in an interview.

He said the international cooperation administration (ICA), which handles most non-military foreign aid, could lend technical assistance and the President could draw on the special contingency fund set up for just such emergencies.

Sen. George D. Aiken, R., Vt., another member of the foreign relations committee and its Latin American subcommittee, said he had written Eisenhower urging that "every effort be made" to aid the Chileans.

### Danger Is Noted In Chile Quakes

WASHINGTON, June 8 (AP)—A prominent Chilean industrialist said today that the earthquake devastation in Chile could breed "deep social and political problems" if the country's economic aid is not prompt.

But the industrialist, Dr. Jorge Schneider, expressed confidence that the help of U. S. and world credit agencies as well as Chile's long democratic tradition will forestall the danger.

"We must act immediately to help decision and energy to rebuild the destruction of one-third of our nation affecting some 23 million persons. Otherwise thousands will be left unemployed and in misery which can have deep social and political repercussions," he told United Press International.

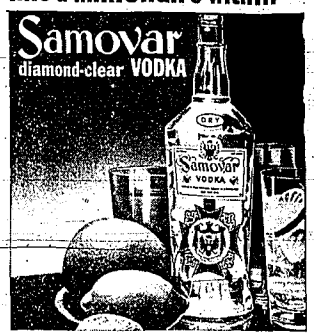

### Church Tells Its Plans to Answer Reds

ROCHESTER, N. Y., June 6 (AP)—American Baptists set up an unusual program yesterday to arm their people with knowledge to combat communism.

In the closing session, the general assembly's annual convention asked each of its more than 8,000 congregations across the country to launch educational courses on the principles and methods of communism and other totalitarian systems.

Program Is First One  
The program is considered the first of its kind to be undertaken by any major Christian body. Funds were authorized for developing textbooks and other training materials to strengthen members as Baptists and to provide a Christian answer to the communist threat.

In taking the step, the 15-million member denomination said communism degrades human personality, crushes freedom, has already enslaved millions, and is engulfing additional multitudes by force and subversion.

Officers Elected  
The convention elected C. Stanton Gallup, Plainfield, Conn., a lumberman and leading church layman, as its president. Other top officers named were the Rev. Roger Fredrickson, Boise Falls, S. D., first vice president, and Mrs. Wade R. McKinney, Cleveland, as second vice president. She is the first Negro to be elevated by the church to such a high office.

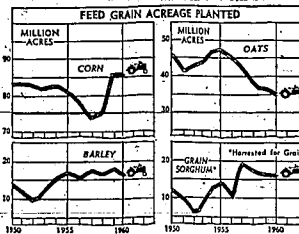

Health insurance for the aged, Johnson may raise and appropriations for defense and foreign aid await action.
