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Oakley Woman's Death Caused by Blowout of Tire

BURLEY, June 14—Mrs. Reed A. Boren, 78, Oakley, died Monday afternoon in Cottage hospital of injuries received Monday morning in a car accident seven and one-half miles north of Oakley. The accident occurred about 10 a.m. when her husband was driving a 1949 Pontiac around a sharp curve on highway 27. The right rear tire blew out and the car skidded and rolled over twice. Mrs. Boren received internal injuries and head injuries. Boren was listed in "critical" condition Tuesday at Cottage hospital, where attendants said he was "not seriously injured." Bore and her husband were thrown from the car, officers said.

Cassia County Deputy Sheriff Robert Aikens estimated the speed of the vehicle at 45 miles per hour. This is the fifth traffic fatality for Magic Valley in 1959 and the seventh this year for Cassia county. The last fatality in Cassia county occurred June 8 when Mrs. Anne B. Powers was killed instantly in a car-truck collision.

Idaho Tax Law Might Make 2.5 Million Surplus

BOISE, June 14 (AP)—Increases in tax collections in the past 11 months indicated today that changes in revenue laws made by the 1959 Idaho legislature might bring in about two and one-half million dollars more than the state's general fund area showing increases compared with last year and the total surplus—if the laws are not changed—could reach five million dollars or so for the fiscal year.

There undoubtedly will be pressure to spend the surplus, particularly for more aid to the schools for the fiscal year 1960-61 or to finance construction of buildings at state institutions.

P. O. Hall, state tax collector, said the total general fund revenue for the 11-month period ended May 31 was \$20,520,010, a gain of \$5,810,000 over \$14,710,000 collected in the corresponding period a year earlier.

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Idaho Medals Request Gets Solons' Okay

WASHINGTON, June 14.—A request for what would be the first centennial commemorative medal ever struck for Idaho by the United States treasury moved a step nearer realization today.

The House of Representatives and the Senate committee unanimously approved the idea after listening to a letter signed by Sen. Harry Dworthak, R. Ida., and Frank Channing, D. Ida.

"We concur in recommendations that the secretary of the treasury be authorized to issue a medal in commemoration of the 100th anniversary of the state, but whereby President Abraham Lincoln created the Territory of Idaho on March 3, 1809."

"Out of the wilderness of that day the framers of empire, undaunted by extreme heat and malarial ambros, laid the foundations for free enterprise out of which nearly 70,000 persons make their livelihood in Idaho today."

NEW YORK, June 14.—The mounting cost of a stay in a hospital are being feared daily by the patients and administrators of the nation's hospitals.

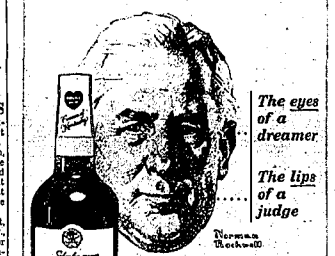

CURSE OF CONFORMITY

We hear a lot about the handicaps and inadequacies of the "organization man."

Rebellion against such degrading monotony is not only sensible, it is vital to the spirit of a free society.

But let it stop short of the idea that organization as such is the total enemy of man, that humanity's safety lies with those who improvise, who pride themselves on being disorganized.

Sen. Hubert Humphrey of Minnesota took this tack in a recent campaign utterance and he must now surely regret. Many other articulate public figures have come close to saying, by implication if not otherwise, that humanity's safety lies with those who improvise, who pride themselves on being disorganized.

Actually the assault on the idea of organization is part of a broader attack, not only the practical world of the arts, form, discipline, control, anything which gives shape and direction to human endeavor, is derided as false and artificial.

Exalted in their place are the formless, the undisciplined, the free and uncontrolled. The idea is conveyed that the best and good only in the spontaneous, the emotional, the impulsive force.

Homage to this notion is seen in some of the paintings, he says, the best of this year; in youngsters whose shortcomings are always excused and never corrected; in the growing formlessness of life in America's overburdened cities; in the conviction of some liberals that only those public men are to be trusted who give a highly emotional flavor to their principles, policies and programs.

We are treading on very soft ground when some of our intellectuals must downgrade rationality, when many see even the simplest of our activities as a result of the self-seeking, when artists scoff at form, when disciplining vanishes from many homes and schools.

He is building and enlarging his own image as a politician of less partisan appeal than standard Republicans.

Most observers view this political earthquake could convert such tactics into nomination this time. The odds are greater that he is looking ahead to 1964 than to 1960.

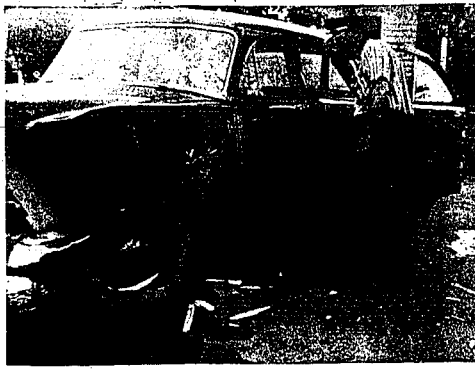

What's the most trying part of a bus driver's job in Yellowstone park? According to Robert Renner, leader of a group of five drivers who stayed at Grigg's motel in Twin Falls Monday night, it's "moo-ing" tourists.

"Some folks read one book on the park, then spend most of a year trying to correct us," explained Renner. He is starting his third summer as a tour bus driver in the Wyoming tourist mecca.

"All in all, though, it's a wonderful job—otherwise, I wouldn't be going back," he says.

Renner, who has lived 20 years in Los Angeles, was born and raised in the Big Horn basin country of Wyoming, so he considers it a rather pleasant summer visit back home.

This year, 27 drivers, for nine months employees of the Charter Bus Transportation system in Los Angeles, will drive the tour buses for the Yellowstone Park company, one of the national park's concessionaires.

The most irritating tourists are "middle-aged women from Brooklyn," according to western Renner.

Why does Renner like his job? "That's easy; the scenery's ever-lasting, and so are the people."

Pole Treaty With Soviets Said Danger

WASHINGTON, June 14 (AP)—Sen. Clair Engle, D. Calif., charged today the Atlantic Pact nations pose a danger to the nations of the United States and its allies.

Engle, making his reelection, said the treaty would settle the case of free world recognition on the Geneva conference.

The treaty, signed in Washington last December, provides that Antarctica shall be developed and used only for peaceful purposes. It recognizes no territorial claims by any individual nation.

In addition to the United States and the Soviet Union, countries signing the treaty are Argentina, Australia, Belgium, Chile, France, Japan, New Zealand, Norway, South Africa and Sweden.

Engle spoke against the treaty in testimony before the Senate relations committee. Sen. Ernest Gruening, D. Alaska, also was highly critical of the pact.

The committee is considering whether to recommend the pact for Senate ratification.

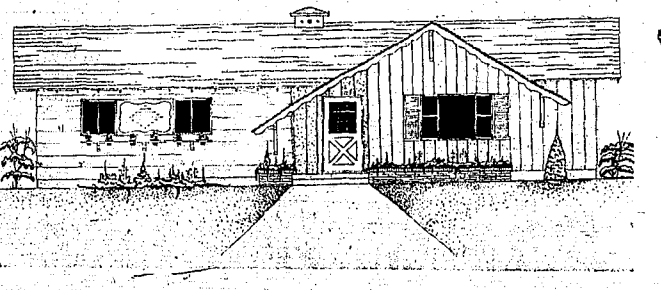

WASHINGTON, June 14 (AP)—The supreme court today laid down any general rule on just what gifts are tax-exempt, unless it sets up a new test for determining a jury verdict that union benefits paid to a sister were tax-free.

The court turned down a request from the Justice department to set up a new test for determining a jury verdict that union benefits paid to a sister were tax-free.

Justice William J. Brennan said for the majority.

Brennan said he and the justices were agreed, so far as the governing principles in such cases are necessarily general.

The problem is one which, under the present statutory framework, does not lend itself to a more definite statement that would produce a tallman for the solution of concrete cases, Brennan wrote.

One of three gift tax cases decided yesterday, the court, dividing 6 to 5, held that Allen Kater was not a partner in a partnership of benefits he received from local 83 of the United Auto Workers in 1954. Kater was a member of the union and received a check for vouchers for food, clothing, and other necessities.

The court, in a 6-5 decision, held that Kater was not a partner in the union's connection with the prolonged strike at the Kohler company, Kohler, Wis.

A jury in federal district court in Wisconsin found the benefits were a nontaxable gift. The trial judge set the verdict aside and ordered a new trial. The U. S. court of appeals in Chicago overruled the lower court, retaining the jury's verdict.

Guard Units' Firepower Goes On Display at Desert Ranges

BOISE, June 14—Firepower—the backbone of any army—was on display this week in the desert south of Boise as all units of the 11th armored cavalry regiment, 20th and Mountain Home. The firing line runs for approximately 30 miles east and west, the ranges is miles north and south.

Firing by all units of the regiment will continue through Thursday starting early in the morning and continuing through the day.

Only a few of the regiment's gunnery are at Gowen field during the training. Most are in administrative positions. However, the units will return to barracks at the field each day and no tactical briefing will be staged.

Illustrating the firepower of the weapons being fired is the fact that the maximum effective range of the howitzer is 11,000 yards and for the long guns, 13,000 yards.

The additional length of the ranges is used as safety areas.

Ranges control is in charge of Capt. Raymond Tate, Twin Falls, a member of the regimental staff, who will control the entire firing exercise from a command post and under close battle. It is the job of the staff to clear the firing line, open firing, halt firing and control the procedure during the day.

If an emergency arises on the firing line, Capt. Tate has the communications to halt all firing until the problem is cleared. 30 minutes in contact with a command post of the range, commanded by Maj. Frank G. Johnson, Twin Falls, regimental communications officer.

Major Johnson will have radio contact with the 2nd, Mountain Home air force base and Idaho national guard headquarters at Gowen field. He will not have any control over the firing line, but is available for relaying tactical and administrative messages.

Each unit and squadron will have its own communications establishment on the firing line for immediate notification from the control post. Six ranges will be in operation with each of the three squadrons firing tank guns on three ranges and howitzers on another three. No separate ranges will be operated for mortar and

Herter Says Russian Spy Agency Big

WASHINGTON, June 14 (AP)—Congress was told yesterday the KGB-Soviet bloc spies maintain an espionage ring made up of some 300,000 trained officers serving in 27 intelligence and security services.

Secretary of State Christian A. Herter said in a statement submitted to the Senate Foreign Relations committee that "no government in history has placed heavier emphasis on espionage than the Soviet Union."

His statement, submitted to the Senate by J. William Fulbright, D. Ark., the chairman, was offered for consideration in the committee's forthcoming report on its inquiry into the shooting down of the 22 spy plane over the Soviet Union a week prior to the Paris summit meeting. The committee is to meet later this week to consider four days of closed-door testimony.

Herter sent the 23-page statement to the committee as a "house record" reflecting on the "Soviet Union," he said.

"It has built the largest of all intelligence machines and maintains an unparalleled network of agents throughout the world."

In recent years, Herter said, some 300 individuals in 17 different countries of the free world have been convicted of espionage for the Soviet Union.

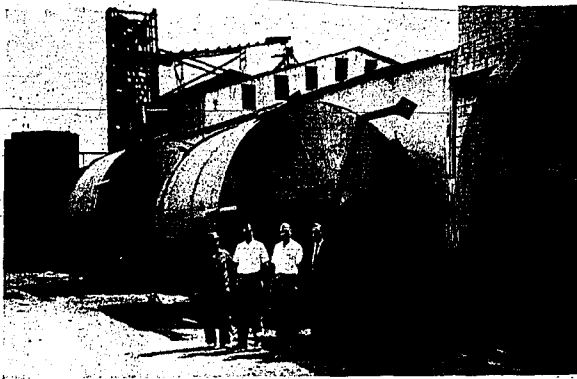

Heavy Equipment Installed at New Chemical Plant in Rupert

RUPERT, June 14 — With the installation of heavy equipment currently under way, officials of the Rocky Mountain Chemical Company expect to be in operation early in the fall, with the possibility of test runs being made with 1959 crop potatoes.

L. M. Bahler, plant manager and company president, reports large tanks and boilers have been moved from Salt Lake City and are now being put into place at the Rupert plant and pipe crews are beginning work this week on the interior of the plant.

Bahler said that the company would be using 1959 run potatoes, packing and shipping the better grades and using only the culls in the operation. They also plan to buy culls from other potato handlers and processors in the area, he said.

At a meeting of the board of directors with the industrial committee of the Rupert Chamber of Commerce, plans for the future of the company were outlined and past operations discussed. Bahler said that the plans met with the approval of the committee and were endorsed by them.

In speaking of by-products of the operation, Bahler said a mash suitable for feeding cattle and other livestock would be available to feeding growers in the area, and pointed out that this mash is raised highly as a feed because it is both palatable and high in protein.

Bahler said that the plant and boiler room have been approved by Dr. E. B. Christiansen, technical consultant, as being more than adequate for the operation planned. Dr. Christiansen is head of the chemical engineering department, University of Utah, and his experience includes designing a number of alcohol plants.

Bahler, president of the company, is also head of a firm of consulting engineers, Salt Lake City. Local members of the board of directors include Wilbert Mol-

Parochial Use Of School Bus 'OK' by Court

HARTFORD, Conn., June 14 (AP)—The Connecticut supreme court of errors today ruled that a state permitting the use of school buses for parochial pupils in public school buses is constitutional.

The state has a financial deficit, however, that use of money from the Connecticut school fund for this type of service is unconstitutional.

Income from the school fund, about \$117,000 last year, is presently deposited in the state's general fund and credited to the state education department.

But Chief Justice Raymond E. Palumbo, with three of the other four justices concurring, found nothing wrong with the law permitting non-profit private school children to ride to their classes in public school buses.

The law, he said, "gives the parents in sending their children to school of their choice, as in their right. It protects the children from the dangers of modern traffic and reduces the hazard of contracting illness in bad weather."
