Speeding Plays Big Part in Road Deaths, Henry States

BY HENRY MEMORIE
I did a lot of thinking about highway safety on my recent motoring trips and it is a good thing I did, else I would have been knocked rightwise to times before my first stop.

I continue to read that speeding is the major cause of highway accidents, and maybe it isn't. But you can't tell it from me that speed has got to do with cars commencing apart at the scene where they hit, and an aerial skidster does do with scattering the occupants around the countryside.

Speed may not have brought the cars together in the first place, but it surely showed its hand once they got together. It is entirely possible to be killed at 10 miles an hour, but it's nowhere near as assured at 70 or 80 miles an hour.

The safest stretches of highway I can remember the only safe stretches—were those on which police patrol cars were present or known to be present. Not one 100 American motorists is going to observe the speed laws unless he is forced to. The urge to get there plus the ease, quietness and quickness with which modern cars slip into racing speeds, is just too much for most of us.

Safety slogans are a dime a dozen along the highways, and they are not worth the billboard they're painted on. The same goes for warning signs.

The only deterrent is the presence of a cop or the belief that one is up ahead or just behind. Some states now use unmarked cars for patrol work, but in a sense of fair-play announce this sign.

All patrol cars should be unmarked—and nothing said about their presence. They should have their lights on, and their sirens should never be able to tell what kind of a car he is preparing to pass with a rush.

A few patrol cars should be driven by women cops, for as soon as a speeder sees a woman in the car ahead he takes it for a signal of a speeder, and get to the road.

After a motorist has been yanked in a couple of times by a pat cop he's mind his speedometer.

Patrol cars should also remove that lethal blinker button from the tops of their cars. It is a sure giveaway, and 99 out of a hundred motorists, have learned to spot the button from miles away.

If the blinker button can't be removed, then a certain number of public-spirited private citizens should be asked to put them on their cars. They would be fakes, but motorists couldn't tell the difference, and thousands of

Clashes Are Showing up In '60 Race

Further evidence emerged today of the sharp differences between candidates in both the Republican and Democratic races for the presidential nomination.

On the Republican side, the latest evidence came in public view when Vice President Richard M. Nixon and Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller, New York, offered it in major speeches Tuesday.

On the Democratic side, the latest evidence involved private party meetings. Supporters of Sen. John F. Kennedy, Massachusetts, and Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson, Texas, were exchanging warnings that the other man could win in November.

U. S. Growth at Issue
The Nixon-Rockefeller differences concerned the nation's economic growth and the method of making high policy decisions.

In a speech in St. Louis, Nixon criticized the government's policy of the United States is growing as a much faster economic rate than the United States and who call for government steps to change this. But Rockefeller, in a television interview to Birmingham, N. Y., said economic growth was "far more important than any other factor which affects the lives and well-being of the people of our country."

Decision-Making Attacked
The governor, who says he would be available for a Republican draft at the national convention, has called for increased growth in the economy.

In an address before the Birmingham Rotary Club yesterday, Rockefeller said, "There is something seriously wrong with the way the government is running the process of our government." He cited the 112 incident as one indication that the government needs a super-cabinet of officials, a first step toward the government's control of the economy in the exercise of his authority and to help in the national security and international affairs.

But despite these differences, Nixon, likely winner of the nomination, said at a St. Louis news conference that "the Republican party is the most united since 1850 when President Eisenhower was the unifying force."

Pat's Chance Questioned
In the Democratic political infighting, Kennedy's supporters are asking party workers whether Johnson, a Democrat, could carry New York, California, and other large states. The Kennedy people's implication was Johnson could not.

Another Democratic candidate, Sen. Stuart Symington, Missouri, gave a television audience his estimate of the relative strength of the United States and the Soviet Union.

Management Said Need at State School

HAMPA, June 22—A director of the state health department has described today as one of the greatest needs at the much-discussed Nevada State school, Idaho's top health authority said he hopes the situation will be improved materially with the arrival of a new superintendent at the school in August.

Charged to head the institution, which cares for about 800 mentally retarded children and adults, is Dr. Edwin O. Sage, assistant director of public health in San Francisco.

James Mace Charles, state health officer, who resigned last March 15, charging he failed to receive cooperation from state health officials.

Dr. Mace, who had been head of the school for about a year, said his recommendations for changes and improvements were ignored. He suggested he had been "marginalized" by Dr. Terrill O. Carver, state health administrator.

Dr. P. O. Greber, state public health director, has served as acting superintendent of the school since Dr. Mace's departure. He will continue until Dr. Sage arrives, sometime in August.

Experience Noted

"Our first consideration in picking Dr. Sage for the job," Dr. Carver said, "is because of the administrative experience he has had. He also is a physician, of course, but we feel that many of the problems which have plagued the Nevada school are the result of lack of continuing effective administration."

Dr. Sage is 64. He is within a year of mandatory retirement age from the job he holds in California and had the fact that prompted him to consider the position here, Dr. Carver said.

Greater Trained

Dr. Carver lauded the work of Dr. Greber during the past several months.

"We have accomplished many improvements in the health administration field," Mace noted, "but no more funds than were available during the tenure of Dr. Mace, that was one of his difficulties. He couldn't seem to be able to accomplish changes with what he had. He refused to accept as his responsibility the accounting within the legislative budget of the things that needed to be done."

Demo Hoots Answer New Deficit Blast

WASHINGTON, June 22 (AP)—Key congressional Democrats hooted today at White House charge they were turning President Eisenhower's budget surplus into another federal deficit. They said the President's predicted surplus was "phantom" and must be "written off" to start with.

The administration charge was made yesterday by Budget Director Charles E. Wilson, who said the \$2.4-billion dollar surplus forecast by Eisenhower last January for the 15 months starting July 1 now stands in acute jeopardy because of migration trends.

Programs Called Vital

Wilson said at a news conference that the "phantom" surplus had been turned into a deficit because of "phantom" programs called vital to the nation's future.

Wilson said the programs called vital to the nation's future included the \$1.5-billion program to build new highways, the \$1.5-billion program to build new schools, and the \$1.5-billion program to build new housing.

Wilson said the programs called vital to the nation's future were "written off" because they were "not included in the President's budget."

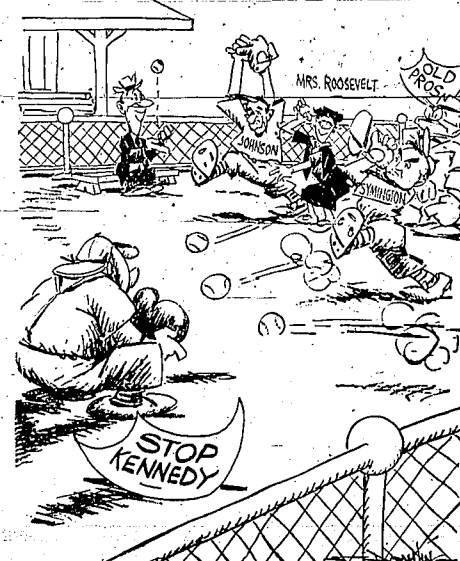

Ike Has World's Sympathy; America's Prestige Hit Hard

As President Eisenhower concluded his tour this week, worldwide reaction as to its results appeared almost unanimous. It was first of all personal sympathy for the president who has impressed the world with a staunch desire for peace but who has twice in little more than a month, suffered humiliating setbacks at the hands of the communists.

Second, it was agreed that the leftist forces which forced cancellation of his visit to Tokyo had inflicted severe blows to US prestige which the communists now could be expected to exploit vigorously.

Merriman Smith, UPI White House reporter who has accompanied Eisenhower on his globe circling tour, reported it unlikely that the President would attempt another trip during the remaining six months in office.

Thus with the blow-up of the summit conference in Paris, and in Brussels, the United States prestige had been hit hard.

An airline clerk in Sweden and a policeman in Zurich believed America should follow a "tougher" line.

A Frenchman thought the United States should listen to advice from President de Gaulle.

A London store clerk thought "Ike is doing the best job possible."

A West German banker in Frankfurt temped it with "America had done a pretty good job so far."

President Eisenhower's history may show could or could not have been prevented.

This much is certain. Both the blow-up at the summit and Tokyo incidents are events dramatically generated by communist leadership at a time when the United States is preparing for a change in its own leadership through general elections.

Thus Eisenhower was the personal victim of a larger plan by communist leadership to destabilize the United States at a time when the United States is in a period of transition.

Man-in-the-street reaction stories cannot be taken as indicative of the feelings of whole nations, since of necessity they cover only small segments of a population.

Eisenhower will make a national television-radio address in the next few days from Washington. Present indications are he will arrive there Saturday.

Announcement of the President's plans to go on the air was made by White House Secretary James C. Hagerty as Eisenhower arrived in Hawaii from the Orient Monday, continued to reiterate his views on the report to the American people next week.

The president talked over his Far Eastern journey by telephone with Hawaii Gov. W. W. Quinn Tamm and Christian A. Herter, in Washington.

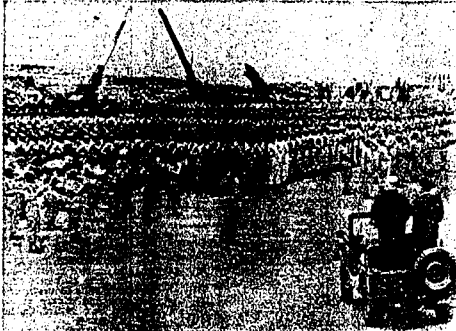
