

Large Death Toll Possible For Holiday

CHICAGO, June 28 (AP)—The three-day Fourth of July weekend could bring a traffic death toll equalling the 307 killed over the recent Memorial day holiday, the National Safety Council warned today.

The council said almost all of the nation's 71 million cars will be on the road during the weekend and will travel a total of 72 billion miles.

The Memorial day slaughter "should serve as a grim warning for motorists to drive with greater care," a council spokesman said.

"Unless they do," he said, "the traffic death toll over the Fourth of July weekend could be around 300. And disabling injuries could total 13,000."

The council laid down a set of rules for a safe and sane Fourth.

"On the highway, don't speed, don't drink, don't faze and fume, don't swim alone, don't shove off, don't swim alone, don't shove off."

"Wherever you are, be patient, be courteous, use common sense."

The Soviet delegate received the loudest applause at the opening session and many Baptist of Florida believed the petition could get nowhere. The supporters of the resolution also admitted this privately.

Solons Asked To Help Keep State Powers

OLACIER PARK, Mont. June 27—Idaho's governor called on congress today to help "restrain" to help preserve the identity of the states in problem areas and in taxation.

Gov. Robert E. Smylie, presiding at a panel discussion on federal-state relations during the national governors' conference, aimed his preliminary remarks squarely at federal control of state centralization.

"Too often in times past, for one political reason or another," he said, "the greater unit of government has cannibalized the lesser sources of the lesser units of government. None of us can be equated with this charge."

Not only does this apply to state in relations with their local and county governments but also to the congress of the United States, the largest legislative body in the world.

"What is needed is a stern resolve in the congress of the United States to take the actions that will make all 50 of our state governments truly representative and responsive and the congress will have the forbearance and self-restraint to leave us just enough of the tax source to permit us to do the job that I am sure all of us want to do," he declared.

"Nothing is Done"

Smylie, chairman of the federal-state relations committee of the conference, said that his committee voted at the conference table to voice against resolutions that were well-conceived and sincerely believed.

"Yet when we come to grips with the problem in terms of practical solutions, the enthusiasm which seems to exist in principle evaporates under the onslaught of pressure groups which are convinced that they will be able to fare better in the future at the hands of the federal government."

"In short, nothing has really happened."

He said that while congress has spoken in favor of local autonomy, it has taken an opposite trend in the opposite direction.

Funds Added to Public Works Bill

WASHINGTON, June 28 (AP)—A senate committee added \$1 million dollars to the public works appropriations bill yesterday.

The bill, which covers the fiscal year on the State river's Lower Monumental lock and dam.

The action by the senate public works subcommittee brought a prediction by Sen. Magnuson, D. Wash., a member of the appropriations committee and full state will leave the firm in the bill.

Magnuson said the "hard fight" will come in the House conference committee.

NEW YORK, June 27 (AP)—The air force has awarded an \$81,567,000 contract to build 38 launcher systems for the Titan I intercontinental ballistic missile to American Machine and Foundry company.

Air force officials noted the contract, which will include paid incentive fee bonus, represents a definite award of previous letter contracts which authorized the company to commence work on the project.

The systems to be built and installed by AMF will equip four squadrons with nine operational launcher systems each.

They will be placed at Ellsworth air force base, Bangor, Me.; D. Mountain-Home air force base, Boise, Ida.; Larson air force base, Moses Lake, Wash., near Spokane; and Beal air force base, Marysville, Calif., near Sacramento.

Others, too, Fight Living Cost Boosts

NEW YORK, June 28 (AP)—The battle against the rising cost of living has been lengthened here at least in the United States.

Others troubled, too. But it's some consolation, if a very small one, that at least 26 other nations have had less success than we in fighting the depreciation of their currencies.

And right now some important questions are facing strong inflationary upward pressure while our money managers tell us that ours is relatively mild.

In the last 10 years the market price value of the U. S. dollar has been falling at the compounded rate of two per cent a year.

Comparison made. This compares with Portugal's loss of only 2.5 per cent a year, but with Bolivia's whopping annual depreciation of 38.3 per cent.

Since then the United States composite index has gone on rising. With the 1947-49 average on 100, the index stood at 123.5 in December, 1959, and at 124.1 in May. In December, 1949, it was 109.9 and in December, 1954, it was 114.2.

But in West Germany, where the annual rate of fall was the mark's purchasing power has been notably less than here, new inflationary pressures are being fought today.

England is trying stricter monetary and credit controls to ward off new assaults on the pound sterling's stability. And other nations with a boom on their hands has contrasted to the industrial hull here—also find their money in danger again.

The nations that have fared better than the United States in the annual rate of depreciation and the percentage of fall are: Portugal 2.5, Switzerland 1.1, West Germany 1.2, Ecuador 1.5, Venezuela 1.2, Belgium and Pakistan 1.3 and India 1.3.

Among our allies with less luck are Canada 2.4, Italy 2.1, Japan 2.8, the Netherlands 3.6, United Kingdom 4.1 and France 5.0.

Officials Use of Planes Is Noted

OLACHER NATIONAL PARK, Mont., June 28 (AP)—More than half of the governors' parties are reported to have flown to the 62nd governors' conference here in violation of a Pentagon regulation covering such use of national guard planes.

It's a violation if persons ride in a guard plane except the crew and certain others specifically authorized—including the governor, his wife, his executive aide and a nurse.

This was reported as the governors went into a session on federal-state relations.

The report blamed former Gov. Milward Simpson, Wyoming, to warn governors—not against such use of guard aircraft—but against flying in "those antiquated roney birds."

Nothing to Do Louisville, Ky., June 28

Japan's Role Against Reds Is in Doubt

TOKYO, June 28 (AP)—Left-wing demonstrations and political turmoil in Japan have raised serious doubts whether the nation can any longer be considered a firm anchor of western defenses against communism in Asia.

After the devastation of a lost war and subsequent rebirth as a free and prosperous nation, Japan stands today at the crossroads.

Tremendous left-wing and communist pressure, internally and from outside, are being exerted on Japan to sever ties with the West and throw in its lot with the communist world.

But powerful forces are pulling Japan to remain with the West. Many sectors of the people want to retain their new democratic way of life.

They know that the present unprecedented prosperity depends and will depend on the West, especially the United States. They are determined never again to fall victim to tyranny in any form. It may take up to 10 years before the final choice is made.

Reds Claimed in Two West States

PORTLAND, June 28 (AP)—There could be a hotbed of communist cells in Oregon and Washington, according to hard-core communists now in the two states.

Herbert Philbrick said here yesterday. Philbrick, whose book, "I Led Three Lives" has been widely discussed, is here this week for a series of anti-communist meetings under sponsorship of Freedom Crusade, founded by a former Salem resident, Walter Judd.

Philbrick said there are 125 hard-core communists in Oregon and 300 in Washington state.

When I am a member of public opinion. That distinction does not come to too many men. And the distinctiveness of my role appeals to me.

It gives me the feeling of being a political power who pulls the strings from behind, or a courtier who dictates out of sight of the throne.

My wife says that she can tell perfectly well when I have been pulled. For a few days she has been sharper with my household decisions, wails a little straighter, and am less tolerant of those who differ with me.

I like to think that a newspaper reader in far-away Idaho or even London, will read my opinion on vital questions, even though I might be disgusted under some such heading as: "Mr. 47, 33 per cent," or "Mr. 21 per cent," or "Undecided—12 per cent."

If people are swayed by polls, and they must be or else polls would have come out of business—

think this is good in a man. I showed up in the "undecided" column only three times. This would indicate that I not only have a mind of my own, but am willing to use it. There's nothing wishy-washy about me as an opinion-giver.

Yesterday was a happy day for me. Attracted perhaps by the small, neat sign that reads, "pollsters welcome—no dues allowed," which stands in a corner of my town's newspaper-shed—

One wanted to know if I thought Senator Kennedy was old enough to take up to Khrushchev, and the other was interested in finding out if I thought Adlai Stevenson would run.

Over coffee and cakes I laid my opinion right on the line. I said I thought Kennedy was perhaps too old to talk with Khrushchev; that what was needed for the conversation was an exceptionally well-built teenager with poor posture and a good right cross.

As for Stevenson, I said I was sure he would run if he didn't run out of money from mailing special delivery letters and sending telegrams to Mrs. Roosevelt. I also said that Stevenson seemed to forget that Mrs. Roosevelt had only one vote like all the rest of us.
