Castro Seizes Two Oil Refineries; Cubans Are Now Dependent on Russ

HAVANA, July 1 (AP)—Premier Fidel Castro's government seized the giant American-owned Standard Oil Co. and the Anglo-Dutch-owned Shell refineries today in a move which will make Cuba almost entirely dependent on the Soviet Union for its oil. Castro's action came when the companies joined the Texaco refinery in refusing to refine Russian kerosene. It had seized the Texaco plant Wednesday, and American sources said the move could cut Cuban oil supplies as much as 50 percent, a threat to economic disaster. The move would cut off a vital oil source for Havana, but Castro said they did not expect an oil shortage to develop for several more weeks. The only thing that could prevent it, he said, was for Russia to go all out in supplying Castro.

Castro said the Esso, Shell and Texaco refineries within 48 hours will be the biggest single exportation move since the revolution. The total value of all refineries, including national properties, in the three companies was estimated around \$1 billion. Ike Given Power To Slash Cuba's Quota for Sugar

WASHINGTON, July 1 (AP)—The house, heading administration plans for fast action, last night voted the President authority to slash Cuba's sugar quota. The action sent to the senate a bill extending the sugar quota for one year—Dec. 31, 1961. The quota will be 3,910,000. The Eisenhower administration asked authority to establish the Cuban sugar quota for the balance of 1960 and 1961 at such level as the President finds to be in the national interest. At present the United States is buying about three and one-half million tons of sugar a year from Cuba, one of the world's major producers. This is more than half the Cuban crop.

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House Overrides "Ike's" Veto for Federal Pay Hike

WASHINGTON, July 1 (AP)—The house today voted to override President Eisenhower's veto of a seven and one-half-per cent pay increase for one and one-half million federal employees. The vote was 315 to override the veto and 89 against overriding it. This was 69 votes more than the two-thirds majority needed to pass the bill over the President's disapproval. Eisenhower had previously vetoed the bill.

Christianity, and other religions as well, have laid great stress upon a life beyond, and upon this earthly life as a preparation or qualification for that larger or eternal life.

It is emphasized in Roman Catholic religion, and rites, but Protestants probably do not realize how much, until comparatively recently, it dominated the thought and practices of their churches.

To the family home and songs have dealt with the life beyond—the land that is fairer than day, "the rest beyond the river"—the freedom from toil and care, and the angelic songs on lips and with harps in hand.

More sober vein there was the thought of this world as a "wilderness of woe" and the inner debate whether it was better to hold a life "or to be with Christ as his fairer."

All this might give much food for thought as it drives back upon life's inner meaning and values. It leaves great questionings, but it suggests the meaning of confidence and strength, exemplified in much experience.

It was under conditions much like our own, a people confronted with complete destruction in the midst of warring empires, that the Hebrew Psalmist (Psalm 93) wrote:

"God is our refuge and strength—there will not we fear." He spoke of annihilation of the world as we know it.

If that sense of values, that fearlessness that confidence in eternal foundations beneath the temporary and the destructible, could dominate all life—it would probably suggest that the steady regimen of the fear of destruction and to make possible the peace for which we all hope and pray.

WORTH THE COST... The free world can use some good news. And it looks as if it has some in the word that the Algerians at long last are agreeing to peace talks with the French in Paris...

It would be almost in a light of the long and bitter history of this dispute, to raise hopes for solution too high. This is only the barest beginning.

The 1,400,000 Europeans in Algeria make it a rather a problem than most in the colonial sphere.

Obviously, no answer can be found that is going to please both these people and the Algerian nationalists, not to mention those in France who are fighting to keep Algeria tightly tied to France.

This dilemma is the rock on which many French governments have foundered. It is even the central theme of the regime of President Charles de Gaulle could be brought down by it.

Yet he knows he was elevated to power to deal with this matter and all he has given it proper priority. Again and again he has devised plans and made overtures. Always before he has failed. But he has kept patiently on, trying new approaches.

The patience and imagination he has displayed constitute the real essence of statesmanship. The rebels' decision to meet with him in Paris is his first real reward.

France will suffer if the ultimate solution does not somehow keep Algeria independent, though it may become broadly linked to the French in both politics and trade.

Nevertheless, France could suffer more if the terrible drain of the staggered Algerian war is not stopped.

De Gaulle understands this preeminently. Only a France free of this painful burden can march forward toward a higher development and find its true place in the Western family of nations. A high price can be paid for the regaining of that opportunity.

The area that is exactly the kind of price that's most likely to have to be paid—De Gaulle must persuade many Frenchmen that France's future is worth that cost.

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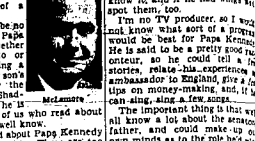

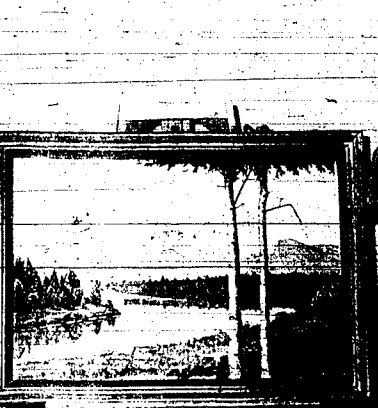

Man Declares Peanuts Will Cure Disease

MILWAUKEE, Wis., July 1 — James Goggins, 30, has eaten a pound of peanuts a day for nearly two months in an effort to cure a blood disease.

Doctors were skeptical whether the 20 three-quarter ounce bags of peanuts did were driving away the disease, hemophilia.

Hemophilia's blood lacks the ability to clot, and an injury could result in excessive bleeding and even death.

Goggins, who has been unable to leave the hospital for more than two weeks during the past three years, started eating peanuts when a nurse showed him an article in a medical journal which stated they appeared "helpful in preventing hemorrhages."

Despite the peanuts, Marquette university biochemist Dr. Arnold S. Quick, said that clotting time for Goggins' blood has actually worsened in the past year.

He added, however, the blood vessels themselves have some effect of hemophilia, therefore if the peanuts had any beneficial effect it may have been on their rather than on the blood.
