Experts Aver U.S. Firms to Lose in Cuba

NEW YORK, July 6 (AP)—American firms are expected to lose billions of dollars in the value of their investments in Cuba, financial and political experts agreed today.

No matter what the future holds for Cuba, final settlements for the Cuban American oil refineries, sugar plantations, cattle ranches, tourist hotels and other businesses on the island can return to the owners only a fraction of their market value of say, January, 1959.

The experts are sure there will be a settlement some time after the government's "five-year" interim success—will pay off the claims partly in cash, but mostly in long-term bonds similar to the four percent bonds Castro has tabled of late.

But precedents over the past 20-odd years in Mexico, Argentina and other Latin American countries make it plain that investors will get only what they think the properties are worth, or what they might have been sold for in 1959.

The Cubans probably will do more than better in paying off the huge arrears of dollar imports that have piled up since Castro's revolution. For all these are sold to exceed 70 million dollars, Cuba must trade to the U.S. to meet its regular trade obligations.

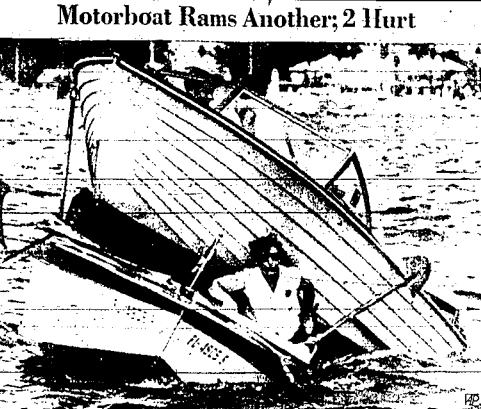

Test Truce End Warned by Russ

GENEVA, July 6 (AP)—Seymour K. Thompson said yesterday that neither research blasts conducted by the United States without full Soviet participation would automatically end the truce on nuclear weapons tests.

The Soviet delegate made the statement to disengage after another session of the U.S.-Soviet talks aimed at achieving agreement on a permanent test ban.

The United States is planning a series of 12 underground blasts as part of a large-scale research program. Thompson has demanded that Soviet scientists be permitted to inspect nuclear devices used to see they are not cloaking weapons tests. Such close inspection is barred by U.S. legislation.

Business Expects Decrease In 1960 First Half Profits

NEW YORK, July 6 (AP)—Early reports on first half 1960 profits of American business indicate the 100 companies who already reported profits when finally in will drop below the year ago figures. But net income after taxes is likely to be tallied as well above most other first six months and perhaps as second best.

The trouble isn't so much that some industries have run into a slowdown in sales or a squeeze on profit margins this year. They have. But the big factor is that the year-over comparison runs up, against a booming 1959 first half, especially in the April-May-June quarter.

That 1959 period set a record for any quarter in business history with profits running at an annual rate of 27 billion dollars. This was up 75 per cent over the previous year. The second best quarter was chalked up in 1958, also for a second quarter, at 23.7 billion dollars.

The final figures on this year's April-May-June period are given little chance to equal last year's record, although they may push 1959 to second honor, since 1959 figures have fallen

Africa Paper-Attacks Way People Jailed

CAPE TOWN, South Africa, July 6 (AP)—A major South African newspaper today sharply attacked the government policy for keeping 1.4 million blacks in jail for three months without charges or court appearances.

The Cape Times noted that it has been "astonishingly" 100 days since the white government has claimed a state of emergency.

The government took the action when racial violence broke out after police at Sharpeville near Johannesburg shot and killed 69 protesting natives, and wounded nearly 200 others.

The government jured hundreds of persons considered opposed to the white supremacy system, and although it has been lifting the state of emergency gradually since the late of emergency has been released.

Canadian Dies in Parachute Leap

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., July 6 (AP)—A Canadian-born airman, Air Vice Marshal Keith L. B. Hodson, was killed late yesterday while parachuting from a disabled jet trainer 12 miles south of here.

A spokesman at North American air defense command said Hodson either broke his neck or was strangled in the coils of his parachute.

Hodson, 44, was deputy chief of staff for operations at NORAD. His rank was equivalent to an air force major general in the United States.

The Treasury has announced that 7,500 questionnaires had been mailed to corporations in an attempt to get public and private industry's views. Additional questionnaires will be mailed to about 2,500 smaller firms by the small business administration.
