U. S. "Keep Reds Away" Plan Backed

WASHINGTON, July 16 (AP)—The United States won hemisphere backing today for its communists-keep-out plan against Cuba. At a meeting of the Organization of American States held up in rejection of Soviet interference in western hemisphere affairs. A Cuban force later, the state department in a note to the United States, urged the United States to back the plan and lodged its aggression charge. At the same time it denounced Cuba's treatment of U. S. news correspondents in the island republic, citing evidence that Cuban forces without charge or expelled without trial.

The government of Premier Fidel Castro now has pending before the United Nations a charge that the United States has committed economic aggression against Cuba.

The U. S. note claimed that the law providing for nationalization of American-owned property in Cuba amounts to seizure without compensation. The United States owners "disfranchised" as important economic assets of the United States for payment in the form of 20-year bonds and called the law "a gross violation of international law."

Reprisal Feared if Report Given on Drag Race Strips

Three women living adjacent to long-ago drag-racing strips on public lands in Twin Falls county have expressed their apprehensions over reports of reprisals from racers should they report such activities to authorities.

Their fears were reported to Probate Judge J. Dean Mosher and Probate Deputy Sheriff James H. Behan, a Twin Falls newspaper reporter who surveyed the drag-race sites Saturday morning.

The women expressed what they expected would be a set of reprisals if they reported their fears to the authorities. At the same time all expressed great displeasure of the fear that their homes would be destroyed.

Two of the women, one a grandmother, the other a mother of four children ranging in age from 10 to a defendant, yet they were just a feature of reprisals from racers if reported.

A Times-News reporter heard the mother of the four youngsters state that she had ordered them to take to the borrow pits, a term used among racers, if they heard rowdy racers, or indications of many drag racers. She admitted that even in the pits the children were subjected to the estimated hit speed of 80 to 100 miles an hour.

Judge Mosher and the reporter journeyed to the sites of three strips Saturday morning. One, three miles north of Curry, is marked with road stripes and a fence on the east side of the strip. The other two strips are on the west side of the strip covered the road, stopping about five feet beyond the end of the course.

The strip, one-fourth of a mile long, began about five yards from the driveway of a small farm home. The marks covered the road from the driveway to the strip. This, the reporter said, is a common practice of racers, there is an intersection of two roads.

The woman released a scathing attack against drag racing and public lands in the area. She said it is far too many citizens are ready to either overlook or ignore the signs of drag racing.

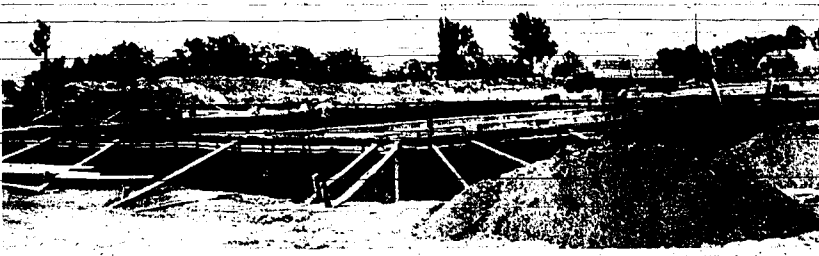

Fertilizers Said Key for Profits

Key use of fertilizers is often the key to profit in farming, C. W. Dahl, county agricultural agent, said today in recommending a new bulletin, "A Guide for Fertilizing Idaho Crops," published by the University of Idaho extension service.

Dahl is Charles Palmer, soil specialist, and C. O. Baker, soil chemist, of the extension station. The bulletin recommends rates for fertilizing most Idaho crops on irrigated and non-irrigated soil.

"Of the plant nutrients used in fertilizers, nitrogen is the most important," Dahl said. "Nitrogen and phosphorus are the most important in Idaho, in certain areas potassium, zinc, boron, sulfur, and molybdenum may be needed on some crops."

"In western Idaho, zinc and boron are needed in fertilizers on some crops," Dahl said. "In some areas, molybdenum may be needed on some crops."

"The amount of nitrogen and phosphorus you need will vary from year to year. Use the fertilizer that fits your crop and soil. Many new commercial fertilizers are a wise investment only when the nutrients added are needed. In Idaho, soil, fertilizer, and irrigation are key factors in profit."

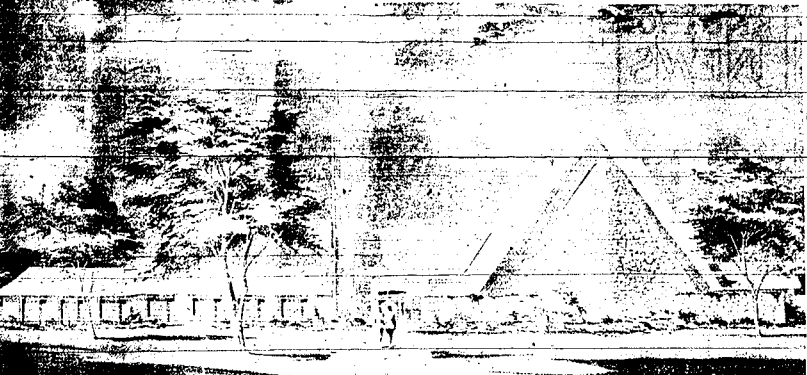

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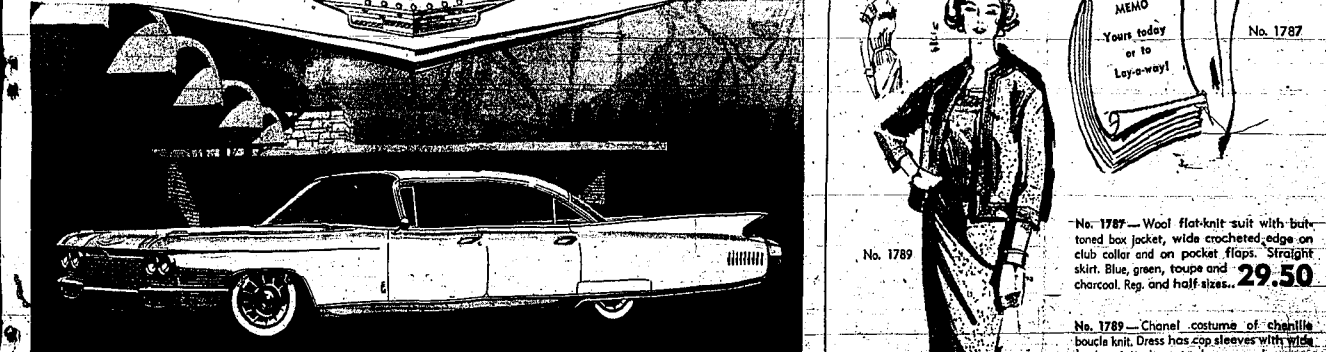

Unusual Flower, Perfect Sphere, Is Grown in T. F.

Featured among the flowers, they only ordered one and now hope that it will multiply. Workshop Gives "Art Colony" Look to Redfish Area at Fifth Annual Outing

REDFISH LAKE, July 16.—Any one who visited here during the past week would surely believe he had stumbled upon a full-fledged art colony.

There were artists everywhere—on the benches in the woods and on the docks. Anyone without canvas and brush was conspicuous.

The occasion was the fifth annual "Workshop on Wheels," an unusual art program sponsored by the University of Idaho. It serves as a multiple function—students can get art training, college credit and a vacation all at the same time.

The program is under the direction of Alfred Dunn and Mary Kirkwood, both professors of art at the university. The program here was the second part of a three-week program. The first

week of the workshop is held at Redfish Lake Cour d'Alene, then the many are simply amateur artists who want additional instruction and an atmosphere where they can receive group criticism. Students vary from high school students to retired persons—but all have a common interest in art.

Dunn explains that more advanced students usually paint on canvas, but the students get to try each and every medium. This is a new experience. The students apply evenly between those painting in oils and those interested in water colors.

Dunn works with those interested in watercolor and Miss Kirkwood instructs oil painting.

During the day Dunn and Miss Kirkwood walk about the area where the students are painting

and give individual instruction, trying to spend some time with each student every day.

Each Tuesday there is a mass criticism of the work and on Thursday evening the group holds a seminar where a topic, such as "modern painting," will be discussed.

Dunn says, "These students are enthusiastic and hard working, and you'd be surprised how you can get a fresh viewpoint on art from some of the novices."

He adds, "These students will accomplish in three weeks what a resident student will accomplish in a semester. They will turn out an equal amount of work, and the concentration of time makes them move ahead at an astonishing speed."

He notes that some of them have turned out as many as five accomplished watercolor a day.

Asked if the "crash course" type of learning that exists means the students could forget what they learn in a short time, Dunn says this isn't so. "The experience stays with them for the rest of their life at experience. They will leave here and most of them will return to their own local art groups, where they will continue to be interested in art and where they will contribute new ideas to their fellow artists back home."

"This is just one of the things that has helped the growth of

local art groups throughout the United States," he adds.

"This workshop is known throughout the United States and is the only one quite like it in the country," Dunn says. The art department has received query letters from every state in the union and a good percentage of the students are from out of state, many from the eastern seaboard.

An article about the workshop appeared in the March, 1966, issue of the Ford Times which drew national attention. "We're still getting letters from persons who read the article and who are interested in attending one of the workshops."

Although the workshop has only been under way for five years, the idea was spawned at the university nearly 20 years ago. Dunn says the idea was brought up shortly before World War II. Gasoline rationing started. This naturally stopped the program in the formative stages. Then, five years ago, the idea was revived, and even national interest in art, it has its other aspects.

Dunn admits out that many of the students—men or women—often bring their families with them. It works out rather well. For example, the wife can paint, the husband can "rest," and the children can swim.

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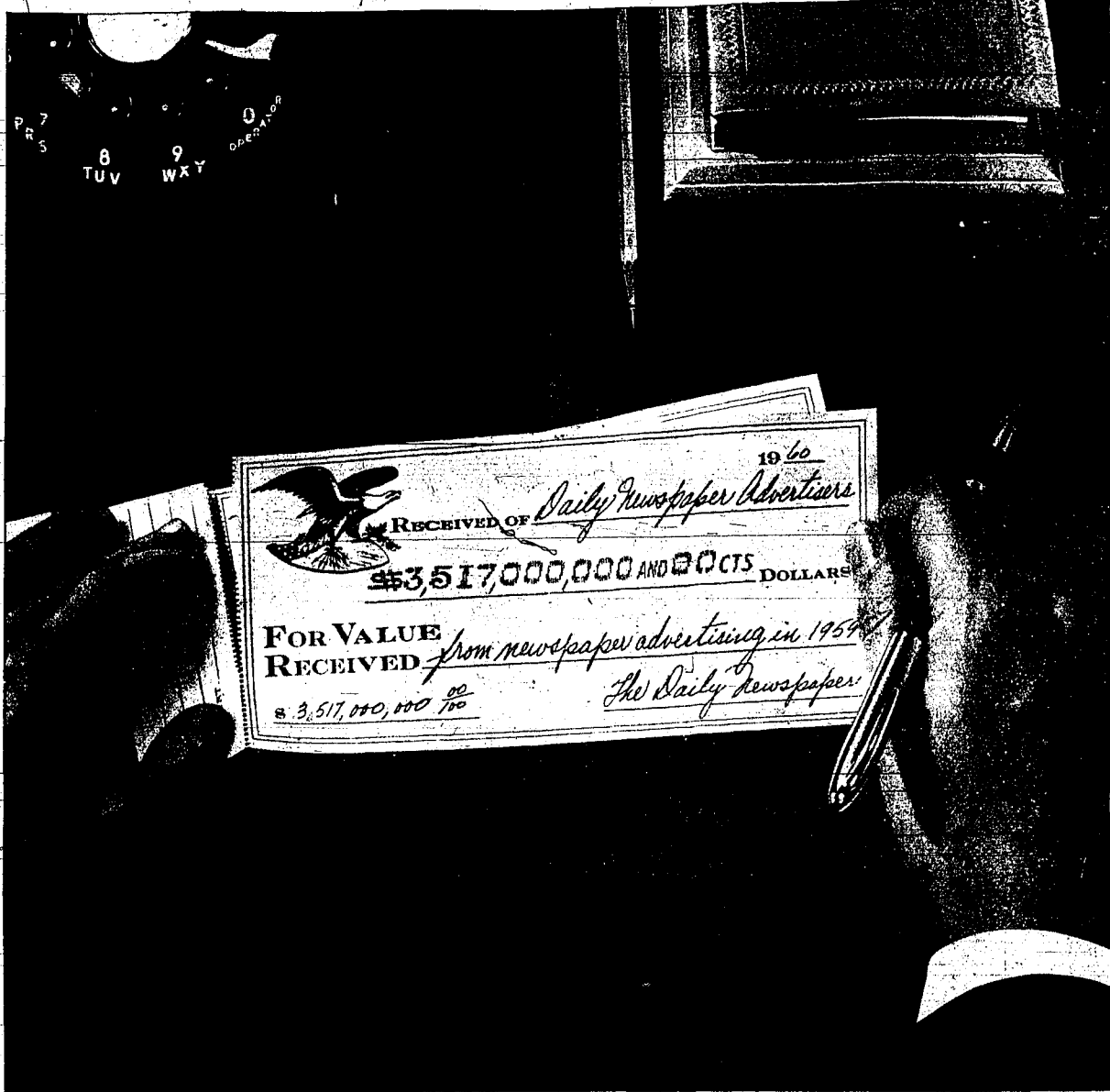

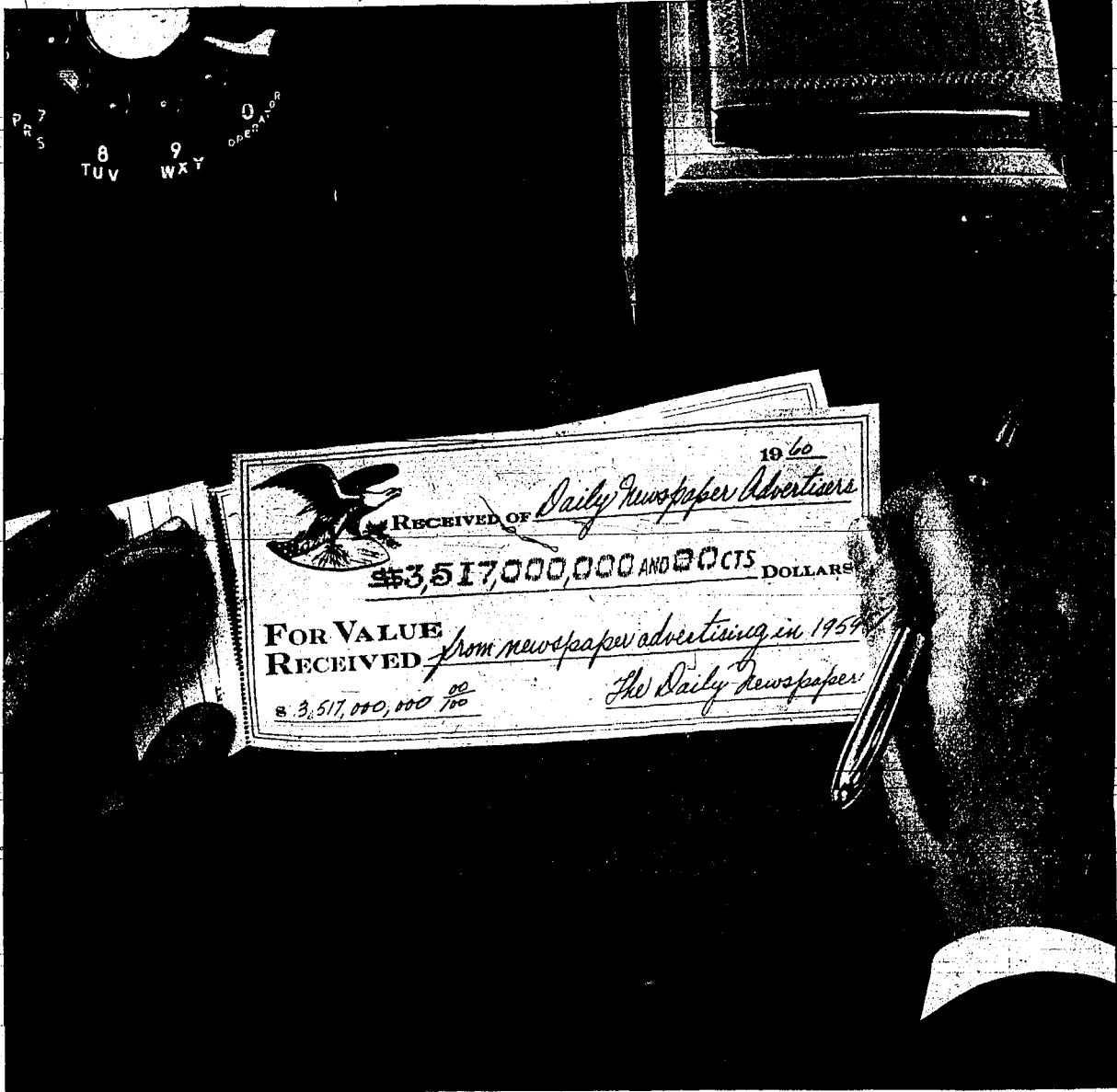
