**THE REPUBLICAN CONVENTION**

Now it's the Republicans turn to hold their national convention which gets under way in Chicago, Monday.

Because there has been so much criticism of the recent Democratic convention in Los Angeles, the Republicans are anxious to show the Republicans conducted themselves by comparison.

Mindful of that fact, the Republicans should make every attempt to keep their convention on as high a plane as possible, not only in the platform they submit for the people's approval, but in maintaining a sense of dignity commensurate with the serious problems confronting this country both at home and abroad.

While it appears to be a pinch Vice President Nixon will receive the Republican nomination for President, two others will be considered as remote possibilities - *Arthur's* Gov. *Nelson Rockefeller* and *New York's* Sen. *Barry Goldwater*.

Rockefeller may be left in sympathy with much of present day Democratic thinking and Goldwater leans heavily to the right in support of what he considers to be the proper American way.

Vice President Nixon lies somewhere in between. No undoubtedly will try to play both ends against the middle in a bid for support from all sides after he wins the nomination.

There lies a real danger, as we see it. The Republicans cannot hope to out-promise the Democrats who in effect have a clean slate, they are clean and are something for everyone - a miraculous Utopia that would cost the taxpayers little or nothing.

To compromise with all such thinking would show weakness on the part of the Republicans - a me-too-ism that would appear ridiculous on the surface.

If we are to maintain anything approaching a two-party system in this country, now is the time for the Republicans to take a firm stand against wholesale government spending and mounting debt at home and a mammy-pummy attitude toward Russian insults.

If this country is so far gone in a drift toward welfare state solutions or will ever one may choose to call it - if the people have become so hypnotized by the lure of the government handout that there's no way out of the morass, we can't help it - we might just as well find it out once and for all.

Unless the Republicans adopt a platform that speaks the plain truth in plain conditions just as they exist, and suggests logical ways of facing these conditions honestly, realistically and fearlessly, they actually will give the people no real choice.

If they resort to a meaningless fluff of political oratory, clouded in platitudes even to the extreme of deliberate misrepresentation, they will fall of their real purpose in effecting the greatest sound leadership in a time of grave need.

If the Republicans are to remain true to their principles, they should have no hesitations in rejecting this concept of a welfare state in America, which offers little more than promising everyone everything - promises which never could be fulfilled without working the country.

Purely opportunist politicians will argue, of course, that the Republicans should concern themselves primarily with political conquest, that resulting to whatever means is necessary for election.

As one observer pointed out recently in commenting on the national conventions: "The Republicans are being urged to understand why the designers must resort to exaggeration, misrepresentation and even outright lies. In practical politics you can't blame them if that's what it takes to win an election."

Those who think that way about politics, of course, would say we are naive and idealistic in our insistence that the Republic be expected of the Republican convention.

We're not too naive to know, however, that the Republicans have been losing ground in recent years by compromising with their party's principles and their own consciences to believe they will continue to lose ground unless they change their ways.

If they cannot come up with a strong program to speak the plain truth in plain conditions which will have a real choice of which way they prefer to go, the convention in Chicago will fall short of its great responsibility.

The business of American government has been getting out of control in enough, it has become a sprawling monstrosity, gathering in tax money by billions and billions and spending these billions as if they were so much paper.

Some World War II veterans have seen more years in which they can obtain loans administered by the federal government, as the result of a bill approved July 14, by the House of Representatives. The bill, which passed the House by a vote of 377-1, extends the loan program through 1965.

The bill also authorizes the extension of the direct loan program for the guaranteed loan program for the World War II veterans and for the guaranteed loan program for the World War II and Korean veterans.

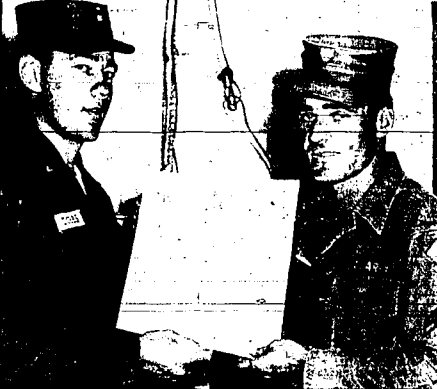

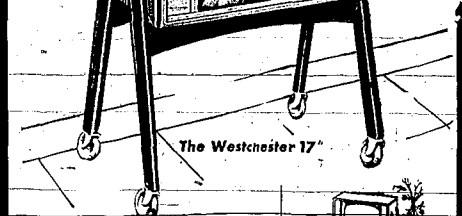

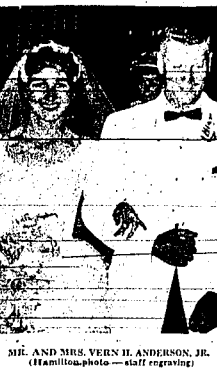

### More Wrecks In June Than In May Told

BOISE, July 21—Fewer drivers were involved in more motor vehicle accidents during June than in May, while the number of persons killed and injured showed an increase, according to the traffic statistics division of the Idaho department of law enforcement.

Last month 2,177 motorists were involved in 1,244 accidents which killed 27 and injured 483 people. In May there were 2,220 drivers in 1,319 accidents, 22 deaths and 403 personal injuries, the monthly report showed. A year ago the June report listed 2,856 drivers, 1,721 accidents, 26 deaths and 520 injuries.

The June 1958 report tabulated 67 of the crashes in rural areas and 707 of them within municipalities. Of the 1,174 increased violations were committed by part of the drivers involved. Some of them were fined as having committed from one to five violations. The most frequent violations listed annual, 118.

Most motor vehicle accidents were attributed to 200 of the drivers while 165 of them drove off the road. Of the 113 increased violations, 95 were following too closely and 89 were on the wrong side of the road. Twenty of the motorists were driving on suspended or revoked licenses and had no drivers licenses. Leaving the scene of an accident was charged against 27 drivers.

A total of 34 per cent of the accidents involved drivers less than 25 years of age, down from 35 per cent reported in 1957, traffic safety officials said.

Hypnosis Used in Case of Surgery Here for Help to Regular Methods

Medical and nursing staffs at Magic Valley Memorial hospital made local medical history when they induced hypnosis in an adjunct to other surgical methods in a case involving major surgery.

In an interview with the Times-News, a staff physician described the use of hypnosis in surgery, and stated that it was used in the case involving major surgery.

The patient was F. W. Dodds, 74, Kimberly, a man who has had a weak heart and lungs for about 10 years. He also needed a hernia operation, but the doctor considered the patient too frail for major surgery using normal anesthetic techniques.

Had had cough. Dodds' lung condition results in a bad cough and a high rate of respiration. When he had coughing spasms it compounded the problems that made major surgery a risk. His lung condition made the use of ordinary anesthetic methods risky. It occurred to the attending doctors that through the use of hypnosis the patient could be prepared more adequately for surgery, and that a hypnotic state could partially replace general anesthesia if used with a dilute local anesthetic.

Dodds agreed to the use of hypnosis and for a week preceding the operation he was prepared hypnotically and medically. In addition to the surgeon who was to perform the operation and who was preparing Dodds hypnotically, Dodds was cared for by a group of four doctors, including a heart and lung specialist and an anesthesiologist.

Through the use of hypnosis, Dodds' respiration was cut from 20 to 12 times a minute. This breathing rate occurred while he was in a hypnotic trance. Dodds was a good subject and rapidly fell into a deep and relaxed hypnotic trance. His breathing and heart rate improved. As a result, he was put to a much better rest for a major operation.

Dodds was in the operating room for one hour and 20 minutes. He was awake within two hours after the operation and was discharged from the hospital in 10 days.

### Milk Production Shows Increase For U.S. in May

WASHINGTON, June 23 (UPI)—Milk production on farms in May was estimated by the agriculture department at 12,628,000,000 pounds, about one per cent above both May, 1959, and the 1958 average for the month.

In the first five months of 1960, milk production totaled 64,920,000,000 pounds, one per cent above the total for the same period in 1959. Production per cow averaged 24.7 tons on June 1, one-half of one per cent above the previous record high set a year earlier.

The five leading milk producing states in May were Wisconsin, 2,770,000,000 pounds; Minnesota, 1,662,000,000; New York, 1,585,000,000; California, 1,500,000,000; and Illinois, 898,000,000.

WASHINGTON, July 23 (UPI)—The department of agriculture said conditions as of July 23 support indications of a record 1960 crop of farm marketings for 1960.

The aggregate volume of marketings is estimated to be about one per cent more than in 1959 and 10 per cent more than the 1947-49 average.

# Cannery Pea Harvest South of Hansen Ends, Crews Move up to Burley Area

The harvest of canner pea under contract to California Packing company in the south of Hansen-Murtaugh came to an end last week.

The crews are now busy at night, harvesting during the cooler periods, in the Burley area. The busy area is about one to two weeks later than Twin Falls county.

Extremes of weather, including frost the first day of summer in June and hot days of the past two weeks, have had marked effects on the crop.

Frost knocked out a strong 50 per cent of the crop under contract to the canning company and heat put most maturely on the green peas that was planned according to the harvesting schedule.

Trucks loaded with more than 16 tons of peas in bins departed each evening during the harvest operation for the six-hour drive to Smithfield, Utah.

The Franklin cannery didn't open this season because the June frost destroyed a 1,500-acre pea crop along with other crops.

The small canneries mounted on the back of tractors which transport the peas to the canneries are being used by the company in the Burley area. According to working crews, they will be used again in future harvest. The large shatters, they are better job cutting and laying the peas in a window.

Large loaders on tractors removing somewhat may load, follow behind the shatters and dump the crop on trucks. These trucks then dump large loads at the stationary deymers.

# Pea Aphids Are Back in Many T.F. County Fields

Pea aphids are back again in many fields in Twin Falls. They are being sprayed with DDT under way, but if the insects are not killed by the sun and dry fields after cutting and keep the third crop from growing, recommendations will be heavy to spray with malathion or parathion.

Another insect that is expected to cause some trouble this year is the spruce miner. Hot weather and the absence of these insects around shrubs and trees on lawns and gardens have put some entomologists on the alert for the pest.

Last year, some specialists recommended farmers to use sulphur.

# Utah Quarantine On Cattle Lifted As Scabies Dies

The quarantine on cattle in western Idaho county on account of the scabies infestation, reported initially April 21, was lifted effective July 1 by state veterinarian Dr. E. H. Beard, Gooding, Idaho.

About 5,000 head of cattle have been dipped for scabies on the Idaho-Utah border under the supervision of federal veterinarian. California now is the only state that will have restrictions on Idaho cattle on account of skin lice. Feeder and stocker cattle handled in the coast state still have to be dipped under state-federal supervision.

### MAGIC VALLEY PORTRAIT Mrs. Pearl Barber's Galena Store Is Traditional Stop for Many Residents

**GALENA, July 23**—"I call it a little hick store or a peanut store," Mrs. Pearl Barber describes her general store. This is the way Mrs. Pearl Barber describes her general store. This station cabin resort and traditional "stop-over" known to every resident of Magic Valley.

Located on the south side of Galena, the store is a favorite haunt for travelers. Anything from a bolt of cloth to information on where to find some rather old lumber can be procured by Mrs. Barber who buries about the station like a busy sparrow.

Since 1924 Mrs. Barber has been associated with the store and she has lived there continuously since 1940. From 1924 to 1930 she and her late husband, Charles Barber, operated the store operationally, mostly during the summer.

Mrs. Barber is known generally by a great many persons in this area, and it is not known personally, she is at least known for her winter weather reports that she has issued throughout the years from her snowbound quarters.

The longest period she has been snowbound at the store was in the early 1940's, when she was forced to stay in the store more than four months.

"This might sound like a lot of work for a 73-year-old woman but Mrs. Barber takes it in her stride. She doesn't always have any sympathy for those who log snowing, and she gave me three consecutive years through the winter ways done it; second, he pointed out that I was capable, and third, she said I didn't know any better." ### Better Control Urged Best Surgery Available None too Good for You

Half of all operations done in the United States are performed by surgeons who are not trained in techniques of major surgery. So-called "Over Doctors" are the ones who assume the practice of the American College of Surgeons.

While few exceptions, each of us must have an operation at some time in our lives. So you might consider the following:

Honoring boards set to protect the public interest by establishing the "better control" agency by Doctor Wengenstein.

"Give fullest support to your local community hospital on which you will have to depend for emergency surgery. Only if it is staffed and equipped in accordance with the standards of the American College of Surgeons will you be given your best chance for recovery when the element of time leaves you with no other considerations.

Do not object to an extra fee for the services of an expert anesthesiologist. Smooth anesthesia is indispensable to the conduct of expert surgery. Later, it serves to reduce postoperative discomforts and complications.

Do not begrudge the qualified surgeon his fee. Pay him in full immediately if you must. . . . If it is necessary to economize, do not buy luxuries like cosmetics, alcoholic beverages, the new model TV set or pleasure car and compare to beauty parlor.

If you've a well-equipped and well-staffed community hospital and a qualified anesthesiologist and surgeon in residence, you may be able to save yourself and your family the greater inconvenience and expense of having to travel to a nonemergency operation.

Whether it is to be a procedure of election, like removal of an uninfected gallbladder or children's tonsils, or a procedure of necessity for removal of cancerous breast or prostate, the home town surgeon on whom you depend for emergency services your consideration.

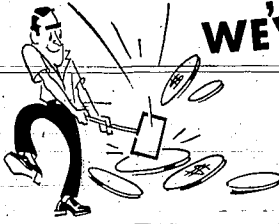
If you're doubtful of his qualifications, you have every right to ask him what his personal experience has been with the contemplated procedure.

How many similar operations has he done? What per cent of patients failed to survive operation? What are the most important complications? How many had successful recoveries? And finally, whether he thinks your chances might be improved if you went to one of the great hospitals as to a famous surgical clinic.

Although the more skeptical among you may have misgivings over your local surgeon's reaction
