THE REAL BOOST

The successful firing of two Polaris missiles from a submerged submarine is an event of great importance to the security of the United States.

The Polaris is a rocket upon which we have long been banking heavily. It had been tested in various preliminary stages, but this double firing was the real thing.

When the missiles were launched, the submarine George Washington rose 50 feet to the surface.

The two Polaris missiles traveled an 1100-mile course, the equivalent of a third of the way across America.

This success carries with it the high promise of a vital flexibility in our nuclear armaments.

The cancellation of a sizable Polaris-bearing submarine would give us one assurance that the Soviet Union could not in a surprise assault wipe out all our retaliatory nuclear power.

Admittedly the Polaris is not a long range and an intermediate range missile. But it is that very fact which permits this weapon to be used in an area of great strategic importance.

And a submarine is a floating shipboard base not easily detected or attacked.

This is the supreme advantage of this missile. It comes up and goes down, drifting, close-in, unpredictable offense that should give pause to any potential enemy.

Even if the development of the Polaris and the Polaris-bearing submarine proceed at high pace, we cannot conclude, however, that we will thereby surpass our military balance in our favor.

It is not that the Russians, who will master the secrets of the Polaris. They already have a tremendous submarine fleet, adaptable for nuclear missile launchings, all of our own and surface vessels.

Nevertheless, the Polaris success represents a tangible gain for our country's defense. We have greatly enlarged our defense perimeter, and have acquired the potential for quick nuclear thrusts that most inventively is sobering to any prospective enemy.

NO EASY WAY

In both the 1948 and 1950 elections there were late-blooming draft movements. At Los Angeles there was a lively flurry for Adlai Stevenson, in Chicago, Gov. Nelson Rockefeller.

These spirited if belated and abortive efforts should never be discouraged in a free country, and the nominations ought never to be discarded until the votes are finally counted.

But a good many of the well-meaning folks who have taken part in these draft efforts are not so much as to be misled by the misshapen view of nominating politics.

To judge by their remarks and their behavior, they seem to feel that anything short of a landslide represents a thwarting of the people's will.

They indicate the only honest verdict a convention can arrive at is to respond to the question of whether or not a last minute avalanche of persuasive telegrams from delegates' home districts a wild demonstration in convention hall and an unbroken series of press conferences entailing the hero's virtues.

Conversely, they take the attitude that there is something not quite respectable or fair about a candidate getting out long in advance and working for the nomination.

They suggest this not only constitutes an undemocratic ambition but actually has the effect of preventing the candidate from molding their wishes. Thus delegates who do not respond to the drafters' drum-beat have never been "brownstoned, coerced, pressured."

The fact is, of course, that our mixed system of primaries and state conventions virtually demands that candidates get out for the presidency get out and work. So long as that system prevails, the American people have a right to expect that they shall do so.

Any man who genuinely wants the nomination can hardly, in fairness, by-pass this long and arduous route. The system has made the law, and the law is the only reasonable reflection of the breadth and diversity of this country.

Who finds the experience "traumatic" or otherwise, should probably be not mean for presidential politics at all.

It is rough and tough, but it is a game that anyone may not only win the prize but also to fill the job with full effectiveness.

Winners are rare. Generally, the men who choose to play this game are those who have gone to the people with their own message and who want in the wings to be tapped of the political arena, seldom deserve the honor.

COEUR D'ALENE, July 29 on—All fire permits in Idaho on state-protected land from the Canadian border south to the Salmon river have been canceled, Assistant State Forester Edward King said Thursday.

A suspension of logging operations in the same area was under consideration, he said, as many operators curtailed work in the woods on a voluntary basis. "The fire condition is critical," said King, "and the cooperation of everyone is asked."

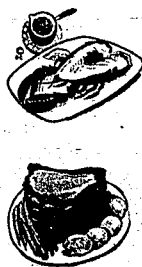
