LONDON, July 30 (AP)—The deputy commander of Soviet nuclear forces called the U.S. nuclear arsenal "powerful" but said it was "capable of dealing blows but not of destroying the entire status quo on remote enemy territory."

Admiral G. Gorshkov, chief of the Soviet Navy, issued the statement on the eve of the launch of Soviet atomic warheads. His statement was broadcast by radio.

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### General Congratulates Retiring Adviser

Colonel Walton retired Saturday after 29 years of active military service during which he was star, after star and Cross of Guerre during World War II. He has been squadron adviser to the guard's third squadron, 101st armored cavalry, Jerome, for the past four years, chief operating officer of the Idaho National Guard, and active career member of the National Guard Association of the United States.

### Adviser to Area Guard Units Ends Service After 20 Years

Lieut. Col. Harold C. Walton, a regular army adviser to the Idaho National Guard, retired from active service Saturday after 20 years of active duty. Walton was honored at a brief retirement service in the office of the Idaho adjutant general, Boise, at which the retirement orders were read. He was born March 11, 1874, at Los Angeles, Calif., and entered the service July 14, 1891, as a private in the Kansas national guard at Lawrence. His active career began as a second lieutenant with the Kansas guard Dec. 23, 1904. During World War II he saw active service in Europe, winning the silver star, bronze star and the French Cross of Guerre. Colonel Walton was assigned to the 101st Infantry on Oct. 12, 1926, coming from Ft. Mead, Md., where he had been stationed with the second armored cavalry. His duties here were as squadron adviser to headquarters of the third reconnaissance squadron at Jerome. Present at the ceremony in Boise were Maj. Gen. John E. Walsh, Idaho adjutant general; Brig. Gen. George B. Bennett, Col. Carl Isenberg, Lieut. Col. H. V. Smith, Maj. James Brooks, and Capt. Charles Brandenberg, all of the Idaho guard, and Col. Landon O. Cox and CWO Dominic Manfredi of the army adviser group. Colonel Walton said Saturday that he had no specific plans for retirement, he and his family are leaving Sunday for an extended trip to Canada. While there they intend to "just tour," the colonel said.

### Optometrists Slate Clinic For Children

Dr. Orrin A. Fuller, Dr. Robert S. Shaw and Dr. George P. Schaefer, Twin Falls optometrists, will open the second annual eye pre-school screening clinic from 9 a. m. to 4 p. m. August 14. About seven other optometrists in Magic Valley will give the same service to children who will enter school this fall.

The "visual screening" examination to be given at the clinic will include all Idaho Optometric Association optometrists, and will be given in cooperation with the Idaho State Department of Health. Dr. Robert C. Phillips, Rupert, Idaho, announced that he will be available for a complete vision examination, but will discuss the importance of visual difficulty if it is found. The purpose of the tests is to determine if the children are visually handicapped. The tests also will locate existing visual problems.

Statistics show 80 per cent of what a person reads is seen. It is an attempt to prevent the development of defects of sight in children. No appointment is necessary for the eye tests.

A report form on the child's visual readiness for school will be sent by the optometrist to the school nurse. PTA chairman or schooling optometrists will determine if the child can see clearly at a distance as well as close and reading distances, examine the eyes for any defects, determine if a refractive error exists, determine if the ability to judge distance is normal, test the children for ability to distinguish the basic colors and determine if the eyes work as a team.

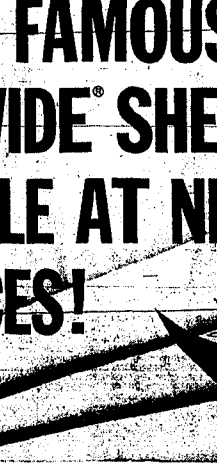

**AGRICULTURE, July 30**—A gain of about \$40,000 in local property is noted on the abstract of assessment rolls as announced by Leta L. Kistner, county auditor.

Total amount is \$3,666,413, compared with \$3,626,413 in 1965 for a gain of \$40,000. The figure does not include utilities. Main item of gain in valuation was land, 17,000 acres.

There were 42,738 acres of irrigated land this year valued at \$1,058,700, an increase of 20,874 last year with a tax valuation of \$225,305.

This year's pump irrigated land amounted to 8,300 acres, valued at \$242,250, against 6,038 last year at \$192,450.

Improved grazing land shrank from 430 acres last year at \$47,100 to 424 acres this year at \$47,620.

Non-irrigated agriculture land remained at 1,132 acres with valuation almost the same. 175,000 acres at \$19,920 to 162,993 acres at \$17,220.

Real estate improvements cost \$2,250 a total of \$14,455. Residence improvements advanced \$5,885 to a total of \$20,005.

Personal property figures show 218,000 at \$18,000, milk cows number 3,503 at \$125,765. Stock cattle number 2,314 at \$460,250.

Much of the rates, cattle and sheep valuations will be shown on the subsequent property rolls which will be prepared next November and which will include stock which was on the range in the county.

Merchandise in stores was down slightly and equipment showed a decrease. When all valuations are added together it will run a little over six million, the auditor said.

Anyone who can even spell psychology knows that this neglectful treatment cannot fail to hurt the citizens of these states. They may not allow their wounds to be felt, but inside they will ache, and some will be scarred forever.

As a lover of all 50 states, this situation grieves me, and I find myself unable to sleep soundly at night for thinking about my fellow citizens in Delaware, Rhode Island, Nevada, Vermont, North Dakota, Hawaii and Alaska, to mention some who hold the shortest in the electoral college, and who won't be courted lavishly, if at all, by either Kennedy or Nixon.

Something should be done for them, to show them that they are every bit as important as citizens of the big five, or Texas, or any other state. But what?

Summertime Beverages Can Create Cool Illusion

Maybe tall cold drinks won't lower the temperature but no one expects that at least they give a sensation of coolness and it is such a relief to "think cool" while in hand.
Summertime beverages should be a variety and abundance of such fruits. Added to summer citrus oranges and lemons give refreshing flavor and are healthful to eat.
The best results with summer citrus use a sugar syrup. Unsweetened sugar does not give as much texture and sinks to the bottom of the glass. Vary the amount of sugar in the recipe to approximate the acidity of the fruit and individual palates.
A sugar syrup may be made by heating four cups of sugar and four cups of water together for 10 minutes. Pour into clean hot jars and seal. Add ice cubes to hand and used as needed.
It is also convenient to keep a concentrated lemonade base in the refrigerator for use when unexpected callers drop in or if a refreshing pick-up is in order.
Combine two cups fresh lemon juice, one tablespoon grated lemon peel and one-third cup sugar, stirring well to dissolve. Add water and one cup boiling water over five to ten minutes. Strain. Combine water-lemon-juice and sugar. Pour into four-cup cup of this base in each glass. Add ice cubes and water.

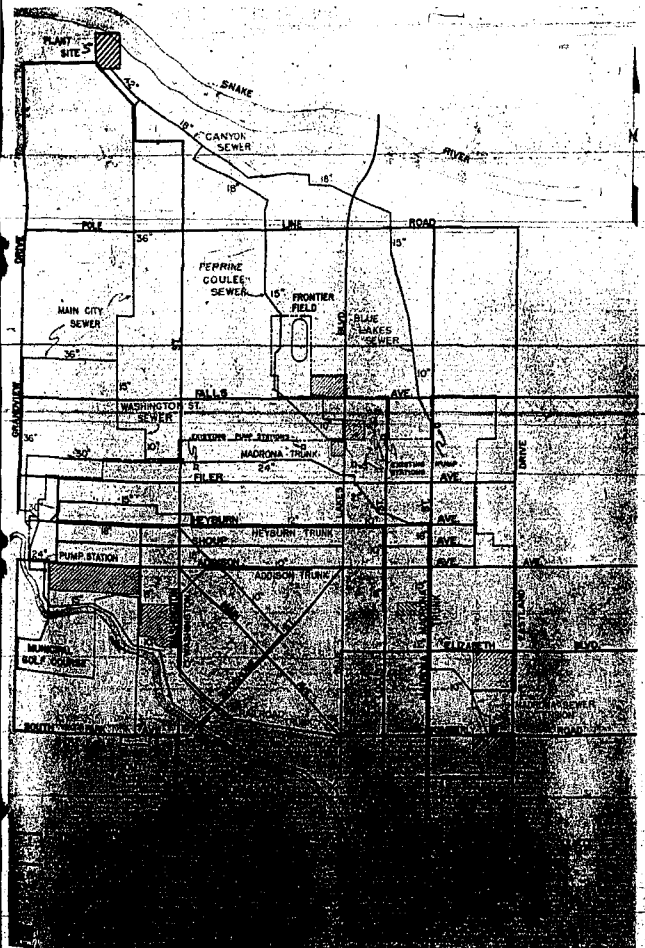

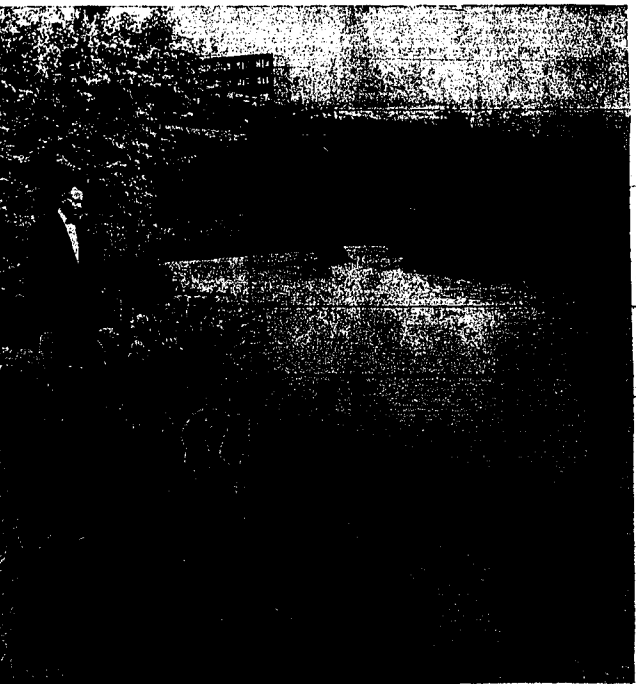

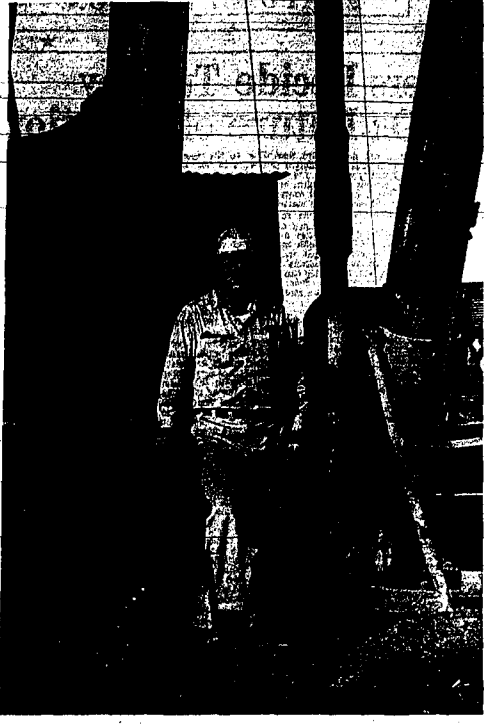

He says a frequent voter question concerns the placement of the treatment plant. Plans call for the plant to be constructed on Snake river, rather than located on the city site. He says the city should understand why the plant can't be placed on Snake creek, near the city, and thus avoid construction of a sewage trunk line to Snake river.

This is not practical because the city would have to dig out a great volume of water flow to aerate the processed sewage. It is more practical to place the primary plant near the Snake river. It would recalculate building another plant, a secondary treatment plant to aerate the processed sewage. If it weren't aerated it would continue to pollute the stream.

Present plans call for a primary treatment plant which will eliminate the solids from the sewage and sterilize liquids with chlorine. This processed sewage can then be dumped into Snake river with no harm to the river. Snake river, even at its lowest stage, has enough flow to absorb the processed sewage 100 times that of Snake creek.

Riddle points out it is cheaper to build one plant on Snake river than a primary and secondary plant on Snake creek. The natural slope of the land toward Snake river canyon will offer a gravity flow system to the new method. In the proposed method only one pumping station will be needed. It will be necessary to pump sewage from areas such as South Park. Once the sewage is pumped to a certain level it can flow to the proposed treatment plant in the canyon.

"Another question—often asked—is whether we use a lagoon system? Wouldn't it be cheaper?" The answer, according to Riddle, is "No." The lagoon system requires level ground, about one acre for each 100 to 200 persons and it must be five to five feet deep. The state health department is currently reviewing its regulations.

To build a lagoon system it would be necessary to purchase 200 to 400 acres north of the city. So the city could use a gravity flow into the lagoon.

Land in this area is some of the best in Magic Valley and it probably would cost the city nearly a quarter of a million dollars to buy the necessary land in this area. It would require many pumping stations to move the sewage to the lagoon. ## Farmers, Grangers Working Steadily To Prepare Exhibits for County Fair

Farmers and Grange members are all ready—such as grain sheaves that must be prepared as early as possible for the Twin Falls County Fair in September. Currently various Grange members are busy assembling their various grain sheaves. Fairview Grange members were one of the first in the area to assemble sheaves. Eleven persons met at the Grange hall between Dahl and Castleford and spent about two hours making three sheaves. It is tedious and exacting work and the care the workers put into sheaves shows up in the finished product at fair time. First a sheave committee, which most Granges have, selects a field with good grain and the grain stalks are collected. This must be done at just the right time, before the grain shatters and after the stalks and heads have matured.

It picked too early the grain stalks will be green; if picked too late the sheaves will shatter by fair time. Usually the grain is picked during the week before it is combined. Making an attractive and well-balanced sheave isn't an easy job. Members of the Fairview Grange who worked on their displays estimate it would take one experienced worker from two to three hours to assemble a good sheave. And this is after the leaves have been stripped off the stalk. Usually when a Grange group busy stripping leaves from the stalk and two or three persons picking needed stalks in a wooden form that holds the stalks together before all the stalks are bound in a round sheave about three inches in diameter. The grain heads are arranged in the form so when the stalks are bound together by ribbons the head of the sheave will be balanced. Just before the sheaves are taken to the fair they are sprinkled with water to keep them moist and pliable. At the fair the sheaves are judged on the maturity of the straw, quality of the grain and perfection of the sheave. To help the variety and Lemo wheat ripen and is bound in sheaves later; the "redstart" wheat and oats ripen immediately before the fair opens, the clover and alfalfa sheaves will be prepared and made ready for the Grange produce display.

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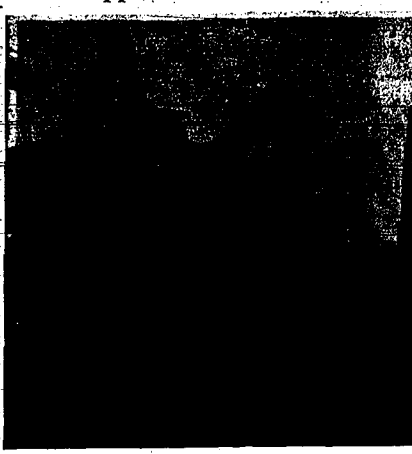

## Rancher's System of Wintering Cattle Cost Only \$5.50 Per Head Last Winter

**BOULDER, July 30**—Mark Skreen, Hollister rancher, wintered his cattle last season by turning the first of January and mid-March at a cost of \$5.50 per head.

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Zinc Sulphate Makes Difference in Beans

In a stronger position to make Marshall LeBaron, superintendent of the station, revealed a startling finding at the time he brought the group over to some beans he had grown a late June with zinc sulphate.

Three fast-grown beans a man variety were more than twice as large as the non-sprayed beans, and showed about a week or more than the other, LeBaron said.

This is the first year LeBaron used zinc sulphate on beans. He said much work has to be done yet to interpret under what circumstances the addition of zinc will help the bean crop.

John Kolar, who will soon join the department of agriculture, was the first to discuss the beans. He said he was notified by LeBaron that the beans were being grown in this area.

Creeping alfalfa also were planted in trial plots at the experiment station and under irrigation none of these varieties would do any creeping. Treatments also were made with the extension agronomist's wheat.

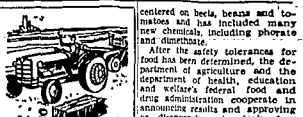

This is the third year that Shoshone has stepped on its insect population, and according to Dr. R. G. Nether, president of the city council, this is the third year that Shoshone has effectively halved the number of insects that can plague citizens.

This week's summer living in Shoshone more enjoyable and at the same time, eliminates the chance of epidemic caused by large insect population.

### MAGIC VALLEY PORTRAIT Dill Expert Ernest Koke's Research Ranges From Chocolate Milk to Steel

Ernest Koke, the man who grows all that dill in the Kumbler-Blitz area, is a chemist who has done basic research in practically everything from chocolate milk to stainless steel.

His contributions—have affected varied things—such as how your car is filled or how your pickles are made.

"Koke thrives on diversity and change. He attributes his interest in organic and inorganic chemistry to the many changes he has experienced in his career."

For many years he worked with ferrous metals for the Alloy Steel and Metal company in Los Angeles, making many changes in the steel to process, changes that affected the entire industry. In recent years he has turned his interest to the growing and processing of dill, and his plant north of Kimberly now produces more than half of the dill oil used by United States industry.

Born in Nebraska, Koke came here when he was just a youngster with his parents. His father, "Uncle" C. E. Koke, Kimberley, Ill. attended public school in Kimberley and was graduated in 1923. Educated by science, Koke entered the University of Southern California. He got his BS degree in chemical engineering in 1927 and his MS degree in 1928.

Koke put himself through college, working, as he says, "at anything to make 40 cents an hour." This included such things as janitor work and chauffeuring. He was president and vice president of the university. Later, he worked part-time while he was in school as a steel factory laboratory.

Although he majored in organic chemistry in school, he took a job with the steel industry upon graduation. Steel research deals with inorganic chemistry, because of his lack of background in inorganic chemistry, he spent the first four years of 16 years in the steel industry studying inorganic chemistry.

For the first few years at the factory he was trained in steel foundry methods and for the last 10 years he was doing chemical metallurgy. At times, he was in charge of 400 to 600 men.

During the years he was with the Los Angeles foundry he ran the foundry and did basic research in heat-treating and in alloying ferrous metals. Always trying to improve on current methods of processing steel, Koke improved on both the acid and basic methods of making steel.

Through the use of chemical methods he developed faster and better methods of producing various steels and steel alloys. He created a method of making manganese steel that was four times as fast as the old, established method and it was a method that created a tougher steel. This was a steel that played an important role in developing airplanes, more wear-resistant mining machinery, and in the naval industry.

Holder of an essential job, Koke was named to his position for the remainder of the war. For most of the war he was the only chemist and metallurgist at the foundry and he lived at the plant 24 hours a day. For more than 18 months he checked the steel every two to three hours throughout the three shifts at the foundry. During that period he slept in "hot spots" seldom lasting over one and one-half hours.

"Koke laughs and says, 'My union laborer is rather slow and I take a little time easy and I can get along with three to four hours sleep a day. I discovered that a lot of people waste a lot of time sleeping.'"

The foundry was making high priority castings for various industries, such as the airplane industry. And the various armed forces kept pushing the foundry for more production.

He was finally released from the foundry in 1944 and returned to Twin Falls.

"Koke says, 'Why not extract the flavor chemically out of the dill plants and sell it to the pickle industry in concentrated form?'"

This would cut down production expense and result in more uniform flavor. For the time the dill has been harvested affected the pickle flavor.

With the concentrated oil it would be possible to set up standard formulations and consistently make a good product.

From 1934 to 1938 he experimented with the dill—with the help of his father—and built a small home-made dill pickle on the farm. The first year they produced four ounces of oil. This year's output jumped to the point where in recent years as much as 18 tons of the oil has been produced.

During those years Koke took his vacations during harvest time and then began to sell the oil to west coast packers in his spare time. They were slow to accept the method, but once they saw the advantages they readily altered their systems.

When he returned here after the war, he added to the plant and now he claims to be the largest independent producer of the oil in the world. Practically all of the oil is used in the pickle industry.

Until 1932 all the dill was grown on his own farm. Now he contracts with farmers in the area to grow the plants. His own crew harvests the dill. The planting of new plants is started so harvest time stretches through August and September.
