Magic Water Users Cut to 90 Per Cent

SHOSHONE, Aug. 6—Mighty reservoir water users were cut to 90 per cent regular water right when members of the Blue Wood Canal company board met this week.

The rate of delivery will not be changed unless future conditions warrant. Each user will be cut off when he has used his 90 per cent water right.

On Wednesday, the reservoir contained 69,160 acre feet as compared to 78,000 acre feet a year ago.

TRouble MAKERS

We sometimes wonder why so many individuals apparently derive so much satisfaction from being trouble makers.

We referred to one type of trouble maker in our editorial commending the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce and its industrial committee for its outstanding accomplishment in helping to bring an Armour and company meat processing plant to this section of Idaho.

Some other type of trouble maker makes a point of finding fault with Chambers of Commerce and their various committees, the city administration, businessmen and everything in general.

For several years, right during the time the Chamber of Commerce industrial committee was working with Armour officials, they were generally doing nothing.

They delighted in pointing to the number of new industries locating in Idaho Falls, the Nampa-Adairville area, and Burley, while their Chamber of Commerce was doing nothing.

Some even went so far as to spread the "inside information" that the Chamber of Commerce was actually trying to keep new industry out of Twin Falls.

They had the Armour plant going to Burley long before the final announcement that it would be located near Twin Falls.

Now that the decision has been made and the Armour company has acknowledged the importance of the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce played in the company's selection of a location for its new plant, it is not surprising that trouble makers look extremely ally.

Chances are they will look a lot siller if other industrial possibilities upon which the Chamber of Commerce has been working materialize in the near future. The prospect for such additional developments are far more promising than the chronic critics realize.

VIEW'S OF OTHERS

THE REPEAT OFFENDER

No one can argue with Gov. Robert Smyth's appeal for antidote legislation for the grand driver. Anybody who has seen the traffic situation in the 1951 legislature to give law enforcement agencies and the courts more power to deal with the willful offender.

WE HAD NEVER QUITE THOUGHT of this latter type of trouble maker until we happened upon a recent advertisement by the Nationwide Mutual Insurance company. We read this advertisement very carefully and we realized what this type of individual is doing to our democracy.

The advertisement, entitled "TROUBLE MAKER," reads as follows:

"He is the SILENT one. He never speaks up on issues. He never sounds off in the local newspapers. He never writes in his correspondence. He is quiet about his ideas, our criticisms? Voting on election day is only part of a citizen's duty. Active, day-by-day participation in government, in business associations, in civic responsibility for each and every one of us."

The SILENT trouble-maker falls to understand the meaning of law and order. He never dares to question an opinion or a law, never distinguishes order from stagnation.

"He is the apostle of social decay, not Democracy."

There is nothing wrong about criticism if the criticism is that of a citizen. It is the best safeguard against inefficiency and corruption in public office, for instance.

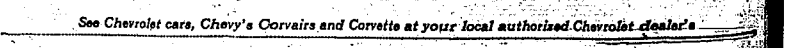

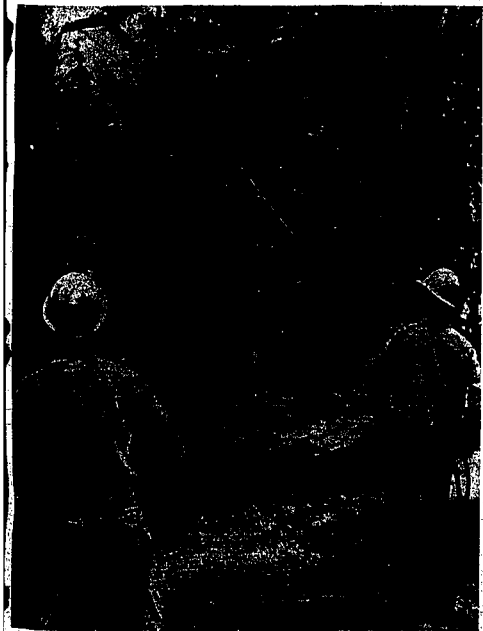

Well Drilled in Hills for Farm Six Miles Away

Well in Hills Yields Liquid Gold for Irrigation of Lands in Golden Valley

OAKLEY, Aug. 6.—The riches in the hills above the flat lands of Golden valley, just west of Oakley, showed up last week in irrigation water when the first three wells being drilled for the Anderson brothers, area food growers and processors, came in with a strong 200 inches of water.

To these days of modern potato processing plants in Magic Valley, this strike for water in the mountains can be almost as rich as a strike for gold and it will mean another section of new land will go into rapid production next season.

Ray Anderson, one of the co-owners of some 4,000 acres of new ground in the valley, said the water from this well will be ground down in the flat and used for irrigation of the next season.

He explains that water pumped from about 200 feet, was considerably better than drilling more than 1,000 feet on the flat and then pumping only 120 inches of water.

The water from this new well at the juncture of Big Cedar and Cottonwood canyons went spilling down a steep slope of open trench to the proposed farm ground six miles away.

For next season, Anderson said, a ditch will be cement-lined to avoid soaking any of the ground and to limit water loss only to evaporation, which will be almost negligible.

Anderson expects it will take about six hours for the water to travel down the hills to the proposed farmstead. A 200-horsepower pump is used.



The Idaho Power company installed a new line to the area north 220-kilowatt transformers at each of the well sites. The other wells will be sunk. The Anderson brothers, area food growers and processors, are particularly interested in this well although the distance to the farmstead didn't seem to exceed a fourth of a mile. The well holes up the Anderson proposed to sink four wells in the area.

This concept of drilling for water for individual farms away from the crop site is comparatively recent and is turning out successfully so far wherever it is being tried. Although some well tests are involved when bringing the trench across some public lands, the process is simple and somewhat by having the wells drilled on private land.

Another farmer who is finding water up on the hills overlooking the farmstead is K. C. Barlow, Butler, in an area west of the Anderson site, he has some excellent wells pumping water to farm ground after traveling some three miles to open concrete-lined ditches.

Another rancher who is transporting water via an open ditch from high country is William Williams, south of Twin Falls.

Local Man Is New Director Of Weed Unit

Herold Lancaster, Twin Falls county commissioner and chairman of the advisory-weed committee, was elected a director of the Idaho Noxious Weed Control Association last week at Sandpoint. Lancaster attended the state weed convention with Warren Lowery, county weed director. He reports last year's weed control in Idaho a whopping 2 1/2 million dollars, according to figures presented by John P. C. O'Connell, director of plant industry, department of agriculture.

And if we can continue to improve our county weed program, we can get a chunk of that money out down here, in a manner of speaking.

Lancaster reports agronomists, commissioners and weed directors were told there are 10 species of Canada thistle in the state.

One of these was planted in the center of a square rod of bare land and in the past year the plant had sent up new plants in numbers large enough to fill the square rod.

In determining the sex of the Canada thistle, Lancaster said the color of the bloom is no indication of female or male plant. Many farmers often think the color of the bloom, white or pink, indicated sex and if the plant is supposedly male it will not bear any seeds. This results in some neglect to eradicate the plant.

"The color is indicative only of the species," said Lancaster, referring to that particular subject discussed at the convention.

He said also it was brought out at the convention that to anyone's knowledge, no one has ever been affected in health by handling Canada thistle. However, some people are afraid that chemicals, even if handled according to labels have a harmful effect on the handler.

Wm. Stearns, Boise, department of commerce and development, pointed out how important it is to treat weeds on public lands because seven million tourists visit Idaho each year. The tourist trade was reported bringing 100 million dollars into Idaho. Since recreation is a prime tourist attraction, especially on public lands, the presence of noxious weeds was thought to detract from enjoyment in particular areas.

Factors Changed For Determining Nevada Hay Cost

RENO, Nev., Aug. 6.—Nevada hay prices, set usually by Los Angeles prices, less transportation costs, are working to reverse this year, reports William V. Neely, University of Nevada extension economist.

This year Nevada hay prices are being set by California prices, area prices plus transportation costs.

The reason for the switch in pricing factors is the result of a short Nevada hay crop. The short hay crop, said the economist, also means that Nevada will be importing instead of exporting hay to the coastal state this year.

California hay delivered in western Nevada last week was reported at \$20.50 a ton.

Rabbits Damage Rogerson Crops

Jackrabbits are at work damaging some crops near asebrah area south of Twin Falls near Rogerson and Hollister, and also in fringe areas of the Roseworth tract.

Moving out of asebrah, which provides homes and hays for the harassing rodents, they take a costly toll in these areas of valuable feed for cattle. Each year these rabbits destroy stands of newly planted dryland grass.

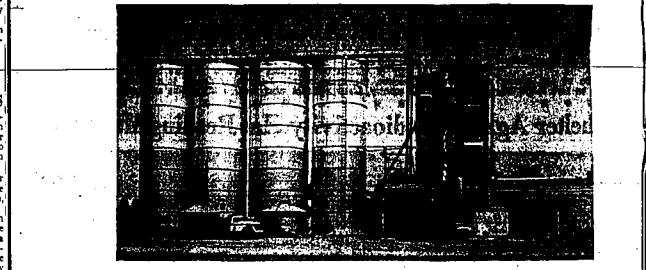

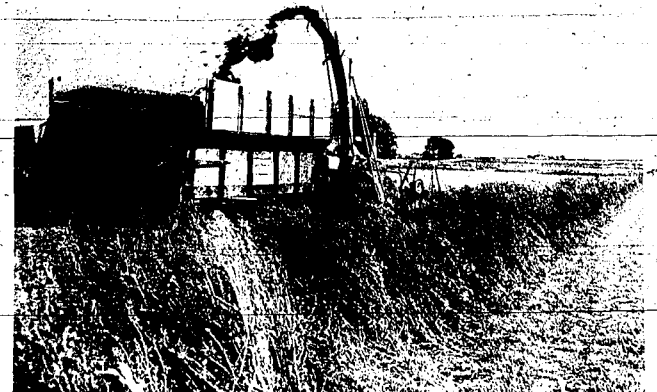

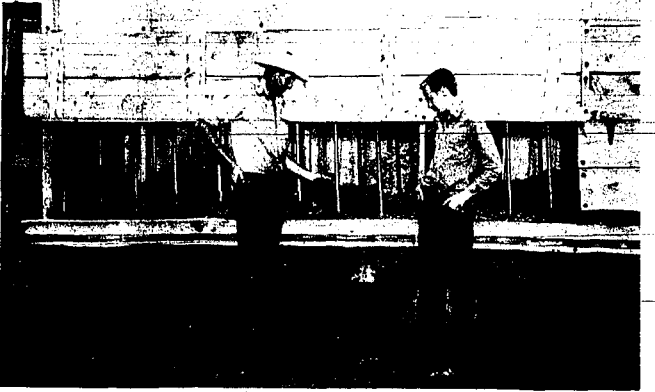

2 Dairymen Explain Why Green Chop Programs Used on Their Dairy Farms

Just why any dairymen should want to go into a green chop program of handling the pasture to the barn can be explained by A. C. Williams, Twin Falls, who has a herd of 70 Holstein cows, and Carl Harder and his son, Howard Harder, both Ruhl.

The Harders have a registered Guernsey herd with over 100 head in the milking string and some 10 head of calves and heifers.

The men agree this gives considerable in going into a green chop program, either grass or alfalfa or both, is the size of the herd.

Last winter, at the dairy short course sponsored in Twin Falls by the University of Idaho extension service, Howard Harder pointed out it wouldn't be worth the time

spending out in the field each day for a load of green feed if the size of the herd was small. He noted the money spent for the chopper and wagon wouldn't warrant the small return from the increased milk flow if there weren't enough cows.

Otherwise, he feels the green chop program is a good one and he has been at it for seven seasons now.

Williams has had about five seasons of feeding green alfalfa. In early June, after he was on green chop a few days, his Holsteins were putting out about 1,000 pounds of milk a day, an increase of 25 per cent over what they were milking earlier.

Many Crops to Be Covered in Experiment Station Field Day

KIMBERLY, Aug. 6.—The field day scheduled for 8:30 a. m. Thursday at the Kimberly experiment station will cover many crops other than beans, notes Marshall LeBaron, superintendent.

Latest statistics of grain will be

compared to the other strains on test plots. Corn varieties, both dry and sweet, will be viewed for silage and grain, will be viewed, as well as results of several years' study pertaining to alfalfa production.

LeBaron says a number of beans have grown up enough to be cut for green chop soon. These areas are then put up for dry winter hay.

Good results can be had feeding alfalfa well along in the bloom, but Harder tries to avoid that.

Feeding green chop eliminates the customary problem other dairymen have through the summer of getting cows to turn their noses up at second cutting. In the green chop program, there is no difference between cuttings. At least not for the cows.

Fourth Crop Possible

Harder says it would be possible to get a fourth cutting some years, but he refuses to cut alfalfa late in the season. He has observed where he cut a fourth crop, the alfalfa from those cut-

Better Hides, Leather Goal For Research

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 6.—Practical support has been voted by directors of the Western Meat Packers association for a three-year program designed to produce better hides and better leather.

In view of the expected increase in cattle slaughter in the next few years, the research program has been set up by the meat packing and tanning industries to develop ways to produce better hides and better leather at less cost to meet competition. If a very competition from substituting has cut into use of hides, a principal by-product of the meat packing industry.

For example, in 1958 one of the largest in auto production, use of about 10 million hides declined 10 per cent.

The Western Packers also are supporting a program calculated to increase consumption of leather in Japan, a major consumer of western hides.

Harder says that alfalfa, if any, is cut in a little, if any, blot trouble. If the green chop alfalfa as it approaches the end stage or any time thereafter.

As expected from this system, the milk flow stays high through the spring and summer.

Problems Outlined

Harder points out some blots in his alfalfa field, also some blots that are watered while others have to be cut. These blots are good, water will spill over to where he is pulling the alfalfa, and the rest is good.

Some of the alfalfa gets too mature by the time other strips

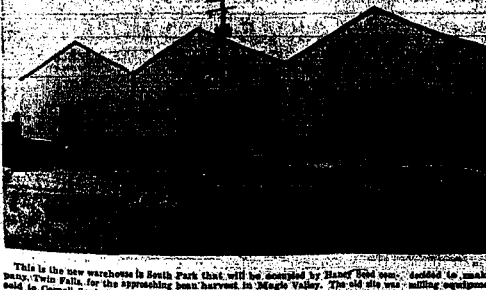

Spraying Project Completed on 1,909 Trees Harmed by Montana Pine Beetle

(From Page 1) In all 1,909 trees throughout an area of 670 acres have been treated to date this season. Approximately five gallons of insecticide—a solution of mixture of rotenone, oil, ethylene di bromide and kerosene—was used in each tree. From here the crew worked on Warm Springs creek, Cabin gulch, south fork of Warm Springs, Pleaser creek, Coale creek, and Red Warrior gulch. A total of 910 trees was treated. Before this work was completed spotters were sent to the Baker creek area. Many Crows to Road Most of the infected trees were close to the road here and we made fast progress. We need only the "swamp" sprayer for 10 days to reach the back country. Nelson states: "In all 237 trees were treated in this gulch, six of them were in an area treated in the fall of 1938. They were in the back fork of Baker creek, north to highway 23 and the Norman creek area."

Cooperative Study of Idaho Pollution Run by Health, Fish and Game Bureaus

By JIM HUMPHREY Idaho Fish and Game Department and Idaho health officials are now in Washington in regard to the problem of pollution control. The U. S. surgeon general, Dr. Leroy E. Burney, has invited the patients they must have to live and reproduce. Such contaminated water presents a definite health hazard to anyone who comes in contact with it. This may happen for instance, to persons fishing or swimming in a stream. The water also could be taken into the lungs of a person who breathes the air. The Idaho health department is now in the Boise laboratory of the state department of health to determine the pollution control program. The fish and game department found that the pollution control program from four general sources. These are domestic and industrial wastes, sewage, and applied fertilizers. The industrial and soil erosion pollutants are subdivided to show the activities causing pollution. The water receiving the most pollution and having the poorest water quality are the south fork of the Coeur d'Alene, the Boise and Portneuf rivers. The water quality of the south fork of the Clearwater river also is impaired greatly with all from dredging and road building on the Fish and Crooked rivers. Proof that state and community leaders recognize the growing problem in the general area was obtained nearly two million dollars in federal funds toxicology. The growth of such biological organisms provides the necessary food supply for game fish. Municipal and industrial wastes discharged in streams encourage rat propagation—another pollution problem. Wastes pollute food and the rate and, since they have acquired a taste for garbage, an ideal habitat for them is created. Other results are the deterioration of water quality for livestock, fly-breeding, unpleasant odors and a sharp drop in aesthetic value. What is being done about these problems for the local and state levels. A survey of the types and locations of water pollution was made by the fish-and-game department by contacting the area fisheries biologists and other department personnel in each district, and learning from them the general location and type of pollution. The Idaho health department also approved further studies on the Snake and Clearwater rivers in Montana, for example, and the problem soon becomes Idaho's, Oregon's and Washington's as well as Montana's. This interstate problem was aggravated further until recently when such Idaho towns as Sandpoint and Priest River built sewage disposal plants. Other major Idaho rivers are polluted with sewage all from mining and road building. Sewer-treatment and dairy wastes, effluents from cheese and fertilizer factories, chemical plants, beet pulp, pesticides and others. Water pollution is related directly to public health just as it is

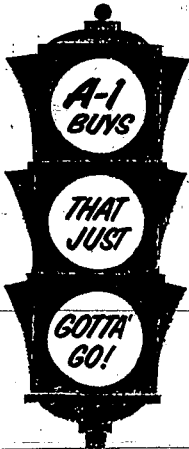

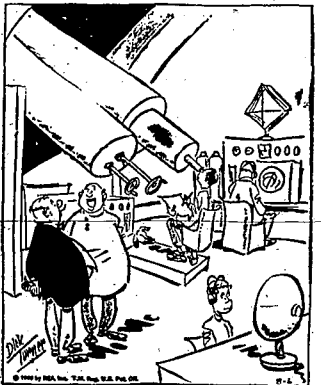

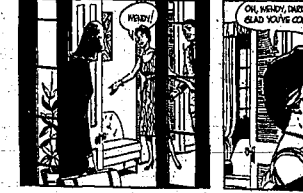
