Russia Launches Space Ship With Two Dogs Inside

MOSCOW, Aug. 19 (UPI)—The Soviet Union today launched its second space ship carrying two dogs and television equipment to picture their behavior during the flight. The official Soviet space news agency said the approximately two-ton space ship went into orbit at a height of 100 miles and every 10 minutes.

The International Aeronautics congress in Stockholm, Prof. Anatole Blagovozov, a top Soviet rocket expert, today made a new conference that Russia will be launching the dogs back to Earth.

"The two dogs are to be brought back to Earth but I don't know where or when this will happen," Blagovozov said.

But he declined to speculate on the chances for success of this feat.

"The scientist would talk about that," he said. "It is just impossible to tell."

The first space ship was orbited by a living animal named Laika and the first artificial satellite was a living thing brought back to Earth by the Soviet space ship, Belka, in November, 1957, with the dog Laika.

Laika was taken to earth, and it died after a week in orbit.

The next mission was to develop a system to support a man in space. It is the second launching of its kind.

The second of the two aboard the ship are called Strelka and Belka.

The first Soviet space vehicle, Sputnik I, weighing four and one-half tons and containing two dogs, was launched Aug. 4, 1957. It circled the earth every 90 minutes at a height between 100 and 200 miles.

U.S. Hopes for Latest Catch of Aerial Capsule

YANDEMBERG AIR FORCE BASE, Calif., Aug. 19 (UPI)—The United States today tries to make its second recovery in eight days of a space capsule in hopes of showing that it can use safely to recover animals and men from space. Discoverer-XIV launched yesterday was scheduled to eject its instrument-filled capsule about 7 p.m. EDT today into a 200- to 600-mile area near Hawaii. Ships and airplanes waited in the area to either snag the 200-pound capsule or to catch it as it floated to the Earth on a parachute or pluck it from the Pacific.

A duplication of last week's first successful recovery from the "Lucky 13" Discoverer satellite today was the scheduled attempt to catch the satellite. The air force said it hopes to catch a monkey into orbit aboard Discoverer next week about three weeks if today's recovery is successful.

Mastery of the difficult recovery technique would accomplish one of the main goals of Discoverer series launches which are scheduled to continue.

Scientists hope techniques to retrieve instruments and animals from orbiting satellites could someday be utilized in getting space pioneers back to earth.

The Discoverer rockets also are the means by which the United States has been able to place in orbit the first satellite, the first satellite to be used as a platform for the U.S. earth-orbiting satellite, a series of satellites which would be used to study Earth's terrain, while Maris satellites would detect clings of nuclear fallout.

Discoverer XIV was blasted into orbit about 6:30 a.m. EDT at 3:58 p.m. EDT yesterday from this central California coastal base.

The launching was delayed 15 minutes by a minor technical problem in the sky when all-orbiting Discoverer XIII passed high overhead.

The air force captured radio signals from Discoverer XIII and the second satellite, Discoverer XIV, at the station which was held up briefly.

Powers Testifies About U2

MOSCOW, Aug. 19 (UPI)—The Soviet Union tonight sentenced Francis Gary Powers to prison and then permitted him to see his tearful wife behind the scenes at the courtroom where he was tried for his U2 spy flight. A military court gave the 31-year-old American pilot a 10-year sentence for espionage but, modified that by specifying only three years are to be spent in prison. The rest of the sentence is covered by "deprivation of liberty." That may mean assignment to a special colony with other prisoners, or possibly exclusion of it entirely, according to a source who said Powers may be sent out of the Soviet Union when his prison term is finished. There was no official word on this, but it is felt among some diplomats and correspondents in Moscow is that the Soviet Union has no special desire to keep Powers in the country because of the excitement about him.

The Soviet Union's top penalty for espionage is death by shooting. Prosecutor Leonov A. Rudenko asked for a 15-year sentence. Soviet attorney, Gostok Mikhail I. Orlov, argued for less, but specifically the death penalty.

There is no appeal provided for in the Soviet law, but Powers' wife has indicated her intention to carry a personal plea to Premier Nikhita Khrushchev if she can get him.

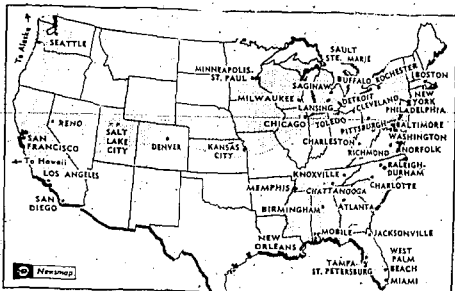

WE MUST KEEP ORDER

One of the great contradictions of this age is found in the attitude of the romantic liberator toward the use of authority. Generally speaking they favor reliance upon a strong central authority—in our case the Federal government—and then they must have purpose. They look to Washington to do almost everything.

At the same time, however, they exhibit a distrust of power. They are afraid to show the nation the exercise of authority. There is a feeling that power individually exercised is somehow "ruthless" and certainly "democratic."

In the romantic mind, this suspicion runs through the whole fabric of life. The cry "fascist methods" goes up wherever police are used to act upon the notion that their job is to enforce the law and to protect innocent people from society's predators.

The romantics frown upon school officials and parents who believe that enforcing discipline is for the nation's youngsters. The idea, it seems, is to let them "express themselves naturally, even if, as in New York, it means that they must burn the \$500,000 worth of school property in a single year."

When a youngster assaults a man on the street, the romantic's prime concern is not how to get the man's pockets. This kid had a bad background. His broken home appears of more consequence than the victim's broken head.

At no level of our society should we fear the full application of authority in support of orderly, peaceful relations among men. Democracy is not the abdication of authority. It is merely a system which gives the people a controlling voice in the selection of who shall use it.

Any who abuse their power we can remove. But we do not fear them in positions of trust so that they may acquiesce in disorder, violence, or other degradation against society. To the extent that they do so, they are acting at all times as traitors.

The wise use of power is a matter respecting great skill and care. There is no wisdom in allowing it to crumble in disuse. That, truly, is the fate of the totalitarian. The romantic liberal professes to fear.

"SOUTH OF THE BORDER"

It would not be surprising if someone had legalized gambling "south of the border," it was ridiculous to presume that those who frown on jackpot, Nevada, would get any wiser from a system which legalized in one neighboring state how to run their business.

Legalized gambling, as everyone knows, is big business in Nevada, and so long as hundreds of thousands of people from all parts of the country flock to Las Vegas, Reno and other towns along the way in Nevada, to spend their money on gambling, food and entertainment, there is little likelihood of the picture changing.

For anyone in Idaho to think his protests are going to change Nevada's ways in this respect is silly. Looking for consolation in one's own state is just the way that the politicians of this state are doing to Twin Falls and Magic Valley. They would only demonstrate our gullibility.

All of this raises a logical question: Would we raise our own gambling and then complain with all its problems, or should we consider ourselves fortunate in having it confined to Nevada?

It is never logical to think we can persuade Nevada to kill the goose that is laying all those golden eggs.

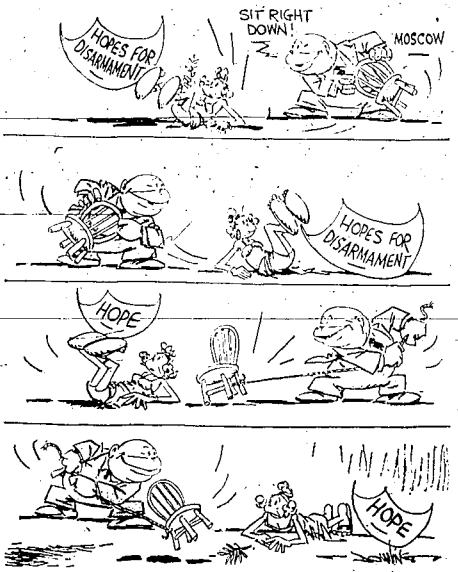

New Hospital Dedication Is Held in Area

BURLEY, Aug. 18.—The pioneer spirit is not all gone, stated Bishop Thomas B. Isaacson, member of the presiding bishopric of the LDS church, Salt Lake City, when he gave the address during the dedication services for the new Cassia Memorial hospital held at the Burley high school auditorium Tuesday evening. More than 600 persons attended.

He stated that the church now operates its hospitals and does so only in the spirit of helpfulness. There will be a host board appointed which will operate under the direction of the church bishopric. We will do everything in our power to make sure this hospital is efficiently and effectively operated," he said.

The bishop said the church did not expect to make money on the hospital but hoped it would pay for its operation. He stated that the church was donating another \$25,000 to start the operation of the hospital. All the bills sent from the hospital will be forgiven, he added.

During his closing remarks he said: "Those who do God's work will get God's pay. I expect to pay through this world but once, so if there is an act of kindness to be done, let me do it now."

The invocation was given by the Rev. Pascal, O.S.B. of the Little Flower Catholic church. The introductions were made by chairman of the county commissioners, Rawlins J. Harper.

He stated, "We have looked forward to this for sometimes and have done a lot of hard work to get this hospital." A bond dedication was voted a number of years ago to make all this possible, he noted. Among those introduced were the past county commissioners, Horace Hall, Loren Lewis, John Harrington and Ray Holter, state Sen. K. C. Barlow, doctors of the town and surrounding communities, Idaho State Medical Association members and County Clerk Frank Keane and his office staff.

Others introduced were the architect, G. B. Sundberg and associates; contractor, L. H. Krueger and associates; county treasurer, Mrs. Jeanette Chamberlain and office staff; other county and city officials; county officials from surrounding counties; hospital administrator, Melvin Engstrom, and other county commissioners John Clark and J. Wilson Beck.

The county commissioners were given a standing ovation by the crowd.

Mayor J. Leonard Salmon stated that it was a pleasure to take part in the dedication of the latest and newest of the community's achievements which extends beyond the city limits.

When people consider moving into a community they check its schools, churches and hospital, he stated. The county or city is not lacking in any of these things, this is the result of a good deal of hard work. This will be the finest and best equipped monument of service to the community for many years to come, he concluded.

Chief of the hospital medical staff, Dr. James R. Richter, stated that Burley's first hospital was established by Dr. Minter in 1914 on 130 1/2 street and Ordway avenue, and in 1918 Dr. Frensted started his hospital in the 1700 block on Miller avenue.

Dr. Leonard Frazer built the present Cassia Memorial in 1933, 1904 but died in 1906 in an auto accident. At that time Dr. Charles Terhune, Dr. L. M. Kelly and Dr. H. E. Dean bought the hospital. This hospital up to this time has admitted 45,000 patients, it was noted.

The Cassia Memorial hospital is the first public hospital to be located here and it is the result of many-splintered individuals, he said. He mentioned the volunteer labor for hauling the dirt for the grounds, volunteer work in making the dunes and the work being done on the lawn. 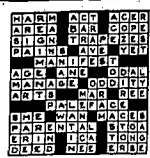

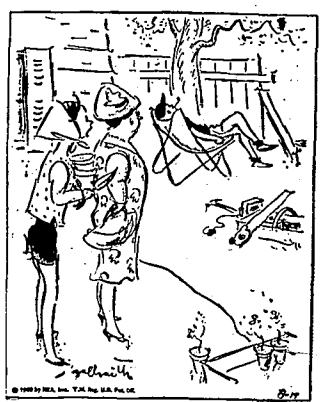

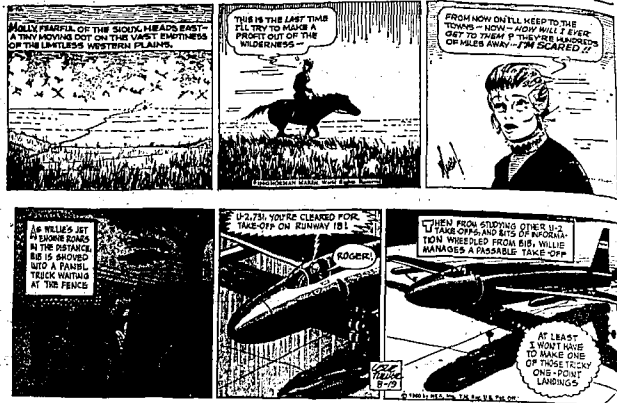

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Tooth Paste Brand Wins Dental Group's Approval

 CHICAGO — In an unprecedented action, the American Dental Association has recognized a toothpaste as having decay-preventing benefits.

The ADA headquarters officially accepted a fluoride dentifrice discovered by an Indiana University dental scientist and marketed commercially by Procter & Gamble Co. under the name of Crest.

The action is significant not only because the ADA has for decades refused to recognize any toothpaste, but has also implied that the public was wasting money buying it.

ADA educational materials have stressed that the toothbrush is a big preventive weapon and that baking soda or salt water are as effective as any tooth paste or powder.

As one toothpaste after another came along with lavish claims for the long-sought ingredient to curb tooth decay, the ADA promptly cautioned the public against extravagant advertising.

Toothpastes containing chlorophyll, ammonia, penicillin, detergents, germ-killers, sugar-digesting enzymes and others failed to win the much-sought ADA approval.

The official nod given to Crest is expected to have repercussions in a dentifrice market where sales exceed \$300 million a year.

The endorsement is a personal victory for a 28-year-old biochemist, Joseph C. Muhler, who began working with stannous fluoride as a substitute for sodium fluoride when a sophomore dental student at Indiana University.

Although the conservative ADA continued to decline acceptance of his assertions, Muhler persisted in his research when a less determined investigator might have become discouraged.

Muhler has assigned his patent to the Indiana University Research Foundation.

Procter & Gamble, headed by Neil McElroy, former secretary of Defense, has paid almost \$100,000 in royalties to the foundation.

Under university regulations, Muhler is not allowed to participate in royalties but a university spokesman said he had been taken care of with a substantial increase in salary that puts him in "top level ranks."

He also has been awarded a special title as research professor of basic sciences, a new laboratory and the freedom to work on his chosen projects.

Muhler believes even greater advances in stannous fluoride lie ahead.

Muhler believes topical application by the dentist will be much more important than the toothpaste and that fluoridated water supplies are still the best and cheapest method of dental decay prevention.

The ADA, in its announcement to the dental profession, also stressed that stannous fluoride tooth paste is an aid but not a cure-all and does not substitute for community fluoridation.

But the decay reduction credited to Crest is marked.

In one test group using the dentifrice "under normal conditions in their homes," there was a 23-per cent reduction, as compared with brushing done with other cleaners.

In another group, where there was supervision of brushing once daily, the reduction was 34 per cent.

Under an ideal setting, where brushing was supervised three times a day, there was a 57 per cent reduction, a figure ranking favorably with 60 per cent reduction in community water studies and 68 per cent in Muhler's topical method.

It was only recognizing Crest and that the acceptance does not apply to any other stannous fluoride dentifrice that may be on the market or might come on later.

In an interview with the Observer-Chicago News Service, he predicted that stannous fluoride applied only once to the teeth by the dentist in matter of seconds, instead of many minutes as now, will confer protection for an indefinite period.

Dentists Make History Brand Of Toothpaste Recognized As Decay Preventive Agent

The American Dental Association made history today. It officially recognized a toothpaste as an effective decay preventive agent.

This had never been done before by the ADA, which for years had rejected claims of many dentifrice manufacturers, such as "a clean tooth never decays."

The unique distinction of being recognized by the ADA goes to "Crest," manufactured by Procter & Gamble, Cincinnati.

"Crest," the ADA council on dental therapeutics reported in today's issue of the Journal of the American Dental Association, has been shown to be an effective anti-carries (decay preventive) dentifrice that can be of significant value when used in a conscientiously applied program of oral hygiene and regular professional care; Crest dentifrice may also be of value as a supplement to public health procedures."

The council emphasized its action applied only to one in-

stannous in the toothpaste-stannous fluoride, a compound of tin and fluorine.

Back of the council's decision are 10 years of clinical studies. There were seven test groups, each matched by "controls."

One group used the dentifrice "under normal conditions in their homes." They experienced a 23 per cent reduction in the incidence of tooth decay.

Reduction in Decay

Members of the second brushed their teeth once a day, under supervision, with a 34 per cent reduction. In a third group, with supervised brushing three times daily, there was a 57 per cent reduction in decay.

The council said these experiences emphasized the need for frequent use of the dentifrice, along with a program of "good oral hygiene," to achieve maximum benefits. "Good oral hygiene" would include proper use of the toothbrush, regular attention from a dentist and avoidance of excessive consumption of candy, sweetened drinks and other sources of sugar, which cause teeth to rot.

The ADA now recognizes three methods of obtaining benefits from fluorides:

- Fluoridation of community water supplies.
- Systematic application of fluoride solutions by the dentist to the surface of children's teeth.
- Stannous fluoride dentifrice.

Fluoridation, the ADA council stated, is by far the most desirable method of preventing decay, from the standpoint of cost, effectiveness and convenience.

Preliminary studies by the council suggest that a combination of all three methods may be more worthwhile than one alone.

Fluorine, in fluoride compounds, is a "trace element" necessary for adequate construction of our bodies. Teeth that lack fluorine are more susceptible to decay than teeth that contain an adequate amount.

Not all decay, however, is believed due to fluorine deficiency. Also the use of fluoridation decreases in effectiveness as children grow toward maturity.

Dental Group Okays Crest As Decay-Preventive Agent

The American Dental Association today officially recognized Crest toothpaste as "an effective decay-preventive agent."

Crest is the first dentifrice ever to receive such recognition, the association said in Chicago.

In a statement published in the August 1 issue of the Journal of the American Dental Association, the ADA council on dental therapeutics reported:
