Senate Rejects Medical Care Plan Supported by Nixon; Second Vote Set

WASHINGTON, Aug. 22 (AP)—The senate today turned down a Republican medical care plan backed by the party's presidential nominee, Vice President Richard M. Nixon. The vote was 67 to 28. The rejection closes the way for a new vote later in the afternoon on whether to accept a Democratic proposal for a health benefits plan linked to the social security system. A vote on that was set for 6 p. m. (EDT), with predictions of a close division. This formula had the full backing of the Democratic presidential nominee, Sen. John F. Kennedy.

An earlier proposal called for \$60 million dollars in annual federal grants to help pay health insurance in non-unioned voluntary persons over 65.

The papers were obtained from Berlin, where the last of the big wartime conferences of the major powers was held July 17-Aug. 2, 1945.

The state department, which periodically publishes state documents in a series of books, has refused its access to the Potsdam papers yesterday. Press officer Lincoln White said the documents probably would be ready for publication in early September.

An inquiry was under way at the department to find out who had leaked the documents to the press, and for what purpose.

It was understood that secretary of State Charles A. E. Acheson personally had ordered publication of the papers withheld until after the November elections, in order "to keep them out of the political campaign."
