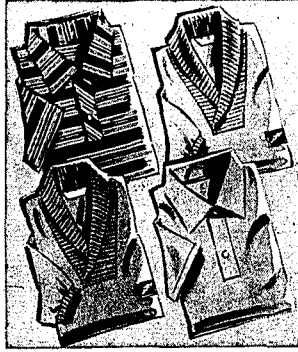

FDA REFORMS BENEFIT NATION'S HEALTH

In addition to officials of the leading drug companies, Rep. William L. Kistner, executive director of the National Consumers Union, N. Y. It has been reported that drugs cost the government \$1.5 billion a year.

PAYOLA IN POLITICS

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As the Idaho Employers council has pointed out, the bill is morally wrong because it specifically would allow unions to inflict damage upon innocent persons having no part in any disputes and no power to end the hostilities.

The bill would sanction the now-outlawed practice of permitting a single union to picket a whole job and shut it down, even though the union quarrel might be with but one employer among many on the job, and even though the person or company that let the contract had done nothing to offend the union.

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This would spread the expensive consequences of a strike against one employer to many employers and their employees. Recent studies indicate that association recently told how this applies to our space program and missile defenses.

A strike at Cape Canaveral was directed against Convair. But the union picketed the gate to the missile plant, thus bringing employment with General Electric, Kellogg, RCA and Burroughs also stayed off the job. The missile program came to a halt in part because of the cold war, until a court enjoined the pickets from shutting down the whole base.

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This worries congress, and reports are that an amendment will be added to exclude the future of the common situs provisions. This, in itself, is a tip-off to the wrongness of the bill.

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There is no law now which prevents a strike against defense contractors. The law is seeking one. To exclude defense work from the common situs bill emphasizes that there is a difference between the right to strike in a peacetime situation (such as a quarrel), and the unique privilege of striking employers who have been living up to existing contract provisions.

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This bill reeks of payola for union political support. Remember how congress frowned on payola?

Per the votes should remind members of congress that payola stinks no matter where you find it.

DAG'S PATIENCE WINS

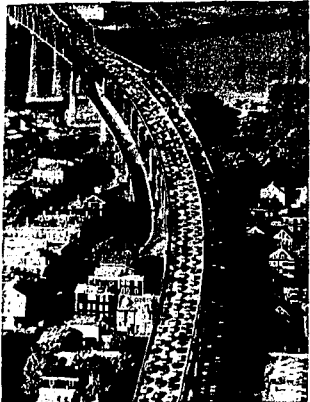

NEW YORK, Aug. 22.—(C)ur-
rent comments of a Parliament
of Plato:
Are you grown up? If you really
are, you are a rarity. Perhaps you
belong in the Smithsonian institu-
tion.
One of the most shocking dis-
coveries that can come to a per-
son in middle age—if he is honest
with himself—is the realization
that he has changed little from
the person he was as a child.
The only thing that consoles
him, as he peers more closely at
his middle-aged neighbors, is the
discovery that they too aren't really
grown up—they are merely de-
luded children.
When young, we were desert-
edly so grown up, figuring that
mere size and time will magically
make us able to solve all our prob-
lems and get everything we want
from life.
Well, it doesn't often work out
that way.
As adults we are indeed bigger
and older. But we have grown up
only physically; emotionally we
are still back in kindergarten—and
and there most of us stubbornly
stay most of our days.
What is the most outstanding
characteristic of the ordinary
child, the most annoying?
Surely it is his determination to
have his own way, to bend the
world to his will.
Frustrated, he howls and shakes
his tiny fists in anger.
He is an outrageous capitalist!
And shrewd from the moment he
takes his first step. He wants to
own everything that catches his
eye, and he wants to be admired
for everything he does.
If he loses at a game and
weeps and is told he should be a
"good sport," he sobs practically
"Why?" His theory is that if the
other kids won't play his way, he'll
pick up his marbles and go home.
He tends, by human nature, to be
vain, arrogant and full of self-
pity.
Life is full of one disappoint-
ment after another as it curbs his
behavior and forces him to be
more social. But inwardly his de-
sires rage and riot as strong as
ever.
As a youth he is confident that
when he is an adult he will at
last be free to have his own way
and live his own life. He is opti-
mistically certain that the petty
restrictions will end, that he will
find the perfect friend, meet and
marry the perfect wife, seek and
land the perfect job.
We find as the years roll on that
our friends are as pitted with

faults as we are, our wives are lit-
tle better than those of our neigh-
bors, and the perfect job is always
beyond our reach.
True maturity consists in mak-
ing the best of what life brings
us. In realizing there is always a
necessary compromise, between
dream and reality, if you can do
that, you have truly grown up.
But who among us wants to be
this mature? Secretly, in our
hearts of hearts, we still want
what we can't have. We remain
vain, selfish, arrogant, envious
and full of self-pity.
We learn to camouflage our ac-
tions because we have to. But now
and again the rebel breaks
through, and you see grownup
people behaving as children, as
they really are.
Then we say in surprise, "Why,
he acts like he's in his second
childhood!" This isn't accurate.
The truth is most of us never
have a second childhood because
we never leave the first one.

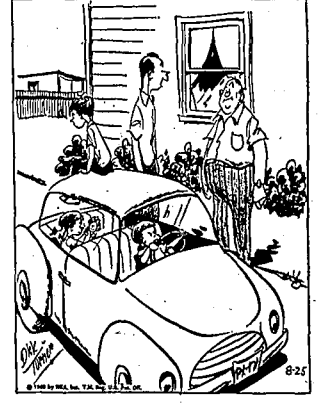

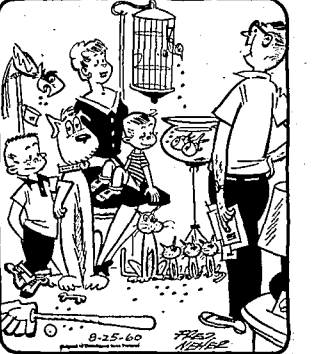
