Cool Weather Holds Crowds on Final Day for Three Magic Valley Fairs

Three Magic Valley county fairs ended Saturday in a series of riding, judging and other events that kept spectators watching to the end. Although cool weather held down crowds somewhat, Jerome county reported attendance of the final day above that of last year. Cassia county reported attendance on the final day less than the previous year, with about 3,000 spectators the final night. About 5,000 people were on the grounds at 7 o'clock last night, the biggest crowd since 1956. The Lincoln county fairs drew smaller crowds last night. Cold weather was blamed for the low attendance.

Youngsters Frolic At T.F. Fish Derby

An estimated 450 youngsters, shepherded by anxious mothers, fathers and a group of Women of the Moose, trawled, waded, splashed and walked—used just about every method available short of dumping—to catch some 500 pounds of rainbow trout dumped into the Harmon river at 10 o'clock Saturday at the annual T.F. Fish Derby, sponsored and supervised by the Twin Falls Loyal Order of Moose. The fish were supplied by three Twin Falls Trout Farm, Frame's Trout Farm, and Greene's Trout Farm. They were moved to Harmon river by the use of special fish hatchery truck supplied by the Idaho Fish Commission in Twin Falls, while city workers screened off the drainage ditch to insure that no fish would escape to the stream. An undetermined number of youngsters were on the scene by 10 o'clock Saturday. The youngsters were divided into teams of two to five. One mother bitterly reported a harassed official that her son had caught a 10-pound fish, but she claimed, another sportsmanlike youngster also caught the fish. The official said the fish was not caught by a legitimate parent.

French Reds Are in Dark About Feuds

PARIS, Aug. 27 (AP)—French communists and their followers—second largest red group outside the Iron Curtain country—may be kept almost in the dark about party-line differences between Moscow and Peking.

Apart from a few snarled hints from party leaders, the French faction set a picture that all is smooth sailing. Yet available clues indicate party feuds are being waged. Jacques Duclos is being upped with Moscow and Peking have done nothing since the early days of Stalin.

Felings News Absent

One indication is the almost complete absence of news from Peking in the official party newspaper, L'Humanite.

There was a day when the Chinese communists were faithfully hailed for taking great strides forward. This tricked off after Moscow took a dim view of the Chinese communists. Now a steady stream of L'Humanite could easily wonder just what the Chinese really have been doing lately.

Dispute Is Ignored

The doctrinal dispute between Moscow and Peking and the complete absence of news from Peking has been almost completely ignored. Whatever guidance has been furnished has come from Moscow.

Aside from pinning the Moscow line, the French have given no indication of its thinking on the subject.

This silence could be an indication that Moscow hasn't forwarded the details of any new line. It wouldn't be the first time. The French and Duclos—despite their faithfulness—have been late getting the word.

Spill Played Down

But the silence also could be a cover-up. Informants in Hong Kong, a favorite western listening post, say the Chinese communists are playing down the ideological split, too. They say it is a strategic effort to avoid any suggestion of a clash between the communist parties of the two huge communist nations.

The point at issue is whether Khrushchev is correct in saying war between East and West is not inevitable. The red Chinese view is the traditional one—that no compromise is possible with the capitalist world.

Idaho to Get Big Share of Forest Fund

BOISE, Aug. 27 (AP)—Sen. Henry Dworshak, 71, 104, said today Idaho would get a major share of funds for rehabilitation of burned over areas under a supplemental bill reported by the senate appropriations committee.

Dworshak said, in a message from Washington, the committee restored cuts made by the house and authorized \$200,000 for the forest service and 1.5 million dollars for the bureau of land management. The house bill provided \$700,000 for the forest service and \$1,250,000 for the BLM.

Dworshak said Idaho would receive about \$200,000 of the \$200,000 appropriated for forest land management. He said the bill would provide funds to reseed about 25,000 acres in Idaho forests at a cost of \$170,000 and planting of trees on 2,500 acres north of Boise at a cost of about \$30,000.

The senator said about \$50,000 of the total 15 million dollars appropriated to the BLM for range rehabilitation has been earmarked for Idaho. The total BLM appropriation would be used to reseed 120,000 acres of range land and 6,000 acres of forest land in 10 western states.

Dworshak said there was no breakdown in the acres to be reseeded in Idaho.

Dispute on A-Weapons May Be Issue Behind Red Fight

WASHINGTON, Aug. 27 (U-A)—A dispute over possession of nuclear weapons within the communist bloc may lie close to the heart of the great and increasingly bitter ideological argument raging between the Soviet Union and red China.

This is one of the possibilities being studied by top officials here in their search to discover the hard, real reasons behind the recent, very delicate over "peaceful cooperation" as preached by the Soviet Union versus the inevitability of war, as argued by the Chinese.

One aim of the United States and its Western allies is fighting out all the information possible on the dispute to discover if there is any way it may be exploited for the benefit of the West. So far no dramatic opportunities have occurred.

So far Washington leaders are persuaded that, however violent the words may become, the forces of their common interests which give significance to the dispute are much greater than the forces which push them apart.

Yet, as the central importance of their common interests which give significance to the dispute are much greater than the forces which push them apart.

China science and production capability eventually would be able to create a nuclear weapons stockpile of its own and aid from Moscow could speed the process tremendously. The same is true of the "peaceful cooperation" drive seriously in recent years by their ruthless takeover in Tibet and their seizure of border territories long in dispute with India.

Their unwillingness to completely renounce the use of force in connection with their claims on nationalistic-held Formosa, their threats and intrigues against the countries of Southeast Asia militate.

Nixon Claims Gains in His South Moves

WASHINGTON, Aug. 27 (U-A)—Vice President Hubert H. Nixon's spokesman claimed jubilantly today that probing actions in the South have shown a strong trend for the Republican presidential nominee.

Hubert G. Klein, Nixon's press secretary, said the trend is such that it has forced Sen. John F. Kennedy to retrace and step up his campaign plans.

Kennedy leads.

Kennedy, the Democratic nominee, is resting over the week-end at his summer home on Hyannis Port, Mass. He begins intensive campaigning Sept. 3 with a swing that will take him to Alaska, Michigan, the Pacific Northwest and California.

Klein said Nixon won't take off on any comparable day-after-day campaigning until about Sept. 18. In the meantime he will fill individual dates including a possible trip next week-end.

Enthusiasm Is High

The press secretary said Nixon's warm reception on a visit yesterday to Birmingham, Ala., and Atlanta, Ga., had stirred up enthusiasm for a two-party South.

"The vice president's success has forced Senator Kennedy to step up his efforts," Klein told a news conference. "They have forced Kennedy to change his pace. During the first week of September he is going to be on the road a lot more than we."

Klein told newsmen that a telephone check had been made of Republican leaders in all 50 states.

Ups, Downs Expected

And how did they feel?

"Highly optimistic," Klein said. "Their optimism has reached a degree that we're trying to temper it. This is a campaign in which both candidates will have their ups and downs."

Klein said that Nixon had ordered those working on his campaign schedule to include a major speech in the South during the first two days of his first long trip. He said a talk in Texas is among those being considered.

The press secretary said Nixon will speak at a campaign school for GOP publicity directors here early this week. The vice president will address the American Bar association convention here Thursday.

Religious Issues Opposed

Klein continued only one other definite date, a talk in one of the club meetings in Atlantic City, N. J., Sept. 15.

In response to questions, Klein denied that Nixon is bringing religion into the campaign despite his promise not to talk about it. Kennedy is a Roman Catholic and Nixon is a Quaker.

"The vice president is taking every precaution against religion becoming an issue in the campaign," Klein said. "No one has worked harder to keep this from becoming an issue than he has."

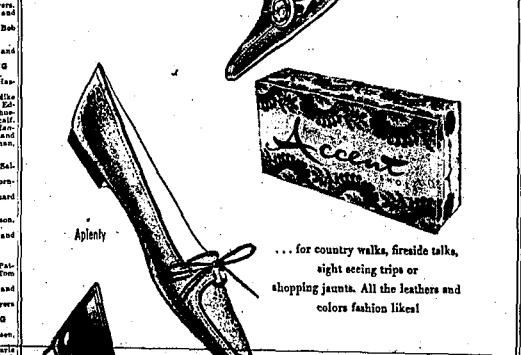

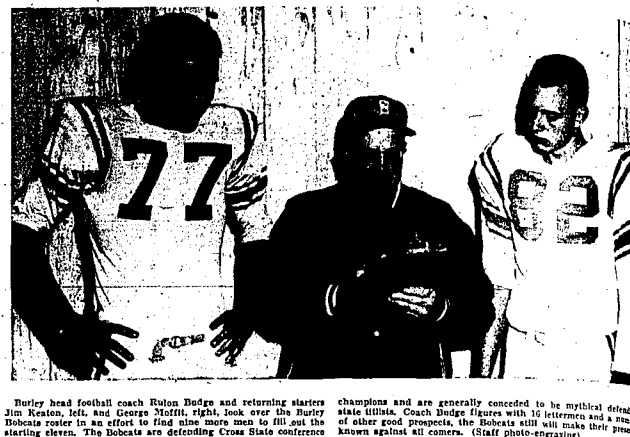

Today's Teen-Agers Live In World of Soft Values

BALTIMORE, Aug. 27 (AP)—Teen-agers are living more and more in a world of soft values, according to a study by Dr. James Coleman, sociologist and professor of education at the University of Chicago. Dr. Coleman's study of 2,000 boys and girls in 10 Midwestern high schools shows that they are living in a world of soft values. What especially is troubling to him is the fact that Dr. Coleman's findings are the same as those of his study in 1957.

Troubles Courted From Hurricanes

CAPE HATTERAS, N.C., Aug. 27 (AP)—This is the elbow of the Cape Hatteras chain that lies like an unbroken arm along the North Carolina coast. Like any protruding elbow, it courts trouble.

It gets gusts of hurricanes, says the Rev. P. D. Davidson, who records hurricanes in a wind gauge on the roof of the Baptist parsonage in Hatteras. "You wonder whether you're going to stay on this planet or go into the mainland. The cape lies in the path of a swirling north westerly and westerly southerly wind. The latter winds guide the cold Labrador current to a head-on collision with the warm Gulf Stream, and each drops its cargo of rain and sleet, creating shoals and reefs.

But for all their fearsome reputation, these islands called the Outer Banks and their formidable dunes are a vacation paradise. The government has built a great year-round winds of 11.9 miles per hour, well behind the New York average of 14.5. And of all the hurricanes that head this way, only one has hit the North Carolina coast, an average of only once every two and one-half years.

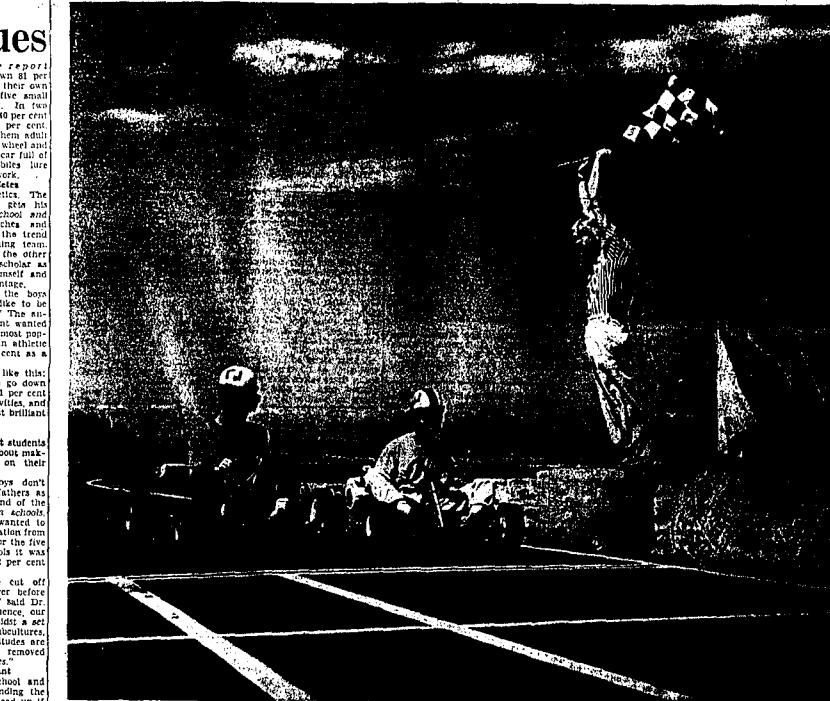
There are 6,500 people living on the banks. They make their living from tourism, the federal government, and the sea.

About 5,000 are employed in the area, now worth 10 million dollars and still growing. It grows on log, vacant beaches, and fishing, and a surprising variety of history.

Remember Wicliams? A W. Drinkwater, Manteo, remembers Dec. 17, 1908. That day a typhoon and Gertie Wright pushed a trail craft from a wooden shack at the base of a sand hill with the old name of Hill David and gave birth to the air age.

Drivers from several communities in Idaho and possibly from Nevada and Utah are expected. Races will begin shortly after 1 p.m. and last most of the afternoon. They are open to the public and free.

Qualification races will begin at the track at Jolin field at 11 a.m. and last until 1 p.m. The track will be dedicated and races will start.

During qualification, each car will run on the track by itself and race against time. It will determine the starting position for the first race.

Races in Three Classes
 Races will be held in three classes—class A, class A, and class A super. There will be three heats in each race.

Most of the entrants in class A will be young drivers. Drivers 12 years old and younger can't enter in other races. Go Karts used in this race have a less powerful motor. Older drivers who wish to drive the less powerful Go Karts also may enter.

Class A is for Go Karts with more powerful motors, but the motor must retail under \$100. Class A super is for larger motors that retail over \$100.

The winner in each class will be determined by the number of points the driver earns in each heat. Thirteen trophies will be awarded. Nine trophies will go to the first three places in three classes. Three trophies will go to the drivers who turn in the best qualifying time in the three classes. The remaining trophy will be awarded to the driver who accumulates the most points in the race.

Nine Races Stated
 There will be nine races, three heats for each class. The track is 500 feet long and a race will consist of 12 laps or two miles. There are five turns on the track.

This is the first big race the Magic Valley Go Kart association has sponsored. It officials can't predict how long the races will last. However, they are expected to last until late in the afternoon.

The association hopes to make the 50 members from throughout the Magic Valley interested in racing Go Karts. Association members started organization and it now has nearly 100. Man May Slate Field Measuring

RUPERT, Aug. 27—Farmers in the area wishing to have an official measurement made of their fields in advance of the planting season may do so by contacting the ASO office, according to Richard Bilcoo, chairman of the ASO committee.
The purpose of the prearrangement, Bilcoo said, is to help the farmer guard against either overplanting or underplanting his allotment of wheat or sugar beets. ASO office can cause unnecessary expenses for fertilizer, seed and labor, and underplanting can cause loss of income.
Cost of the prearrangement must be paid by the farmer at the time he files his request, Bilcoo said, at the rate of 25 cents per acre for lots from one to 100 acres, but not less than \$25 plus 10 cents per acre over 100 but not less than 200 acres; \$25 plus 5 cents per acre over 200 acres.
Requests for prearrangement must be made at the local office not later than Aug. 31 for fall-seeded wheat, and after Jan. 31 for spring planting.

Horse Can't Saddle, Bridle Himself, But He Does Nearly Everything Else

Oakley Barnard, Twin Falls, horseman and trainer, has a horse named "Spika" that can do almost anything but talk, bridle and saddle himself or fit in a car. Not that he needs to fit in a car, for he can bow the horn of a cow by reaching his head through an open door, and he can shut the car door with his shoulder upon signal from Oakley.

Spika is obliging in a way uncommon to children. He will hunt a willow stick, pick it up with his teeth, and bring it over to Barnard for a "spinning." Then when Barnard has the stick in hand, and warns Spika to get ready for a spinning, the obedient gelding will bring his fore legs together so that the stick jumps over to receive the besting of his tie—which he never loses.

Spika is also an athletic-minded horse, not only in running, which comes natural, but in playing with a ball. Barnard will send him away some distance, as if to the shortstop position, and then call a grounder his way. The horse will field the ball, pick it up with his teeth, and then chase Barnard to tag him before he reaches first base. Actually, even if Barnard reaches base, Spika will tag him anyway as if to show he understands the game.

Spika is one of those rare horses that will do what Barnard tells him, not in the approach to the trainer but in going away.

Spika is a seven-eighths Thoroughbred, born in Rockland valley in Power county. Until he was 2 years old he ran untrained on a farm near the town of Pocatello, at Utah State college. Logan, Idaho, and a full brother who was two years younger competed often as matched pairs in California shows, and won the ribbons in 1938 and 1939.

The pair also placed as reserve grand champions of the blue ribbon class at Palm Springs, Calif.

All this proves the excellent impression Spika has made on prominent horse judges in the West.

What more can one expect from a horse than intelligence, conformability, gentleness and lots of action unless it were the ability to shoot a pistol? Well, Spika can shoot a pistol and never bat an eye.

Hot Weather Cause of Low Wheat Yields

It doesn't take much investigating to learn that wheat yields are way down this season. Now that the crop has been harvested, hot July weather took its toll of this grain crop, just as the June frost took its toll on the pea and bean crop in Magic Valley.

Many farmers and warehousemen have reported that grain yields are down, but the most striking bit of proof of the short grain crop this season is to see the empty lots in front of several elevators around Twin Falls and vicinity. Usually these lots are filled with large piles of wheat and suitable for the most non-observant motorist. This year apparently there wasn't enough wheat to spill over the elevators so that it had to be piled outside.

A combine operator who had seven machines going in grain fields at once reported not one filled made 100 bushels this year, unlike other years. The crop was that poor. Another warehouseman is said to have received only 10 per cent of the wheat he normally expects.

Beans are another crop that was thinned by the weather. Providing the weather holds warm during the remainder of the cutting and harvest season of this important Magic Valley crop, the total yield will be about normal. Otherwise, with the poor stands on some fields, due to the frost in June, the crop may produce low yields.

Bean cutting continued this week, picking up in tempo everywhere at the morning or evening crew provided favorable temperatures to the pods and stems.

Some of the pods being cut were still green, but many farmers were hoping these pods would "milk" in the windrow, since they couldn't wait for any more maturing on the stem on account of the fast loss of leaves this season.

Some bean-threshing has commenced on wet and scabbing parts of the county, and it won't be long before the sight of the large bean threshing machine, with lights ablaze at night, will be seen almost any mile road in the county.

Two to three good weeks of growing weather are still needed to make the fall crop or russels a good one. Though some fields have large stands in the ground, many fields have many small plants that will grow larger with warm, non-freezing weather until the last weeks in September.

Hay is another crop that needs growing weather to fulfill expected and customary yields. Except for a few fields, most third-crop alfalfa is still short. Here and there some farmers are still irrigating fields that were "arched" by horses of spika. Most arching is done now, but on some early quiet morning or evenings air-blast can be seen doing its spreading death to the insects that have been so harassing this year in some areas.

Other activities this past week were tractors pulling corrugators in grain stubble so water can go to alfalfa.

Area Potatoes Due Early for Restaurant Trade

188 Million Pounds of Field Seeds Listed for Carryover

WASHINGTON, Aug. 27 (AP)—A crop reporting board shows that carryover stocks of all kinds, groups and strains of field seeds held by wholesale and large retail dealers through the country totaled 188 million pounds on June 30.

These holdings were 13 per cent larger than last year's total mostly because of sharp increases in rye-grain, timothy, red clover, sweet fescue, American winter peas, blue pine, red fescue and chervils and timothy.

Blocks were smaller than last year for 22 kinds and larger for 20. The most notable declines—20 per cent or more below last year—were registered by tall fescue, whetgrass, wild winter peas, Kentucky bluegrass, smooth bromegrass, burrhead grass, Sudan grass, bent grass, vetch and ladino clover.

Stocks of certified and non-certified alfalfa seed totaling 217 million pounds were down 12 per cent and the lowest in eight years. Largest increases were reported for lupine and dallgrass, both more than seven times the amount a year ago. Timothy showed nearly a sixfold increase.

Powdery Mildew Noted in Spuds in Rupert Area

RUPERT, Aug. 27.—Powdery mildew, a fungus disease of potatoes, has been identified in some fields near Rupert in recent weeks. Nobody knew the disease was in the area until a research agriculturalist from Washington D. C. visited in the region to look for spuds raised in Minidoka and Cassia counties.

Some fieldmen for J. R. Simplot purchased 100 bushels of potatoes in the county for years but received no powdery mildew. This year, however, some small plots of spuds have been damaged. The past week or two, the disease was found on potatoes in the field and the damage was supposed to take the form of a white powdery substance on the leaves. 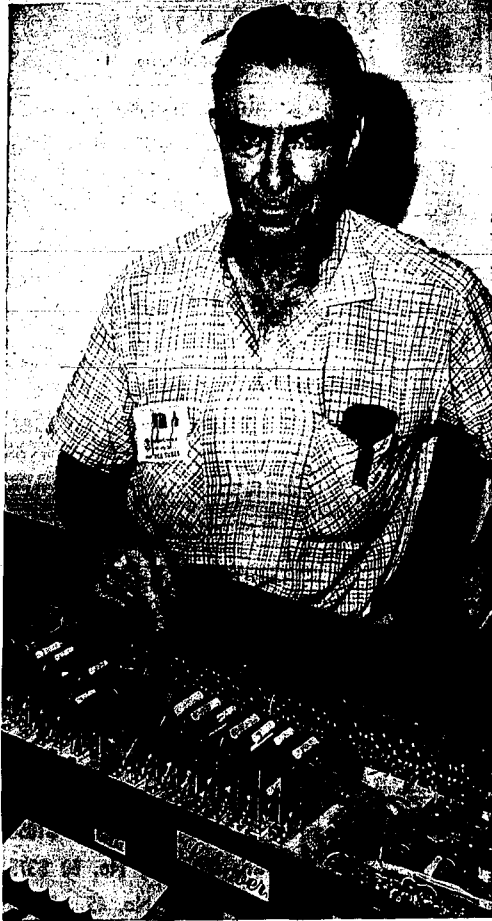

including freight, it cost him \$1,247. If an organ of similar design were bought assembled, and it can't be bought, it would cost about \$4,000.

Now that it has completed, he has one of the most versatile electronic organs in this area. It compares to a 10th rank pipe organ, much larger than most church organs.

Controls Are Common

He explains it is a concert model, built on the European classical design. All the controls are common to pipe organ design. It has 19 stops and six couplers. Brown says this gives it a versatile keyboard arrangement, capable of playing the most critical organ. Brown says many churches are buying the kits and having the organs assembled.

Although other types of kits often arrive lacking some critical bolt or washer, sending the average do-it-yourselfer into a rapid frenzy, Brown says out of the thousands of components in the organ not a single component was missing. And he says the instructions were clear. In fact, Brown says any person with an interest in electronics, armed with a soldering iron, pliers and a screwdriver, and a dash of patience could assemble the organ.

Assembled in 200 Hours

The company estimates it will take from 100 to 200 hours to assemble the instrument, but Brown, who has worked with electronics for many years, says he managed to assemble it in a little less than 200.

He says it can be assembled with any electronic equipment, but he did use an ohm meter and a voltmeter, which he says makes the

No Split Seen In Fight Over Red Idealism

LONDON, Aug. 21 (AP)—Western diplomats here consider that the struggle between Nikita Khrushchev and Mao Zedong for the ideological leadership of the communist world does not mean a split between the Soviet Union and red China is imminent or even likely. The Kremlin reportedly has put support behind Khrushchev's policy of peaceful coexistence. The circular was addressed to Communist party cadres inside the Soviet Union and the party leadership outside.

A communist diplomat in London said that Peking has issued or is preparing a parallel circular setting forth that the West can be trusted and that East-West relations are irrevocable on the dogmatic Leninist line.

The New York Herald Tribune, which has received news of the Soviet circular yesterday, said today that red China's counterattacks as outlined in its press and in conversations with foreign diplomats and delegations, has concentrated on the line that the Russians were falsely misrepresenting Peking's true policy of peaceful coexistence, and that the Russians were modern revisionists trying to divert attention from their own "capitalist" line.

The Washington bureau, said while there have been "deliberations" here and there, "now that the vast majority of Communist parties are swinging behind Moscow's assertion that the Soviet bloc should oppose the use of nuclear weapons as a means of achieving world revolution and that this renunciation is perfectly consistent with Leninism."

The U. S. government is understood to have what seems to be an authentic summary of the Soviet circular.

Russians Fail to Pay Money Sent

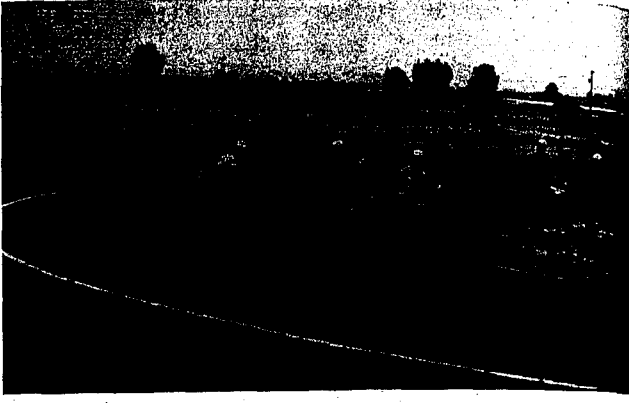
PITTSBURGH, Aug. 21 (AP)—Soviet officials here said a Pittsburgh hotel with an unpaid bill for \$1,000.

building the track on land leased from the city in late January. They completed the track in mid-July. All of the work was done by volunteer labor in evenings and on week-ends. Members surveyed the land, hauled sand and gravel to the area, and graded and oiled it.

Since the oiled track cured in July, members have raced on Sunday and Thursday evenings. The Magic Valley Go Kart association was formed in October, 1950, when about 25 persons from this area met to form a racing association and make plans to develop a track.

The Go Kart craze that has swept the country is a comparatively recent affair. The first Go Kart was devised in 1936 by Dr. Douglas, a race track driver, who built it for fun, but discovered that the little manueverable cars built as much fun, and less dangerous, than powerful racing cars.

Since then the little cars have caught the fancy of the public. The following year a Go Kart association of America was formed, made racing rules and standardized the size of Go Karts.

It Can Be Serious Fungus Infection Isn't In 'Nuisance' Category

Until comparatively recently, most of us dismissed fungus infections as nuisance diseases whose ill-effects were limited to skin disorders like ringworm.

Since World War II, when many soldiers were evacuated in and around the interior valleys of California, we've become more and more impressed with the frequency with which fungal attack bones, joints, lungs and the nervous system. And we've learned that what we used to call desert rheumatism, San Joaquin valley fever and valley fever were actually infections with a fungus that's name—coccidioides immitis (pronounced cock-idee-oy-dee im-mitt-ih).

A recent report of a small epidemic caused by a related fungus, called histoplasma (his-toe-plas-ma), emphasizes the danger to all of us, irrespective of geographic location.

A sixth grade teacher in Sturgis, Miss., undertook a classroom project that required her pupils to pot plants with soil obtained from under a backdoor root within the course of two weeks. Many People Just Looking For Handout

But they are discovering you can't give away one-half million dollars like a sackful of gunpowder and then fade away into obscurity. No longer millionaires, the brothers are now covering nearly everyone's lives here. And an astonishing number would like to get it from the Saturdays. It started a year ago when Frank, aged 72, and Victor, 64, gave \$250,000 worth of Bank of America stock to the 24 residents of the impoverished Italian village of San Marco, D'Urri, from which their parents emigrated to the United States. Instantly people began pestering us to buy factories. Last month they announced gifts of one-half a million dollars, primarily to help Italian war orphans. Letters poured in. They have no idea how many. But before they left for Europe they had received about 25 letters a day at the home of a sister in Oakland, Calif. "We nobody knows our lives here. Even more went to their Reno address. They are going to San Marco D'Urri for the Aug. 31 dedication of a monument to their parents. About half the letters are from the United States. They are Victor observed in San Francisco before leaving for Europe, "we see where you give your money away. How about passing some over to us?" The Saturdays became millionaires in obscurity and apparently living the life of a pauper. "Dad died when he was 80, but he died largely through expanded stock purchases. But it was the life on the farm that gave them the love of the soil. They were born in Italy. "We grew up on the 'Trucker River,'" Joseph said, "and began fishing when we were 10. We fished and hunted all the lakes and mountains of the West. Schools and the workday world of most people never appeared to either brother. Only Joseph ever had a job. He worked for the Nixon National bank of Reno in 1906. 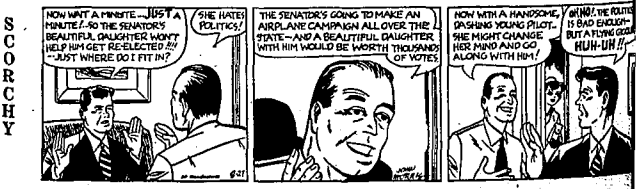
