Worker Is Killed Instantly by Baler

When Pate was pulled into the baler, the motor died, was discovered about 100 yards from the house and sent for David Chatfield, 11, out to summon Pate to breakfast. The body was taken to McGoldrick funeral home, Shoshone, where funeral services are pending.

July Traffic
Fatalities up
Six Per Cent

CHICAGO, Aug. 31—Traffic fatalities during July were six per cent higher than the same month last year and brought total traffic deaths for the year to 20,510, the National Safety Council reported today.

The July toll of 1,410 died on the nation's highways was the second highest July mark on record, topped only by 1,555 deaths in July, 1956, the council said.

Last year's fatalities Thursday totaled 20,350.

Of 220 cities reporting to the council, 215 went through the first seven months without a traffic fatality. The three largest cities were Schenectady, N. Y., Columbus, Ga., and Topeka, Kan., the council said.

Some of the nation's top-ranking cowboys will be on hand to compete for the \$4,000 purse, plus entry fees, at the Twin Falls fair and rodeo to be held Sept. 7 through 10 at Filer, Earl Hutchinson, producer of this year's event, promises his stock is every bit as tough as the broncs which unseated this unidentified cowboy. Many familiar, popular singer of Western songs, will be featured each of the four nights. Reserve tickets are now on sale at Kimberty, Twin Falls, Filer and Dubl (staff engraving).

Many Top-Ranked Cowboys Expected at T. F. Area Rodeo

Since many of the annual big-money rodeos in the nation are now in the past, several top-ranking cowboys are expected to compete this year at Filer during the \$4,000 purse plus entry fees. The rodeo is expected to run Sept. 7 through 10. Thomas Parks, secretary-manager, reports. Although rodeo cowboys are reluctant to commit themselves ahead of time, Parks says he is sure many of the leading contenders in the nation will compete for the \$4,000 purse plus entry fees. Parks notes that many of the cowboys are attempting to make their "rodeo cowboy" association standing for the year and are expected to make appearances at late date. Rodeo championships are determined by the amount of prize money won during a season. Harry Tompkins, Dublin, Tex., presently is leading the list as the champion all-around cowboy with total winnings of \$22,644. He is followed by an Idaho cowboy, Bob A. Robinson, Rockland, with \$20,684. Guy Weeks, Austin, Tex., is third with \$19,274, followed by last year's world champion, Jim Shoulters, Henrietta, Okla., with \$18,830. Last year Shoulters won a total of \$37,905 for the 1959 championship. Enoch Walker, Cody, Wyo., is leading the saddle bronc contestants for the year with a total earnings of \$15,380, according to the latest standings released by the association. Last year's world champion, Casey Tibbs, Brackley, Tex., and Pat Pierce, O. D., is in sixth place with total earnings of \$14,682. Other top riders in this event are Marty Wood, Bismarck, Canada, \$11,604, and Alvin Nelson, Gardnerville, N. D., \$11,545. Last year's barrel race champion, Jack Bunchbox, Capetown, Wis., led in front again this year with a total of \$12,527 for this year. He is followed by Harry Tompkins, Dublin, Tex., \$10,544, John Hawkins, Twin Falls, Calif., \$9,664, and Jim Shoulters, \$8,656. A. Gooding cowboy, Daryl Hobday, is presently in ninth place with earnings of \$6,266. Two other Idaho cowboys, Jay T. Smith, Tona, and Bob A. Robinson, Rockland, are among the top 15 riders of the nation. Last year's world champion bull rider, Jim Shoulters, also is in 10th place this year with winnings of \$7,465 according to the latest statistics. Leading the riders in this event is Harry Tompkins, Dublin, Tex., \$12,599, followed by Duane Howard, Minneapolis, N. D., \$10,621, and Bill Blumstein, Nara Vista, N. M., with \$8,741. An Idaho cowboy, Dean Oliver, Boise, is well out in front of his rivals in the calf roping event with total earnings of \$11,818 to date. Jim Bob Allier, Del Rio, Tex., last year's world champion, is in 11th place this year with earnings of \$6,476. It is expected that if Oliver should win the world championship this year, he will be one of the few northern cowboys to win top honors in this event. Following Oliver in the standings are two New Mexico cowboys, Glen Franklin, House, \$14,047, and Benny Davis, Pecos, \$10,330. Last year an Idaho cowboy, Harry Charters, Melba, won the world championship in steer wrestling with total earnings of \$18,836. This year Charters has been plagued with injuries which hold him down earlier in the year, but in recent rodeos he has made a comeback and according to latest figures is in 10th place with earnings of \$7,781. Charters, who appeared last year at Filer, was honored with the title of "Rodeo Man of the Year" in 1959 by the association.

Historical Society Receives Advice on Museum Opening

Twin Falls County Historical society members setting up the museum at the county fairgrounds Tuesday received some expert advice on just how to do it.

Two officials of the Idaho State Historical society's museum at Boise spent several hours at the museum, building at the fairgrounds. They were George Bowditch, art director, and J. V. Root, registrar. Arriving from Boise in the early morning they conferred with local society members until late afternoon.

Root expressed praise for the work local society members are doing in what the museum here into a presentable display by fair opening on Wednesday, Sept. 1.

In discussing the need of a museum, Root pointed out that all members should work together and form a "purpose and objective" to show the young people just how their parents and grandparents lived. He said the society should primarily show objects relating to the growth of the county, but must also show the state of Twin Falls county "these could include Indian relics, those from the lives of early pioneers and also those from people up to the present."

Bowditch instructed members in the manner of displaying artifacts and selected various ways of achieving the desired results. He also said that should the local society obtain a more permanent structure, his office in aiding in the design would be available without charge.

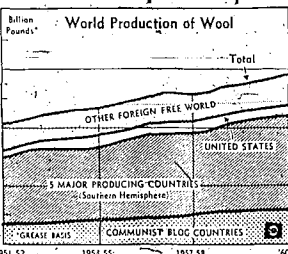

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
