WASHINGTON, Sept. 7 (AP)—Earl Warren's victory in the presidential election was a political miracle. It was a victory that defied the odds, the odds of political magic.

The odds were against him. He had been a three-time Louisiana governor. When he died Monday at 65 he had just won the Democratic nomination for the presidential seat after losing a fight for lieutenant governor because of a lack of mental health.

When he was elected, he had more votes than any other candidate. He was a national figure, a name that was known to all. He was a man of letters, a man of letters who had written a book, "The Choice of Mr. Lincoln."

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## TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—The emergence of young, energetic and colorful members—Republicans and Democrats—as leading participants has been the outstanding feature of the presidential campaign and pre-convention battles.

With the vice president, two senators and an ex-senator heading the two tickets, the national audience is faced with the question of the balance of political power, temporarily at least, has been moved.

Use on the first shift result solely from the fact that, with a few notable exceptions, there are no Democrats in Europe, and it is due to the extension of federal authority—especially in the area of foreign affairs—into the daily lives of every citizen, and to the increased impact which the conduct of foreign affairs has on the national complexion.

Every cent appropriated for national defense and every cent for public works and other projects of the federal government, every cent must be paid for by millions of tax-payers who are not directly involved in all legislation effecting federal revenue.

"YOUNG TURKS" AND "OLD-TIMERS"—Nevertheless, the growing national influence of these young leaders is being called the "loose body" in an entirely novel change from the days when governors led the major tickets and senators headed the minor ones.

The GOP's demand a return to Republican convention at the last session, and their philosophy of "no more federal interference" has been done the "progressive Republicanism" which is advocated in his 1952 acceptance address.

THE PROS TAKE OVER—They had another effect on the nation's great contacts with him, he became more interested in practical-political issues than the GOP members of Congress. It was this group which succeeded in hurt veto threats at the capitol hill opposition.

The Republican "young Turk" also headed the movement to elect Rep. Charles A. Halleck, a Hoosier, to the Senate in 1950. He was elected as a Republican. Rep. J. Lee Rankin, Massachusetts, felt that they needed a younger and more active champion for their cause, and he elected Speaker of the House.

Although the membership varies at different times, the principal personalities are Reps. John H. Roy, New York; Gerald R. Ford, Jr., Michigan; John W. Byrne, Wisconsin; John W. Bricker, Ohio; and Bob Wilson, California. All favored Nixon over Eisenhower in the 1952 election, and were extremely effective for the vice president.

"THE ROOSEVELT REBELS" LIVE ON—The Democratic group, in a legislative manifesto, formulated the anti-John-Foster Dulles plan which denounces the Dulles administration and its policies. It was a social and economic reform. It was far more radical than the Roosevelt administration at the end of the 1940s.

The blue was originally known as "the Roosevelt rebels" and was led by three southerners. Indeed, it believes that a harsh appeal to labor, racial, liberal and agricultural elements will enable the Democrats to win without carrying the southern states.

In answer against the rules committee's blockade of their legislative program, they insisted on reforms in the Smith-Corbin unit more responsive to the needs of the laborer and farmer.

The principal members of this insurgent movement are Reps. Lee Mitchell, Montana; James Roosevelt, California; and Frank Thompson, Jr., New York. They are all Democrats and are expected to support, if he is elected in November.

This approach would get at two of the most persistent features of present federal financial practice. Congress now considers spending bills, whether for foreign aid or veterans' allowances, as though they were in a vacuum. That is one way that budgets get so big and so jumbled, mountains piled on mountains.

What is perhaps even worse, neither administration nor congress are in the habit of revealing the whole cost of spending projects as they are approved over a period of years. A pork-barrel tidbit, for example, may cost only few million in its first year but end up costing hundreds of millions of dollars.

Such "bullet" spending is one of the major threats to sound budgeting, and it is growing increasingly serious. If the people could see the full cost, they might put some pressure on the more liberal members in congress.

Devices of this sort are not, of course, a guarantee of lower spending and rational budgeting. If the next administration and congress—Democratic, Republican or mixed—are determined to go on a new orgy of extravagance, we may be sure they will find ways to do it. But when government spending in the form of military and other projects is to be financed through a budget, it is a fair and reasonable attempt at restraint would be welcome.

ROUTINE LOOK WHO COMPLAINS—Routine activities by political leaders are all part of the game but when one comes along that finds the author guilty of the accusation he makes, it is a different matter.

"I wonder how the Mayor Leupp can square it for himself that he is a taxpayer and yet he is not for a full-time job in Nampa when he has been bouncing up and down the first congressional district in vain pursuit of votes."

That is certainly a case of the pot calling the kettle black. From Senator Kennedy on down, and from the late President Nixon on down, politicians of both parties are campaigning for office on taxpayer's money.

That has been the system for years and it will continue. It was the system that the one who is thrown at Mayor Leupp.

A member of Mr. Walters and Mr. Frost, as well as a number of other congressmen, carried over the fact that an aggressive campaign is being generated in the state by the Republican Party. It is the same old story of irritation. The defense in behalf of Mr. Frost is thin-skinned. Perhaps Mayor Leupp is the candidate for the Republican Party who might replace Mr. Frost. Certainly we hope so.

## HOW THINGS APPEAR FROM PEGLER'S ANGLE

Any ambitious person who gives the least intelligent thought to the condition of the Idaho in a budgetary and economic sense, will be struck by the fact that the land haunted by the socialist letters of mediocrity, economy, and frugality must sorrow for population.

And speaking of the capital, one percent of the population, including all those figures children, are examined every year for lunacy of some degree. 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## REWARDS OF WORK

The postwar economic recovery of West Germany is not a new story. The new thing today is that country's emergence as a second big economic power in the entire world.

By the principal yardsticks of national economic power, the West Germans have now passed Great Britain. To be sure, their gross national product is still less than that of the United States, but it must be remembered that their population is 52 million less than that of ours. In area West Germany is the size of Oklahoma.

The magazine Business Week, surveying the German situation, finds the country's businessmen extremely confident of their general competitive position in the world today. Exports are high and still rising.

They expect to go on winning a larger and larger share of the world market. They see Germany's "domestic" market-size-nation Common Market in Europe as affording them a bigger "monopoly" than the formation of a world market.

The magazine observes that some of the explanation for West Germany's success lies in the fact that the nation is to a considerable degree business-oriented. Businessmen have a powerful voice in government councils. The government has labored to create a favorable business climate, particularly in tax policies.

But this is not all. The Germans seem to be natural-born, driving workers. The energy and determination they once poured into political and military expansion is now funneled into economic effort.

Germany's business managers offer evidence. They put in longer, harder hours than most of their counterparts in Great Britain and France. In return they get high reward.

Some are saying that West Germany's new prosperity and economic weight give it world responsibilities it is not fulfilling. Certainly it must bear its share of the great task of lifting economic levels in the underdeveloped nations.

There is another aspect to this new prominence. In an age when America, and some others seem captivated by a mood of ease, comfort, convenience and fun, the lesson of West Germany is clear. "There is still no substitute for hard work."

## FANCY POLITICAL REASONING

Sen. Frank Church, as he has demonstrated many times, will go to any lengths to gain some political advantage for his Democratic party.

He has quite a gift as a public speaker, but a lot of what he says makes no sense. In the Democratic caucus, Sen. Church and Lewiston recently, the senator came up with something really fancy. Those who favor either Nixon or Kennedy for president, he said, would waste their votes if they cast them for Sen. Henry Dworshak or Rep. Hamer Budge.

This, he reasoned, is because the Republican and Democratic programs have become so much alike that they differ only in minor respects, while Dworshak and Budge have remained out of step with both.

"Any voter who would see the program of our next president implemented, whether he be Kennedy or Nixon," Church said, "will serve his purpose best by voting for McLaughlin for senator and Grace Pfost or Rich Harding for congress."

Church may fool a few Dworshak and Budge supporters with such a line of political hokum, but our guess is they're mighty few.

He should realize that the voters more and more are thinking of checks and balances, and judging from what Church has to say about the similarity between Democratic and Republican programs, there may be a greater need than ever for members of congress who will hold the free-wheeling spending check.

Respective of Senator Church's flimsy reasoning in this regard, Idaho has every reason to be proud of Senator Dworshak and Congressman Budge. They have commanded outstanding respect in Washington, not only for their courageous voting records, but for the commendable work they have done on important committees.

Unless the people of Idaho stand ready to go all out for the welfare state, under which they would relinquish all their responsibilities as citizens to the bureaucrats in Washington, they should be grateful that we have the opportunity to keep men like Dworshak and Budge in office.

### New Ears of Navy May Be Wave Spotter

POINT MCGUIRE, Calif., Sept. 7 (AP)—The navy's new underwater ears, now used to spot the impact of missiles fired from the coast, may someday detect destructive tidal waves.

A Hawaiian scientist's proposal that a navy network of hydrophones in the Pacific do double duty has aroused considerable interest at Pacific metallic range headquarters here.

Frank G. Cox, head of the Hawaii Geophysics Institute's tidal wave research program, came up with the idea after learning underwater listening devices had been installed near the island of Oahu to pick up sounds generated by missiles fired from Vandenberg air force base, Calif.

A navy spokesman said the idea is workable but would require funds not now available in the budget.

Listening devices have been installed on the ocean floor near Oahu, Eniwetok, Wake and Midway islands, he said. At present they are monitored only at the time of missile launch.

### School Year Starts Quiet For 5 States

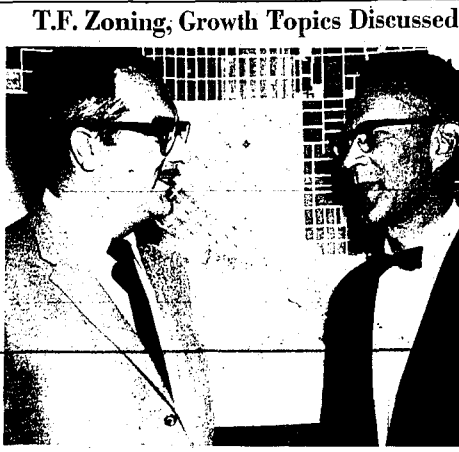
The seventh school year since the U. S. supreme court's 1954 school desegregation ruling began peacefully with taken integration in the southern states.

Twelve Negroes were almost unharmed yesterday when they entered formerly all-white schools in Little Rock. Three years ago President Eisenhower sent federal troops to Little Rock to disperse segregationist mobs and to integrate integration of Central high school.

Taken integration notes in effect in 10 Virginia communities, including Richmond, capital city of the Commonwealth.

Some schools have been integrated in North Carolina, Tennessee and Florida, but Negro pupils in Florida have been received in the state's Miami, Panama and Pineles (Fla., Petersburg), and one Negro and one white child in school with whites in Pineles county, and that is a Roman Catholic parochial school.

Schools opened on a strictly segregated basis in Georgia, South Carolina, Alabama and Mississippi. In New Orleans, under court orders desegregation recently won a delay until Nov. 14.

### Consultant Praises Planning, Zoning Work Finished in T.F.

### Leasing Idea In Appliance Field Grows

NEW YORK, Sept. 7 (AP)—Householders plagued by appliances that seem to break down too soon and to take forever to be repaired are borrowing a tip from businessmen. Leasing instead of buying.

Monthly rental fees are far from replacing monthly payments as in the greater importance in today's household.

But when and if leasing charges in general are brought down to the level of monthly payments, the new industry expects to take wings.

### Red Army to Be Run With Tough Laws

LONDON, Sept. 7 (AP)—The Soviet Union today disclosed new rules for the army aimed at tightening discipline and communist party control of the military.

Russ news agency said Marshal Andrei A. Grechko wrote in the defense ministry publication Red Star that the rules "have come into force and are being circulated among the troops."

The agency did not spell out what measures had been decreed, nor say why they were necessary.

But it pointed out significantly that the rules had been endorsed by the president of the party-central committee and approved by decrees of the supreme Soviet executive committee.

Grechko said the endorsement was "in view of the special significance of the rules for the construction of our army and navy as well as for enhancing further socialist reality of the army and navy."

He said the rules marked "a new phase in the life of the Soviet armed forces."

### Lead-Zinc Plans Called Temporary

BOISE, Sept. 7 (AP)—Sen. Henry Dworshak, R., Ida., said yesterday he would have been happy if President Eisenhower would have signed legislation designed to aid small lead-zinc mine operators.

But the Idaho senator told a press conference here that the bill "was nothing but a temporary measure which he did not think would have solved the problems of the mine operators."

"It was a last-minute desperate attempt," said Dworshak. "We need more drastic action to stimulate the mining industry, and quotas on mineral imports would 'come nearer to solving' the problem than would subsidies," he said.

"DWORKER," said the Communist China's Premier Chou En-lai has sent a message of congratulations to the U. S. Law Center's premier, Prince Souvanna Phouma, Peiping radio reports.

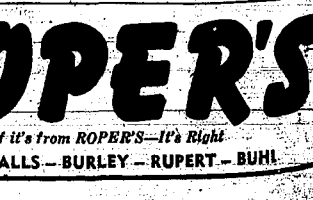
