

Donna Hits U.N. Orders Are Defied as Three Airfields Seized

LEOPOLDBVILLE, The Congo, Sept. 9 (UPI)—The secessionist government of Katanga defied orders of the United Nations and seized three airfields briefly by force today to allow movement of Katanga planes. It was the first instance of open resistance to U.N. troops since they entered the Congo in July and forced Katanga to sign a truce. The situation has become serious enough that U.N. Secretary-General U Thant requested a crisis session of the security council on the Congo at 8:30 (EST) tonight in New York.

BERLIN, Sept. 9 (AP)—Communists erected an iron curtain against West Germans inside Berlin today in a new challenge to the West. The East German regime forced West German visitors to get red-stamped passes for entry into the communist sector of the divided city. The move defied the four-power agreement for free movement within the city—and agreement that even the Soviets have respected since the four powers took over in the summer of 1945.

Shade of '52 Race in 1960

WASHINGTON, Sept. 8 (AP)—Shades—but only minor shades—of 1952 are about this time eight years ago in the 1952 presidential campaign Republicans had hit on a slogan to get them votes and beat the Democrats: It was "reds in government" under the Democratic administration.

Now under the Republican Eisenhower administration two emblems of the highly secret national security agency (NSA)—William W. Martin and Vernon P. Walters—have defected to Russia and landed up in Moscow.

Mad in the midst of the 1960 presidential campaign the Democratic House committee on Un-American Activities will begin this month an investigation to find out how the two men got into government under a Republican administration.

The whole problem of rooting out subversives out of government has cooled down in recent years. And, as it became, it has, this recent, sudden, Mitchell-Martin flareup is unlikely to be anywhere near the top of the issue of 1952.

For two years before the 1952 campaign Sen. Joseph McCarthy had troubled and hounded the nation with his one-man hunt for communists in government and his air insinuations against some of the most highly placed people.

Differences noted. But there has been no steady buildup that could make the country feel very uneasy and suspicious about any widespread infiltration. There hasn't been any talk. There hasn't been any McCarthy hysteria.

President Eisenhower, at his news conference yesterday, didn't blink at the idea that communists may be sneaking into the government.

MARKING TIME
American business is in a state today that defies clear definition. There certainly is no doubt that American economists agree we are in a recession. As has happened occasionally before, the signs are badly mixed.

At the outset of 1950, expectations were high. The early figures seemed to sustain the promise. But then the tapering-off began. Steel output is plugging along at 55 percent of capacity. It is hardly a pace to gladden the heart. Construction, always viewed as a necessary prop for a boom, has sagged substantially. Prices have slipped, and profit margins generally have thinned down.

Things might be a good deal worse if we were not for a number of contrary factors. In the first six months of 1950, consumers purchased retail purchases to the value of \$4.2 billion dollars higher than the same period in 1949.

Furthermore, our economy has been aided by the fact that business is soaring in Europe and other free world areas.

Consumer spending may well continue to rise. Personal income and employment figures seem to support this premise.

Yet the big spending by business on capital improvements that, along with residential construction, looked to be major help has not materialized. Few think it will in the remainder of 1950.

The general business signs have to be a good deal healthier than they are to encourage boom-style capital spending.

Uncertainties in Cuba, the Congo and elsewhere surely have not contributed to a mood of business confidence. Intensely, too, the doubt that surrounds the presidential election clouds the economic outlook.

Business conditions work two ways in relation to elections.

If they are extremely good or bad, they can affect the result—with prosperity naturally favoring the "ins" and recession the "outs." If conditions are mixed and indecisive, it can be the other way around. The election result may affect them.

Barring an unforeseen surge or plunge, the second election appears most likely.

Business is waiting to see who wins in November before planning—big or small—for 1951 and thereafter.

INDIVIDUALISTS
Of late some observers have developed the habit of referring to Vice President Nixon and Sen. John Kennedy, the major presidential nominees, as prime examples of the "organization man."

In plan fact they are just exactly the opposite of that.

The term "organization man" was coined to describe the man who is pressed into the business organization mold so completely that even his social life is thus dominated.

It is the man who follows the crowd, and others, and lets others make the decisions.

Neither Nixon nor Kennedy fits that description in any degree, nor has he ever. Both men are makers of organizations, not members and followers. There is a vast difference.

Both are strong individualists, gifted leaders, men of vision, and men successful with a clear affinity for command.

If either were in fact an "organization man," he would not today be the presidential nominee of his party. For winning those nominations calls for the use of talents which the cog in the machine does not have.

Examination of the Nixon and Kennedy careers shows conclusively that neither man has from the start pursued a distinctive course.

In Kennedy's 14 years in politics, he has at all times held himself apart from standard organization politics. The organization which won him the Democratic nomination was one he built on his own.

Nixon's rise in politics, and senate, he quickly carved a separate niche that made him a favored choice for the 1952 presidential nomination. His eight years in the White House—his first—showed him remarkably building individual stature and influence while serving as second man in the President's shadow.

Kennedy and Nixon are both men with high skill at organization. Those who think that this makes them "organization men" do not read very well.

It is the course of good fortune that both are about as far from that as it is possible to be.

SPIKING THE DANGER
The situation was becoming grave. Property damage caused by "them" was mounting. The threat to human life and limb was a most matter. At least one city had taken legal action against "them." Yet "they" continued to increase in numbers and strength.

"Who are 'they?'" Why, ladies' spoked heels, which had been punching holes in floors, getting entangled in sidewalk gratings—and becoming more popular with the girls all the time.

The strategy adopted: If you can't lick 'em, join 'em. All the know-how of modern technology was thrown into the problem. The result: A heel that is long-wearing, yet soft and non-slippery; gentle to floors and furniture. It's due on the market later this year. Bank goodness.

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—The trend toward political and economic conservatism today, especially in western states, is a reflection of the same movement in this country which began the Nixon-Lodge ticket.

Although different classes and factions animate the voters in the old and new world, a study of their political behavior indicates that there is a certain similarity in their attitudes.

In 1948, for instance, West Germany elected the sturdy, sober, and conservative Adenauer as president and his country's recovery under his pull-through program has been a economic miracle.

In 1951, Britain looked to the west for help and confidence. It turned to the conservative Sir Winston Churchill. Only the year before, largely because of war and economic difficulties, had he been ousted him as prime minister. Pundits proclaimed the end of the Conservative party, yet between 1950 and 1951 British Conservatives won three consecutive general elections.

NO LONGER 'PRISONERS OF STARVATION'
—England's comeback led to Macaulin's reelection in the Conservative party, yet between 1948 and 1951 British Conservatives won three consecutive general elections.

An important factor in Macaulin's victory, and one which the GOP counts on as an asset in November, is that Britain's working people no longer are "prisoners of starvation." They tend to regard themselves as "middle class." The union loyalties which once moved them to the right of the road have faded.

If they fell that way, and in view of the fact that Britain's news and working conditions are far below those in this country, Republican strategists think that the same sentiment may prevail among this section of the American electorate.

TOWARD THE MIDDLE OF THE ROAD—Although the AFL-CIO-led Americans for Democratic Action have endorsed the Kennedy-Johnson ticket, Nixon-Lodge observers note that neither of these "liberal" groups evinced the enthusiasm or devotion which they had for Roosevelt and Truman, they found it difficult to face Lyndon B. Johnson.

EISENHOWER-NIXON LINE GAINS FAVOR IN EUROPE—Under the leadership of High Gallate, British Labor has abandoned their program of nationalization of all major industries.

BEHIND THE SCENES
Berlin Mayor Willy Brandt, who will run against Chancellor Adenauer in the 1951 election, is a more restrained philosopher. He no longer insists on full "nationalization" of industry. Both the Gallate and Brandt doctrine are nearer to the Republican plan principles than to the Democratic's.

All of these statements—Macaulin, De Gaulle, Adenauer, Gallate and Brandt—have revised their views on the Eisenhower-Nixon line.

Whereas they once favored summary, they now prefer the gradualism of the Eisenhower-Nixon line.

REVIEWS OF OTHERS
IDAHO REPUBLICAN DYNAMITE
One of the puzzling things in this hour that thunders the already crowded atmosphere is Governor Bentley's interest in placing before the coming state Republican convention two personal issues. One is for reorganization of the state government and the other is for a department of natural resources. Neither of these issues has any proven support. Either, or both, do create ammunition for the Democratic party in a year when they need something to offset the unfortunate taxing arrangement the legislature—Democratically controlled—loaded on the public.

Both of the issues are of Smylie origin. Neither of them is likely to get off the ground. But if the governor wants a job on whether or not Idahoans would agree to these changes, they should be saved for a vote when the time comes.

The government reorganization plan, which would eliminate some state officials presently elected in more of a political development than a real Idaho need. The Smylie contention is that the arrangement would lead to more concentrated direction of state affairs. The proposed reasoning is that makes the governor a dictator. Neither of the conventional arguments that this would raise the question of the advisability of making an issue of this change in a year when there is no governor race.

The proposed department of natural resources is another creature with partisan political wings. And it is effort at creation of another office foreign to our established form of state government.

The rearrangement of state government to suit the fancy of an individual candidate is little far-fetched. There is no assurance, should the two Smylie ideas be accomplished, that Idaho's next governor might not want to reverse them. So it is just as well to leave things alone.

Just as a Republican standpoint, in this year of 1950, the issues are politically inopportune and unnecessary. The Republican party hangs by a slim thread in state government. One way of assuring disaster is to provide the heavy Democratic legislative majority some badly needed ammunition.

The convention next Saturday should shelve the two Smylie issues. If the governor wants them he should take them into the next campaign. If he will not be a candidate, they should be forgotten—Bolshevik Statesman.

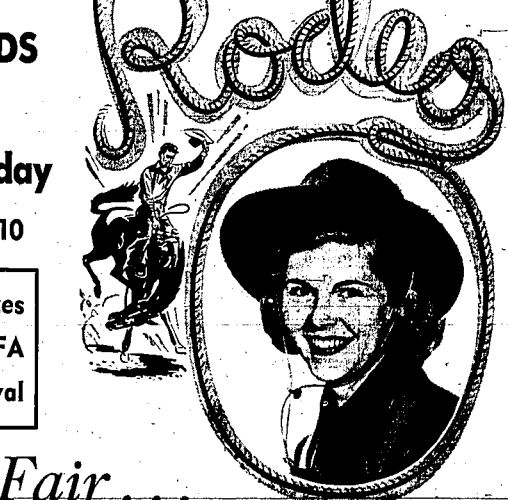

Dedication Rites Set Sunday For Area LDS Stake Center

Jerome Sept. 9—Bishop Thorpe of Issaquah, Salt Lake City, first counselor of the presiding bishopric, will preside over the dedication rites of the LDS Gooding Stake Center at 7:30 p. m. Sunday.

Bishop Thorpe will represent the general authorities of the LDS church. He is well known in his education and church work throughout the northwest.

Open house will be held from 4 to 10 p. m. today and 9 a. m. to 7 p. m. Saturday. Orders will show up through the building.

Ross C. Lee, stake president, said the building was completed in 22 months. The old building was completely renovated and entirely new construction work was done. Most of the construction work was donated by LDS members. The value of the donated work exceeded \$74,623. The building will serve for both the present and second Jerome wards and also as the Gooding stake center.

The exterior of the building, presently stone, is of red brick veneer and cast stone pillars. The roof and cast stone below eave windows.

The main entrance is on the north through large glass doors. On the left is the recreation hall or gymnasium and on the right is a rose window.

The chapel, on the right of the first is carpeted in brown teard. The walls are oak-stain color and the drapes are green. Four hundred people can be seated in the chapel and an additional 200 in the foyer. The foyer is separated from the chapel by heavy green velvet drapes.

If additional room is needed, the recreation hall may be opened by adding Birch doors into a small closet. A steeple choir section, located behind the pulpit, is furnished with theater type seats upholstered to match the pews. There is an electric organ and a baby grand piano in the chapel.

The ceiling is lined with acoustical tile and the lighting fixtures spotlight the pulpit, which is located so even those in the recreation hall may see the speaker.

The building also includes two restrooms for each ward. Each is equipped with materials, books and mimeograph equipment needed in the various departments of the church.

The old chapel now holds the Junior Sunday school department. The new recreation hall is large enough to accommodate a regional basketball gym, approximately 50 by 100 feet. The gymnasium also is faced with red brick and the ceiling is completely lined with acoustical tile. The hall also has a large stage area.

The kitchen is approximately 35 by 12 feet, decorated in green with built-in cabinets.

The Relief society room has large picture windows to the south. The room is decorated in soft green and rose. Doors open from the kitchen into this room for easy service.

The second floor of the tabernacle is arranged with 13 classrooms. The office of president Ross C. Lee is on this floor. On the president's office is the stake high council meeting room. Cecil Durrant, stake clerk, office is adjacent to the council room.

The offices of Bishop Lee, Fratt and Bishop H. Thomas Newman are both on the main floor.

The entire building contains a total of 26,128 square feet of floor space. South and east of the building is parking area for 715 cars that has been a completely backstopped and adequately lighted for night use.

The building is topped with a stainless steel copper steeple that is lighted at night.

President Lee noted the \$350,000 building was designed to be used for a long time with a minimum of upkeep.

"It will long stand as a monument to the people of our day who devoted their means and labor to its erection," he said.

Carl Wook was general supervisor and contractor for the building. President Lee said that because of his excellent work in Jerome he was called to serve a two-year labor mission directing other building projects for the church. Since he left in July Ray Peterson, Wendell, has served as general supervisor.

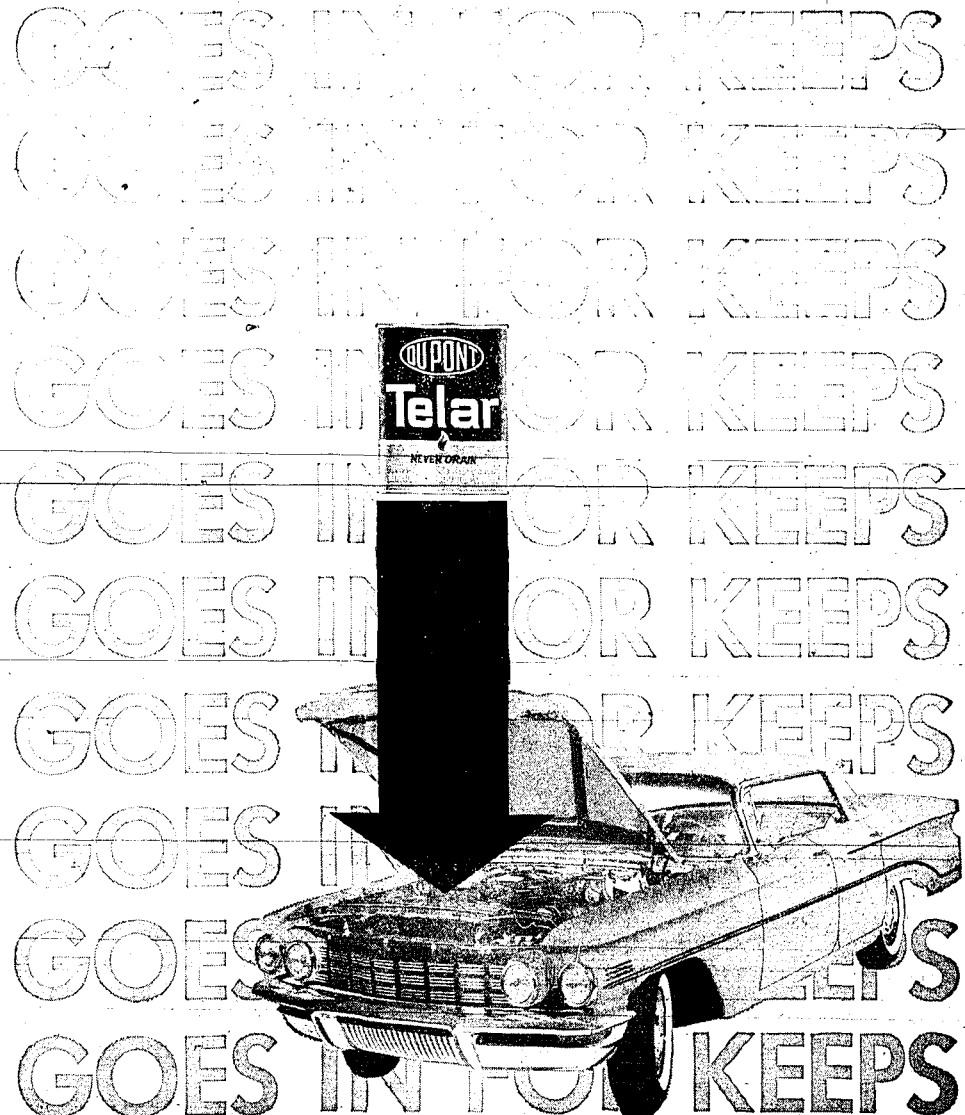

Trailer Law Accepted by City Council

JEROME, Sept. 9—A trailer ordinance was passed at the meeting of the Jerome city council Tuesday evening at the city hall. The ordinance includes regulations on the parking and location of automobile trailers, provides for the licensing of trailer courts and regulates the location, erection, maintenance and removal of courts.

It provides that a trailer shall not be used as a permanent place of abode or as a permanent dwelling place for an indefinite period of time except in a trailer court. However, any trailer coach, with the usual removed property, can be used with the city water and sanitary sewer system in compliance with all requirements of the building, plumbing, sanitation, health, zoning and electrical ordinances of the city may be permitted on any premises under properly secured permits.

It also states that no person shall park, place or locate and use any trailer on a public street or highway longer than three hours except in a licensed trailer court. However, any unoccupied trailer may be permitted in any accessory garage building or an accessory car trailer port or may be parked on the rear half of a lot at least three feet from side property lines and 15 feet from any dwelling or adjoining lot. On corner lots no trailer shall be permitted within 15 feet from any side street property lines.

Temporary or temporary storage or parking is permitted on any street, alley or highway for no longer than two hours subject to other traffic regulations.

The code states that all trailer courts must have a minimum of 20 feet wide. Each space must have a well lighted, gravelled or paved driveway not less than 20 feet wide. Each space must be furnished with an electric service outlet.

The code also provides regulations for access buildings, water supply, plumbing, sewage, disposal, propane, insect control, fuel and fire protection.

The council also decided to invest surplus cash funds in U. S. bonds and securities. The city has \$100,000 in the surplus revenue fund and \$50,000 in the water works improvement fund which are not in use, and cannot be applied on the indebtedness of the water bonds at this time. Under this ordinance the city can realize an interest return until the money can be applied to the contract indebtedness.

The city council also repealed a section of the ordinance pertaining to dances in the city. The regulation said that once anyone had paid admission to the public dance they could not leave the premises without paying another admission.
