# Khrushchev Restricted to Manhattan Island on His Visit to U.N. Parley

**UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Sept. 10 (AP)**—The United States today laid down unprecedented restrictions on the movements of Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev during his coming visit to the United Nations general assembly. The Russians were notified that Khrushchev must not leave Manhattan island and that even there he should be moved by his official duties as head of the Soviet U. N. delegation. The United States told the permanent Soviet mission to the United Nations the restrictions are necessary because of security requirements. Similar limitations were placed on two other communist leaders, Hungarian party chief János Kádár and Czechoslovak premier Antonin Novotny. This was the first time in the history of the United Nations that such a restriction of a delegation has been restricted to Manhattan island.

Somehow certain delegates must not leave more than 25 miles from U. N. headquarters, but these limitations do not apply to Czechoslovakia and Poland.

The United States also laid down restrictions on communist delegates expected to attend the assembly starting Sept. 20. They include Khrushchev, Novotny, Kádár, and other communist leaders from Poland, Czechoslovakia, Hungary, Rumania, Bulgaria, and Yugoslavia. There is no geographical limitation on U. S. movements of delegates of those countries, and none will be imposed on their movements within the New York area, but they must notify the U. S. government before traveling outside the city.

The original 25-mile restriction on the Russians and some other countries was ordered by Washington several years ago in retaliation for Soviet refusal to allow Americans in its East Berlin area.

Khrushchev will not be able to visit the Soviet delegation's headquarters in the north shore of Long Island.

There was no immediate reaction from Soviet officials, but it appeared obvious they would be furious. The rules also could be applied to other communist leaders and expanded to include other communist leaders.

In a terse radioed note, the United States requested that Khrushchev limit his movements close to U. N. headquarters so as to simplify the problem of protection. The note also requested that the Soviet government inform the U. S. of any movements of Khrushchev outside the area of the regular travel restrictions.

It was expected that Khrushchev would be accompanied by his wife and two children, the north shore of Long Island.

# Hurricane Swirls Into Citrus Crop; 4 Reported Injured

**TAMPA, Fla., Sept. 10 (AP)**—Hurricane Donna swirled inland through the heart of the Florida citrus belt tonight, dealing untold damage to the almost ripe, multi-million-dollar crop of oranges and grapefruit. Warnings were ordered up along the Atlantic coast as far north as Savannah, Ga. One hundred-mile-an-hour wind roared steadily north through Florida. Florida. Behind it, the killer hurricane left much of the lower Florida citrus belt ruined. Four deaths had been reported. Preliminary reports told of 12 injured in west Florida. But more still was cut off at midnight.

The weather bureau said 121 miles-an-hour winds struck Port Myers. Donna diminished in intensity as it moved inland, but it had by then still moved up wards of 100 miles an hour near the coast.

At Key West, Monroe county Sheriff John Spotswood, whose domain extends up the chain of Florida keys, said damage might run to \$10 million dollars.

The matter here was that a sudden gust of wind had blown a succulent load of grapefruit from the trees of a grove near the state capital.

From Port Myers, George Hunter of the Lee county disaster commission told the Associated Press that roofs were blown from homes and stores.

At Fort Myers, a candidate for mayor of Port Myers, made contact with a television station in Tampa and told the station that he was a victim of the storm.

They brought seven of their 11 children and among them were twins pre-school age, Laina, Roy, Roy Lassell and Roy Roy Lassell. Another of twins present were Mickey Otto and Ricky Otto, 7 1/2, sons of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Otto, Jerome. These identical twins were accompanied by their mother and it was reported that she was the only one who could tell them apart.

Among the other towns represented at the camp were Rupert, Caldwell, Hagerman, Halley, Weidert, Kimbark, Burley, Heppner, Twin Falls and Paul which had the largest representation with 27 attending.

The Rev. Mr. Hargrave, who looks to the group the first experience, stated that the purpose of the camp was for "fellowship together and to have freedom to enjoy your families. We are not here just to be alone, but to deepen our fellowship in Christian faith," he stated.

"Sometimes our lives go round and round, but we accomplish nothing. We need to know God's purpose for us. It is good for us to be away from the many things that go around in our busy lives today. By learning to pool our resources we can become a light to our community," he stated.

used by campers, sheep herders of the Magic Valley. Twenty women and seven men worked on the walls. The women built the interior in the shape of a dome.

After this portion of the building was completed a temporary roof was put over the site and when this proved unsatisfactory some of the men of the Magic Valley group raised several hundred dollars to complete the roof of the building. This building contained two rooms, the kitchen and a dining room.

In 1954 a chapel was added to this structure, and a native stone fireplace was added in 1959 and 1960. This fireplace was a memorial to Warren Lattue, son of Mr. and Mrs. Roy Lattue, Heppner, who died 10 years ago from cerebral fever.

This memorial was made possible by the gifts of the Methodist Youth Fellowship young people of this valley. When the family knew the camp was to be permanent they had the fireplace built.

The altar youth had been appointed by the Idaho Methodist conference to serve on the committee as a representative of the YFP to help select a camp site. Others on this committee were Rev. James R. Crow, his son, superintendent of the Idaho Branch for Youth near Rupert, Rev. Don Smith, former pastor of the Burley church and now pastor of the Salmon church, district superintendent. Dr. F. W. Wertz, and Rev. W. C. Moore, who was executive secretary.

An impetuous spot of the camp is the open-air chapel which is nestled in a small grove of lodge pole pine. A cross of small pine logs has been erected at the front of the chapel beside a pulpit made of large smooth river sanded stones that were placed one upon another after cemented together.

The floor is carpeted with a heavy mat of cedar pine needles and the pews are of sawed logs. The chapel also has a communion rail.

A spokesman for the Methodist men's group stated that many of the youth say that the Sawtooth camp is their favorite camp for they are completely cut off from the outside world and feel they are really camping. Electricity is available in the main building. The men's club is working on the feasibility of having a swimming pool at the camp.

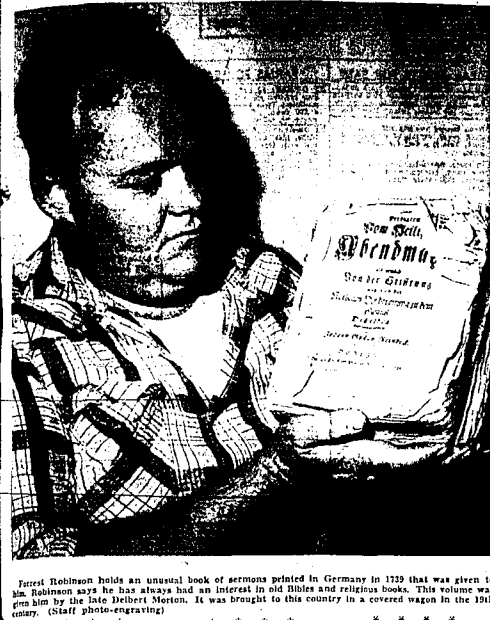
