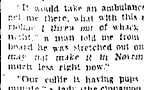

Slight Steel Order Pickup Cheers Metal Group Some

STEEL ORDER—Sept. 18—A faint glimmer of light pickup in steel orders is being reported by some observers. But American steelmen have been bringing some cheer to the much-bleeding metal industry.

Copper, lead and zinc markets are also showing some improvement. Copper prices are up, and zinc prices are also showing some improvement. Aluminum has a cool squeeze on it coming here.

The best domestic customers for steel are still not ordering in order. Automobile makers are using less steel for smaller cars or still have not come out of their stockpiles. Appliance makers are ordering a little better, but not much. The construction industry has a better outlook, but also has a disappointing August.

The metals industry tends to be pessimistic about the future. They are tied to business cycles. Now their outlook is complicated by overcapacity and labor uncertainty.

Long-range considerations include technical and governmental developments that might affect their capacity to produce well in excess of demand. Most observers think this could last for a few years longer.

There is also growing competition, not only with each other, but with the steadily increasing number and volume of substitutes to which their customers can turn when metal prices seem too high.

Shortness of demand for steel is most noticeable in the United States. In West Europe it still is not as bad as it once was.

Scholar Says Mankind Will Survive Well

Survive Well

MADRID, Sept. 19 (AP)—A noted scholar looked deep into history today and found threats to the survival of mankind in New York this week mankind will endure.

"We tend to forget that the pace of the world has been in the hands of a few men more than in the past 3,000 years," said Dr. George Kilpatrick, professor of history at the University of Madrid.

It is not that the world has changed, but that the problems we also face are not. The first time the threat of annihilation has been in the minds of ordinary men was in the 19th century, when it was those who were called "the great ones" who were called "the great ones."

Kilpatrick is in Madrid as one of a number of Biblical authorities asked to advise on the film "King of Kings" in which for the first time in the secular cinema Jesus is portrayed as a man of his times.

This is such a radical change from the usual treatment in which Christ is never shown full face or speaking—the Professor Samuel Bronston got the approval of Pope John XXIII and leaders of other churches before he started.

And every now and then Canadian-born Kilpatrick intervenes in his study of a third century Greek text of the Gospels at Oxford to show the scenes already shot.

"It's surprising," the historian said, "how many times peace has appeared—as now—a handful of men."

He mentioned, among others, the summit meetings of top officials in the troubled times after the death of Alexander the Great in 323 B. C., the conferences called by Constantine in an effort to set peaceful agreements, the Christianity for the Roman empire, and the three or four "big men" who led the empire together after Diocletian's death in the fourth century.

But Kilpatrick was asked, was not the hydrogen bomb a completely new factor in the world's history?

"They know how to kill just as thoroughly, if not more slowly, in the modern world," he said. "They simply destroyed the harvest and their enemies starved to death."
