Watershed and Coordination Office Set by Forest Service

ODDEN, Sept. 20—The division of watershed management and multiple-use coordination was established Monday in the U.S. Forest Service, Intermountain region. It is headed by Leon R. Thomas, former assistant regional forester in the Southern region of the forest service in Atlanta, Ga. Located in the regional office at Odden, the new division reflects the fast-growing public interest in maximum production of usable water and other resources from the national forest watersheds. Regional Forester Floyd Iversen stated. He said the division of water, recreation and lands will now be one of the division of recreation and lands, remaining under the direction of present Chief John Herbert.

The new division will direct multiple-use coordination, watershed management and lands. Thomas' division will include recreation management, mining, land adjustments and land use. National forest users of water, timber, forage, wildlife, recreation and minerals have directly gained economic importance. In June the multiple-use law opened the way for the use of these uses for the good of the public.

The regional forester stressed that the need for wise watershed management is increasing because of industrial and agricultural expansion. About 75 per cent of the region's usable water originates directly from the national forests, he said.

Thomas, the new division head and native of central California, spent his youth on a cattle ranch. He was graduated from Stanford college in 1933, and received a degree in forestry from the University of California two years later. He began work with the forest service in 1934 as a field assistant in the California region. He spent the World War II as a sergeant in England, France and Germany. From 1942 to 1946 he worked on national forests in California, progressing from ranger to staff assistant in fire control and forest supervisor. In 1947, he was promoted to chief of the division of the forest-in-charge California office. Since early 1956 he has directed division work in patrol, watershed, soils, and multiple-use planning. He will arrive in Odden about Oct. 1 with his wife and their two children.
