**WASHINGTON CALLING** BY MARQUIS CHILDS

WASHINGTON, Sept. 24—A department of commerce and development survey shows that most of Idaho's newly visitants are to stay in the state for an average of 3.6 days per person and stay in the state three days.

Secretary Louis Standaud released some figures obtained during July and August when 1,000 paid-state visitants were asked to say how much they were spending, how long they were staying and why they chose Idaho visitants as a vacation spot.

Miss Standaud says 80 percent of the visitors questioned spend a day per person in Idaho, another 20 percent are staying in the state for two to three days.

Other findings turned up by the survey: Most of Idaho's visitants come from Washington, Oregon, California, Montana and Nevada. The majority of visitants are in the 20 to 40 age group, with 40 percent of the visitors coming from the Midwest region of the country. The survey shows the majority of visitants are male, with 60 percent of the total being male. The survey also indicates that 70 percent of the visitors questioned were carrying out the survey.

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**THEY GOFED, BUT GOOD**

The idea persists that the Russians are immensely superior in the uses of propaganda and that we cannot help but be done in any test on that front. Yet the fact is that again and again they help us to gain important victories in this field.

It is not that we have had more than one of our greatest assurances against failure in the cold war. Whatever their propaganda efforts are often trumped by the iron rigidity of their purpose of conquest.

Their actions in and relating to Africa provide the newest example. With the Congolese government of Patrice Lumumba in obvious chaos, the Kremlin chose to cast a lot with him and send some 500 "technicians" to his aid. Their real aim, of course, was to "break" the Communist will.

Lumumba's monumental inability to govern eventually brought about by Colonel Mombutu, Congolese army chief, who proclaimed the success of the Communist.

At this turn, men truly sensitive to the propaganda impact of their behavior would have moved to the Congo. But not Khrushchev and associates.

Sixteen Afro-Asian nations, alarmed at the Red interference with U.N. efforts under Secretary-General U Thant, drafted a resolution of support for Hammarskjold. A principal feature was to call upon all nations to refrain from military aid to the Congo through the U.N. It was a direct slap at Russia.

The Kremlin carried its stupidity to the length of actually drafting a counter-resolution to "break" the Communist will.

The measure had no chance, and at the last was abandoned. The Afro-Asian proposal, firmly endorsing Hammarskjold, gained a 20-11 triumph.

Not enough, the Russians are great practitioners of the propaganda art. But they are not the masters they are sometimes alleged to be. At any time their goals of conquest are rudely exposed, and for a time at least, their game is up.

Even among the relatively green leaders of Africa, the Russians are losing their illusion today as to what the Soviet Union really desires. Clearly it is not the welfare of the emerging Africans, but simply new domains for their empire.

Certainly this state of affairs is something a great deal less than a propaganda victory for Moscow. It is, beyond all doubt, a smashing defeat.

**CHANGING SCENE**—But Mr. Khrushchev, India and Southeast Asia, apparently confer collective strength, even though largely moral, and its decisions impact on world opinion. Khrushchev has recently overtaken the United States. At the recent meeting of the Organization of American States, Khrushchev and his Cuban lackey, Fidel Castro, were told to keep their hands off the American continent.

There are other optimistic signs—no more than that—of a change in the atmosphere. There has been a significant improvement in the mood of the world, with food shortages and lack of funds waning.

There could be no doubt that Khrushchev's speech brought about an atmosphere of crisis-to-the-historic-1954 general assembly session. It could well mark the beginning of a complete collapse of the world organization dedicated to the pursuit of peace and cooperation among all countries.

In effect, the Soviet premier let it be known that Russia regarded themselves as being more powerful than the United Nations organization. To go to such lengths in trying to destroy the United Nations, Russia is not only a sign of weakness, but organization unless she can have her own way.

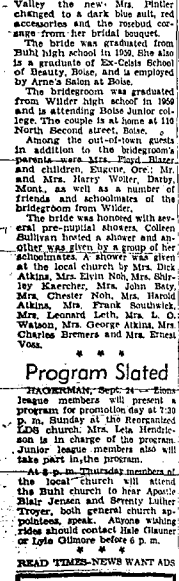

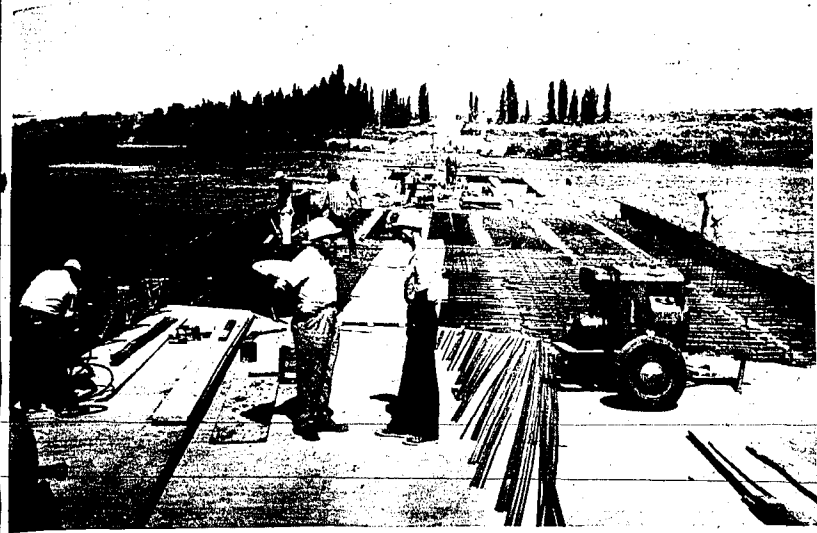

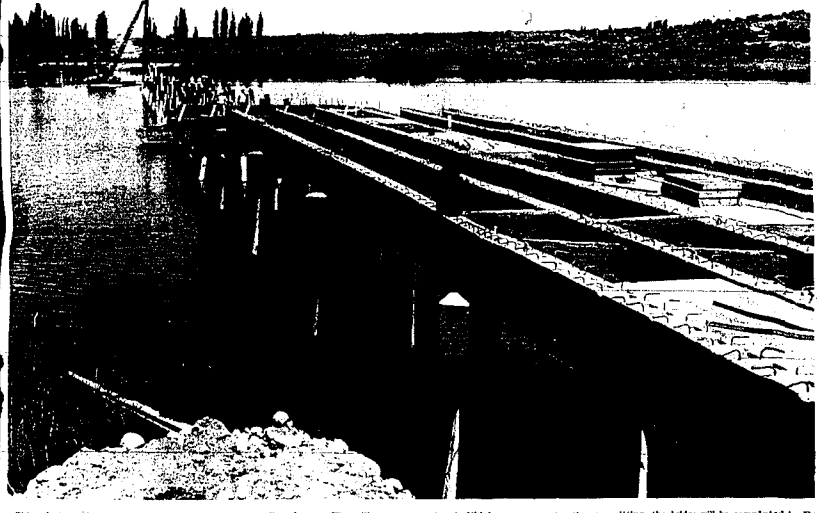

## Bridge to Replace Owsley Span Nears Completion; Cost Is Over Half Million

The new bridge that will eventually replace Owsley bridge on highway 30, downstream from Thousand Springs, is nearing completion. According to Eugene Burdick, Jerome, resident engineer for the Idaho department of highways and state engineer in charge of the project, weather permitting, the bridge will be completed by December.

The \$500,000 bridge and approach road construction will eliminate much of the older road that remains to be recontoured between the Thousand Springs resort and the Main river. The highway from the river to the new portion near Thousand Springs resort will be completed by June, leaving only the portion between the Main river and the north side of the bridge to be recontoured.

When this small portion eventually is recontoured, all of highway 30 through this area will be new. There are no definite plans for recontouring that portion at this time.

Burdick says the bridge is about 60 per cent completed at this point. He says they have had good weather since the construction began in March. The prime contractor is R. Cahoon Construction Company, Pocatello, which is building the bridge. The sub-contractor is Karl Woodard, Boise, who is doing the grading construction leading to the bridge.

A total of nearly three and one-half miles of highway will be recontoured on each side of the bridge. The superintendent, Alvin Gonerly, W. R. Cahoon Construction Company, The Idaho Highway Department project chief is Richard Sorenson.

The bridge, named the Gridley bridge, is 1,280 feet long. It crosses the river about one mile upstream from the old Owsley bridge. Final work on the approach can't be

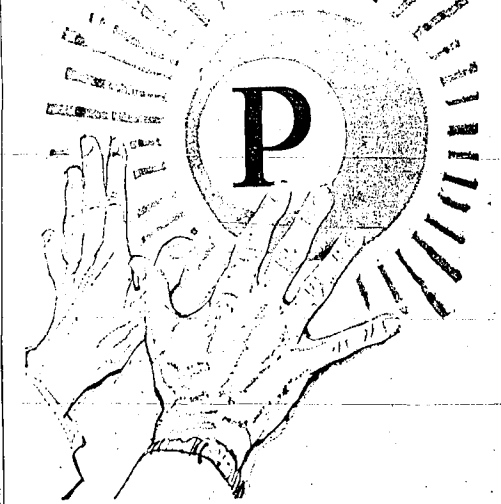

**Experts Note Grain Supply To Be Larger**

WASHINGTON, Sept. 24 (AP)—Economists believe shipments of grain and other feed grains will continue to grow in the year ahead.

The surplus went up in the 1959-60 feeding season, the eighth year in a row. It is expected to continue to rise in the 1960-61 feeding season, the 12-month period which ends Sept. 1.

The 1960 harvest of feed grains was estimated at 162 million bushels, the first ever. It was 10 percent above the 1959 crop. The 1960-61 surplus was expected to be about 1.5 billion bushels, a 10 percent increase over the 1959-60 surplus.

The surplus is expected to be broken down 210 million bushels for the 1960-61 year and 190 million bushels for the 1961-62 year. The surplus for 1960-61 is expected to be about 1.5 billion bushels, a 10 percent increase over the 1959-60 surplus.

**Garbage Ban for Hog Feed Aiding Disease Control**

WASHINGTON, Sept. 21 (AP)—The agriculture department says new laws banning the use of raw garbage for feeding hogs are improving control of many hog diseases.

The department says this is especially true in the case of trichinosis, a serious disease which may spread to humans who eat infected pork without roasting it properly.

The department reports that cooking raw garbage before it is fed to hogs is now required in all 50 states.

Animal disease experts believe that most trichinosis infections in hogs can be traced directly to raw garbage. These experts report that raw garbage feeding must be stopped completely before the disease can be eradicated.

**Top Ranked Quarterhorse Standing at Stud on Tim Qualls Ranch East of T.F.**

Bregar Joe, a registered four-year-old stallion quarterhorse, now is standing at stud at Tim Qualls ranch east of Twin Falls.

Bregar Joe, who actually is a yearling just a heifer, and Qualls bought him from \$1,000. Qualls bought him, eight months from his owner in Atlanta, Ga., on the basis of his pedigree and his history as a running horse in Florida and California.

Bregar Joe is an AAA quarterhorse, one of three such horses in Idaho. He is characterized as being in the house, good at the track, and Bregar Joe has run a 1:10.00 for 1 1/2 miles.

The stallion, who stands 15 1/2 hands high and weighs 1,250 pounds, has superb legs and withers, is expected to make an American Quarterhorse champion.

Qualls said there are only 210 champion quarterhorses out of more than 100,000 registered quarterhorses in the United States. To receive this classification, Qualls said, 12 points are necessary for standing, quality as a winning stallion, 12 points at halter, and six points for working or halter. Bregar Joe has already earned 18 points in 1959 as a working horse. Two points toward the halter's requirements were earned this year when Bregar Joe took first place in his class at the Twin Falls county fair at Fair.

Qualls said the stallion, a young for his remarkable record, won the Centennial race at Denver this year, the last time he ran.

Qualls doesn't intend to race him in the future, but will keep him for stud purposes and some work with cattle. He said the stallion shows considerable promise working with cattle.

**Processed Potato Foods Use Climbs 18 Per Cent**

WASHINGTON, Sept. 24 (AP)—The crop reporting board says consumption of processed potato foods rose about 18 per cent last year and government experts forecast a comparable increase this year.

The board estimated that about 463 million hundredweight of 1959-60 potatoes were used for chips, frozen products, dehydrated and other processed foods such as potato

potatoes and canned foods. This was an increase of 61 million hundredweight over 1958.

The volume of potatoes used for french fries in homes and restaurants has not increased. It has run about 143 million hundredweight in each of the last three years. With population rising, it is expected that per capita consumption of french potatoes has been declining.

**County Director Says Fall Weed Spraying Gets Results**

Warden Leedy, Twin Falls, without fear of any self-criticism says the fall county weed director, urges farmers to consider seriously the fall spraying of weeds.

Leedy says the best results possible with modern chemicals.

Leedy says the weed department has found some of the best results are achieved at this time of the year. Chemicals work slower in the fall and burn less of the tops and go deeper into the root systems at a time when root reserves of noxious weeds are low.

Leedy says the weather has been fortunate this month for weed growth and many noxious weeds are showing heavy fallow now that the beans are off the fields.

He says weeds can be sprayed automatically with a device that hits the leaves and "burns" them down.

**Record Run of Storage Water Used This Season**

The Twin Falls Canal company (the remainder of time from the dry storage water from the natural inflow of waters into the American Falls reservoir for 1959-60. The only months this season for a record run, reports Alfred Peters, manager.

The average withdrawal of storage water in the reservoir is about 15 days.

The reason for this unusual occurrence, Peters says, is that there was little runoff of waters from streams and rivers into the reservoir this year because of the dry water lock season. In addition, irrigation requirements during July and August were high due to the blistering heat.

Under normal conditions the canal company draws storage water for just a few days in May and June, drawing irrigation water the remainder of the season.

**Silo Unloader Is Reported to Cut Time and Labor**

WASHINGTON, Sept. 24 (AP)—Federal and state agriculture engineers have developed a new silo unloader which may save time and labor in cattle feeding operations.

The unloader was developed by an agriculture department engineer working in cooperation with the Washington state experiment station.

When research is complete, the electrically powered device will automatically unload and distribute 175 to 200 pounds of silage per minute. The device includes a auger which makes a cut 10 feet wide, 12 feet deep, and 16 inches thick.

**Imports of Meat For U.S. Show Decline in June**

WASHINGTON, Sept. 24 (AP)—U.S. imports of livestock and meat products continued to decline in June, and June imports were the only red meat items which were above the June, 1959, level.

The total of red meat imports during the month was 28 per cent below last year, while variety meat imports declined 23 per cent. Imports of meat other than livestock products also declined during June.

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# Large Game Herds Overuse Browse Plants

## Idaho Fish and Game Department Warns of Damage to Range

Idaho fish and game department officials say that more hunters are needed in many areas around the state to adequately harvest big game. Unless a herd is hunted to take the annual surplus, serious range damage may be done through overuse of browse plants. A deer herd can double its numbers in two or three years unless adequately hunted or diseased and starvation limit it to equal the available food supply. The accompanying article gives a rundown on underhunted areas around the state. (Fish and game department photo—Staff engraving)

usually ignore county lines and sometimes state borders. Most units are quite central because of numerous roads. Weather is a big factor involved in both deer and elk hunting in Idaho because of the central region of the state. Snow and inclement conditions can be expected in the high country anytime after the last of September and hunters are usually in the mountains by then. While access to winter range is usually available through November by car and plane, hunters should check locally before starting. Strange country lies in the region.

**Deer Kill Possible**  
The special Hells Canyon deer tag makes it almost theoretically possible for a hunter to harvest four bucks around the state. First, he may use the regular tag to bag one deer during any general open season in Idaho. Then he may obtain an extra deer tag and take a general deer tag in a designated mountain area in southeastern or southwestern areas. The third tag bag entitled to the hunter is another deer in any of the rugged central portion of the state. A fourth, however, that only about eight per cent of the state's total deer harvest last year was taken on extra or middle tag.

**Winter Range in the Near Future**  
Winter range in the near future back country often amounts to no more than one or two acres of brushy areas during other seasons of the year. Each spring a crop of leaves is produced which makes up about 100,000 to 200,000 pounds of food for the deer. This means that for every 100 deer surviving, 200,000 to 400,000 pounds of food are required. If this is not met by hunting, nature does it. The animals starve or succumb to disease and parasites, or by other means. There is room for more deer and more.

**Plan Game Supply**  
Idaho big game managers are attempting in some areas to increase the food supply of the range, thus increasing carrying capacity. They are planning to plant barberry to help increase the carrying capacity of the range.
