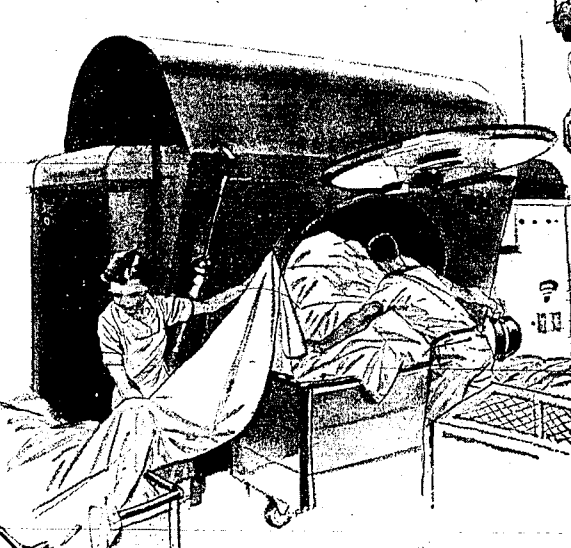

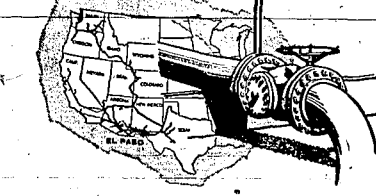

AUTOMATIC LIVING
 About the time folks were getting used to the hazards of modern living, along came some geniuses who changed everything. It seems like only 20 years ago when the little woman, her hair in a bun, sat at the coffee pot and, after she got the old ketchup out to earn his paycheck, she'd work like a dog all day, and then get a big dinner for her family.

Nowadays her hair is permanently fixed and doesn't look so bad even in the morning. Coffee is started by an electric clock before she gets out of bed. Housecleaning for the birds, with appliances and defrosters, washing is automatic and the evening neck clothes half-cooked and frozen from the supermarket.

Not that anybody complains, but it's hard to get used to these things. The voids are hard to fill.

When the little woman went to market in the old days, she'd be the neatest you know about by grinding her gears. The family bus sounded like a rivet gun and hopped down the street like a rabbit. Today the family bus is a motorcade.

And another "for example" is that long drive to the office. In the old days, it used to be a thrill when the phone rang. "Dallas is calling." You'd guess that Cousin Joe in jail or what was worse, coming for a visit. Now you answer, "Hello, Cousin Joe. Wish you Happy Halloween."

When you call long distance you don't have the important feeling that came when you called the operator. It's like talking to a girl in Los Angeles. You simply dial with a few extra twists, like you were calling up a friend to borrow a fist.

Those harrowing bumps and dips disappeared with the advent of the turpentine. No auto drivers queue up traffic, no traffic signals, no pedestrians, no cross roads, no potholes, no potholes, no less worries than when the engine ate time.

You don't need initiative anymore. Everything is preplanned, precooked, electronic or automatic.

That's why outdoor barbecues are so popular. They give a man a chance to build a fire all by himself. With an electric fire starter, of course.

BETTER BY COMPARISON
 Even day-to-day forecasts are hazardous where the Congo is concerned, but there is one thing as reasonable as prospect that Patrie Lumumba, the prime minister, cannot administer, is out as top man for good.

Colonel Mobutu, Congolese army chief, apparently has a retentive grip on the hand to have successfully ordered several hundred Communist "technicians" out of the country. These were the subversive Lumumba's alleged helpers in the Congo's trying hours.

Lumumba still has his voice, however, and that has to be put down as dangerous. So long as he retains sufficient man to manufacture some sort of chaos.

It is a great wonder how even an inexperienced, untrained new country like the Congo could have had one man as its leader. Except for a certain devilish personality augmented by a study set of vocal cords, he has no qualifications for leadership.

Indeed, matters reached the point where Lumumba appeared incapable of acting from the most elemental motives of patriotism. His behavior to this day depicts a man who is intoxicated with the idea of personal power.

One would not easily imagine that any man, in less than three months, could helm himself so enraptured by the necessity of his own role.

The worst of it is that in this mood of self-entrancement, he has not only the enemies of freedom in his midst. In the name of saving his country's independence, he put down the red carpet for his potential dictators.

Had he had the good judgment to rely solely on the U. N., the chaos in the Congo might have been averted. But when accepted soviet assistance in the great East-West struggle into his borders.

Had he had an ordinary boldness would be required to predict that things will now be better for the Congo. If an anti-Lumumba government headed by Mobutu or someone else takes hold, improvement may come gradually.

At the moment, barring new incursions by the Communists, the best that can be said is that perhaps the worst is over.

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG POT SHOTS

WASHINGTON—A generous expansion of the limited medical insurance program in the next Congress is being urged by a coalition of labor and widespread complaints that the present plan is only a "pittance."

Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller of New York is the chief critic of the federal-state arrangement, which he says is "a mere pittance" because of the present plan of the project at Albany.

Gov. Rockefeller's criticism is based on the fact that the new law's financial demands on New York is that the legislature pay-reducing changes by which the state's health insurance scheme to the social security system, with contributions by employers.

GREAT FIGHTING IN CONGRESS—The Democratic Party in Congress, Kennedy and Rep. Albert W. Gooden of Rhode Island, attacked the Rockefeller plan for the reason that the Senate's proposed Senate Finance Committee rejected it by a 12-10 vote and the administration side of the congressional caucus.

"KITCHEN AND POOR" AREAS—The question will be asked as to whether the states of Arizona, Louisiana and Mississippi, where so many "kitchen and poor" areas, will be listed as "poor" areas.

Such states as New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania and California, which have had a "kitchen and poor" for 80 per cent, although they have spent more money on their welfare programs than the states of the South.

TEXAS, of course, would be numbered among the "poor" states, and the other states of the South. Now, there comes another complaint and blow at the administration's welfare program.

RADICAL REVISIONS FORESEEN—At their recent convention, the United Steel Workers of America decided to establish their own billion-dollar health and pension program. It will rival the excellent hospital system built by John S. Lewis for the United Mine Workers of America.

Khrushchev's Stand Due to Red Squabble

NEW YORK, Sept. 27 (AP)—Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev's stand at the United Nations was directly from his bitter squabble with Red China for control of world communism.

That is the conclusion of top American authorities after a week-long study in action for the past year.

Communists Addressed
Khrushchev is talking in words at United Nations and in the streets of New York, but his words are directed to the communist bloc of the world. He is under growing pressure to demonstrate to the Chinese communists that he will charge them with having lost revolutionary fervor.

Split Between Red China and Russia
The split between Red China and Russia, according to information from the United States, is growing steadily wider and wider. The United States has noted the policy where Khrushchev refused to support China's demand for that nation's action was necessary before the gathering of the communist bloc in Moscow on Nov. 7.

Congress Issue
American authorities believe that the Congo and other issues are necessary to Khrushchev's purpose in turning the cold war on full blast against the United States.

There is no doubt that he will try to score up any dividends along the way and he may have some gains in Soviet-supported satellite nations emerges on top again in the Congo.

Cars Hit 2 Cows

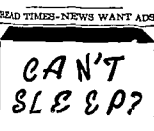
In Cassia County

Right Denied By Delay of Court Cases

WASHINGTON, Sept. 27 (AP)—A justice department report shows that thousands of Americans are being denied their constitutional rights to prompt justice because of a heavy backlog of cases in the federal courts.

The report, based last month by Warren Chief Justice and Associate Justice of the United States, revealed that nearly 70,000 civil, criminal and appellate cases are awaiting trial in federal courts.

49,000 Cases Filed

It would take the federal judiciary almost a year to plow through this huge backlog, and because so few cases were filed last year, cases are being filed—83,794 during the first 30 days of this year.

This was 462 more than the cases disposed of by the courts in 1959.

It is an extension of the trend that has been delayed in justice denied. Lawyers and judges say it should never take longer than six months to bring a civil case to trial.

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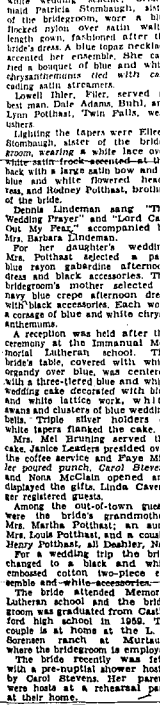

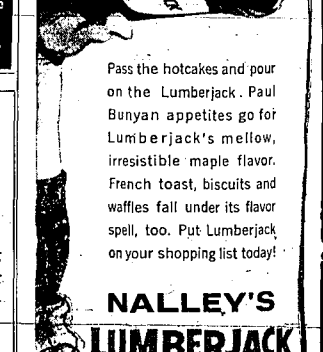

Role of Small Business Is Eyed in Talk

BURLEY, Sept. 27—Sen. Frank Church, D. Ida., voiced alarm over the diminishing role of small business in the country's economy when he addressed members and guests of the Burley Chamber of Commerce at the Monday luncheon at Cousin Ron's.

He called for tax and legislative relief which will give the independent entrepreneur a better chance to grow and prosper.

He reviewed his voting record in support of small business exemptions from wages and hour coverage and tax relief for small owners and entrepreneurs. He intends to look the same on them when tax measuring legislation introducing coverage of the minimum wage law was presented in congress last year.

"If we don't begin to do better by the man who owns the small business, it won't be long before small business becomes an extinct animal," the Idaho senator said.

He classified as a big business the business which employ 500 or more persons, he said, and that small business in Idaho, he stated. One person at the meeting stated that 2000 of such enterprises have been recorded in Boise in the past year.

During a question period a question was asked concerning the federal minimum dollar surplus, and the senator stated that the federal house had 100 been in the past year and that the surplus was of about two and one-half billion dollars. The surplus was based on a 100 percent increase in tax and a half cent cut on each congress dollar tax, therefore, the surplus was only about 300 million dollars, Church said.

He stated that in 1950 the country had the largest deficit in its history, and that during the past year the deficit had increased by about 12 billion dollars. He stated that the deficit was a third the rate of western Europe and it is a higher rate than that of any other country in the world.

The important thing is to get U. S. economy growing again healthily rate and reduce the federal debt, he said.

When the senator was asked about the proposed increase in the federal debt, he stated that most of the debt was incurred during the war and that the increase was necessary to pay for the war. He stated that his proposal was to reduce the federal debt by 10 percent in the next year.

ICC Refuses To Stall Cuts For Rail Rate

WASHINGTON, Sept. 27 (AP)—The interstate commerce commission (ICC) has refused to block a proposed 20 per cent rail rate increase on grain shipments to Pacific Northwest ports.

The ICC board of suspension voted Tuesday to allow the rate to stand pending the new rates filed by the railroads shipping grain from inland points to Oregon and Washington.

But this action can be appealed to a three-man division of the ICC anytime up to the Sept. 30, the effective date.

The rate cut has been bitterly protested by the barge and truck lines. They did not object to a similar rate cut on grain in 1953.

The railroads have argued that they will lose grain business and be forced to abandon their branch lines into the grain country if they do not lower their rates.

They contend that they are at a disadvantage because barge and truck grain shipments are exempt from government rate regulations.

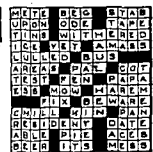

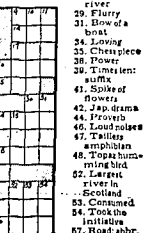

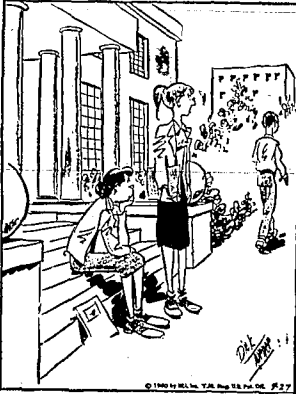

BOISE, Sept. 27 (AP)—A leading Democratic state legislator said today his party's endorsement to repeal the \$10 head tax was unwelcome and lacking in sound judgment.

And, he added, the only direction he saw the legislature could turn would be to the sales tax, which will put a hardship five times greater on the taxpayer than the head tax.

It was Monroe's committee which came up with the new Idaho income tax law in the last legislature, including the \$10 fee on each income tax return filed.

Since adoption, this ruling fee or head tax—has come under heavy criticism and recently the Democratic party, in its platform,

called for repeal of it by the next legislature.

"The Democratic party pulled the rug out from under me," Monroe said.

Such a move, he added, was unwise and nothing more than "political expediency instead of sound judgment."

"For myself, I don't want to buy my way back into the legislature," he said.

Monroe noted that the Republican tax alone was a disapproval of their platform, then added, "The Democrats should have done the same thing."

Nixon, the first to talk, said both candidates were behind labor's goal for a better life but had different ideas of the best methods to bring this about.

The carpenters' union, 820,000 members strong, traditionally opposes no potential nominee.

The 1,600 delegates and 400 guests thronged the hall in Nixon and took in 45 times with vigorous applause.

But a far blarer and siller demerolization came 3½ hours later when Kennedy took the same program. Cheers, whistles and applause delayed the start of his speech for one minute. The Nixon demonstration lasted 14 minutes.

Differences Noted

Kennedy said the two major parties have taken different positions on America's domestic issues since the beginning of the Woodrow Wilson administration.

He said there is a great place and a major place for private responsibility and individual enterprise in the United States but added, "There is also a responsibility for the people working as a whole if they are going to develop the resources of our country, if they are going to provide employment for our people, if they are going to provide homes, and federal policy affects that program as thoroughly as any other factor."
