### Transfers of U. S. Land to States Denied

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5 (AP)—Secretary of the Interior Fred A. Seaton has denied suggestions that the Eisenhower administration of the President Richard M. Nixon has proposed wide-scale transfers of federal lands to the states.

The department yesterday made public a letter Seaton wrote Friday to Thomas L. Kimball, executive director of the National Wildlife Federation. Seaton is traveling with Nixon on the campaign trail of the Republican presidential nominee.

Kimball had called Seaton's attention to an editorial in the *Palm Beach Gazette*, dated Sept. 10, reading a statement by Governor John F. Bunker Hunt, who is the transfer of federal land in Arizona to state ownership.

Seaton wrote Kimball that in view of past discussions with Nixon he was able to comment on the position the vice president personally has taken. The secretary added that it was his own responsibility to establish the basic administrative policy on the matter.

He said Nixon has endorsed proposals to authorize sale of small tracts of western public land for urban and business use and to create a special commission to study the non-military public land law.

Additionally, he said, Nixon has pledged himself to modernize the public land laws in order to meet the demands of the rapidly developing western states.

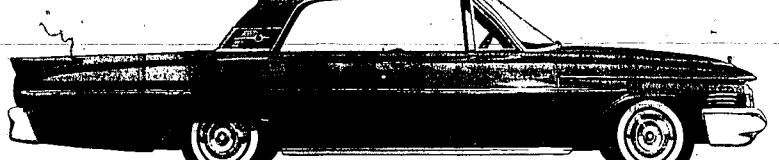

When completed, the federal highway system will make driving safer, easier and quieter, so I suppose I'm a nut to wish the roads weren't going to be built.
But I do.
As a motorist who puts close to 50,000 miles a year on his car, I do not look forward to the superhighways with their miles and miles of four, five and six lanes, their cloverleaf, like of the valley, and bachelor-tun turns, their endless stretches of straight, concrete, their speedway banker turns and their no "stop" and "go" sign.



What bores these roads will be: How monotonous to cross the continent without a red light, how dull to pass through big cities, how unexciting never to get lost, and how unadventurous always to get in service near restaurants as standard in appearance and food as the feathers on a chicken.
You never get the right directions or, if you do, you forget them after the first left turn—but getting lost is the best way to see a town or city. After you have made

three wrong turns, and gone by a turn where you were supposed to turn right, the best thing to do is to cruise around slowly, taking in the sights, until you happen across the road you were looking for in the first place. And you always do.
The new federal highways will never let you get to where you want to go.
Half the fun of motorizing is trying to pick out a good restaurant by name or appearance or by the roadside signs displayed. There is nothing more satisfying than to be surprised by a place that serves really fine food. You feel like a discoverer and the whole day is made.
Even now, before the roads are fully standardized, eating is a chore, a bore and dull beyond belief. The restaurants on the thruways, speed as defined as the hands on a clock, all look alike.

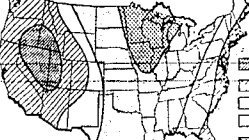

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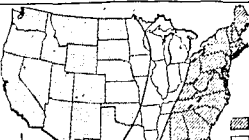
