

TUCKER'S NATIONAL-WHIGLIG POT SHOTS

WASHINGTON — President Eisenhower has decided to pursue a much "tougher line" toward Russia as a result of his private talks with allied and neutral states. The president's decision was announced at a general assembly at New York. His decision may be diplomatically significant in international and world affairs.

President Eisenhower's belated decision is a result of these off-the-record conversations that he has had with allied and neutral states. He is using an American flag expression, "on the war" in the White House. It is generally believed, has not been belated by his peculiar behavior. He has increased the world affection for Fidel Castro.

Instead of dominating the United Nations meeting, which he had hoped to do in order to bring the newly admitted African members of the International Body, Khrushchev's popularity contest with President Eisenhower, Khrushchev lost.

INCREDIBLE BIRD BEHAVIOR — Khrushchev in his visit to the United States has turned the neutral nations toward the United States and the United States. He has not only won the affection of the neutral nations, but also the affection of the United States.

Khrushchev, according to White House and state department belief, and mainly because of his bluffing in New York, has cut himself down as a leader.

Mr. K's incredibly bad behavior at New York and in previous visits has gathered a large following of admirers in Africa, India, Yugoslavia, and Mexico. Egypt, as well as the foreign ministers of several other nations.

EISENHOWER-KHRUSHCHEV DUEL — The behavior of Mr. K. and his behavior in the world's largest metropolis, not to mention the hotel and the streets of New York, has been a disaster in a literal sense in the eyes of the world.

The contrast, President Eisenhower's calm and dignified address made it clear to the world that Khrushchev's behavior was not only a disgrace, but also a warning to the world.

NATIONAL LIFE AND DEATH — As the campaign progresses, it becomes increasingly clear that the relations with Russia, particularly our ability to conduct Russia in a "hot war," has become the most serious political issue of the day.

Contrary to earlier beliefs, such broad-and-bitter political issues are not the only ones that will be decided in the White House when they go to the polls on Nov. 8.

In short, Nikita Khrushchev has been Vice President Eisenhower's biggest enemy in the 1960 presidential campaign.

The Democrats, to combat this challenge by the Eisenhower-Nixon team, must be able to match it with toughness of their own brand. What is needed is a candidate who can stand up to him, no matter which candidate was a combative, well-delineated rather than improve.

POOR TASTE AT LEAST

It's not unusual for the smoldering feud between Twin Falls County Recorder Thomas W. Stivers, Republican, and County Prosecutor Edward Babcock, Democrat, to flare up.

But usually the average reader hereabouts regards these flare-ups as nothing more than penny-ante political kid stuff. It is not until they are carried away with their personal political prejudices to the extent of making much ado about nothing.

Their latest tiff, however, is slightly different although not motivated to a large extent by the same old political horseplay.

The county prosecutor has charged that Republican campaign material is being distributed at the office of the county recorder. Stivers has received a letter of protest from Babcock reading as follows:

"This office (the county prosecutor's) has received a number of complaints from citizens of this county that political campaign literature and buttons have been carried and displayed on the counters and walls of your office (the county recorder's). It being part of the duties of your office to supervise in an impartial manner, and now that the polls have been set up and absentee balloting is being instituted in your office, I would suggest that all campaign literature, buttons and pictures, be removed."

Stivers made no attempt to deny the charge. Instead, he went to considerable length in citing legal technicalities to justify his position.

"This office has not been designated as a polling place officially," Stivers said. "Sure they vote here on absentee ballots, but this office is not designated a polling place as such."

Stivers could not constrain himself even to this flimsy defense of his actions. He pointed out that he had no right to censor political blast which questioned Babcock's capabilities as prosecuting attorney.

Denying vehemently that there is any animosity in the duo in which would make his actions illegal, Stivers commented that Babcock's letter of protest had "no more sound thinking behind it than anything else which has come out of that office in the last two years."

When it comes to sound thinking in this particular instance, Stivers is entirely out of order. Irrespective of legal technicalities or Babcock's ability as a prosecuting attorney.

Stivers should keep in mind that he is running a public office which should be conducted as such in a campaign headquarters of a sort for any political party.

For once, at least, the Times-News agrees with the county prosecutor. The Republican campaign literature should be removed from the county recorder's office.

QUESTIONS OF SPENDING

Seasoned federal budget analysts have been saying for at least two years that a gradual but steady rise in government expenditures is bound to occur over the next decade and beyond.

Their reasoning is fundamentally simple. They argue that the nation's booming population growth means that the demand for federal services is inescapable in the ahead. And they also point out that existing federal laws contain many provisions that require for automatic step-ups in government outlays.

It is their view, too, that these increases will occur regardless of which political party is in power, either in the White House or in Congress.

Evidence for this latter conclusion seems to be building up as the current campaign for the presidency advances.

Recent reports from Washington have it that President Eisenhower's final budget to be offered a few days before he steps down from office is expected to be about \$10 billion dollars in expenses.

Vice President Nixon, on the campaign road, is advocating a number of programs which would demand the greatest spending that would be elected. They include such things as more generous aid for medical care for the aged and assistance to depressed economic areas.

Observers who have sought to put the money tag on these proposals place their cost at a minimum of 1 billion dollars and a maximum of 2 billion.

The indications, therefore, are that there would probably not be too wide a gap between the two parties when it came to actual spending. It is the general consensus that the Democrats have a much finer attitude toward such outlays.

This does not mean that the differences may be unimportant. For when the expenditures are in the tens of billions, there is no doubt that the difference of a few hundred million dollars is important.

It is the important thing, or whether it is a minor consideration when set beside the broad picture which would be presented by today's heavy spending and promises for the future.

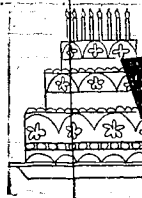
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Postmaster Studies New Building Blueprints

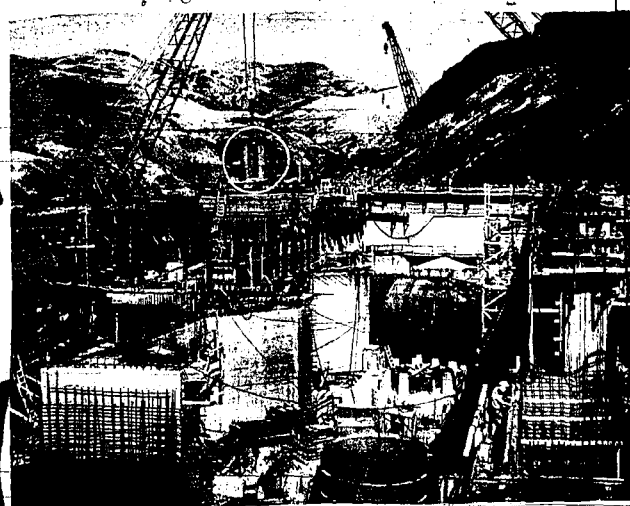

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Office Collections Fad Kills Time; Hal Describes System

NEW YORK, Oct. 7 (AP)—One of the great ways to kill company time in the modern business office is to take up a collection for somebody.

In the old days you took up a collection for someone only when he died or retired.

"Today any excuse will do. You take up a collection for a fellow if his sister-in-law develops head cold or the son gets bad marks in high school algebra."

"Did you hear about poor old Charlie's trouble?" someone asks. And before you can find out what's ailing Charlie, three eager beavers are already going around the office to raise a fund for him.

If you have ever taken up a collection yourself, the following types will surely be familiar:

1. The selfish realist—"I could drop dead in my sleep and nobody would even bother to mention a pecunie!" he growls. "When are you going to take up
2. The artful posponer—"he has a reputation for being generous but the truth is he hasn't actually contributed a nickel to the office collection in the last 15 months. His stock line: "Gee, I sure want to be in on this one, but I actually make a profit on every dollar I have any change with me. I'm sure and look me up tomorrow."
- 3. "You've got to get it done for me!" he cries. "You're taking up a collection for me after lunch before hitting good old Charlie, he skips a sheet of paper out of his pocket and plants him in a full stomach."
- 4. The topper—"You think old Charlie's got trouble?" he declares. "Let me tell you what real trouble is. If you spend 45

minutes listening to all the woe of his life, he will then generously contribute a dime to your collection.

5. The tycoon—"Will be glad to contribute \$5 — that is, if you honor credit cards," he says. "I haven't touched cash in years."
6. The big-talking bigwad—"I'd like to oblige you but I can't," he says. "I can't sign that group philanthropy. With me it's strictly by a matter of principle."
7. The double dealer—"Lend me two bucks and I'll be able to contribute one," he offers. You give him the two bucks and you receive one of them again. This guy is either of them again. This guy actually makes a profit on every dollar he collects — with your money.
8. The box—"It is awfully easy to identify him. If you collect your contributions, he's the guy who always hands you a \$20 bill."
9. The rival—"If you hand him a sheet of paper explaining why he's not in, you're taking up a collection for good old Joe, who has even worse troubles."

Voting Is Month Away; Race May Be Closest for Century

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7 (AP)—With election day only one month away, the presidential race between Republican Richard M. Nixon and Democrat John F. Kennedy looks like one of the closest of the century.

Millions of voters, according to the opinion polls, haven't made up their minds. Their decisions in the final month of the long American election campaign could produce a landslide for the Democrats or the Republicans, or they could split about evenly.

AND here comes a paradox of American politics: Even if these popular votes split about evenly, Nixon or Kennedy might win a whopping margin in the vote that actually counts—the electoral vote here's how:

Under the American political system, each state is allocated a number of electoral votes proportional to its population. New York is the largest, with 45. A total of 532 electoral votes are needed to elect a president.

Thus, if the New York popular vote favors one man by a little less than a one vote majority, the entire 45 electoral votes will fall in his lap.

In 1884, for instance, Grover Cleveland defeated James G. Blaine by carrying New York by 119 votes. A change of only 515 would have swung the state—and the nation—to Blaine.

It was almost that close four years later when Cleveland lost to Benjamin Harrison because he failed by 1,573 votes to carry New York.

More recently, Harry Truman defeated Thomas E. Dewey in 1948 by the sizeable electoral vote of 303 to 109. The popular vote was 24,108,812 to 21,970,055. But a shift of only 60,000 votes in four close vote states would have swung the election to the Republicans.

As of now, the race in some of the key states is just about that close. The big imperishable moment in every survey is the sizeable block of undecided voters.

Nationwide pollster George Gallup reduces this undecided figure to fire or six per cent by lumping with the decided votes all of the undecided voters "leaning" toward a candidate. But estimates of the number of "leaners" range all the way from around 12 per cent up to near 31 per cent of the electorate.

It is unusual for so large a percentage to remain undecided this late in the election.

Observers think one of the reasons for this is an inability to draw a sharp distinction between the candidates, both of whom are cool, intelligent, ambitious young men set apart from the voters in some indelible way.

Both Kennedy and Nixon, in speeches at the right places in the campaign, have watered down the traditional liberal-conservative differences between their parties.

Neither represents the beloved to have a big impact on the election, as the voters are expected to see both men under fire and watch their reactions.
