## American Executed in Cuba; 12 Cubans Also Put to Death

**HAVANA, Oct. 13 (UPI)**—The first American ever to be executed in Cuba met a grisly fate today as he and 12 Cubans were shot in the north. Anthony Zarba, 27, Boston, died on a rifle range outside Santiago last night. His body was buried in the nearby Santa Efignia cemetery pending arrangements for delivery to his next of kin, a sister, in Miami, Fla. Zarba was one of 15 men — the others were Americans — who were shot in two widely separated localities in a resumption of the executions in which more than 100 persons have faced firing squads since early 1959.

Zarba had been sentenced to be executed in Cuba since it became a republic in 1962. The first was Guzman, 40, Aguayguay, who died in a prison in Havana. The only survivor of the scene of Zarba's execution were the warden, a doctor, and the five men firing squad. Government spokesmen quoted Zarba as saying before his execution that he did not know he was coming to Cuba to "die," when he arrived in Havana Oct. 5 with 26 other expatriates.

Zarba disclosed when he heard his death sentence but quickly recovered his composure. Asked by U.S. Consul Harry Simon if he understood the verdict he replied, in the affirmative and said, "I never made a mistake. I was a bitter fight over whose country was better. I was in Cuba for some time on a business trip for an insurance company."

"I think those Cubans are just a bunch of animals," the brother said. "I was a doctor and I had a good-looking" person who liked excitement.

In Boston, Zarba's ex-wife said she accused his execution made the divorce final. She said her former husband had plotted to overthrow the Cuban government and make a lot of money. "The 'knew what he was doing,'" Zarba's execution was carried out 10 days after he was sentenced despite a personal plea by U.S. Ambassador Philip W. Barbour for clemency.

### Boyle Sees Marriage of TV, Phone; He Scolds Inventor

NEW YORK, Oct. 12 (AP) — Dr. Alexander Graham Bell did a great thing when he invented the telephone.

It served people apart, it brought them by wire closer to each other across country and continent.

It secured for a while that the telephone was the greatest mechanical instrument ever devised. It made the world a universal "village."

There are those who now believe the telephone has an even greater future by marrying it to television. I don't mean to explore the possibilities of pay-TV wire.

What I mean to discuss is the possibility you can phone people and see them as you talk to them personally.

This prospect may sound like a pipe dream, but I think its real appeal is to teenagers rather than grandparents. Teenagers seem to have a fa-

vor for each other's face and color which to the average grown-up is repulsive. They could use the framing of electronic voice and television sight to enjoyment. No one else I know can.

The truth is that the telephone itself afforded its ability to say "hello" to everybody and anybody. Certainly like the Pony Express and the telegraph, it was an dramatic victory in communications. But the better it got, the more it produced the telephone created.

It became an instrument to invade the greatest and most irresponsible communication a man can have—the communication of his own thought to himself, which means no stress. But it does demand privacy.

The telephone is a great instrument of many purposes. It saves the housewife from walking to a store. It speeds business decisions. It is the voice of each to his friends in an emergency. It is a source of help that brings quick relief. It keeps the lonely; it joins the

groups; it keeps in occasional but needed reunion the loyalists of farflung families.

But the telephone does other and more dismal things, too.

People you call up and would prefer not to hear you have to hear. People you don't want to hear from again have this invitation to your ear.

Strangers call you up and ask you to do things you don't want to do. Answering a telephone, which ordinarily was a thrill, becomes in time a chore and a fear.

In business there is also a trend toward putting a jured ear between your own ear and the phone. Anyone who picks up his own phone and answers it when it rings is behind the times.

I would phone up Dr. Alexander Graham Bell in heaven and complain about this except for one thing: He is not available now. Can I lose a message?

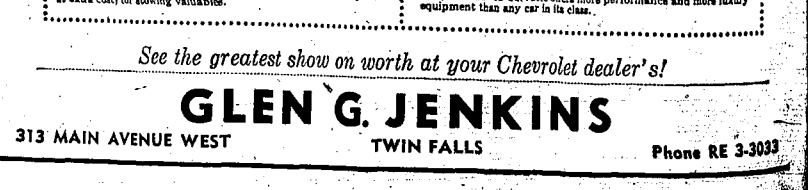
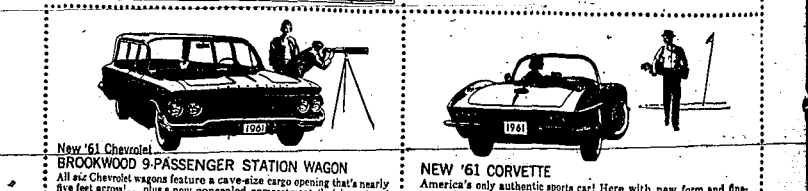

### Christianity's Future in Africa May Hinge on Congo Government Action

NEW YORK (AP)—The importance of Christianity in Africa may hinge on Congo government action.

U. S. Protestant and Catholic missionaries are keeping alive plans for expansion made before the former Belgian colony gained independence, precipitating violence and an international crisis. They expect to renew their efforts in this land which Christianity has found to be one of its best breeding grounds for propagation of the faith on the African continent.

But Dr. Homer Jack, associate director of the American Committee of Africa, who has talked to Congolese leaders, warns of new hurdles. "The Congo is likely to lay new ground rules for missionary work after its more pressing problems are considered."

Should this happen, Christianity may face a setback comparable to the one it got in India when that nation gained independence, Dr. Jack says. There, Prime Minister Nehru led a legislative movement curtailing Christian "enclaves" in the predominantly Hindu nation.

"If the Congo takes this step, it probably will be followed by some other African nations gaining independence, Dr. Jack reports.

Rev. Theodore Tucker, director of the African committee for the Protestant National Council of Churches, has hopes that Christianity will suffer no setback in Africa because of present or future political turmoil. He says:

"In the past we have had pretty free movement. We see no reason to suppose that African nations gaining independence will be any more or less stringent than those lands were in the past."

About 500,000 more than 1,000 U. S. Protestant missionaries affiliated with Council churches left the Congo during the crisis, Dr. Tucker reports. But he is hopeful because:

"One American missionary reports that the president Kasavubu (trained in Catholic schools) is saying, 'Be sure the missionaries who come back will stand by us.' The key words, to Dr. Tucker, are 'come back.'"

The mission secretary of the National Catholic Welfare Conference says that its missionary force is standing fast. While there was only one U. S. priest and a brother in the Congo, there are hundreds of others from European nations, including more than 400 American Jesuit missionaries.

For both Catholics and Protestants, the Congo has been a stronghold for missionary work. In some ways, it could be considered the hub of Christianity in Africa.

The Catholics report more than 415 million have been baptized there in the population of some 25 million. Congo Catholics represent almost 25 per cent of the faith on the continent.

U. S. Protestant council mission work is concentrated there. While the many Protestants are generally cooperative and are usually assigned by a coordinating body to various locations (Methodists to Liberia and Mozambique, Unit-

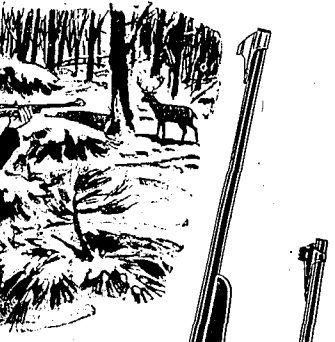

### Saddlemakers Are Dwindling Clan, but Art Is Continuing

PORT WORTH, Tex. (P)—In a few small shops, where the pungent aroma of fine leather hangs heavy in the air, a handful of western craftsmen continue to work as an art that will endure as long as man prizes fine horsemanship. They are the saddlemakers — a dwindling clan, even in this city with the title, "Where the West Begins."

Three Port Worth firms specialize in fine, handmade saddles. They are Laddy Brothers, L. White Box and Saddle Shop, and Nobby Barnes company, Inc.

Most of the saddles made by these firms are to special order for customers who may choose from a wide variety of sizes, types and shapes to suit themselves and their horses.

After the design is selected, the workmen go to work tooling, shaping and tacking the leather to saddles, "tree" and produce an "easy chair" for horseback riders.

The saddle leather is toolled with intricate designs as desired by the owner. Laddy brothers recently sold two saddles that featured green leather seats and white and brown unbroken calf leather skirts and fenders.

Frank Ledy, who established his company 29 years ago, has done other innovations that are

lightweight "Double Feather" with a horn for riding. Ledy's firm is thought to have the largest volume of any handmade saddlemaking in the country. His 12 craftsmen produce an estimated 1200 saddles annually. Saddlemakers turn out about 200 saddles each year, including the famous trophy saddles awarded annually at the world championship rodeo in Medicine Square, Garden.

The oldest of the three shops is the L. White shop, the industry's favorite, founded 70 years ago by the late J. H. White, who managed his company for his favorite brother, Nobby May. The Nobby shop has produced probably the most decorated saddle of the three.

More than 30 years ago, J. C. Miller of the 101 West Ward street had Nobby build a saddle that contained 100 diamonds, 20 sapphires, 17 rubies, four garnets and 15 pounds of sterling silver and gold.

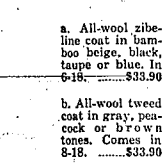

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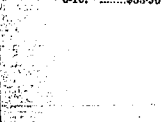

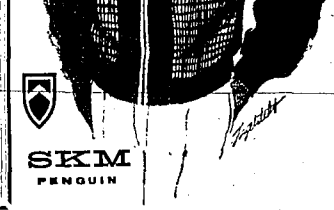

# Human "Muscle Rustle" May Help Fight Muscular Disease

**SECRETARY, N. Y.**—In a body signal obscured in the past, muscle rustle is the sound from the human heart. Every time you move a muscle you send out a high-frequency signal. These signals may help diagnose muscular disease, says Dr. William Candib, a Secretary physician.

And the sound from way in may be due to respiration. And they go way out. It makes you wonder about telepathy, says Dr. W. Candib, an electronics engineer. Candib and his team recorded the sound while testing new noise amplifiers that have so little noise that they reveal rustle of the body. The tones varied

They counted like waves breaking on a beach, like rain on a tin roof, like a jet streaking through the sky.

"I am a wild speculator," says Candib. "There must be some reason for the signals coming from the muscles and sound nature shows us. Candib says the strength and frequency range of these signals holds itself to diagnosis of muscular disease because the muscles are the principal generators of the radio signals." He believes "great airds may be made in fighting muscular disease since the signal, discovery supplies more details in transmission."

Volker feels "the fact that the human body generates radio-type signals leads to speculation whether or not it is capable of transmitting these signals and whether another person can pick them up."

"I do," he continued, "would explain rather easily such phenomena as telepathy, hypnosis, extra-sensory perceptions and possibly even the ESP sensation that, on occasion, the mind may have power over matter."

The experimenters found that small muscles such as those that fix the fingers or those near the eyes, were particularly effective signal generators.

"We wonder," Volker says, "whether making a fit or rolling your eye is merely a dramatic effect of actually see the radio transmitters of the body in motion."


The two men used tuned transformers or special vacuum tube circuits that minimize noise. Special wave filters emphasize a particular frequency component and suppress other frequencies.

Doctors have long been able to detect electrical signals generated from human muscles and nerves, and have used the method, but the signals were filled with so much "static"—interference from nearby muscles probably—that the methods were not too precise.

Dr. Volker has developed a device that helps amplify accurately and clearly specific ranges of electrical signals that are virtually noise free. This allows them to listen to specific muscles.

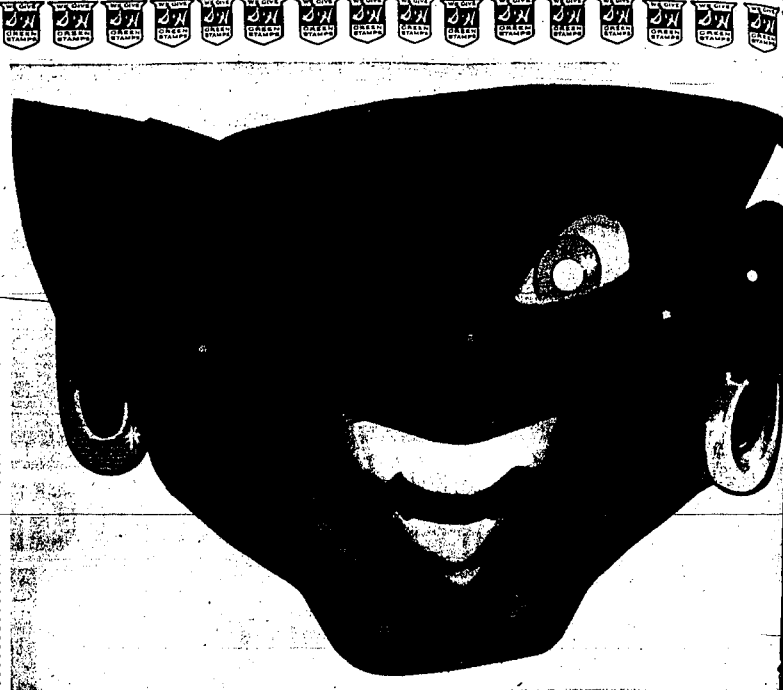

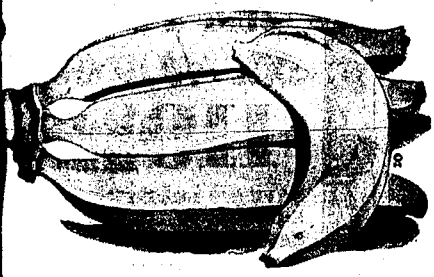

Mrs. Gene Bose, Indianapolis, opened the school eight years ago. At the time it was one of the first of its kind in the country.

In most respects it's like any other kindergarten. But it differs in that each morning after opening exercises children learn about safety.

Mrs. Bose thinks kindergarten children are the most receptive to learning safety rules. But, she adds:

"Children of this age usually have no fear. Therefore they need basic safety training and they must be taught fear—it might save their lives."

### Major Part of Human Heart Replaced OK

PORTLAND, Oct. 13 (AP)—Surgeons replaced the heart of a 35-year-old man three weeks ago today. They found the mitral valve so badly damaged that they had to replace it with a synthetic valve.

The patient, who had been in an artificial coma since rubber ball trapped in a plastic case.

Dr. Major Breakthrough said a University of Oregon medical school surgeon performed the breakthrough in heart surgery. There have been reports of similar breakthroughs in heart surgery, but in heart reality, they had to replace the mitral valve with a synthetic valve.

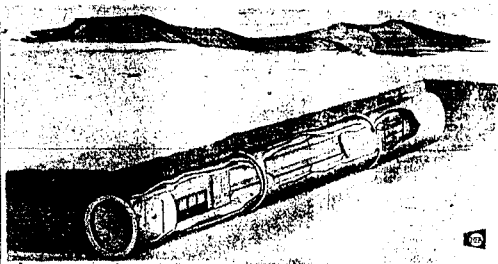
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### Underground Moon Bases Predicted

### Engineers Already Making Plans to Build Moon Base

WASHINGTON (NEA)—The effect of sunlight will tend to force air out of the moon, and engineers already are building up on all metals including trying to figure out how to use vehicles and tools unless they are up a military base on the moon, complete with underground barracks.

They're pushing ahead with their plans even though the scientists don't think we'll get one man there for about 15 years.

They're getting ready to build a large laboratory with a new "room" world of its own. Inside the atmosphere, living conditions, radiation, the dangers—everything—would be as near like those on the moon as the engineers could make them.

The object, of course, will be to learn how to build that base with the proper barracks and equipment, considering such factors as food, light, power, vehicles and sun protection.

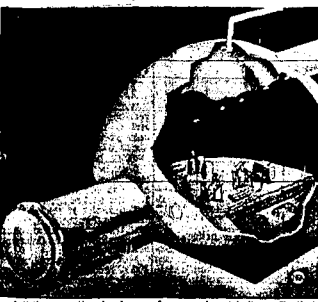
The first army colonel, even before the moon laboratory is built. The first man to step out on the moon is going to have a rest-suggested time.

In the first place, he will have to be "grounded," perhaps with a wire to the ground like the old-fashioned radio sets. That would carry off electric charges on any thing metallic that he's wearing or carrying, including any gold jewelry in his teeth.

Without circulating atmosphere, charges caused by the photoelectric effect will be very practical on the moon.

He'll carry all of his own power and food. All the water he expects to use while on the moon must be brought with him. All the air he breathes will have to come with him.

Truman came here to give for an overnight visit with friends before departing today for campaign talks in North Carolina and Virginia.

"I'm having a good time," Truman told newsmen and a contingent of friends at the airport. He was mainly in a good simple-breasted suit with a gray hat cocked over one eye.

Asked if he had been challenged on his statement in Texas that Vice President Richard M. Nixon, the Republican nominee, never told the truth in his life, Truman said, "Too bad I've heard of that. They can't challenge that."

Truman was asked if he intends to apologize, as Republicans have demanded, for another remark that Texas who vote for Nixon ought to "go to hell."

"Well, there is no hell," Truman laughed.

Truman denied he had said quite what he was quoted as saying in Texas on the way to hell there, but didn't offer to straighten it out.

**Nixon Says His Nose Is Cause Of TV Trouble**

HOLLYWOOD, Oct. 13 (AP)—"My trouble" is the vice president of the United States said yesterday, "is my nose."

### Red Seaman Has Asylum In America

NEW YORK, Oct. 13 (AP)—The seaman who fled Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev's ship, the *Balkia*, two days ago has won political asylum in the United States—and with it the freedom he sought.

The seaman, Victor Janninets, has been allowed to leave the U.S. immigration service offices where he had been held pending determination of his status and background.

The decision was announced by P. A. Exerty, district director of the service.

Exerty said he made the decision after consulting with his superiors in Washington.

"After checking sources of information, we have decided that Mr. Janninets is a bona fide political refugee," he said.

The International Rescue committee has been selected as sponsor for Janninets to "look after his welfare and get him settled," Exerty said.

Asked whether a guard would be provided to protect the seaman from possible reprisals by Soviet agents, Exerty said, "Definitely not."

Khrushchev himself struggled off the seaman's defection.

Janninets, 29, was among nearly 200 seamen aboard the *Balkia*, when it brought Khrushchev here Sept. 19 for the United Nations general assembly.

SALT LAKE CITY, Oct. 13 (AP)—A federal judge has granted a big-brother corpus writ sought by a man and a woman who took part in an Indian uprising on the Uintah-Ogury reservation last June.

Judge Willis W. Bitt's order freed Mrs. Etta McCurdy and Julian "Tony" from total fines of \$100 each or jail terms of up to 90 days apiece—penalties imposed by the eastern Utah reclamation tribal court.

The two, leaders of a band called themselves the "True Utes" assumed control of the tribal offices at Ft. Duchene, Utah, last June and held it for several days.

"They protested the way some tribal funds were being spent."

### Russ Soften Hard Talk of Khrushchev

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Oct. 13 (AP)—The official U.N. translation of Premier Khrushchev's bitter denunciation yesterday of the words "stooge" and "jerk."

Representatives of the Soviet news agency Tass, supplying an amplified spelling of the words new weapons, "our nuclear arsenal," now the cornerstone of our security, could soon slip from Khrushchev's use of the Russian word "stavlenik"—pronounced "stah-ven'chik"—with the accent on the first syllable.

A better English translation of "stavlenik," the Soviet newsmen said, came from Khrushchev's use of the Russian word "kholuy"—pronounced "kohl-uy"—with the second syllable accented.

A better English translation of this word, the newsmen said, would be "joker."

### A Power Plant Is Dedicated; Atomic Weapon Tests Urged

MORNING, Ill., Oct. 13 (AP)—The world's largest nuclear power plant, which produces electricity for 200,000 users—was dedicated yesterday with a call for resumption of United States atomic weapons tests.

John A. McCone, chief of the atomic energy commission, said the United States tests its nuclear weapons in the underground so that no detection is possible.

"We cannot long delay in this area—atomic tests—because the security that nuclear armament provide our country is the strong shield behind which we can push forward in the development of peaceful uses of this great new power."

The plant is the nation's first full-scale, privately financed nuclear generating station. It was built by the General Electric company for Commonwealth Edison and a group of independent electric companies.

McCone addressed dedication ceremonies at the \$5 million dollar Dresden nuclear power station—atomic size equivalent of conventional, coal-powered generating plants. The plant has been producing electricity for 200,000 Chicago area users since April.

Replying to a tirade Tuesday by Soviet Premier Khrushchev in the United Nations, McCone said the Russian's statement that the United States is turning out missiles like sausages is a threat to all nations and all people he cannot dominate.

"It is not to me a satisfactory statement that their massive production is based on nuclear technology of several years ago. I can

only surmise that they are advancing their knowledge behind their traditional wall of secrecy by testing their weapons in the underground so that no detection is possible.

### Production of Butterfat for Cows Declines

Butterfat production for cows on the Twin Falls County experimental association dropped below 30 pounds for the first time in reports "C. W. Gentry, reports "C. W. Gentry, Twin Falls county agent, says the drop to the 29.5-pound average of dry cows. Although 20 percent of the production in the herd tests were low in butterfat.

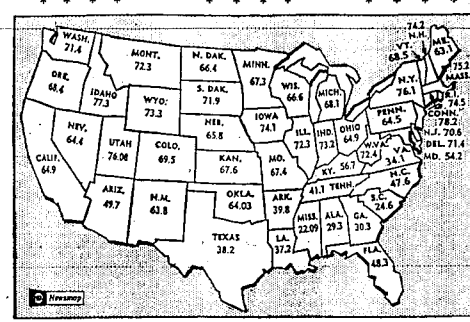
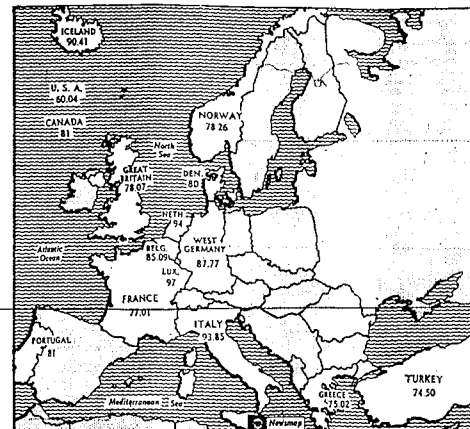
The average butterfat production of 28.2 percent was tested with 28.2 percent of the herd. The herd had an average milk output of 75.5 pounds.

Dr. Charles, Twin Falls, had high herd in butterfat production in 1959. He reported that all 20 registered Holsteins in the herd produced an average of 63 pounds. The herd was second in milk production with 1.4 percent of butterfat.

The Ralph Aho herd, Buhl, was the highest milk production in 1959. It produced 123 pounds from 25 grade Holsteins. The herd produced 112 pounds of butterfat. Each cow in milk and butterfat production in milk tests, which is the east end of the Twin Falls tract, was "Blue," a registered Holstein owned by Leo Aho. The cow produced 2,570 pounds of milk, which on a test of 4 percent fat, made 98 pounds of butterfat.

High butterfat producer in unit was "Sunlight" a grade Holstein belonging to the Hesteholm herd. Dr. Charles, Twin Falls, reported it produced 87 pounds of butterfat. High cow in milk output was "Queen" with 2,680 pounds of milk and 147 pounds of butterfat and Pat Peterson, Buhl, owned and fed some concentrate in addition to forage. High three unprofitable cows were fed last year.

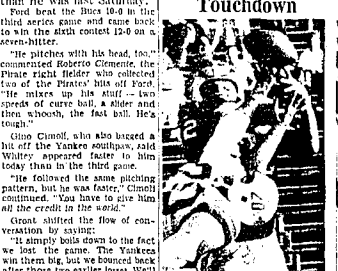

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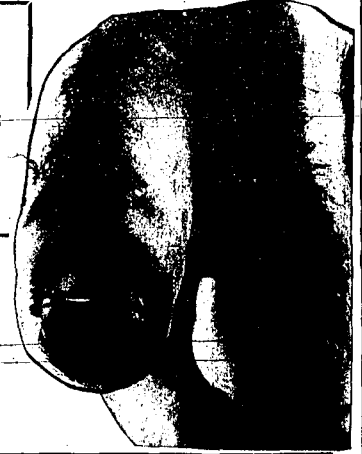

### Schedule for First Aid Set in Minidoka

RUPERT, Oct. 13 — Plans for a series of Red Cross first aid training classes to be offered throughout the county are announced today by Mrs. Forest Under, chairman of the women's division of civil defense for Minidoka county.

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## Hank Thinks U. N. Spotlight Shows True Colors of Reds

headed leader of the country. His status, his boasts, his long-windedness, his manner, his dress, his threats, could not have but given thought and pause to the men and women of the neutral nations.

Khrushchev's vicious remarks, his violent pounding on his desk, his red-necked appoplexy, his savage attack on the secretary-general—how could these increase his prestige in the eyes of thoughtful men?

I say let such men rave and rant and roar and threaten and revile all they want, and the brighter the spotlight on them, the better.

Their actions only heighten the contrast when President Eisenhower talks with quiet dignity and sincerity, when Macmillan speaks with well-bred calm and bearing, and when Ambassador Wadsworth answers taunts and bitterness with calm and gentlemanly reason.

I am quite sure that the brief, heartfelt talk made by the secretary-general in defense of his actions, carried more weight with men and women of the world than all the histories, all the shouts and cries, of the Khrushchevs and Castro.

Do the communists gain by the misuse of the United Nations? Do they really make friends and influence people with their never-ending tirades against the free world, against the leaders of the West, against the people of the West?

I don't think so. They steal the spotlight, yes, and the headlines, too, but all the while they are in the center of the spotlight they are revealing themselves.

No one could look and listen to Castro and gain or maintain a high opinion of the man as a social, sincere, thoughtful, level-headed leader of the country.

Let the communists be heard. Turn the dial so they sound even louder, if that is possible. Put the glare of world attention on them. Let no grimace, no gesture be missed.

Certainly the sight and sound of them in action at the United Nations is good for us Americans. It shows us what sort of men we are up against. After such a display to American has any excuse for misunderstanding the character or the aims of the opposition, in full, true color they have shown themselves to be opponents of peace, of goodwill, of reason.

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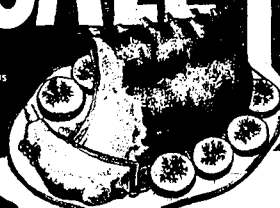

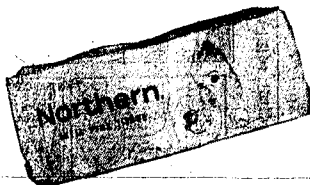

Withdrawal For Land in Hills Noted

BOISE, Oct. 13 — The bureau of land management has filed a modified national forest land withdrawal application which affects 290 acres of public land in the south hills, according to Boise land office Manager Donald J. Bailey.

The application calls for withdrawal of 274 acres of public land in the south hills national forest in Cassia county from operation of the mining law. The lands included were either in use or proposed for use as picnic areas or for other public purposes.

While reducing the overall total number of acres to be withdrawn, the modified proposal includes the withdrawal of 70 acres of land not contained in the original request made in 1959.

A 30-day waiting period is provided during which written comments or suggestions may be submitted in connection with the added 70 acres. If circumstances warrant, a public hearing will be held to iron out the complaints. Comments or suggestions should be sent to the BLM state supervisor, Boise.

The proposal temporarily segregates the specified lands from prospecting or locating for mining purposes pending action on the application by the department of the interior.
