TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—Apparent! Although Vice President Nixon has not uttered that sinister and dread word in his stretch room for the past several days, it is the voters' minds with respect to Senator Kennedy's ideas on foreign policy.

Senator Kennedy has been charged that the Democrats have been "betraying" the "Tsunami" regime. Vice President Nixon believes that he has finally hit upon the single fundamental issue which differentiates his position from those which have been advanced by the other major national honor, and on the more practical question of sending Kennedy to the White House to discuss the national concern to the commu-

Hay Ticker
Despite a sharpening of their differences in campaign speeches, especially in the television debates, the two candidates have disagreed only on the means of strengthening national defense, combating Russia and achieving expansion of the economy.

NIXON HAS RAISED AN ISSUE—The unusually large number of "undecided" and "don't know" people queried by the pollsters reflects the confusion of voters who are torn between these nice and attractive young men.

Nixon, however, Nixon feels that he has raised an issue which will win him the election. He has wrapped the Stars and Stripes around his candidacy.

Not only is their clashing viewpoints on the hands of Quenoy and Matsui which forms the basis of his unwieldy but implied indictment of the other candidate, but also the time between the Chamberlain-Hill meeting at Munich and Kennedy's trip to Europe.

Included in the Nixon implication is Senator Kennedy's suggestion that "President Eisenhower should have been more forthcoming in the use of the summit conference from Europe. Nixon contends that, regrets or no, regrets, Eisenhower would have done better."

THE SOVIET IS CHEATING—Senator Kennedy's opposition to bitter resumption of Atomic testing also lends itself to the Nixon attack. Kennedy's position is that the Soviet Union is cheating. He believes that the United States should continue these tests until the Soviet Union is caught cheating.

He also has the United Nations on suspecting the admission of Red China furnishes another peg for the Nixon thrust. Kennedy advocates Chester W. Igois and John F. Kennedy's position is that American policy on this question should be to keep the United Nations out of the picture on world problems can be effective or binding without Peiping's participation.

INVITATION TO WAR—Finally, as Nixon constantly notes, John A. Mohr, Truman's secretary of state, chairman of the Democratic advisory council's subcommittee on foreign affairs, was particularly hostile to the communist invasion of South Korea in 1950.

VIEW OF OTHERS

MR. RIBICOFF IS CONFUSED
Governor Ribicoff of Connecticut said this week that the American people are confused and need a better press coverage than any other Democratic presidential candidate in modern times. Mr. Ribicoff is unimpressed.

The American press, except for isolated instances, has always provided Democratic presidential candidates with pick-out-the-roses coverage. And that fairness has always been admitted by fair Democrats.

The real argument the Democrats have against the press is that the overwhelming majority of the newspapers in the nation editorially favor the Republican candidate. The proportion just about the same in this year 1960 as it has been since the New Deal took over.

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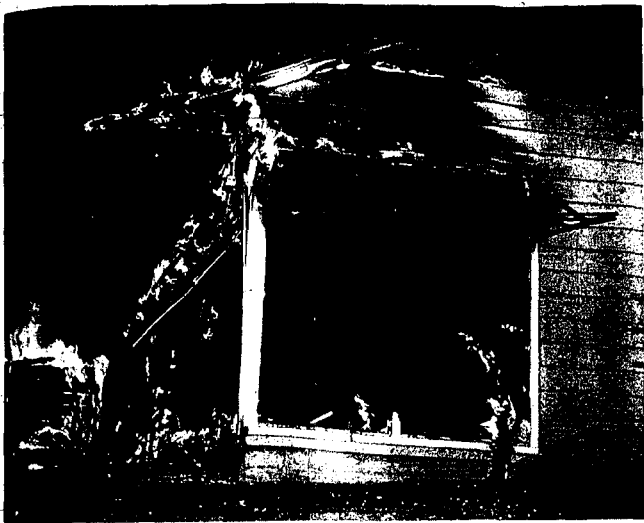

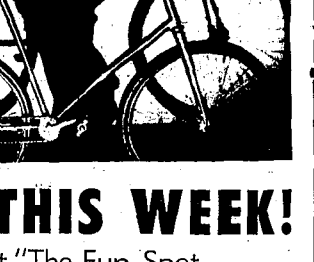

Demo South Gain May Be GOP Threat

WASHINGTON, Oct. 19 — Party claims of a Democratic resurgence in the South may pose some new threats to Vice President Richard M. Nixon's basic campaign strategy.

The Republican presidential nominee has been working hard to rack up half a dozen southern and border states to offset the admitted advantage of his Democratic rival, Sen. John F. Kennedy, in New England.

Frank Keeney, Nixon's strategist here, tended to link the states with those of the midwestern farm area as a foundation from which he could win the presidency by at least securing half his opponent's electoral vote of the industrial states including New York and California.

But the southern flank of this base has come under heavy Democratic attack in the last couple of weeks. There is some evidence that the flank is weakening somewhat.

The most recent Associated Press survey showed Kennedy clinging to the Nixon column in a doubtful state and Louisiana shifting from doubtful to Kennedy.

The survey indicated Nixon leads in Florida, South Carolina and Virginia, which have a total of 30 electoral votes.

Other States Doubtful Besides Kentucky, the doubtful state includes West Virginia, Louisiana, Tennessee, with 11, North Carolina with 14, Mississippi with eight and Alabama with 10.

Republicans say these give Nixon the opportunity to build a base with the farm areas of Oklahoma, Kansas, Nebraska, South Dakota, Minnesota, Iowa, Illinois and Indiana.

Paradoxically, Republican prospects appear to have dimmed in the farm belt which the Democrats thought a key to victory in the South. At the same time GOP strength may have waned in the South and border states where their opponents were singing the blues in September.

Nixon has repeatedly discounted the talk some in the South of the best men or women regardless of race. He said he has made no commitment.

2 Southwest Indians Are Found Dead

GALLUP, N. M., Oct. 19 (AP)—Navajo police officers reported yesterday that two southwest Indians were found dead in a winter swept through the reservation during the past week.

The bodies of the two men were found separately about 60 miles apart in the Arizona portion of the reservation.

One Yazzie Orphair was found near here three miles west of Pinon. Ariz. Police said he is reported to have left his home after an argument with his family. He went up on a nearby ridge and apparently fell asleep and froze to death. His body was found Monday.

John Wilson, 42, Kinchee, Ariz., was found Sunday after the coroner's coronial in the area. The coronial is held at the beginning of each winter and consists of a series of tests designed to keep people well during the winter months ahead.

Official said Wilson was on horseback when he left the coronial. He apparently fell from his horse a few miles from Kinchee and tried to walk to cover.

He collapsed near a house during the nighttime and froze to death just outside the door. The occupants of the house found his body Sunday morning.

Senator Hints GOP Apology To Red Chief

WASHINGTON, Oct. 19 (AP)—Sen. J. William Fulbright, D., Ark., hinted today that the Republican party might make an apology to Richard M. Nixon had expressed regret to Soviet Premier Khrushchev over the lifting of a 1959 "captive nations" resolution passed by Congress.

Fulbright said he had been informed that Nixon told Khrushchev "that he regretted the resolution would deliberately have chosen to have a resolution of this type passed just before his (Nixon's) visit to the USSR."

"Mr. Nixon added, 'After all, we are not angels,'" Fulbright said.

The resolution, passed by Congress and signed by President Eisenhower directed the President to proclaim a "captive nations" week to emphasize the plight of people behind the Iron Curtain.

Fulbright, who heads the senate foreign relations committee, made his statements in a letter to Secretary of State Truman in which he expressed his demand for release of the full records of Nixon-Khrushchev conversations in Moscow last year.

Fulbright noted that Nixon, as the Republican presidential nominee, has criticized Sen. John P. Kennedy, his Democratic rival, for expressing regret over the U.S. spy plane incident that would have been admitted to the conference which collapsed last May.

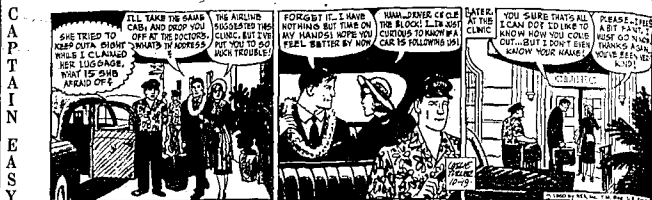

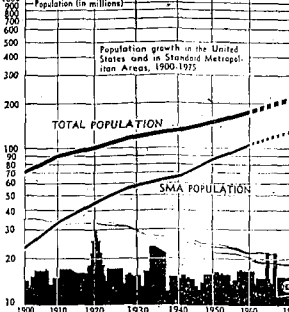
