while the wrestling crew threw it on the ground.

Brown Lundy was the man with the knife, cutting the ear for punched identification, cut 13 1/2 inches a wattle from the loose hide beneath the jaw bone and if it was a bull calf, castrating it.

Another of the crew then dehorned the calf and while this was done the other men jabbed the calf with antibiotics. One injected penicillin into the neck of the animal, and the other injected 50 cubic centimeters of a penicillin solution into the side of the calf. This amount is five times what is injected into a horse or cow.

The calf was then rolled on its other side and, if it was a spotted, unbranded calf, Jack Butler then burned a brand, clear Quarter Circle Six through the right side of the hide. In some popular markets branding doesn't hurt the calf, but in some areas it does and scars off with the clear mark of Butler's ownership showing for the rest of its life.

Branding is a necessary in range cattle operations. Individual brands are registered in a book in Boise and are deterrents against rustlers. They are also means of identifying cattle when they get sorted in the fall roundup from the forest service and Bureau of Land Management men.

When the calf was released by the medicine and surgical crew of ranchers, Weech flipped the loose hair, unspooled more from the front and back looper. The looper unspooled and wound around the looper so that the calf ran away and joined the others already processed.

By lunch time, all the calves that needed any work done on them except dehorning had been sorted out. Then Mrs. Jack Butler and Mrs. Raymond Butler served as complete a meal as can be bought anywhere for eight hard-working hands.

After lunch the remaining calves were run through long chutes into a squeeze chute where Weech and Norman Mason ran the looper and then held the calf's head while Raymond Butler used the dehorning knife. Jack Butler then sprinkled the styptic powder on the open wounds to stop excessive bleeding and to keep away infection.

Charles Cline, 68, a longtime retired cowboy who lives near the Broke ranch, came to the corral to watch the proceedings. Green Butler, who also came to watch, soon found himself with the job of branding calves for blacking.

In a short time, the work was finished and the hour for awakening the next day was planned for the same operations at another ranch on other calves.

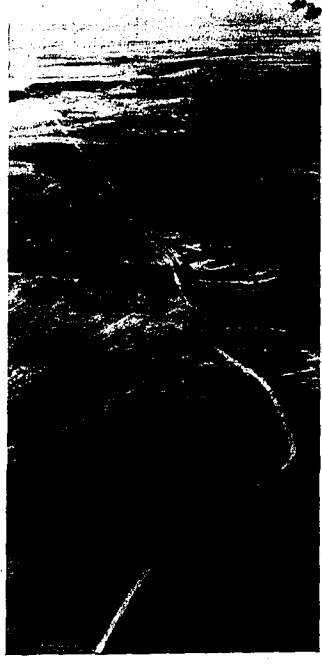




# Miles of Mud Flats Mark American Falls Reservoir Site Where Old Roads Are Still Visible

Although the Twin Falls tract draws on the water stored in the reservoir during the peak growing season, a good percentage of the water used in this tract originates at American Falls. Almost 2,700 second feet of water comes from springs and streams in and around American Falls that are included in this company's fillings on Snake river.  
Alfred Peters, manager of the Twin Falls Canal company, says that although this water will supply a good share of the needs of the tract, about 1,900 additional second feet must come from storage during July, August and the first part of September. If storage water can't be drawn from the reservoir, winter water flow in the canal can be ceased for about two month period (probably in January and February) and stored in the reservoir to assure that needed storage water will be available next summer.  
Whether the winter flow will be stored for this period is now in question, and Peters says this will be determined by the character of the weather in the drainage area during the winter months.
